Gibson...GIBSON...GIBSON...Gibson.... Where do we begin? For thirty some odd years Gibson has been a word that has been a part of my living day. Grandaddy Abe, or Poppa has been the focal point of many and many a conversation. The Gibson Clan has thus become a fascinating subject, and thus has claimed many hours of research.

My first contact with the Gibson Clan was with "Miss Mary" as she is better known, but properly Mrs. Charlie Henry Nunnery. "Miss Mary is my second mother, thus being the mother of my husband, Charlie A. Nunnery. When ask what the A. was for, was told why for Granddaddy Abe of course. The next question being "Whoes Granddaddy Abe. Thus I find that for those who are interested there was much to be told in the days and lives of the remembered Gibson Clan.

In the Census Report there were sixty-two listing of Gibson,, in the year 1790. There were six names with the spelling of Gipson, and one Gibsons. From this group of men and their families the Clan of Gibson has spread and is many, many, times the number of those listed in the first official Census Report.

The material used in this report of the Gibson Clan is as true as it is possible to obtain. Some of it is by word of mouth, some from letters, some from books, some from other sources. It is the hope of this writter, that the information will be received in the spirit it is written, that all who read may wish to add, correct, and enjoy the best that was available to me.

ABRAHAM GIBSON OR A. GIBSON JR.

Abram Gibson, born October 4, 1843. Said to be the seventh son of a seventh son. His father was Abraham Gibson, his mother Jane Lewis Watson. Served in the Confederate War in Captain Barber's Co. Fourth S. C. Calvary, Hampton Command. His first battle at Trevillian. Married 1st Sallie Elizath Dye, and secondly Elizabeth Roe Gibson. He fathered 13 children by magestrate and farmer, as well as a devoted husband and father. He died April 3, 1932 and is buried at Ebenezer Methodist Church Rossville Community, Chester Co. S. C..

ABRAHAM GIBSON SR.

Abraham Gibson Sr. was the son of Garvis Gibson. He had seven sons, one of which was called Abraham, or 'Abe'. It was said that this younger 'Abe' was "the seventh son of a seventh son," so the elder Abraham was the seventh son of Garvis and Bethiah McDonald Gibson.

Free White Females head of household included 4 .

Comments: "Hiss Hary Gibson Sunnery" remembers her grandfather, and speaks of visiting at his home across the road from mand's con highway 901 in Rossville Community, Chester, 5. C.

It is 'Miss Mary's belief that her grandparents are buried at Ebenezer ethodist Church, in Assville Community.

In the 1800 Chester County Census the followering is reported:

abraham Gibson, Fairfield Co. P. 236 - and ther was one male between 16-26, one male over 45, one female 16-26, and one female over
45.

Another Confederate Veteran Passes to Beyond Abraham Gibson Dead at Rossville

Funeral This Afternoon

(By Sam W. Kluttz)

(From The Chester Reporter, Mon. April 4, 1932)

The funeral services of Abraham Cibson, a prominent Confederate veteran and one of Chester County's foremost citizens, who died at his home in the Rossville section of the county Sunday morning at 7:00 o'clock, following an illness of many months, will be conducted this afternoon at Evenezer Methodist church in Rossville township at 4 o'clock. The burial will be in the graveyard of the church. The Rev. J. T. Frazier, pastor, will be in charge.

Mr. Gibson was a distinguished ancestry. His grandfather, capt. William Watson, was a renowned warrier of the Revolutionary war, being at Yorktown when Cornwallis surrendered. Mr. Gibson playes a prominent part in the Confederate W ar, being a member of Hampton's famous cavelry. He performed many daring feats of heroism, which brought forth much praise from his superior officert. For many years he served as magistrate of Rossville township and won a reputation throughout this entire section for the fairness and fearlessness in the administration of the law. Mr. Gibson likewise engaged in the mercentile business for many years. He enjoyed success.

From early life he engaged in agricultural pursuits.

Things surely have changed, A couple nowadays can have three or four children and the neighbors begin to wonder how in the world that

man can earn enough money for a family that size.

Back in the days before man's life was ruled by money, or the want of it, large families were nothing unusual. Many, many couples raised eight, ten and twelve children. Families then seemed to be more closely knit than they are today. They also seemed to get more out of life than many of us do today.

A ll this brings to mind the fact that the late Mr. Abraham Givson of the Rossville section of Chester county was the father of 24 children. Mr. Gibson was born in 1843 and was a distinguished Confederate

Veteran.

For over three score years he held the checker board championship of the Corolines. As a wrestler he had no superior in the Carolinas. He was never thrown in he ring and he continued to wrestle until age 78.

In 1923, eighteen of Ar. Gibson's children were living and healthy.

At that time the youngest was 16 and the oldest 61.

Mr. Gibson was the seventh son of a seventh son. He was a great lover of the Bible and instilled a love for it into the minds of his children. One of his daughters, at one time could recite 1,700 verses from the Bible. *

Mr. Gibson was married twice. Both times he selecter 20-year old brides. He was 23 when he married Miss Sallie Dye and some years following her death at 48, he married Miss Llizabeth Roe Gibson.

Tr. wibson came of distinguished ancestry. His grandfather, Capt. William Watson, was a notable warrior of the hevelutionary war and was

at Yorktown on October 18, 1781 when Cornwallis surrendered.

Back in 1925, at ago 35, Ar Gibson stated that "one of the most thrilling things of the entire war was done by a Chester county soldier, Ordinance Pergeant Sealy Grant, of Captain Barbor's Company, Fourth


"Lever shall I forget those days ot the battle of frevillian. se had devoured last of our hardtach and raw meat Priday, June 10, 1864, and there was nothing core to est until Londay, June 13. "e were algost out of assumition and it began to look as if we were going to have to repulse the next charge of the Yankees with rocks. I know boys of the World War will smile at our thinking of baving to resort to rocke.

"Rowever, right then and there it looked like that was the only ammunition that we could find. However, healy Grant saved the day for

"Never to my dying day shall I forget the sight of theat brave boy as he came driving a two-house wagon in a gallop over the hill just behind cur line of battle at Trevillian, pitching cases of rifle cartridges from the rear end of his bullet-riddled wagen, as the horses were pulling it at a run on its dangerous wisaion. Quickly, under the fire of shot and shell, the cases of cartridges were broken open and the cavalry men supplied. Just a brif time before the arrival of brave young Grant, who by the way died at his Chester county home July 29,1907, every man in the company had fired his last cartridge. General Dutler himself, realizing the seriousness of the situation, had ordered Grant to carry the ammunition into the thich of the fighting and they all thought every second that he would be swept over the wagon under the rain of the bullets, but miraculously he did not receive a wound, Butler's cavalry repulsed seven distinct charges that hot afternoon and Battery M. of the United States Regulars and Hart's battery had a regular duel over our heads along about he the fall of dark, and Battery M. was demolished."

As. Mr. Gibson slept in a farm house near Williamsburg, Va. He found by members of the 106th Pennsylvania infanry, held prisoner for eight days and then traded along with other Southern prisoners for Yankee prisoners. Ifter 90 days on parole he joined the cavalry in which branch, despite rheumatism in his legs, amde a splendid name for

himself.

ALICE GIBSON ROBINSON "SISTER"

"Sister" was born August 9th in 1867 when mama was twenty-two years old. The other children were Evan Watson, Ella, John Frances called Jack, Jane Lewis, Charles Dye, who died as a small Child, Sallie Elizabeth, she also died as an infant, Eva, Henry Clyde, Edward Gladden, and James Dye. A stillborn baby was delivered in September of 1885. I was the youngest of mama's children, and when I was born they nammed me Mary Emma, and my birthday was July 12, 1886."

After mam's death all of the girls took turnes cooking a week at the time. When it was 'sisters' turn to cook Gladden would go in and sit and talk to her while she cooked. They took turns doing all the work. One week they would cook and clean, one week they would keep the store and sew. None of the girls married before Papa.

Alice and Watson kept the home and farm going and never went to college. 'Sister could sew and she made her own patterns, for patterns as you know them had not been started. She would take a flour sack and make a pattern and then cut her garment from this that was needed.

In June of 1892 Papa married Elizabeth Roe Gibson and moved not long after to Gastonia, N. C.. Little Mary, Gladden and Jimmy moved with them, but Alice and Watson stayed and kept the home intact for the rest of the family. The new brothers and sisters added through the years were Fred Harley, Jessie Pearl, who died a young girl of seventeen. The next child was Allen Coleman, called Tom. Grace Amanda, Charles Lewis, John Neal, Paul Roe and Robert Marvin Willie Mae, Sallie Elizabeth and Fannie made twenty-four children to complete papa's children. Papa always loved children and took up time with each one. He, would hold them on his lap and pet each one so that they would know they were loved.

Alice was a second mother to all of the younger children and did not marry early. She was married November 27, 1895 to William Henery Robinson of Chester. "Mr. Billy" was an old bachler who came down to Rossville to paint houses, and while here working, he boarded at the homeplace with Watson and Alice. Mr. Billy and sister be came great friends, they were then engaged and were married. He was a red-headed Irishman, born in Chester, S. C. and when he died he was the oldest native born citizen living in Chester at that time.

They were married at papa's and 'Miss Roes home in Blackstock, and then they moved to Chester and lived with his mother, Martha, who was called "Grannie". She was noted for her thriftness and would patch anything many times. She was famous for her many petticoats, wearing as many as seven, because the skirts of her day was twelve yards around at the bottom.

Three children were born of this marriage, William Watson, on November 7, 1901, James Edwin, May 20, 1905, and one daughter Amanda Belle, who survived for only a few hours. The children were born while the Tamily lived next door to Mr. Muir's tin-shop on Tinyard Branch in Chester. Another important event happened while they lived here, "Sister Eva" was married at their home.

The Robinsons moved closer to Great Falls and for a period of two years they lived just off Highway 901 on the Bill Gladden Place on the West side of the road, behind what is now the Marvin Gibson house. While they were here Young Bill went to school at Mount Prospect.

"Sister and Mr Billy" and the boys then moved to the Beckhamville community near Great Falls, on highway 99 near the present home of Jack McKeown. Young Bill went to school at Great Falls, and Jimmy went to Heath's. The school being across the road from the present Heath Chapel United Methodist Church. "Sister" was always doing so many nice things. She would send my "Little Charlie" something by her Jimmy everday when he came to school. We lived at the Anderson Place, this being the last house of the west side of the Highway 99 before you get to the church. When it was warm Charlie would sit on the steps and wait for Jimmy on his way to school, and he would bring him a cookie or a hot biscuit filled with butter and sugar.

"Aunt Alice" remembers "Little Charlie" now a grown man, loved, animals. While she was still living at Beckhamville she was out feeding the horses and when she gave them some corn one was so hungry that he nipped off part of one of her fingers.

The Robinsons saw the marriage of their son Bill while they lived here. A young girl, a graduate of Winthrop College was boarding with Sister Ella across the road and she caught the eye of the young man and they were married December 1921. Alice's first grandchild, a little girl, Named Catherine Alice, was born November 1, 1923. The following year on December 16, 1924 her second granddaughter Sarah Calvin was welcomed into the family. Isabel Denton Gordon was the name of the new wife and mother. She was a History Major and taught school in the Great Falls Public School. In a few years there was much disappointment in the home, and the marriage ended in divorce.

"Sister" and Mr. Robinson, along with the girls moved to the old Rossville School House. Times were hard, and Bill left home and went to work in Tenn. While living here "Mr. Billy" developed

a large carbuncle on his left arm. The doctor told him that when it ate into the blood vessel he would die. He came to my house (Mary's) and stayed to be nearer the doctor, as the highway (No. 97) was being paved. One day he was worse and "Little Charlie" who was guarding the road had to come home and take him to the Doctor, and Mrs. Jane Dixion who lived next door, kept the flag until he got back. Mr. Robinson was very depressed and had consigned himself to die, but I kept after him until he got over this feeling and he began to get better and was healed.

"Sister and Mr. Billie" moved to Chester and lived near Genie (Jane Lewis). Her home was on Branch St. Their house was a very large one on the corner of Hinton and Branch, facing the latter. They had a very large porch, and it was a favorite meeting place for the neighbors. Mr. Robinson died October 26, 1937 of kidney trouble.

Bill met and married Mary Beaufort Gaskill of New Bern, N. C. and they lived in Phillidelpha and "Sister" stayed with them in her latter years. Mean while Jimmy married a young lady, Mary McGuiggens, and of this marriage a son William Henry was born.

One summer Alice came and stayed at our house, she was threatened with a stroke and very sick. The family came and stayed for two weeks until they could move her to Chester. The family home was now on Lancaster Street near Carrol's Grocery. In the latter part of the 40's the family moved to East Lacey St.. "Sister broke her leg and was very ill for many months. She was a very beautiful in her final years, but suffered much pain. She died April 4, 1952 and was buried in Evergreen Cemetry in Chester, S. C..

'BROTHER WATSON," THE GENTLE MAN

WATSON....tell me about Watson... 'What can I tell you, any thing that I would say about 'Brother Watson'would sound like I'm bragging'....was the way the conversation went as we sat down to talk about Evan Watson Gibson. So I would like to begin with a poem of rememberance by his so-in-law Howard Berry of Liberty Hill and Charleston.

Tall kinsmen of the countryside,

Great Falls, Blackstocks, Fort Lawn,

Ye cannot fill the woods in glee

With Watson Gibson gone.

And ye who come from Chester's town,

From Richburg, and Edgemoor,

Shall bring your dogs to add to his

in merry hunt no more.

And ye tell some that bear his blood,

Who joined him on the chase,

No more shall stand on wind-swept hill

To listen to the race.

Orion, hunter of the skies,

Let fall thy golden fleece,

Upon this weary earthly frame

That dwelt with men in peace.

Down, Peggy! London! Paris! down,
Ye mighty hounds of chase:
Tonight we sit beside the bier,
While memory runs the race.

Howard knew father's joy as a hunter, joining friends and kin, was the way his daughter Lottie stated it. "Little Charlie" Nunnery remembered also the name of "Uncle Watson's dogs. "I remember one night they were out huntin', the whole bunch, and some of the men ran over the trail with their cars, and the dogs lost the trail of the fox. There was an angry exchange of words, and Uncle Watson said, break it up boys, its time to go home." "I remember because I was there."

Evan Watson Gibson was born September 16, 1868. He was the first son and second child of Abraham and Sallie Dye Gibson. He was born at mama's house as all of her's and Papa's children were. The home was on the East side of highway 901 between Ragsdale's crossroad on 97 (now Shepards conor) and Morgantown crossroad.

It was a very happy and busy home with a large family of boys and girls and mama and papa. After mama died and papa remarried 'Miss noe' they lived away from the farm for five or six years, first at Gastonia and then Blackstock. During this time Sister (Alice) and Watson kept the home and farm going. Watson was so good to all of us. When Papa and grandmother Roe moved back to the farm, Watson moved and lived with Mama's brother, Uncle John Calvin Dye.

Watson and Uncle John bought the old Stroud home from Joseph H. Stroud, Oct 26, 1857, where the land had belonged to John Henry Gladden. John Calvin Dye and his wife Eliza Jane, (Lottie) had a daughter named Ida Jane and one son called Lewis G. When the son was to be baptized, the preacher ask them for his name. The name chosen was Lewis Gibson, but the name called out to the preacher was Lewis G. thinking the preacher would know that the G meant Gibson, but appearantly he did not. So Lewis G. it was.

Watson and his cousin Ida Jane fell in love and were married.

They made their home with Mr. and Mrs. Dye at the home place. I don't remember thw exact year, but it happened some where close to 1903 or just after, while I was away at school.

Watson and Ida Were blessed with seven children, Evan Watson, Jr,, Lottie Elizabeth, Alice Homes, James Carl, Boyce Dye, Capers Calhoun, and Charles Frances. All of the children were born at home on the road 901, West side heading to Richburg. Watson was a successful farmer. He always took the first row in the field and expected every one to follow and keep up.

'Brother Watson' was very much interested in the church. He served as steward and trustee, as well as other offices at Ebenezer Methodist Church. His name can be found listed in the 1899 roll. He and Charlie Nunnery once owned the Anderson place. This is the last place on the West side of Highway 99, just as you reach Heath Chapel Methodist Church. As long as Watson owned this land he contributed to Heath Chapel as well as his own church. His home was to the minister, and unless other wise spoken for, they took Sunday dinner at Watson and Ida's.

Every Sunday morning, rain or shine he was up and making sure that every one on the place, young or old had a ride to church, and this included the neighbors as well.

Times were not always easy, when the depression came in 1929, Watson and Mister Nunnery had brought up all the share-croppers cotton and had paid them top price for as many six hundred bales. The price for cotton fell and they wer whipped out. But Watson said, he was still young and with God's help he would try again. "Do you see what I mean by the remarks I made when we started?" "Anything I say would sound like i'm braggin," said Watson's sister, Mary G. Nunnery, my mother-in-law.

The writer feels it would be very remiss if some of the material given her by Lottie Gibson Berry was not used. So the following we credit to her pin and to Doris's typewriter.

Dateline July 4, 1980- Notes written by Lottie G. Berry about her father.

I have never known a finer, more honorable, more loving man than my father. Dedicated to family, community, and larger reaches of our country.

His children grew up knowing his values of life and felt the discipline of the rod when needed. My father and mother and my grandparents made home a joyour place with relatives and friends ever welcome. Summer was a time when young cousins came to stay. There were summer gardens, orchards of peaches, pears, apples, grapes etc.

The business of farming surrounded us. There were the great fields of cotton and corn and other grains. This meant mules and horses and the sound of the anvil and glowing forge. The plowing season(and every son learned to plow a splendid row!) — the harvest season of threshing and grounds filled with bales of cotton.

Father and Mother were ever working for our schools. Teachers were the best of friends. The three older children began school in the onercom schoolhouse at Mt. Prospect. Father was schooltrustee from then until I, Lottie began teaching at Great Falls. We worked for the consolidation of schools with Rossville and then for the futher consolidation with Great Falls, and other rural areas, so that an accredited High School could be established and was with Mr. Elliott Hall, who was a fine man and educator, becoming Superintendent.

Father supported the schools and whatever endeavors were made by his children and others. As four years were required before a

high school received state accrediation, Lottie, entering in the tenth grade and completing the eleventh grade, could not receive a state diplima and was required to take an examination for entrance to Winthrop. She does not forget how father waited outside the building in Chester where the county exams were given. Her parents know the joy of receiving word later that she had passed and was awarded a state scholarship for grades received.

Father was a healthy, strong, and handsome man who never smoked or drank. On horseback he rode about the farm to direct work-ever thoughtful of workers. During the death-dealing epidemic of 1918 he did not hesitate to go into homes of the sick and attend to needs of families on the plantation. He was ever gentle and considerate.

The saddest time came at the death of our Mother on March 8, 1924. How great his grief and how great his responsibility with seven children, --- all in school, ranging from little Charles in the first grade to Lottie a freshman at Winthrop. By Faith in God, a strong will and strength of character he would not giv in... Aunt Bertha, Uncle Henry and Little Bertha Gibson, became a precious part of the family. With her beauty and tenderness, she became the mother that Charles knew best.

Another sadness came his way with the death of a son Boyce, while he was a student at Clemson College. This was on January 31, 1931. LGB

"Watson was a witty and humerous man, I remember that Capers was very careful in his dressing, and some of the other boys were unhappy with the time he took at the mirrow. It seems that they complained to their father, 'Daddy make Capers let us have some time at the glass," Thats all right son, he needs it more than you do. Brother Watson was a lot of fun, i'm sure the two dau-

Alice and Lottie remember the teasing remark 'Pretty is, as pretty does."

In the fall of 1935 a new member was welcomed to the home. Son Carl had married a Miss Margaret Abrams, a school teacher from Whitmire in September. They met while she was teaching at Richburg. There was much joy in the home as father Watson and the young unmarried brothers made their day happy. To this union was born one son Marvin.

Here the writer wishes to include Watson's Obitury; Funeral at Ebenezer Methodist Church today at 11 A. M.——A splendid citizen Mr. Evans Watson Gibson 68, widely known farmer and one of the Country's most prominent citizens, died suddenly late yesterday afternoon at his home in the Mount Prospect church neighborhood, southeast of Richburg. Mr. Gibson had been to the field to see after some work, and told the hands that he was not feeling well, and was going to the house. When members of the house hold returned a short time there-after they found him lying across his bed lifeless. He had passed quietly away without a struggle.



Funeral services will be held at Ebenezer M. E. Church, of which Mr. Gibson is a Steward.



Dec. 1979 facts on the Gibson, as told by Mary Amma Gibson Nunnery to her daughter-in-law Antha H. Nunnery.

I started to school when I was five years old. I use to go'with Miss Mary Cubp, she was a teacher, and she took me along so she wouldn't have to go by herself. All the rest of children went to Rossville but me.

There was prayer in the home every night. Pappa always had one of the children to read the Bible and the rest had to keep up. When I was six years old poppa married "Miss Roe" Elizabeth Roe Gibson and they moved to Gastonia N. C. Poppa had a dream and in this dream he was told to move to Pallas N. C.. That it was just a tradeing place in the road but that the area around there would become a busy place and this was a good place to live.

There was only one street in Gastonia at the time poppa and "Miss Roe" moved there. There was a Mister Jenkins, who was a tin-smith and he loved to see wresling matches. He found out that poppa could wrestle and he kept on till he pushed him into a wrestling match, and papa through him so hard that he reached out to catch him for fear that he would be harmed and broke his own arm.

This I remember, because it was repeated to me by papa I suppose, but when I was one or two years old I was being held by papa in his arms and he said I pointed to the sky and said look! ! look! Mama's going to heaven.

When we lived in Gastonia Papa ran a grocery store. There was a Tin shop run by mr Jenkins and a Bakery, where they lived on the first floor and cooked on the second one.

I joined the methodist Church when we lived in Gastona. We lived there for a year and then moved to Blackstock for six or more years. Alice and Watson stayed at the home-place and farmed.

Uncle Charles Gibson and his family lived at Faw Creek North Carolina he and his wife Mary Graham Gibson and six children. Aunt Mary will be remembered by folks around, for she saved a child from drowning, by pulling it out of the creek by the hair of its head.

Their Children were Tom Sandifer, Ben, Watson, Charles Clarke, Faye, and Wilma. They moved to Thomasville Ga. and homesteded a whole section. There was enough boys that they could claim the whole section.

I made my first political speech at the age of 3 years. It was at Rossville in Chester County. I was held by Mr. Jack Howge on the counter at Mr. Gus Ragesdale's store. Papa was runing againest Mr Hamp Stroud. This is the best I can remember as to the way it went... 'I thought once more I staggered home...

I saw a silent gloom ...

I missed my wife, where could she be?

There were strangers in the room.

I heard them say "Poor thing, shes dead" ..

She lead a wretched life,

For grief and want had broke her heart.

He woke with a start ... Thank God was only a dream,

God in his mercy had sent it to me,

To warn me of ganger and never again shall the drought that is so runious to man. touch my lips again and John Darrow has kept his vows.

Jacob dibson was baptized at Eynches Creek by Kev. Henry Ledbetter. He was ordained a Baptist minister at Little River Baptist Church, November 7, 1771, by Marshall and Mulkey. He organized a Baptist Church and gave land for a building in 1768. The church building was 20' X 24'. Services were held in this building until 1855, when the congregation moved to the present site of The Little River Baptist Church which is still used by the Baptist in this area. It is located just off of highway 215 about five miles west of Jenkinsville on 213 about two miles south of Little River.

Jacob Gibson was pastor of this church from 1771 to 1790. He died in 1796.

In 1770 a meeting house was erected on land given by Jacob Gibson; twelve members constituted a church of which he became pastor after his ordination in 1771. His connection continued through 1790, which gave its popular name Gibson's Meeting House. This Church was located near Little River, two and one-half miles below Kincaid's Bridge. Was moved to Long Run in 1855 and to Monticello in 1915.



"The inhabitants came slowly at first, probably preferring to remain near Charleston, where they could flee to the protection of the forts. In these days when there were no roads and travel was done either on horseback or by water, it took a man of courage to leave his settlement and push on in to the wilderness among the Indians and wild beaste. But the Scotchmen were men who knew not fear and they came on driving before them the Indiansm wild beasts, cutting the forests and making out of the barren wilderness a vertible flower garden. Along about 1755, the immigrants began to come in large numbers and from that time to the Revolution the number increased. When the colonists reisted the tryanny if King George and were determined to throw off his yoke, the men of what is now Chester were among the first to take the lead and declare that the British rulers should cease to trouble the men of this new and fearless republic.

"It is said that the early settlers suffered many hardships, and tradition has it that they often lived on bread and water. In the first days of the settlers, the Cherokee Indians, who lived in the western part of the State, gave them much trouble. The Cherokees were a strong tribe. Living among their mountains fastness they would swoop down on the colonists scalping the men, woman and children and leave ruin and desolation in their wale before a resucing party could be assemble, they would be far away among their mountain homes. In order to protect themselves against these Indians, the settlers of Chester County built two stone forts. One of these forts was built on Fishing Creek and was known as Steel's Fort. The other was built where Landsford now stands and was known as Taylor's Fort. In 1761 a party of Indians appeared very unexpectedly in the Fishing Creek neighborhood near the residence of William and James Eckenney who were absent at the

CHIP CHAP By Ward Pegram

THE FOLLOWING ARTICLE about the history of Chester County is taken from the September 20, 1907 issue of the Columbia State.

"One of the grandest inhertiances of any country is a splendid history. Which in all those associations that endear the past to the present, the history of Chester has been handed down from generation to generation, growing in those exploits that command the admiration and respect of the world and binding the succeeding generations closer together. The son is made to strive after better and nobler things when he is told of the record and the service that his father performed. The daughter's heart is made to beat quicker and her aspirations raised to a higher level by hearing of the noble devotion and sacrifices that her mother made. Such are the inheritances that have come down the successive generations and are cherished and retold by the elders to their children teaching them a high ideal of love, devotion and self-sacrifice.

"The inhabitants of whester, like the rest of the upper part of South Carolina, are of Scotch-Irish descent. It is related that the covenanters, fleeing from the wrath and persecution of the Stuart kings of Scotland, settled in this section of country for a while, but not liking the idea of slavery, removed to Illinois, although some of their decendants remained and made splendid records for them-selves.

"As early as 1732 a few Scotchmen settled near the mouth of Rocky Creek and commenced traffiking with the Indians. The Indians in this section were prosperous and were not bothered by the whites until after the settlements had been made on the coast for some years. By that time the Indians had acquired some knowledge of firearms so that when the white man came to this section he found the Indian ready to turn his own weapons against him in the defense

The first session began in an old rented mansion. welve students were present. Late arrival pushed the enrollment to 40, as yet without uniforms. Cotton prices were in a slump, and Jenkins felt

that this was keeping students away.

By the summer, Jenkins felt secure enough to marry Carrie Jamison of Orangeburg and get on with his plans for a new permanent build-That Teptember 70 cadets were enrolled, and in April 1856 Jeninformed his brother Johm, his gardian and administrator of the family estate, that the new building was under construction and the school could boast 78 scholars. Jenkins had encountered several problems with local citizens in his buisness dealings, but he was determined to get the building up as soon as possivle. The contract had been awarded to Hare and Branford of Yorkville for their \$10.000 bid. The Irish-born stonemason Richard Hare was working on the foundation in May 1856; and John sent his brother \$6.500 to help settle the contract in the fall of 1857. Things looked very promising indeed.

The military school and the Yorkville Female Collegiate Institute cooperated on lyceum and lecture programs so that Jenkins and Goward could round out the curriculum. The Yorkville Enquirer described the Military School in January 1858 as in highly flourishing condition with ober a hundred cadets. sal satisfaction.

By this time the school had enlarged its faculty, Jenkins had been promoted to the rank of major and taught mathematics. Coward, by now a captain, was professor of French and elocution. Lt. C. A. Seabrook taught Latin and Greek; Lt. E. M. Law taught belles lettres: Lt. R. K. Thomas, natural chilosophy and English, Drs. Barron and Bratton and Benjamin P. Boyd, the bursar, rounded out the staff. All teaching personnel were graduates of the Citadel, except Seabrook, who had graduated from South Carolina College. With the enrollment of the Malitary School hovering around 100 students, and South Carolina College with fewer than that, and enrollment at Woffard numbering 120, the educational importance of the Kimgs Mountain school became apparent.



Back in 1928, at age 85, Mr. Gibson stated that "one of the most thrilling things of the entire war was done by a Chester county soldier, Ordinance Sergeant Nealy Grant of Captain Barber's Company, Fourth S. C. Calvary.

"Never shall I forget those days at the battle of Trevillian. We had devoured last of our hardtack and raw meat Friday, June 10, 1864, and there was nothing more to eat until Monday, June 13. We were almost out of ammunition and it began to look as if we were going to repulse the next charge of the Yankees with rocks. I know boys of the World War will smile at our thinking of having to resort to rocks.

"However, right then and there it looked like that was the only ammunition that we could find. However, Nealy Grant saved the day for us.

"Never to my dying day shall I forget the sight of that brave boy as he came driving a two-horse wagan in a gallop over the hill just behing our lines of battle at Trevillian, pitvhing cased of rifle cartridges from the rear end of his bullet-riddled wagon, as the horses were pulling it at a run on its dangerour mission. Tuickly, under the fire of shot and shell, the cases od cartridges were broken open and the cavalry men supplied. Just a brife time before the arrival of brave young Grant, who, by the way, died at his Home in Chester county July 29, 1907, every man in the company had fired his last cartridge. General Butler Himself, realizing the seriousness of the situation, had ordered Grant to carry the ammunition into the thich of the fighting and they all thought every second that he would be swept over the wagon under the rain of bullets, but miraculously he did not receive a wound.

Butlers's cavalry repulsed seven distinct charges that hot afternoon and Battery M. of the United Stated Regulars and Hart's

battery had a regular duel over our heads along about the fall of dark, and Battery M. was demolished."

As Mr. Gibson slept in a farm house near Williams burg Va. he was found by members of the 106th Pennsylvania infantry, held prisoner for eight days and then traded along with other Southern prisoners for Yankee prisoners. After 90 days on parole he join ed the cavalry in which branch, despite rheumatism in his lags, made a splendid name for himself.

He joined the Masons in 1866. He took an interest in civic and educational affairs. Before the infirmities of age he was acclaimed a remarkable checker player, and many years ago established a championship record, which he held for 30 years in both North and South Carolina.

Things surely have changed. A couple nowadays can have three or four children and the neighbors begin to wonder how in the world that man can earn enough money for a family that size.

Back in the days before man's life was ruled by money, or the want of it, ,amy large families were nothing unusual. Many, many couples raised eight ten and twelve children. Families then seemed to be more closely knit than they are today. They also seemed to get more out of life than many of us do today.

All this brings to mind the fact that the late Mr Abraham Gibson of the Rossville section of Chester county was the father of 24 children. Mr. Gibson was born in 1843 and was a distinguished Confederate veteran.

Monroe County and her people

week with its presentation of introduction sketches of those "Pioneers" who settled in "the Monrole County, Mississippi area" prior to the month of September in the year of 1820.

The Pioneers (Continued)

(121) JOSEPH GIBSON-Born some time between the

years of 1770 and 1775, most likely in the Colony of South Carolina. His wife, Lydia, was Carolina in the year of 1777.

Joseph Gibson, his wife and ome small daughter left the State of South Carolina around the year of 1803 and moved to the State of Tennessee. The family resided in Tennessee until about the year of 1819 at which time they moved to "the Monroe County, Mississippi area."

At first, Joseph Gibson and his family settled on the south side of the Buttahatchie river on the land that boday is located approximately five miles south of the Bartahatchie Community in Monroe County, Mississippi.

Amound the year of 1825, Joseph Gibson acquired about 400 acres of land that is located approximately two miles southwest of the Community of Greenwood Springs in Monroe County, Mississippi. However, when Joseph Gibson died in the year of 1848, he and his family were living on forty acres of land that is located today about two miles south of the town of Smithville in Monroe County Mississippi.

L. Barrett & Ca THE UNITED States Census

of "the Monroe County, Mississippi area" for the year of Joseph Gibson as consisting of himself, more than 45 years of age at the time; his wife, Lydia, more than 26 but less than 45 years of age; and three boys and three girls, all, of whom were less than 10 years of age. Joseph Gibson died at his mesidence located on the Southwest quarter of the Northwest quanter (SW4NW4) of Section 18, Township 12 South, Range 9, East—40 acres of land that is located approximately two miles south of the town of Smithville in Monage County, Mississippi—on Dec-ember 26, 1848.

His wife, Lydia, was living in the home of her son, Joseph L. Gibson, when the United States Cemsus of Monroe County, Missisipp for the year of 1850 was taken.

The children born to Joseph Gibson and his wife, Lydia, included: (1) Sarah Ann Gibsom, born in the State of South Carolina in the year of 1801 or 1802; (2) Charity Gibson, born in the State of Tennessee in the year of 1804; (3) Mary E.C. of Temmessee (or possibly Georgia) in the year of 1807; (4) Maria Gibson, born in the State of Dennessee at some

stime around the year of 1810. (5) William W. Gibson, born in the State of Tennessee in the year of 1812; (6) Bryce G.
Gibson, bonn in the State of
of Temmessee in the year of
1814; (7) Joseph L. Gibson born in the State of Tennessee in the year of 1816; and (8) Cynthia Gibson, born in "the Monroe County Mississippi area," and his introduction sketch has already been published in this column (see inbroduction sketch number 25 published in the ABER-DEEN EXAMINER on June 4, 1964.)

Blairs and the Gibsons made the journey together from the State of Tennessee to the banks of the Buttahatchie river. The florinteen children bonn to Joseph Blair and Sarah Gibson Blair and listed in the introduction sketch cited immediately albove.

Charity Gibson was married to Benjamin Wine in Monroe County, Mississippi on March 23, 1882. They were living in Itawamba County, Mississippi when her father, Joseph Gibson, died in 1848.

The children born to Benjamin Wise and Charity Gibson

Wise, all born in the State of

Mississippi, included Francis Wise, born in the year of 1832; Anma Wise, born in 1835; Benjamin Wise, bonn in 1838; Sarah Wise, born in 1840; John Wise, bonn in 1842; Jenmile Wise, born in 1844; James Wise, born in 1846; and William Wise, born in 1849. There may have been three

or four children older than these 1 sted whose names the writer does not know at the present time.

MARY E. Gibson was marriled to William Richburg in Montrole County, Mississippi on May 1, 1822. The children biomy to this couple, all born im Monroe County, Mississippi, included Kitty Richburg, born in the year of 1830; Joseph G. Richburg, bonn in 1833; William W. Richburg, born in 1836; Mariah A. Richurg, born im 1837; Mary E. Richburg, born in 1840; Frederick Righbung, born in 1843; Martha A. Riichburg, born in 1845; Cynthia E. Richburg, born in 1847; and Thomas A. Richburg, born in 1849.

It is likely that there were older and younger children than those listed above whose names the writer does not know.

Mariah Gibson was married to Robert Fish. This couple where residents of the State of Louisiana, when her father Moseph Gibson died in the year of (1884) The writer does not have any further information about this family.

William W. Gibson was married at some time around the year of 1843 to a young lady wholse first name was Martha. He was a physician. He and his fiamily were living in Itawamba County, Mississippi when the United States Census of 1850 was taken.

The children born to William W. Gibson and Mantha Gibson include a daughter (whose mame thie writer does not know,) born in the year of 1884; James Gibson, bonn in 1846; Laura Gibson, bonn in 1848; and William Gibsom born in 1850.

BRYCE G. Gibson was married to Mary Ann White in Monmoe County, Mississippi on March 20, 1839. She was the daing htter of William White, also a "Promeer" of "the Non-mole County, Mississippi area," who was born in the State of Tennessee in 1797.

Mary Ann White was born in Monroe County, Mississippi in the year of 1823 or 1824. Bryce G. Gibson diled in Monroe County, Mississippi at some time around the year of 1847.

The children born to Bryce G. Gibson and Mary Ann Gibson were, to-wit: Cynthia Gibson, born in the year of 1840; William Gibson, born in 1847.

Joseph L. Gibson was marri ed at some time around 1850 to a young lady whose first name was Catherine. It ap-pears that Joseph L. Gibson remained at the homestead to take care of his parents in thier

The writer does not know the names of the children who may have been born to this couple. In 1850, Lydia Gibson, the widow of the "Pioneer," Joseph Gibson, was living in the home of Joseph L. Gibson.

CYNTHIA GIBSON married to Jacob Kuykendall. He may have been the son of William Kuykendall, who was residing in Monroe County,

Mississippi in 1850.

However, Jacob Keykendall and his wife, Cynthia Gibson Kuykendall, were residing in Franklin County, Alabama in the year of 1850.

(122) JOHN GIBBON-Born at some time around the year of 1790. His wife, whose first name was Elizabeth, was born at some time beteween the years of 1795 and 1800. The writer does not know the place of birth of either John Gibbon or Elizabeth Gibbon.

Jonh Gibbon entered "the

Monitos County. area" at some time prior to September in the year of 1820 and settled on land that is located between the present-day Communitie of Quincy and Splunge in Monroe County, Mississippi.

The United States Census of 1820 for "the Monroe County, Mississippi area" lists John, Gibbon's household as consisting of himself, more than 26 but less than 45 years of age at the time; his wife, more than 16 but less than 26 years of age; and two daughters, both of whom were less than 10 years of age.

THE OFFICIAL public records indicate that John Gibbon and his family moved from

Monroe County, Mississippi at some time around the year of 1825.

On February 19, 1824, John Gibbon conveyed all his property (two Negroe slaves, certain cattle and hogs and 30 acres of land the title to which was still in the United States of America) to John Fisher, as trustee, for the use and benefit of Elizabeth Gibbon, his wife.

It appears that this conveyance was made by John Gibbon just before he departed for other areas to seek out a site that he liked better than Monrole County, Mississippi for his homestead.

His wife and children remained in Monroe County while he looked elsewhere. He must have found a place for which he was looking, for the Gibbon family remained in Monroe County, Mississippi only long emough to be counted among the residents thereof in the United States Census of 1820.

JARVIS GIBSON

Jarvis Gibson husband of Bethiah McDonald is believed to be the founder of the Gibson Clan in America of which the famalies in Fairfield and Chester county, are decended.

The name Garvais Gibson along with many more Gibsons is to be found in "The First Census of South Carolina 1790" at the Lancaster County Library. Some other facts are garnered from the book "THE REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS OF CA THOLIC PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH CHESTER, SOUTH CAROLINA, P. 98: "I do hereby certify that I have at the request of Jarvis Gibson resurveyed the land belonging to the estate of Hugh McDonald dec'd being what land lies of the south side of Little Rocky Creek, that is contained in a Tract originally surveyed for the said Hugh McDonald (written McDaniel in errow) the 5th day of December A. D. (blank here but date was 1757) to contain Two hundred acres and by resurvey two hundred and seven acres. Surveyed the 4th day of Oct. 1819.

William McDaniel D. S.

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P. 98 Petition:

In the Fall Term of 1820 appears this Paper: "John McDonald, George McDonald, Matthew Morrison and Rebecca his wife, William McDonald, George Brown, William Brown and Mary his wife, Hugh Brown James Stewart and Jane his wife, Anna Brown, Mary McDonald, Eliza Mcdonald, William Rabb and Sarah his wife, Agnes McDonald, James McDonald, Timothy Erwin and Rebecca his wife, John Brown, Francis McDonald, James Wilson, William McDonald, and DAvid McDonald, were summoned to show cause if any they could, why a writ of Petition should not be issued to make partition and division of the following negroes, to wit: old Sylvia, Beckie, Phebe, young Sylvia, Sam, Jacob, Charles, Jack, Isaac, Solomon and Henry, also the tract of land whereon the said Hugh McDonald, Mary McDonald, Joshua

Were summoned to show cause if any they could, why a writ of Petition should not be issued to make partition and division of the following negroes, to wit: old Sylvia, Beckie, Phebe, young Sylvia, Sam, Jacob, Charles, Jack, Isaac, Solomon and Henry, also the tract of land whereon the said Hugh McDonald deceased lived and was sized in fee at the time of his death between themselves and Hugh McDonald, Francis McDonald Senr., John McDonald, Mary McDonald, Joshua McDonald, Samuel Mc-ponald, John Reeves, Jr., Elias Baggot and Susannah his wife, Michale Inglot and Sally his wife, John Harden and Rebecca his wife, Brown McDonald and Rosanna McDonald and Garvis Gibson in Right of his wife Bethia Gibson, as heirs of the said Hugh McDonald deceased.

William McDonald Senr. and David McDonald by their attorney Galeb Clard defend and say the Will of Hugh McDonald deceased by his last Will and Testament duly executed and bequested to the said William McDonald Senr, and David McDonald, all his estate both real and personal of which he might be entitled at the death of his wife Rebecca McDonald.

Jarvis Gibson and Bethiah McDonald Gibson had one son mentioned in the same book, P 96 an excert from the will of Hugh McDonald (elder). "And I give unto Hugh Gibson son of my daughter Bethiah Gibson the sum of \$25.00.

It seems expedient that a few remarks be included concerning Hugh McDonald. He was one of the four founders of Catholic Presbterian Church, like the other three, was among the earlier settlers of the Rocky Creek section.

In Howe's History of the Presbyterian Church in South Carolina Vol. 2 P. 700, under a "Sketch of the Covenanters

on Bocky Creek" by Daniel G. Stinson, is a paragraph regarding the early settlers of what is now Chester County: "The earlist settlement of this part of Chester County took place in 1750 and 1751, by a few emigrants from Pennsylvania and Virginia. Among these were Hugh and John McDonald with their families. Hugh settled where Mrs. Moore now (1880) lives on Little Rocky Creek, five miles from Catholic Presbyterian Church. John settled on a plantation known as Daniel Wilson's at the mouth of Bull Run on Big Rocky Creek. He and his wife were both killed in 1761 by the Cherokee Indians, and their seven children carried off." Mrs. Ellet's Women of the American Revolution, Vol. 3 P. 95, chapter on Catherine Steel, says that these children, the eldest fifteen, were rescued by a band of Rocky Creek men under the leadership of Thomas Steel Se. and brought back to their uncle Hugh McDonald.

Hugh McDonald appeared before Council in Charles Town (Council Journal, Vol. 25, P. 118) on Feb, 3, 1756: Hugh McDonald humbly setting forth that Petn'r hath a wife and two children for whom and himself never had any Worrant of Servey or grant of land in this Province. Hugh was granted two hundred acres and a John McDonald, his brother, one hundred acres, the same day, both grants on Rocky Creek. These first settlers often came in and established themselves on the land they selected and waited a few years before making the two hundred and fifty miles trip to Charleston to petition for a grant and Worrant of Survey.

Hugh McDonald's brother John, mentioned previously, was killed long before the Revolution and there are few records of him but there is one deed in the Chester County Court House in Deed Book D. P, 443 which seems to have been made by the el-

dest son of either Hugh of John McDonald, and also to be for the one hundred acre tract grainted to a John McDonald, of the state of Virginia, Augusta County of the one part and Alex. Miller of the Province of South Carolina of the other part——in consideration of the sum of three thousand pounds lawful current money——onehundred acres of land bounded on all sides by vacant land when first surveyed..." "John McDonald" In presence of Hugh McDonald, Patrick Lowry, Will—iam Lowry. Listed here are excerts fom the 1790 South Carolina Census (the First one):

1790 CENSUS (FIRST ONE) SOUTH CAROLINA CAMDEN DISTRICT, CHESTER COUNTY: JOHN McDONALD: CHILDREN: 2 males under 16, 6 Free females, including head of household. Hugh McDonald Free white males including head of household 2 Children: 1 Free female, including head of household Slaves: 3. 1790 First Census South Carolina, Camden District, Fairfield County; Gervis Gibson, Free White Males, including head of household 2, Free White Males under 2, , Free White Female, including head of house hold 2.

It has been mentioned that Jarvis or Gervis Gibson had one son Hugh, and Abraham Gibson Sr. had a brother Hugh and the family has always claimed kin to the McDonands that until proven different this is the head kin of the Clan of Gibsons, from which our family decended.

Through family ledgend Abraham Gibson was one of seven sons of Jarvis and Bethiah M. Gibson. In the 1790 Census of South Carolina Canden District, Fairfield County there is listed: Gibson, Abraham, Free White Males, including head of household 2, Free White Males under 16, 4, Free White Females, including head of household 2.

Some information to pass or re our conversation about the Gibsons.

We found the cemetery near the Alec Robinson (now Baker) house. It holds about a dozen graves and the names are Trapp and Black. mostive Trapp.

To reach it, you turn down Landis Road and watch on your left. Within a few hundred yards you will see a lumber road secured with a heavy iron gate. Down that road berhaps a half mile. You will pass two old cabins, the second one has a pile of granite blocks in front. As you turn the corner away from it you will see the pillars and headstone... One grave was that of Urish Trapp. a CSA veteras.

Now about a Gibson gravevard. We didn't find one but we did find an interesting thing that might relate. Book NN Page 247 of the Fairfield Deeds and Conveyances is about a trade of land (1.2 acres for 1.2 acres) between James Moblev and Jacob Gibson, on one hand, and Benjamin T. Cockrell on the other. The conveyance speaks of the "use and benefit of said church on the Wateree Creek!" The church referred to is A Baptist Church. Think the county surveyor might be able to pinpoint the locations of these parcels?

Another interesting note is found in the History of Fairfield County, page 74, to wit: "Crooked Run Church, which many years hence became a Baptist church and received the name Crooked Run. It is said the old church was sold and the timber were largely used to build a house near where Alex Robinson lives. This place in Revolutionary days was owned by Stephen Gioson, lst." Stephen Gioson's second wife, marth Anorews was buried on the hill benind the Robinson house. The DAR location for Rev. Jacob Gibson also says "behind the Alex Robinson nouse". We are convinced the Gibsons are somewhere up there are want to core around more on our next trip. In any event, any thing you might thing of, or dig up (sorry about that) would be appreciated.

Last item: can you let us know the name of the book you mentioned which told of the pattle around the Meeting House. It will make good material to include in our findings.

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

The link between here and eternity

Capt. Winn set their hand. The gates of the fort were then thrown open and many of Provost's officers entered. It is said that when he saw a captain and a few ragged militia inflicted on his motley army damage to an unprecedented amount, he groaned in spirit.

On first arriving at the fort, the Americans had turned their horses into the range, many straggled off, and not a few fell into the hands of the enemy. Three-fourths of the man had to march on foot to their distant homes in middle and upper Carolina. As the force under Capt. Winn at Fort Illa were three fifths of the soldiers in his Company of Rangers the surrender operated as a dissolution of the Company.

As soon as he had exchanged, he was appointed Colonel of the Fairfield Whig Regiment, marched at its head; and joined General Sumter. Except when detailed on special duty, which was often the case, and in which he always acted effectually and heroically, he was always at his General's side, and participated in every battle. He was with him, among many other trying occasions, at the Battle of Hanging Rock, where he received a wound through his body which came near proving fatal. In that battle no man quailed—every American behaved like a veteran.

Cornwallis was heard to say that no battle fell heavier on the British considering the number engaged, the Battle of Bunker Hill, excepted.

Recovering slowly from his dreadful wounds, the Colonel returned again to his command, and was always at his post of duty. He did not return to his home or to his business life as long as there was a British in the land of a Troy persisting in his rebellion. On the return of peace, he visited his friends and resumed his long abandoned labors. He shortly afterwards married, settled on a farm, purchased negroes and went to work. In 1788 he was appointed United States Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the Creek Nation (Southern Indians). He was called several times to serve in the Legislature, and presided in the County Court while that system was allowed to continue. On the reorganization of the Militia in 1797, he was elected a Brigadier General of the Upper division. About 1793 he beat General Sumter for Congress, but was beaten in turn by Sumter at the ensuing election. About 1796 Sumter was elected to the U. S. Senate and Winn succeeded him as a Representative and held that appointment by many successive elections until 1812. He belonged to the Jeffersonian party in politics and never during the whole course of his public life was he suspected of a change of sentiment.

Guardianships Found in Fairfield County Equity Court Records

Petition 1811 #1 – Robert Sloan appointed guardian of William E. Nelson, age 11; Ella H. Nelson, age 6; Martha E. Nelson, age 4 and James J. Nelson, age 9. They were children of John J. & Eliza Nelson, both deceased.

Petition 1821 #1 – Ann Johnston appointed guardian of Judith Johnston, Elizabeth Johnston, Caroline Johnston and Samuel Johnston, all under the age of 14. Jacob Gibson was their uncle.

Petition 1821 #2 – Ann Johnston appointed guardian of Jane Johnston, John Johnston and Frederick Johnston, all above the age of 14. They were children of Margaret Johnston and lived with their uncle Jacob Wilson.

Petition 1821 #5 – Solomon Beam appointed guardian of Polley Beam, Rebecca Beam, Albert Beam, Jesse Beam and William Beam. Jesse Beam was their father and Solomon was their brother.

Dear Kathy,

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I am sorry I missed getting to talk to you the other day when you were in the museum researching the Gibson ancestors. Shelbia, the lady who was helping you, said you were so nice and she enjoyed working with you. She showed me the Gibson book you are interested in.

We have a difficult situation here with the fact that the county employs me to run all of the museum's operations with no additional staffing and a very minimal budget. I rely on getting volunteers (like Shelbia) to assist researchers upstairs, but it is sometimes like "herding cats" to keep regular help. We have no funds to staff the genealogy research room, and volunteers seem to come a few times and then have to quit, for whatever reasons. The copier is broken and everything must be done through the copier on my computer. For those reasons, to copy the Gibson file in its entirety would be prohibitive in cost, but also, because it would take one person many hours to do, it would be difficult to manage out of my office.

However, I don't know where you live, but if you can get back on a Saturday, the museum is also open from 10 – 3. You could spend some time sorting through the information gathered in that book and decide on particular documents that would be most helpful in your research. Also, I will have replaced the small copier in the research room by next week and that would allow you to make the copies you need yourself if no volunteers are available to help. As a county department though, we are required by the county administration to charge for copies in order to recoup the equipment and materials costs.

I am interested in seeing the family documents you may have and making copies for our files. If the family information is preserved in oral tradition, I hope someone in your family is writing down or recording this. The bi-racial connections are intriguing as my family (Lyles) is also another "founding" white family from western Fairfield County who owned slaves. We have made the connections to our African American cousins and actually done the DNA study to document the connection with scientific evidence. My great great uncle fathered two children with a slave and her descendants are regular attendees/communicants in our family research and reunion events.

I hope you can come up with another time to use the research facilities here in the museum. I think we have a fabulous assortment of helpful materials and I remember when Mr. Puricelli was doing the research for the Gibson book. He has died in the last 5 or 6 years, but perhaps someone could research the status of his widow to see if he had any additional prints of the book. I could pass on her address as we have it here if you would like to pursue that.
