Douglas. It was handed down to

Dr. William Rylos Hecklin (1871 - 1911)

He and his wife Lula Blaine are both
buried in Concord Pres. Com. in Woodword.

The top part of the information sheet
was written by my father-in-law

Zachariah Hecklin Douglas. He was
a criminal lawyer here in Jacksonville

(over)

at Dr. James C. Hicklin's residence, Beaufort, S.C.

Mrs. Sarah Rebecca Hicklin on the veranda. Dr. James C. Hicklin was
the son-in-law of Major General George Washington Custer, hero of Gettysburg.
The mansion was designed by an architect from Paris, France, and constructed
by a firm out of Charleston, S.C. The interior reflected the period of
Louis XIV, with the furniture and furnishings "modern" American - French-
German - selected as of the 17th Century. The dining room suit with
buffet was said to have been imported from Italy. All paint and colors
Sedona predominated the exterior, as well as the interior of "Cheapside"
which caused unusual attraction. This subject (Mrs. Hicklin and her
home) was a social background for artists both amateur and
professional during late 1800's and early 1900's.

Dr. James Edgar Douglas, Jr.
Son of Dr. James Edgar Douglas and
Margaret Jeanette Stevenson Douglas.
Graduated from Erskine College and of
the Medical College of Charleston.
Was a well-loved physician in
Winnsboro, a mason, and a member of
the local American Legion Post, having
served in the Medical Corps at Camp
Greenleaf in Chickamauga, Tennessee
during World War I.

Married Annie Gibson in 1920, and
had six children - Anne Sims Douglas
Melvin, Dorothy Douglas Tregaylor, *James
Edgar Douglas, III, Carl Macey Douglas, *Ward
McDowell Douglas, and Jimmie Milton
Douglas - *deceased -

Dr. Douglas served for thirty years as a
member of the town council in Winnsboro -
In April, 1925, he was elected to this
position and served continuously for
30 years - Although Dr. Douglas did not
offer for re-election, he continued to be
interested in civic affairs - At a
special ceremony, he was presented a
silver cup by the Mayor, (Bill Elliott)
A portrait of Dr. Douglas ^{in his father's} hangs in
our Fairfield Memorial Hospital, along

with other esteemed & beloved doctors.

Dr. Douglas Hobbs

One of Dr. Douglas's hobbies was fox hunting, a sport he enjoyed two or three mornings ^{each} week, getting up at 4 o'clock, and returning in time for breakfast) so as not to interfere with his busy schedule - He kept anywhere from 6 - 10 prize fox hounds in his backyard, also a part of his family -

His sense of fairness, his serenity, his excellent judgement, and his cooperativeness made him popular with everyone -
