Brent,

Here is what I pulled from the hanging files on Hartin and Stevenson: Had at first thought the Harden and Hartin names would mesh but they appear to be different. As you likely already know, in the 1850 census there is a Hartin household #295 composed of Amelia (age 50), Hilliard, age 25, Christiana, age 18, and Margaret, age 20. As you mention, in 1829 there is a Jacob with 5 in his family. However this previous family of women is the right one. A note in the family file says that the home of Amelia (Permelia!) Hartin is near Laban Trapp and Wm. A. McCreight. I find in the Trapp file that the Trapps were early landowners in the area later to be township 10 of the 1876 period, while I would imagine this McCreight to be a son of the early Jackson Creek/Little River area McCreights, maybe a son of the craftsman/ginmaker in Winnsboro. I didn't track down this McCreight residence. In the Stevenson files, I find that "long Robin" Robert (over 6 ft. tall, 1799-1886) Stevenson, was the son of John (cripple born 1751 Antrim, died 1808 in Fairfield and buried at New Hope ARP in Douglass/Albion community) and Janet Murdock Stevenson(1757-1852). Long Robin married first Elizabeth Brice who died a year later (no children), then Rebecca Margaret Hartin on Jan 14, 1855. She was the daughter of Joseph Gibson Hartin (1780-1845), elder at Horeb Presbyterian (also in Township 10 also called Bethel) and his wife Permelia Bower Hartin (died 1864). Their children were James Munroe, Mary Catherine (married John E. Robinson), William Hilliard (Baptist preacher who married Frances Rhine), Jane Brown, Rebecca Margaret, and Christiana.
