My great, great grandparents on my father's side were Chas. Denald Bradford and mary Lemon. C. D. Fradford and oldest son Jack, who at this time was sixteen years old was in the Levolutionary War. C. D. was named for his uncle Chas. Carrol of Carrolton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence.

C. D. and son were at Camden when the Brittish had possession, it is told of Jack that he bit large places over his body and made the officers think he had small pox, they released him; his father was about to be hanged, asked for time to pray, request was granted, during the time for prayer, Milly Woodard, one of our men, brought papers which caused his release.

C. D. was educated by his uncle (Chas. Carrol) his wife was Mary Lemon, an English lady from an aristocratic family, her mother being over here at the time Mary fell in love with Chas. - did not favor the match, wanted to take Mary back to England, when the failed to do so-disinherited her girl and laft her the wife of Chas. and both of them very poor. They had twelve children, the middle child. Tatty Eradford married Adam Hwathorne, they had three children, Larry (my grandmother) born April 19th, 1805, married Alexander Yarbo, ough Ir. Second child of Detty Bradford, was named Lucy. She married ar Alemilton and went to Georgia. About died at his home near Winnsboro S. C.

hobert Hauthorne, grandmother only browner married friscilla Gibson half sister to Stephen Gibson, father of Mrs. Hayne McMeekin of Monticello; S. C.

cello, S. C.

Mary Yarborough and Connie Pettigrew were the last of C. D. Eradford's grandchildren, last of a whole generation, and they were first cousins.

Charles J. Eradford, granted lands in 1794, 11,000 scres, Greenville S. C.

Adam Hawthorne granted lands in 1768 along Broad Miver. Indont issued Sept 1-10, 1785 to Adam Hawthorne for seven pounds and eight pence for militia duty done in 1761 and 2. (See stub book and stub 503 in office of Historical commission of S.C. Page 67 Journal of the Gineral Assembly March and April 1776, that the election for District between Broad and Catawba-Fivers should be at Caplair Warrens old place and the commissioners be Capt. Hobt. Pattern, Capt William Lang and William Strother, Joseph Mirkland and Ches. D. Eradford.
