
## Town Honors Dr. J. E. Douglas



## Serves on Council Thirty Years


Pictured here is Dr. J. E. Douglas receiving a silver cup from Mayor W. R. Elliott, as a token of appreciation from the Town Council for 1 o n g and meritorious service on the council. Dr. Douglas, a Winnsboro physician, established a record by serving continuously from 1925 to 1955, a period of 30 years. He retired voluntarily on account of his health.

The presentation took place in the town hall on October 30 prior to a regular council meeting, in the presence of old and new councilmen a n d twenty members of Dr. Douglas' family. The inscription on the cup reads: "Presented to Dr. J. E. Douglas for 30 years faithful

service as councilman, 1925– 55—Town of Winnsboro."

This appropriate recognition was authorized at a meeting in April, 1955, when the council was composed of Dr. Douglas, was composed of Dr. Douglas, J. M. Hall, Berry Arnette, Ern-nest Ferguson, S. D. Ellison, Jr., and T. W. Evans. W. R. Elliott was Mayor. The motion was made by T. W. Evans, seconded by Mr. Ferguson and passed unanimously in Dr. Douglas' ab-sence sence.

All officials of the town, past and present, spoke appreciatively of pleasant associations with Dr. Douglas and agreed that he richly deserved the honor accorded him. —Photo by Ferguson
