

W.H. 'HAMP' HALL DIES TODAY AT HIS HOME HERE

Former Chairman Charitable
Institutions Board Had Re-
sided Here Since 1929

Wade Hampton (Hamp) Hall, 62, chairman of the state board of charitable institutions of Arkansas under Governors George W. Hays and Charles H. Brough, and since 1929 a resident of Pine Bluff.

Mr. Hall was born near Stephens, Ouachita county, on Dec. 1, 1876, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Hall, prominent pioneer South Arkansas citizens. His mother passed away on March 28.

Mr. Hall was graduated from the

Stephen A. Bemis Institute at Stephens and from the Arkansas Methodist college at Arkadelphia, now Henderson State.

He first read law in the offices of Gaughan and Sofford in Camden and then came to Pine Bluff where he was employed in the offices of Austin and Taylor, prominent lawyers here.

He was married to Miss Hope Brummett of Camden, who survives him, in Pine Bluff on April 30, 1899, the marriage having been performed by the late Dr. John F. Carr, beloved Methodist minister.

Following their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Hall moved back to Camden where he again was associated with Gaughan and Sofford for a number of years.

In 1914 he went to Little Rock as chairman of the State Board of Charitable Institutions, serving under Governors Hays and Brough.

He was a life-long member of the Methodist church.

Returning to Pine Bluff in 1929 he was for a time associated with the late R. W. Wilson in his law offices here but for several years had been in ill health.

Survivors other than his widow are: Three children, Mrs. Margaret Sanders, Hamp Hall, Jr., and Jack Hall, and a grandson, Ross Wade Sanders, all of Pine Bluff; two sisters, Mrs. T. M. Thompson of El Do-

rado, and Miss Bess Hall of Oklahoma City; three brothers, A. B. Hall of Stephens, J. B. Hall of Little Rock, and Tom Hall of Newport.

Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning at the Holderness-Thornhill Mortuary chapel, conducted by the Rev. Robert F. Bristol, pastor of the First Christian church, assisted by the Rev. Fred G. Roebuck, pastor of the Lakeside Methodist church.

Following the services the body will be taken overland to Camden where a second service and burial will be held.
