Here is some info that we found for Thomas Edward Dye:

It does appear he was married more than once:

The 1880 Census has Nancy E. Dye-aged 35

The 1900 Census has Drucilla Dye-says she was born in March 1850-aged 35

The 1910 Census has Drucie Dye-aged 62 years

The 1920 Census does not list a wife, only his daughter Sarah F. Dye living with him

There is a Elizabeth N. Hill Dye buried in the Hill-Dye Cemetery with the following on her tombstone: January 10, 1844 to December 24, 1880, the wife of T. E. Dye. This could be the Nancy E. in the 1880 Census, as I have found that sometimes the two names were switched.

In the 1860 Census there is an Elizabeth Hill, daughter of Alex. & Mary E. Hill, who was 16, this appears to be Thomas' 1st wife.

Thomas' 2nd wife was Drucilla L. Mobley:

Drucilla was the wife of Thomas in the 1900 census, Elizabeth or Nancy had died in 1880

Drucilla's probate records state that she was the wife of Thomas E. Dye

Drucilla's death cert. states that her parents were Biggers and Frances Davis Mobley

Drucilla is buried in Cool Branch Baptist Cemetery, July 6, 1844 – October 11.1916

In Thomas' Death Certificate, it says he is married but does not list a wife. If he was married, we did not find a name, so this may not be correct that he was married. It also stated that he was born in Chester County, as were his parents, George and Betsy.

Thomas is buried at Antioch Methodist Church beside his daughter, Sarah Frances Dye.

Edward Hill Dye, oldest child of Thomas, and his wife are also buried in the Antioch Methodist Church Cemetery near Thomas. His death certificate says he is the son of T. E & Mary Hill Dye.

River and near Green Pond Station, until April, 1862, when he went with his Regiment and Gen. Gregg's Brigade, first to the vicinity of Fredericksburg. Afterwards joined with this Brigade, the Army of Northern Virginia under command of Gen. R. E. Lee, in Gen. Stonewall Jackson's corps from Aug. 1862 to his death in May, 1863, then in Gen. A. P. Hill's corps until the surrender of Gen. Lee at Appomattox on April 9, 1865. He was in all the battles in which his command was engaged, except Sharpsburg, Harper's Ferry and Ox Hill in the Maryland Campaign and Fraser's Farm and Malvern Hill, being absent on account of sickness, and except the battle of Reams Station and Jones Farm, which were fought, while he was absent on account of his wound from the 16th of August to October, 1864."

Born Nov. 20, 1846, in Chester County. Entered Army Dec. 1861 in Co. B. 17 S. C. V., under Capt. W. A. Burley. Wounded



at the Crater in 1864 at Petersburg.

Taken prisoner at Fort Steadman March 25, 1865, and then carried to Point Lookout, Md. Released July 1, 1865. Was guarded by black negroes.

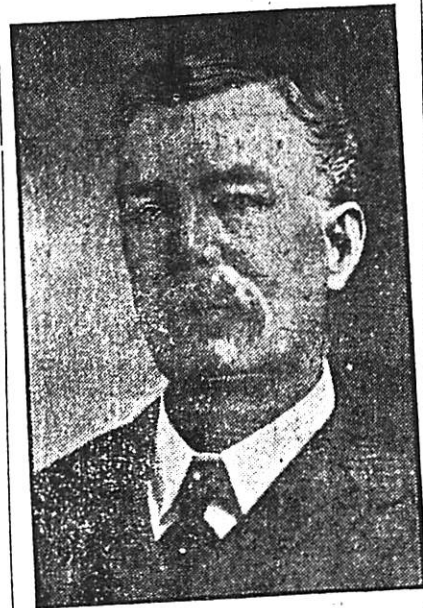

discharged on account of wound. Now farming near Shelton.

LEE ROY FEE.

Born Sept. 13, 1845, in Chester County. Entered Army in 1862 in Co. H, under Capt. John McLurkin. Went to Virginia in 1863 to the 6th Regiment. Company G.

JACOB FREEMAN.

Born in 1844 in Richland County. Entered Army in 1861 in Company B, under Capt. E. B.



Cantey. Wounded at Mobile, Ala., 1865.

Now farming in the Center-ville section.

JOSEPH FRESHLEY FREE.

Born Oct. 6, 1835. Entered Army in 1861 under Capt. Davis. This Company disbanded and come home. Joined Capt. Coleman's Company. Wounded at Second Battle of Manassas. Taken prisoner March 4, 1865, and carried to Point Look Out, where he remained until July 4, 1865.

JOHN LONG FORD.

Born Dec. 12, 1844, at Rocky Mount. Entered Army in 1862 in Co. B, 4 S. C. Cavalry, under Capt. O. Barber. Was never wounded, though horse was killed from under him.

Dear Cousin Charles,

My girlfriend, Pelham Lyles, runs the local museum and received your letter of inquiry of July 19. The genealogy room is in the process of being relocated to the museum and the files are still in boxes, but I can provide you with some information on your ancestors, as I am also descended from the first John Dye (1746-1825). I know he had a land grant on Rock Creek (the next creek south of Beaver Creek on the Broad River in Fairfield County) in 1764. I do not know his wife's name, but I do believe he came here from Pennsylvania. The Dye name is prevalent there with various spellings and many of the given names are the same that we have in this locale. I think that they may have been descended from Dutch settlers and the name is sometimes spelled Day, Dyches, etc.

One of John Dye's (#1) sons was George Dye, who married Mary Lemley. Their son was George Lemley Dye who married Sarah Roberts. Their daughter, Jemima Dye, married James Crowder and they were my great-great grandparents.

In your general notes I would like to offer some corrections. There were no Chinquapin Indians here. The Natives in this western half of Fairfield County were Catawba, some Cherokee, and a group that migrated from NC called the Eno. The area of Beaver Creek and Broad River was a favored area for hunting and trapping and native groups had been living here since at least 1200 AD. There are numbers of Mississippian period mounds. Much of this area today is called "Buckhead", a slang term for a Native American community. Many of the people here, both white and black, are descended from these native people and my Crowder ancestors were likely Catawba.

Beaver Creek has never been the county line. The Chester County line is further north. The family names Lyles, Beam (Boehm in German), Colvin, Mayfield, and Hill that you mention are all still common here. Pelham's Lyles ancestor was Ephraim Lyles (Lisles) who was scalped on Beaver Creek in 1761. The Pennsylvania immigrants did, in fact, come into the county on a branch of the Ocaneechi Path, which merged with what later became the Great Philadelphia Wagon Road. The merger was at Salisbury, NC, and continued on through SC in Chester, Fairfield, Newberry counties (crossing the Broad at Lyles Ford), and onward to the Southern states west of here.

Another of John Dye's sons was Malachi, a gunsmith. He moved to GA and possibly later to ALA. His descendant is Pat Dye, the former well-known football coach of the Auburn U. Tigers. Off the top of my head, this is what I can remember of the earlier Dyes. I will try to locate my records to fill in some gaps.

Pelham will print you some nineteenth Century. maps of this area and is interested to know what else you know of Mary A. Lyles. Was she a Cleburne County Lyles or did she come from our area. Three Lyles brothers were some of the earliest settlers on the Broad River/Beaver Creek area. They came down from Virginia following the Ocaneechi Trail and settled in several NC areas along the way.

Do you use email? Pelham can fill you in with information from the Dye family files when the genealogical library gets set up.

Husband's General Notes

The Dye's and several other families in the same traveling party settled near Beaver Creek in an area that was originally settled by the Chinquapin Indians, between the Broad and Catawba rivers. Beaver creek became the County line between Fairfield and Chester Counties in South Carolina. John died at 64 years old intestate [without a will] John Mayfield and William H. Colvin administered his estate at his death. All of Johns children were under 21 at the time of his death. Fairfield Co. SC.deed book R, pp 147 - 149 shows John buying 40 acres of land on Beaver Creek, bordered by land of George Dye. John owned about 500 acres of farmland in Chester county. John was married to John Beams daughter Sarah, and some of the other families in the area were, Beasley, Lyles, Beam, Murdock, Pannel, Colvin, Hill, and Taylor. They cleared the land and put in crops, took fish from the streams, wild game from the woods and, lived off the land. As John and Sarah's children were becoming adults, there were vast areas of land being opened up for homesteading in the states to the west, and many of thier neighbors were migrating to these areas to find a better life. John's son, Thomas D. and his wife Mary Lyles went on to northeast Alabama, Nathan, Jonathan and, Alfred went on to Mississippi, George Washington went on to Louisiana, and he is buried in Lincoln Parish.

John Dye died without a will. john mayfield and william F. Colvin were the administrators of his estate. At the time of his death, John had 5 grown children and 4 which were under the age of 21, and a plantation containing 418 acres.

Husband's Research Notes

John Dye and Sarah Beams ancestors migrated to South Carolina by the same route as many other families who came in search of new land as the country developed. The route taken must have been the Indian trail know as the Ocaneechi, or Saluda trail. this was known from earliest times as a trading path from Virginia to the Carolinas and on into Georgia and Alabama. The trail followed the Blue ridge mountains, the middle piedmont of NC. SC. and GA. Chester County South Carolina was named for Chester PA. whose ancestors came from Chester England. The family name Dye, Beam, Colvin, Lyles and Beasley can be found repeatedly in historical research of Chester and Fairfield Counties, and were some of the earliest European settlers in the area.
