Hickory Index: It is rumored that the Alabama & Vicksburg management will change the road so as to run north of seven miles bend in Chunky river between here and Meridian. The proposed route will go north of Chunky station and come back to present route just this side of the tunnel. This will give a hill route and avoid disaster from high water.

Additional Passenger Trains. In the line with other improvements there will be placed on the Alabama & Vicksburg and Vicksburg, Shreveport & Pacific roads about the 1st of June two additional passenger trains, making six trains a day, carrying mail and express matter. While their running schedule has not yet been announced, it will enable the people living along the line of the road to make all trains between Shreveport and Vicksburg without the necessity of having to remain in any of them over night. Four of the six trains will make through passenger connections, instead of two as at present. Two handsome vestibule coaches have been turned over at the Meridian shops for this service. They will be lighted with Pintsch gas, and have all the latest improvements. Four more coaches similar in make have been ordered from a car construction company. The Queen and Crescent will be thoroughly prepared to handle the great numbers of people who will use its road to go to and from the reunion of Confederate veterans at Dallas. The road expects to run 400 coaches to the reunion. If each coach carries ninety persons, that would make 36,000 people. All along the line preparations to care for this great number of people have been made.

H. C. Latham was appointed overseer on road No. 13 from Coffeebogue bridge to Hodges Hill, with hands under former overseer. J. B. Davis was appointed overseer on road No. 14 from Coffeebogue bridge to Rankin county line on Canton and Ludlow road, with hands under former overseer. C. L. Stuart was appointed overseer on Forest and Pulaski road for 4 to 6 miles post in the place of Z. T. Faulkner, with hands under former overseer. G. W. Talbot was appointed overseer on road No. 15 from Stiel to Madden and Golden's mill pond, with hands under former overseer. J. B. Clark was appointed overseer on road No. 16 from corporation of Forest to Hillsboro road, with the following hands viz: W. T. Lyle, A. W. Green, H. Pitman, G. Joe and W. Vincent, J. and Will Rascoe, A. A. Hicks and Will Halbot and any other hands within the jurisdiction of said road not otherwise assigned.

Tom Ormond was appointed overseer on road No. 17 from Simon Strong's to Shucaloo bridge, with hands under former overseer and any other hands within the jurisdiction of said road not otherwise assigned. Lennie Blackmon was appointed overseer on road No. 18 from Blackmon's mill to Cross Road church, with hands under former overseer and other hands within the jurisdiction of said road not otherwise assigned. W. J. Stokes, county superintendent of public education, submitted his report for the month of March showing the amount of pay certificates issued to teachers for said month. The same were duly examined and in all things found to be correct and was approved and ordered filed and he was allowed his salary for said month.

The appointment of R. E. Dodson, C. H. Noblin, T. J. Walters and Jesse Sprouse as deputy tax assessors by J. D. Davis, tax assessor, was approved by the board. The petition of H. N. Stuart et al. asking for a change on Morton and Pulaski road was granted as prayed for in said petition to wit: Leave the old Morton road 100 yards south of Ben Crye's residence and run north quarter of a mile, thence northwest about 200 yards and intersect the old road south of bridge on Shillings creek. The matter of assessments of sundry parties with solvent credits for back taxes, by Wirt Adams, state revenue agent, came on for hearing and action and after hearing the objections of the several parties the assessments were revised as shown by the roll of 1900 pages 108-130 and pages 101, 102, 103 of clerk's copy of said roll.

The petition of W. Robert Harrison et al. for new road was continued until the next meeting of the board. The report of County Treasurer S.
