### E. U. Brice Dies At Home Of His Brother

Winnsboro Man Passes Unexpectedly Wednesday Morning. Funeral Services Thursday At Hickory Ridge.

E. U. ("Yank") Brice, 43, died suddenly Wednesday morning at ten o'clock, at the home of his brother, T. D. Brice, three miles north of Winnsboro.

He was seriously ill in the early morning and a doctor was summoned, but when he reached the home, Mr. Brice had expired.

"Yank" Brice, the son of the late J. W. and Ella Brice, was born in the Hickory Ridge community, October 27, 1897. He moved to Winnsboro, and for a time worked for the old firm of Ketchin Mercantile company. Later he went in business for himself — a business which continued up to the time of his death.

In 1918 he volunteered for service in the World War, became a member of the famed Rainbow division, saw active service France, and after the war remained for eight months with the army of occupation in Germany.

He was a charter member of the local chapter of the American Legion (Post No. 16), and for the past ten years has served as fi- r nance officer.
