

# Dr. Douglas' Funeral Today In Winnsboro

Funeral services for Dr. James Edward Douglas, Jr., 64, of Winnsboro will be conducted at 11 o'clock this morning for the First Methodist Church in Winnsboro by the pastor, the Rev. Harry Chandler. Interment will be in the Methodist church cemetery.

Doctor Douglas died Saturday afternoon at the Baptist Hospital in Columbia, where he had been a patient for five days after a heart attack at his home last Saturday.

Dr. Douglas was a greatly beloved physician with a wide circle of friends, who will join with the family in mourning his passing. He was a man of many upstanding qualities and recognized in his profession as a skilled physician.

He was the eldest son of the late Doctor James E. and Mrs. Nettie Stevenson Douglas. He was born in the New Hope Community of Fairfield County July 28, 1892, and was graduated from Erskine College and from the South Carolina Medical College in Charleston.

On September 1, 1920, Doctor

Douglas was married to the late Miss Annie Gibson of Winnsboro, and in that year he began the practice of medicine in Winnsboro. He was an active physician until his last illness.

Taylor, James Edgar Douglas, III, Carl Macy Douglas, and David McDowell Douglas, all of Winnsboro, and Jimmie Milton Douglas of the 8th Engineers Corps, Fort Benning Ga., ten grandchildren; three sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Bessie McMeekin, Mrs. Lily Davis, Miss Mayme Douglas and Dr. Robert T. # Dr. Douglas, 64, Dies; Practiced Here Since 1920

## Funeral Held Monday for Longtime Town Councilman and Physician.

Dr. James Edgar Douglas, Jr., son of the late James E. and Nettie Stevenson Douglas, died at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the Baptist Hospital in Columbia after a heart attack at his home the previous Saturday.

Dr. Douglas was born in the New Hope community of Fairfield County July 28th, 1892. He was graduated from Erskine College and the S. C. Medical College of Charleston and interned for 2 years at Roper Hospital.

On September 1, 1920, he was married to Miss Annie Gibson, who died in 1954.

Dr. Douglas served as 1st Lieutenant at the Medical Base Hospital at Camp Greenleaf, Chattanooga, Tenn., during World War I. He practiced medicine in Winnsboro from 1920 until his last illness, being associated with his father until 1940, at which time Dr. Douglas, Sr., retired.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church in Winnsboro, a member of the Masonic Lodge and of the American Legion, and a Director in the South Carolina Fox Hunters Association.

He was deeply interested in all civic affairs and served continuously from 1925 to 1955 as a member of the town council a period of thirty years. A silver cup was presented him by Mayor W. R. Elliott as a token of appreciation from the town for his life and services. Dr. Douglas had a warm personality and a deep love for people. He inspired confidence in the sick, and his happy, cheery smile was always present. He had scores of friends among the colored people as well as white people. All who knew him loved him.

Dr. Douglas had a quiet, abiding faith and a firm belief in prayer.

Funeral services were conducted at 11 a.m. Monday from the First Methodist Church, by Rev. Harry Chandler, pastor, assisted by Rev. Richard Sturgis, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church.

Interment was in the Methodist Church cemetery in the family plot.
