Martha Evans GILBERT was the second wife of William Ruberry GILBERT. They were married in 1839 and had four children: Joseph Evans GILBERT (Who wrote this obituary), Charlotte Elizabeth GILBERT, <u>Samuel Moore GILBERT</u>, and Milton Logan GILBERT.

#### **OBITUARY**

Died of typhoid fever on the 22nd of July 1866, Miss Charlotte E. Gilbert, aged 24 years, 1 month, and 16 days.

Seldom it is that so large a group of brothers and sisters as that to which the deceased belonged attains maturity of years before consigning some of its members to the chill embrace of Death! As years advance the cords of love are more closely drawn, and more reluctantly the last farewell is uttered. So it was in the case of the departed one. Among a band of nine her death has made the first void.

Hopelessly dark would have been the grief of these that loved her had not the resurrection morn reflected its brightness upon their hearts. For many years a member of the Presbyterian Church, her consistent christian life gave evidence of her preparation for death. Though for a while, the dark valley seemed lone and cheerless, though the waves of the River of Death beat wildly upon her, yet soon she beheld her Saviors glory spreading light through the gloom, and heard his voice stilling the troubled waters.

Her spirit, we trust, is reposing in Paradise there to await in peaceful bliss the joyful reunion of body and soul.



Dear Uncle,

Yours of the 15th inst. came duly to hand a few days since. I suppose you have not yet heard of our dear Mother's death. There was not two weeks difference in Father's and her death. Mother was taken the night Father died. She only lived two weeks lacking one day. She died of typhoid fever and heart disease.

Dear Uncle, it seems as if all our trouble comes at once, but it is a pleasure to us to know that they are at peace with the Lord whom they have been serving so long. You asked me to tell you all about the family. Jane and Charlotte are still single and at home. Sister Rebecca, Mary, and Isabella are married. Rebecca married McCreight. They are living about seven miles from us. Her husband has been in the army but is now at home attending to a mill. Mary married Long. She is in Florida and her husband is in the army in Virginia. Isabella married Harden. They live about ten miles from us. He belongs to the army but is now at home on sick furlough. All my brothers are in the service. William and Milton are in Virginia. Samuel is in Georgia. William and Milton are in the 6th S.C.Rept. Sam belongs to an artillery company. He is now at Atlanta, Georgia. William and Sam were well when heard from last. Milton is sick at hospital in Richmond. He has diarrhea.

I don't suppose you know that f ather had sold his place. He sold it to a Mr. Trapp. He intended to buy another place but did not do so. I don't know yet what Charlotte and Jane will do. The place will have to be given up at the last of the year, or I believe the bargain was when the crop was gathered.

Dear Uncle, my wound is entirely healed up but I have no use of my hand. My fingers are stiff. I don't think my hand will ever be of any use to me. My furlough will be out on the 11th of next month. I will go to Columbia then and try to get it extended. I would like very much to come over and spend a while with you but I can't leave Charlotte and Jane by ....

This letter was written by Joseph Evans GILBERT, son of William R. GILBERT and Martha Evans GILBERT to either John R. GILBERT or Joseph R. GILBERT. Since William R. GILBERT was originally from Charleston, SC and Joseph makes the comment that he would like to come "over" to visit I would assume that this uncle lived in Charleston.

Joseph E. GILBERT and his family were members of Scion Presbyterian Church in Winnsboro, Fairfield County, SC and this letter was probably posted somewhere in the town of Winnsboro.
