

# DANIEL HALL DIES AT HOME

Former Member of the Red Shirts,  
and Long-Time Fairfield County  
Treasurer Passes Tuesday.  
Funeral Services Held Wednes-  
day At Concord Church.

Daniel Hall, former Fairfield County Treasurer, died at his home here Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock following an illness of several weeks. Mr. Hall, who was in his 77th year, had been in ill health for a number of years.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mamie McDonald, three daughters, Mrs. Joseph Sprott of Walterboro, Mrs. R. E. Arnette and Mrs. Sue Hall Davis, both of Winnsboro; six sons, J. Leland Hall of White Oak, Daniel Hall, Jr., and Carlisle Hall of Birmingham, Ala., Bratton Hall of Columbia, J. H. Hall, and J. M. Hall of Winnsboro and by a number of grand children and great-grand children.

This county was saddened by the death of Mr. Hall who has been a prominent citizen in the community since 1876. For 12 years he served Fairfield as County Treasurer. Death followed a heart attack about noon Tuesday, after a lingering illness resulting from a stroke of apoplexy more than a year ago.

Mr. Hall was a noted and picturesque character in the days of his early manhood, when our State was over-run by Scalawags and Carpetbaggers. He was fearless and daring in all the enterprises devised by General Bratton, Major Woodward and the older men of those Red Shirt Days. Indeed, he was the ablest and most resourceful one of the young men in his section, Gladden's Grove. He possessed the confidence and admiration of his elders who esteemed and loved him for his patriotism. His time, energy and wealth were always at the service of his State and he gave freely all of these for the redemption of his section from moral degradation, political infamy and negro domination. Time saddens us. His scythe has cut down all Confederate soldiers in the county but one, and is now busy in the ranks of the Red Shirt heroes of which the deceased was a gallant leader.

Mr. Hall took the complete course at the Kings Mountain Military Academy under the superintendency of Colonel Asbury Coward. Some of his class mates were Colonel James L. Orr, Colonel Joseph K. Alston, Spanish American War Veterans, John J. Mobley, C. S. Ford, T. M. Boulware, Clarence Brice and others. He comes from a long line of distinguished ancestors. The Halls and the Hicklins were among the first settlers of the eastern part of the county and in the neighborhood of Catawba Falls, acquiring lands and wealth and investing in lands in Georgia and Florida. His father, Daniel Hall and his uncle, W. E. Hall were the principal founders of Bethesda church at Mitford. His mother was Sarah Hicklin and one of his nieces married J. Lyles Glenn, father of the present Federal District Judge, J. Lyles Glenn.

Mr. Hall first married Elizabeth Mobley. In 1929, he married Mamie McDonald, who survives him.

Hundreds of friends throughout the county and State, on hearing of his death, will pause and think of his brave and chivalrous youth, his superb honesty of character, his loyalty in friendship and his sympathy and charity towards his fellowmen.

Funeral services, conducted by his pastor, Rev. L. A. Carter, were held at Concord church, Woodward, Wednesday afternoon at 8 o'clock, and interment was in the church cemetery. Mr. Hall's six sons
