OLD LUNENBERG

In the period between 1745 and 1765 there were many families represented in this section who contributed later to the settlers who moved into the North and South Carolina wilderness, and in many cases moved on as entire families after stopping for awhile in the Virginia "Southside" or "Old Lunenberg." Lunenberg County originally embraced all that territory extending from Brunswick County westward to the top of the Blue Ridge Mountains from the NC-Va. line northward to the divide between the James and the Roanoke Rivers. Almost all the Fairfield-Chester settlers came down this way - the Colemans, Feasters, Moberleys, Varnadores, Wagners, etc. - the Wrights, Claytons, too. Among those mentioned in the Tithe Lists, which were really Census reports, we find the following:
