April A. D.. 1868, between William H. Hardin of the one part and
Helen M. Dye and Lewis Y. Dye of the other part, witnesses, that
the said W . H. Hardin agrees and promises to advance and fur-
nish at his store in the town of Chester on demand, made on or
before the 18th day of October next, to the said Helen M. Dye and
Lewis Y. Dye money or supplies to an amount not exceeding Four
hundred dollars to be used by the said Helen M. Dye and Lewis G.
Dye in cultivating and harvesting a crop for the current year
on her plantation, in District of Chester State aforesaid.

In consideration whereof the said Helen M. Dye and Lewis G.
Dye agree and promise to deliver to Wm. H. Hardin at his store
aforesaid an or before the 18th day of November next, for ship-
ment and sale in good _____, so much of the cotton raised dur-
ing the current year on the plantation, as will be sufficient after
defraying all charges to pay and satisfy said William H. Hardin
for all money or supplies furnished in _____ of this agree-
ment. In case all the cotton raised on said plantation shall not
be sufficient for that purpose, then the wheat, corn, and other
produce of said advances.. This agreement is intended to create
in favor of said W . H. Hardin the Lien and confer the services
provided by an Act of the General Assembly, entitled "An Act
to secure advances for agricultural purposes," certified and ap-
proved 20 Sept. 1866 Witness our hands and seals;

I Give and Bequeath to My Grand Son John Lott one Negro Boy Named George all Ready Delivered to Him.....

12th And Lastly I Give and Bequeath to My Grand Daughter Patsey Sandifur Lott One Negro girl Named Rachel With Her Future Increase....all Ready Delivered Her

And Last of All I Nominate appoint and Ordain My Two Sons Thos. Dye and Weldon Dye Executors of this my last will and Testament. Hereby Revoking all others.
