Dear Helen:

I know it has been 6 months since you wrote me that nice letter all about an anticipated wedding for your daughter. I hope all went well.

My daughter, Becky, did not return to college this past fall. She decided she wanted to go on a mission for her church (LDS - Mormons) so she came home and began working as a substitute teacher here in Shreveport. She enjoyed her assignments for the most part. Some days our schedule was hectic with me arriving at the office at 7 am, her picking me up at 5:20.

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Charles (age 12) is playing baseball now and we are busy with games or practice during dry weather.

Now to the good stuff: I am slowly whittling away at the Harrison-Robinson-Wilson picture in Fairfield Co. Mostly I order film from the LDS Family Library system and research it. I currently have 3 rolls of deed records on 6-month loan which I haven't even begun to research.

I thought I would send you my most promising Harrison family group sheets and the other miscellaneous and otherwise sheets I have compiled on the allied family lines. It just might be you might be able to help me some on these other lines. Don't worry about going to any library or anything. I thought there might be parts of your book that would help me on these lines. I probably told you the night we visited I had found that the elder Harrisons, Daniel and Edessa ______, had migrated to Arkansas after the Civil War. So did their son, Thomas F. Harrison. I finally figured out how that Calvin John Wilson could be his step-son and nephew at the same time. I really scratched my head over that one. It was from marrying the boy's widowed mother (first) and then when she died by marrying the boy's aunt (second). He must have been hard on wives, because within a 4-year period he married a third time to Martha Levining.

Now, in Arkansas I have located Harriet E. Martin Harrison Wilson's gravesite. I have not been there, but found it listed in a book of Lincoln Co., Ark. Cemetary Records. Evidently her tombstone reads "Harriet E. Harrison, wife of D. B. Harrison - 14 Jun 1852 - 5 Oct 1890" I have no explanation of why they did this. Maybe it was a generation or so removed that placed the marker there and all they knew was it was an aunt that had been married to Daniel B. Harrison. (Mt. Zion Presbyterian Cem.)

I have submitted a query to the local genealogical society's quarterly journal. This local society has multiple internal problems (they just fight all the time) and they have not put out a quarterly journal since I sent my query in. I hope through this query to get in touch with some living descendants of these Arkansas Harrisons. They had large families so I know they are around somewhere.

Harriet E. Martin and Charles Edward Wilson were first cousins, their mothers having been daughters of John P. Robinson. When Martha Sarah Robinson Martin died 22 Dec 1868, Daniel B. Harrison was named guardian of the minor Robert C. Martin. There was no mention of any other minor children. I guess they died before she did. There should have at least been one girl between Harriet and Robert C. She might have been married at 17, though. Martha S. R. Martin's probate showed who bought the various belongings and it appears that Harriet got the lion's share of the household accouterments to begin housekeeping with. I realize now that my grandfather, Charles Edwin Harrison, was named for Harriet's father, Charles Martin.

Harriet's younger brother, Robert C. Martin, went to Arkansas, eventually settling in Pine Bluff, Ark. My father had a recollection of him. I have a Bible he gave my father about 1916. called him Uncle Rob.

Dear Helen:

I enjoyed so much talking with you. And look forward to the information you promised. My father admittedly knew very little about his Harrison forebears, but always told me a melodramatic story about Charles Edwin Harrison, at age 4, being sent in a covered wagon to live with his mother's brother, Mr. D. C. Martin, in Pine Bluff, Ark. Daddy's story was that Charlie lived with this uncle for 10 years, working in his livery stable, then ran away to Texas at age 14.

The facts I have uncovered do not support this tale. The 1880 Census of Fairfield Co., SC shows young 9-year old Charles Harrison with his mother, Hattie, and stepfather, Charles Wilson. I presume the girls, Mattie A. and Margaret are Wilson's children and are misleadingly enumerated here. I expect your information will clear this up.

Going backward in the census records, I could not find Daniel Harrison (b. c. 1839) in the 1870 Fairfield Co. SC census with his wife Hattie and whatever other children they may have had prior to Charles Edwin Harrison. I searched that county about three times looking for them. Nor could I find them as single persons in their parents' households.

Please notice in the 1850 Fairfield Co. census that Daniel had an older brother Thomas. I believe he is the Thomas Harrison in the 1880 Census that has a nephew named John C. Wilson. This lead's me to a hope that there was a family connection between the Wilsons and Harrisons before the widow Hattie Martin Harrison married Charles Wilson.

Daddy mentioned once that either this Uncle Tom Harrison or his son, Buck, (or both) migrated to Texas also. Have you any intuition on this?

Grandpa Charlie Harrison's biographical sketch in the Terrell Tribune states that he came to Texas in 1893 from Hunt Co., SC. I accept that with more weight than Daddy's tale.



Mattie Thomasson's letter to my daddy, Jan. 24, 1962, makes reference to a visit the Harrisons made to SC when Mattie, Margaret Wilson, and my daddy were teenagers. I don't know the exact year, but Daddy was born in 1908, so it must have been in the vicinity of 1923. Please keep these pictures and circulate them among those of your husband's relations who might have met this family during that visit. I am sending Linda Shull recent pictures of me and my children. Now you two get together and share what you have and don't wait for the next funeral to do so.

I am returning the original letters Mattie wrote to Linda. I know how I treasure things that my daddy wrote and she mentioned she frequently finds things her mother wrote. Mattie had a good descriptive style and I regret not having made contact with you all soon enough to have corresponded with her.

Background on me: I am a receptionist for a law firm. I do genealogy research 45 min. at a time on my lunch hour. I have four children from my first marriage:

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Dear Helen, Thanks as much far the new information. The Robinson family is so indelibly a part of the picture. as over as I complete census research on the Martins, I shall begin on the Robinsons. I had earlier realized Danied + Eliza (hits ?) whe the parents of Charles Edward Mastin because they lined next door in 2880. Jooking them up in 2870 reneab the Julia Smart of John Rahinon's probate papers as well as a woman & child named Robinson. On the 1880 census where Thomas Harrison has a nephew named John C. Wilson, I theoring that Martha J. may be a pister of Eliza M. Robinson or perhaps a Harrison sister of his married a Urlison. When do we begin to keep marsiage records in Fairfield County? Note that in 1860 Daniel Harrison was no longer farming, but working as a wagon maker. Helen, have you ever researched the andrea Files on the martins & Polinsons? Mr. Leonardo andrea was a genealogist who died pometime in the late 19500 or early 1960s. This files are maintained by his daughter, Connie andrea, maintained by his daughter, SC 29205.

The sells copies of these files at reasonable rates. You have to request them by surname. If you pursue this, D'll gladly share the expense, I alledy have the andrea fills on the Harrison's of Fairfield County and cannot make any connection yes. 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If this is the same man, he would have been 65 years old when he gave this bible to my fithe, Rohart Daniel Harrison, age 7. Mama sureaus this is the uncle that young Charles Edwin Harrison lived with for a while when he was young. Joday I checked the ark. 1880 + 1900 Sounder for a Robert (or RCor REM) Martin born in SC. No such listing. Just about all the Robt Martins claimed they use bom in ark. I'll have to bearn his wife's nome from another source to pin him down, ar find out who his children were. Within the next month as so, Buddy and I aregoing to Drew County, ark. on a weekday when the conthouse is available. I should be able to find some trace & we'll examine ald cemeteries around Monthello also. Coincidentally, Buddys great uncle, C. Dear Helen,

You are blessing me with bountiful information which I am attempting to properly assimilate and mentally digest. I'm a little slow sometimes, so be patient.

Buddy just brought to my attention that you mean for James Robinson, Julia Smart and William B. Robinson to be included in the series as heirs of John Robinson. I did not see that at first. Am I to assume that Martha Robinson, sister of Eliza M. Robinson, married a Martin and is now deceased in this probate?

Next, on the page copied from your book, it appears David H. Wilson is an heir of James P. Robinson on his own, not through his marriage to Eliza Robinson, besides, she is descended from John P. Robinson. I thought for a week or so the clerks were getting their James and Johns mixed up. But I'm the one who's mixed up.

I don't have any idea who Martha or Mary Harrison married. I have searched the 1870 census twice for a trace of my Harrisons. Right now I can't recall if I found Tom Harrison & family in 1870 or not. If I did, I don't have it with my census records in the ring binder where I keep them now. I'm sure neither the elder nor the younger Daniel shows up. Don't know where Daniel and Harriet Martin Harrison were living in 1870.

When I finish researching the Robinsons and put together several family group sheets on them and the Martins and Wilsons, I will then go through 1870 Census real slow and see what makes sense to me then. The 1870 has no index--at least I've never seen a one of them indexed--it is the stepchild of the censuses. We only just last year had an index published of the La. 1860 Census. It looks like with the advent of home computers that more of these index books would be forthcoming.

Enclosed are more census research sheets. I have begun the rudiments of several family group sheets based on the wonderful cemetary information and the census information thus far. When I get them firmed up more, I will type them up neatly and send them also.

How is your little grandson doing? Sorry to hear he needed surgery. It is really tough when one of our children is ill.

Dear Helen:

You probably have no idea of the value of the research you are doing for me. Thank you so very much for your excellent help.

Saturday I got to visit the library for an uninterrupted three hours and finished the research of Fairfield Co's 1870 Census, which I had come close to abandoning. had gone through it two or three times before in years past without finding my Harrisons. But, persistance paid off, plus your excellent help. I previously had thought my great-grandmother's name was Mattie Martin, learning her name was Harriet, "Hattie" for sure, was a big help. I finally found my people in Township 12 and listed as Harris instead of Harrison. My mother and father had told me this story about Charles Edwin Harrison being the youngest of some 6 children, who, at age 4, was sent west in a covered wagon with his uncle, D.C. Martin, after his father's death. Story went that his older brothers and sisters all died of yellow fever and he was the only Harrison child left to his mother who then remarried a Wilson. No wonder I failed to recognize Danniel Harris, age 30 and Harriet Harris, age 17 as the couple I was looking for. Now that I know more about the family at large, I recognized them despite the enumerator's error.

Funny how one's cumulative knowledge produces fruit. Now I would dearly like to learn the relationship of this couple to other nearby families: Family #3, the James A. Robinsons?? Family #4, Elizabeth is probably an aunt of my Daniel Harrison. Robert Martin is, of course, Harriet's younger brother, who went to Pine Bluff eventually, whose Bible I have now. Family #7, who is Rosanna Levining? Maybe Martha S. Harrison's mother. I know from the 1880 census with family relationships stated that Calvin John Wilson is Thomas Harrison's nephew, but through his wife or through one of his sisters' marriages I don't know. Family #8, in 1860 Julia Cameron is living with John and Sally Robinson (p. 265, #1151). This must be a sister-in-law and her child with her in 1870. Back to Family #3, in 1860 they have a Mary Hamilton with them, so I think Elizabeth was a Hamilton (p. 277, #1342).

A word on the 1870 Census, I was in such a hurry I didn't write down page numbers, I only identify the entries by Township No. and Family No. Helen, is Twp. 12 the area encompassing Dumpers Creek? My present information on early Harrisons in Fairfield is good. The Andrea files contain some 15 different probate records and gift deeds and such on:

Leonardo Andrea, in his notes, cautions continuously about 5-10% error in records copied by the WPA. Two years ago in Dallas, Texas at their library I researched Fairfield Co. Cemetary Records of theirs and copied down all the Martins and Harrisons there. Of some 8 listings in the Martin-McDowell Burying Ground, which they referred to as the Martin-Aiken Cemetary, there were 4 glaring errors in their copy work. Thank you very much for your accurate information on these cemetaries!

While I worked on the census microfilm, Buddy looked in the card catalog for other references on Fairfield Co. He found Fitz Hugh McMasters' good History on the county. Therein, pages 125-142, is an excellent account (I recond) of the county's contribution to the Confederate Army. I already had Daniel Harrison's service record from the National Archives. I had written the Univ. of SC for information on his particular company and regiment. They responded nobody had ever bothered to write up anything on this subject. But with Mr. McMasters' good help, I now know that he fought in the following battles: Bull Run (1st Manassas) 21 Jul 1861 Gaines' Mill 27 Jun 1862 - wounded here Sharpesburg (Antietam) 17 Sep 1862 Bull Run (2nd Manassas) 29-30 Aug 1862 Gettysburg 1-3 Jul 1863 Wilderness 5-6 May 1864 Spotsylvania 9-20 May 1864

Daniel Harrison was captured at the Battle of Spotsylvania Courthouse and interred in the Federal Prison at Ft. Delaware, built in a river bottom, a cold miserable place. He was released after the surrender. He signed his oath of allegiance with a mark. I do not believe he was illiterate, just either stubborn or infirm. Family legend (which I don't put much stock in anymore) has it that he died of wounds from the War. Certainly the debilitation of wounds plus a year's imprisonment would contribute to his untimely death in the early 30s of his life.

Helen, I'm putting together family group sheets, trying to digest all this material as I go. I'll send them on in tidyed up manner in a week or so.

Buddy and I went to Campti, Louisiana, on Saturday to visit a family connection of his. I thought the oil crunch had Caddo Parish in a bind, but it is affluent compared to the state of Red River and Natchitoches Parishes. I saw some POVERTY down there. It makes me so sad. I can remember country homes when I was a girl. They were always well kept, you could tell immediately if black or white lived there. White people kept their homes in good repair, clean, pretty shrubs and flowers in the yards. Nowadays you can't tell who lives in the messes you see. People just don't seem to be taking care of their property anymore. Buddy says I'm half right in my observation. He says a working man used to be able to get a Negro to do some work around his place, but nowadays a Negro won't do such work anymore. I guess that's part of the situation. I do know people who take excellent care of sizeable properties all by themselves, though, with no hired help. Thank goodness Buddy is able to get help from time to time around here.

I must go fold the clean laundry my excellent Kenmore twins have been doing for me while I wrote this letter.

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After a long period of concentration on other family lines, I am about to switch gears and get on the SC Harrisons again. Buddy and I plan a trip east beginning July 9. We will attend a couple of Neal Family reunions July 9 and 10 and on Sunday night will arrive in Atlanta. We'll work in the Ga. archives Monday, go to Warrenton, Ga. on Tuesday.

Tuesday night or Wednesday morning we will arrive in Columbia and hope to be able to drop by, see you, have a cup of coffee and get better acquainted. We plan to play it all by ear from this point. We'll probably go on into NC to Raleigh also. Must be home on Sunday, though, so we can't stray too far for too long.

It so happened on Good Friday that the Ark. courthouses were open and our law office was closed, so I went to Drew County to see what I could find. I could find no evidence of Charles Wilson having ever owned land in Drew Co. He must have leased while there. I did find a Robert Martin owning a bit of land in the SE corner of the county. Then I found the Robert Martin/Venna Brown marriage certificate which stated they were both residents of the township in the NW section of the county. So, I wonder, are these two different Robert Martins?

We visited two of the oldest cemetaries around Monticello and did not find Harriet Martin Harrison Wilson's grave. It is possible the grave was not kept up through the years and is now unmarked. Those stones look like they'll last for eternity when first put up, but the years take their toll, even upon stone.

So the sum total of my trip was conflicting, inconclusive evidence and one tick.

We did much better on the Neals. Stumbled upon an entire Neal cemetary and gained a valuable lead for Buddy.

Thanks again for all your help on the research. We will be in touch.
