Generation 6 Overview

Generation 6 includes eight (8) sets of GGGrandparents of Ann Ella Henderson Collier. George's research has uncovered a number of previously unknown 'facts' about these individuals to include:

6.1 William Franklin Henderson & Agness Robinson Stephens

a) No researcher has yet proven the identity of William Franklin Henderson's parents. However, George's research suggests the Hendersons were neighbors with Stephens and Wardlaw families near Donalds, Abbeville County, SC just prior to 1820.

b) George's research indicates that Benjamin Waller Stephens Sr (1797-1850) and an unidentified woman in Abbeville County, SC were parents of Agness R Stephens.
Further, research suggests that her name is "Agness Robinson Stephens" - 'Agness' and 'Robinson' occurred in five consecutive generations of the combined Stephens/ Henderson lineage. Note: Thanks to Tina Henderson Robinson for her insight on that R equals Robinson rather than Roebuck.

c) George's research suggests that William Franklin Henderson emigrated to Greene County in 1824 - where he signed a 7-year indentured contract in return for 80 acres of land in Greene County. William purchased his 80 acres in Jan1832.

d) George's research suggests that Agness R Stephens was buried in 1873 in the Old
 Bethel Church Cemetery which is now abandoned and overgrown. Further, her
 tombstone was relocated to its current location (beside her husband's) sometime after
 1890.

6.2 Joseph W. Cartee & Sarah Carolyn Lamb Mayes

a) Sarah became the Grandmother of Josephine Drummond and the mother of Elizabeth Jane Cartee - both women are Ann Ella's GGrandmothers.


However, they were life-long members of Bethel Baptist Church which is located several miles to the east near Ralph, AL.	
	George estimates that current Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery was not opened until ~1880. Agness was buried in original Bethel cemetery which was located just 'down the hill' from current cemetery location. Her tombstone (as well as 7 others) was removed from the old cemetery (after 1890) and repositioned to their current location in the Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery.

Stephens Family Schism and Separate Paths to Alabama and Kentucky

Diagram above depicts George's research regarding the background and migrations involving family of Agness Robinson Stephens and why her progeny have had such difficulty in reconstructing her family tree. Edmund Waller Stephens married Agness Smith Robinson in Virginia in 1796 - after which the couple migrated to Abbeville County, SC. Their first child Benjamin Waller Stephens (1797-1844) was born in Virginia (in 1797) and their second child Dorothy Waller Stephens was born in South Carolina (in 1802). Year of death suggests that Agness Smith Robinson (1779-1802) died of childbirth complications shortly after Dorothy was born. There is a family story (see 9.17) about how several members of Benjamin Stephens (1754-1839) family migrated to Abbeville County, SC where they encountered serious problems - including the death of Agness Smith Robinson. Problems were sufficiently bad that Benjamin, Sr and Benjamin, Jr left Virginia and traveled to South Carolina to 'rescue' his children. Several of them had long-term symptoms similar to those produced by malaria. Edmund Waller Stephens (1777-1864) married his second wife Jane L Griffin (1788-1839) in 1812. Census includes a daughter Agnes Stephens who was born in 1810 presumably this daughter was born during Jane's first marriage and Agnes was adopted by Edmund after they were married..

There appears to have been a split - probably over money because Edmund was relatively wealthy - in the Edmund Waller Stephens household because his two families separated as follows:

- a) Edmund's first family Both Benjamin and Dorothy (with their respective spouses and children) migrated to Greene County, AL in ~1824. Note that Benjamin returned to SC in 1826 long enough to marry Margaret Only Wardlaw before the newlyweds returned to Greene County, AL in 1827.
- b) Edmund's second family Edmund and Jane Stephens (and children) migrated to Kenton County, KY in ~1829.

Circumstantial evidence (but thus far no proof) suggests that both Benjamin Stephens and Margaret Wardlaw had been married to other spouses prior to their 1826 marriage in South Carolina. Benjamin was 29 years of age and Margaret was 32 years of age at time of their marriage - plus Margaret's parents had emigrated to Greene County, AL in 1824.

Circumstantial evidence suggests that Benjamin's first marriage was at age ~18 to a young woman who lived in South Carolina. Their first child was Agness R Stephens (1818-1873) who was born in South Carolina - and later married William Franklin Henderson in Greene County, AL. George suspects that Agness' mother died of childbirth complications in 1818 from childbirth complications with either Agness or a 2nd deceased infant. Note: As of Feb2015, George has been unable to find any reference to this marriage or the supposed mother - and neither have any of the other Henderson family researchers been able to identify Agness' mother.

The scenario described includes 5 important factors related to Agness Robinson Stephens:

- a) Per some of the Henderson family trees on ancestry.com, Agness' mother was supposedly born in Virginia. However, George now believes that Agness' grandmother was the one who was actually born in Virginia - probably in late 1770s.
- b) Per census records, Agness was born in 1818 in South Carolina and migrated to Alabama prior to her marriage (at age 17) in 1835.
- c) Since Agness was only 17 when she married, the Henderson and Stephens

households must have lived near each other there in Alabama. Remember that William Franklin Henderson had been working his new Snoddy homestead for almost four years when the couple married in Nov1835. The 1850 census shows this to be the case for William and Agness Henderson and family of Benjamin Waller Stephens and his wife Margaret Wardlaw. Note: During visit to Greene County in October 2016, Mr Ray Drummond told George related story from his grandfather. Supposedly, each of these early farmers planned to clear one acre of their property (to support cultivation) each year - if so, William Franklin was not able to complete clearing of his homestead within his lifetime!! Further, Ray said that these early farmers planted turnips (??) as their first year crop on the newly cleared land.

- d) There is a 12-year gap between Agness' birth and birth of Benjamin and Margaret Stephens oldest child. Gap strongly implies that Margaret was not Agness' mother.
- e) Agness Smith Robinson (1779-1802) married Edmund Waller Henderson (1777-1864). Their son was Benjamin Waller Stephens (1797-1844) who George believes is the father of Agness Robinson Stephens (1818-1873). Agness Robinson Stephens married William Franklin Henderson (1811-1890) their daughter was named Agness R(obinson) Henderson (1836-). Note: George has been unable to find any record which lists this mother/daughter combination as anything other than 'Agness R.' George is less certain about the double "s" chiseled on her tombstone. George found the Agness spelling common in the Robinson lineage beginning with Agness Smith (see 9.18) and propogating forward through five generations of Stephens and Henderson women.

William Franklin Henderson (and his siblings) were part of a wave of Irish immigrants who emigrated from South Carolina to Greene County, Alabama in the 1820s. Most of them were looking to become 'land owners'. Following table lists a number of original land patents which were purchased from the Government by Ann's grandfathers in the 1820s and 1830s.

Fifteen (of 16) of Ann's GGGrandparents migrated from/through South Carolina to Alabama and Mississippi in the 1820s. They traveled through the Cumberland Gap by wagon and (likely) built rafts to float down the Holston and Tennessee Rivers to their destination. One of her GGGrandparents (Fridelle) settled near Stevenson, AL which is on the Tennessee River about 35 miles NW of Huntsville. Three sets of her GGGrandparents (Montgomery, Nason, Bardwell) floated down the Tennessee River to Corinth, MS before driving overland to settle near Starkville, MS. These people were some of the earliest settlers in Starkville and were involved in establishment of Mississippi State University. Eleven of her GGGrandparents (Henderson, Stephens, Wardlaw, Cartee, Lamb, Drummond, Legg, Mayes) floated down the Tennessee River to Huntsville, Al before driving overland to Tuscaloosa, AL. At that point in time, Greene County was literally at the 'end of the civilized world' - there were no roads between northern and southern Alabama at that time. The 16th GGGrandparent (Bellah) migrated from Georgia via the Federal Road and settled near Abbeville in southern Alabama. Note: George was amazed to learn that all 16 of Ann's GGGrandparents migrated to a small area in Alabama and Mississippi at about the same time. For certain, his ancestral migrations did not cluster in this manner.

There was a caravan of mostly Irish immigrants who migrated from Edgefield District, SC to Greene County, AL in 1827. Per the White Family ancestry book, Thomas and Isabel Drummond (see 7.7) were part of this caravan. Apparently, Benjamin Waller Stephens and Margaret Wardlaw were also part of this same (or at least a similar) caravan. This migration began shortly after the Government opened Greene County lands for settlement - once the Cherokees were defeated in 1819. Mr Jim Roebuck of Tuscaloosa told George in Feb2015 that one of his ancestors was part of a similar caravan that migrated from Edgefield District, SC in 1834 to Tuscaloosa - where they camped for one year - before moving on to Greene County. George now suspects there were probably multiple caravans of similar migrants on a yearly basis for a decade or more.

George's supposition: Both Benjamin Waller Stephens (see 7.5) family and WFH's siblings/ mother (7.1) originally settled in the vicinity of Knoxville, AL. Suggest this is the reason each of these people became involved with Bethel Baptist Church at Ralph, AL in the 1830s - and why three generations of them are buried in the Bethel Cemetery. George would not be surprised to learn that both Stephens and Henderson families were charter members of Bethel Baptist Church when it was organized in 1834 - but as of early 2016 has been unable to locate any records to prove this supposition. For certain, both Benjamin Stephens and David Henderson families purchased land in immediate vicinity of Bethel Baptist Church in the late 1830s.

Samuel Henderson's family moved to Chickasaw County, MS (near Starkville) in early 1840s because their first child was born in Greene County, AL in 1840 and second child was born in Mississippi in 1843. Cynthia Henderson Cockrell and her husband moved to Mississippi in the 1840s (i.e., before the 1850 census) - apparently without ever purchasing any land in Greene County. Census readings indicate that both Samuel and Cynthia were illiterate and could neither read nor write.

Following the Civil War (and before 1870 census), David Henderson's family also moved to Mississippi. William Franklin Henderson and his family (and their descendants) were the only Henderson family members to remain in Greene County, AL. David Henderson,

his wife, and six children are listed as illiterate (neither read nor write) in the 1840 census. Also, census indicates an older woman (possibly David's mother - the unidentified Widow Henderson) living with them. George has seen census readings which indicate that two daughters of David Henderson remained unmarried - at least through their 40th birthday.

Among Ann's ancestors, Agness Robinson Stephens (and her daughter Agness Robinson Henderson) are the only people who could potentially have had the name 'Roebuck' as part of his/her name. George (Note that Tina Henderson first proposed this idea) believes that Agnes' (or Agness') middle name was 'Robinson' instead of 'Roebuck' because the first Henderson-Roebuck marriage did not occur until ~1900. To this point, all Henderson family researchers have used the initial R. or Roebuck as Agness' middle name - George believes that all of them are just propogating an error which was made by researchers in 1990s.

Finally, the Henderson and Roebuck families lived near each other in Greene County (and Beulah Baptist Church) from before 1850. None of the first generation of Henderson and Roebuck children born in Greene County married each other. However, four children of Edmund Waller Henderson married four Roebuck children in the early 1900s. These four marriages are the source of close linkage between the Henderson and Roebuck families in Greene County.

Chronology for William Franklin Henderson (WFH) and Agness Robinson Stephens

George developed the following chronology based on both factual and circumstantial evidence of time and movements of the Henderson family and associated neighbors. Unfortunately, researchers still do not have enough information to identify either the parents of William Franklin Henderson or the mother of Agness Robinson Stephens as of August 2016.

1832	William Franklin Henderson's 7-year contract expired in Dec1831 - he purchased 80-acre land patent located near Snoddy in Jan1832. Note: Circumstantial evidence suggests that William had been indentured to Benjamin Stephens and had fallen in love with Agness prior to this date. William had almost four years to work his newly-acquired land near Snoddy (which is at least ten miles from Benjamin's property) before he and Agness were married.
1833	Beulah Baptist Church (near Snoddy) organized. Thomas James Drummond (see 7.7) was one of its charter members.
1834	Bethel Baptist Church (near Ralph) was organized as of 10May1834. George's assumption: Henderson and Stephens families were early - perhaps even charter - members. For certain both Benjamin Stephens and David Henderson purchased property near Bethel Church prior to 1840.
1834	Another caravan of Irish immigrants traveled from Edgefield District, SC to Greene County. Immigrants spent a year at Tuscaloosa before moving Generation 6 Page 6-15

on to Greene County. One of Jim Roebuck's (of Tuscaloosa) ancestors was part of this caravan.

1835 William Franklin Henderson married Agness Robinson Stephens in Greene County, AL

7-year contracts which David Henderson and Samuel Henderson had signed expired in Sept1835. Both David Henderson and Samuel Henderson purchase 80 acres of land in Greene County, AL in October 1835. Their adjacent purchases are about 10 miles SW of Eutaw - apparently they did not want to live near William who lived in Snoddy Community.
Note: Circumstantial evidence suggests lack of closeness between the Henderson brothers. The youngest, William, purchased his 80 acres

near Snoddy in Jan1832 - he and Agness lived there for rest of their lives. The two older brothers, Samuel and David, purchased their 80 acres in SW Greene County in Oct1835. In early 1840s, Samuel moved on to Mississippi and David relocated to near Bethel Church about 1839 - David moved on to Mississippi in the late 1860s.

- 1835 David Henderson married Vianna Hix (from Ga) in Greene County, AL
- 1835 Cynthia Henderson married Griffin Cockrell in Greene County, AL
- 1838 Samuel Henderson married Sarah Head in Greene County, AL
- Benjamin Waller Stephens and David Henderson each purchase 80-acre land patents just southwest of Bethel Baptist Church. Presumably, this become the homestead for each family.
- 1839Edmund Waller Henderson (son of WFH & Agnes) was born in Snoddy,
AL
- 1842 Samuel Henderson relocated his family from Greene County to Starkville, MS

- 1st child born 1840 in Greene County- 2nd child born 1843 in MS

 1845 Widow Henderson (i.e., WFH's mother) died in Alabama (per family lore) (George's Assumption: Mrs Henderson was buried in the original Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery - which is now covered by woods.)

Per 1860 Census, David Henderson's family lived in Green County, AL
David Henderson relocated his family from Greene County to Mississippi
Census indicates that families of David Henderson, Samuel Henderson, and Cynthia Cockrell now reside in Mississippi
Agness Robinson Henderson (WFM's wife) died in Snoddy, AL and was buried in the Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery (Old) - which is now heavily wooded. (George's Assumption: Agness' tombstone was relocated from her original burial site in the old cemetery to beside her husband's tombstone sometime after 1890. Note how completely the bottom portion of her tombstone has been eroded - which likely happened before it was relocated to its current location.)
WFM died in Snoddy, AL and was buried in Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery at Ralph, AL



Notice how completely the bottom portion of Agness' tombstone has been eroded. Her tombstone was also standing upright when this picture was taken prior to the year 2000. George's research indicates that current Bethel Cemetery was not opened until ~1880. If true, then Agness was buried in the original cemetery (which is now abandoned and heavily wooded). The soil there is acidic which caused bottom of her tombstone to disintegrate. Agness' tombstone was relocated to its current position beside William's

tombstone sometime after 1890. George now believes that 7 such tombstones were relocated at about the same time and are now located in close proximity to each other.

(Notice that Agness' tombstone lies flat and is almost completely underground as of 2015. Earlier photo shows her tombstone in this location to be erect but with its bottom portion eroded away. George believes this erosion occurred prior to tombstone being relocated to its current position beside William's tombstone.)



WILLIAM FRANKLIN HENDERSON 1811-1890

"Uncle William Henderson" as named in the Henderson Family Bible creates a question as to who the "Uncle" is? Milton Eugene Henderson (author of this web site) knows of four (4) William Hendersons, the first being William Franklin Henderson 1811-1890 who married in Greene County, Alabama in 1835 and is buried in the Bethel (not Beulah) Baptist Church Cemetery at Ralph, Ala. just northeast of Greene Co. over in Tuscaloosa Co. This WFH had a brother David Henderson 1806-1895 who also married in Greene Co. in 1835, David had a son also named William Franklin Henderson (known as "Sr." in Miss.) 8/1838-10/1866 apparently named after his 1811-1890 Uncle W.F.H. This 2nd William Franklin Henderson 1838-1866 was a Confederate Soldier during the W.B.T.S. and suffered wounds and was captured/prisoner of war and died soon after The War in 1866 back "at Home in Ala." at age 28, his burial place is unknown to MEH. The 1st eldest WFH 1811-1890 died at age 79 years!

The 3rd William Franklin Henderson 1863-1943? (known as Jr. in Miss.) (born during the WBTS while father in service) was the son of the 2nd WFH (Sr. in Miss.). MEH has heard that the 2nd WFH 1838-1866 has been considered a brother of Edmund Waller Henderson and the son of the 1st eldest WFH, but believes that is in error when the Census records are studied, the 2nd WFH being the son of David Henderson instead. The 4th and least likely William to be considered the "Uncle William Henderson" in question is Samuel Henderson's reported son, William ? Henderson, born 1847 in Miss.

When considering all the above, especially the age differences, 1st WFH death age 79 and his nephew the 2nd WFH with his death at age 28, MEH is of the opinion that the "Uncle William

Henderson" picture is of 1811-1890 William Franklin Henderson eldest to Greene Co., Ala. from South Carolina. The picture is apparently of an elderly Henderson. With Confederate Soldier 2nd WFH back "at Home in Ala." to die probably in Greene Co. in 1866 at age 28, he and his brothers (all of David) calling their uncle "Uncle", the eldest WFH, such maybe where the "Uncle" came from for the picture. MEH believes the picture is of 1811-1890 William Franklin Henderson, his and others' GGGrandfather!





Note: There are few published records related to James Benjamin Stephens, Sr - most of the records collected by George were in Lydia's name rather than her husband's name. There is also another hurdle for genealogical researchers because none of the 'Alabama Hendersons' have recognized that there is both a James Waller Stephens, Sr (see 5.2) and a James Waller Stephens, Jr (see 6.3). In some cases, this confusion has caused researches to erroneously identify Margaret Wardlaw or Josephine Drummond as the wife of James Benjamin Stephens, Sr.

Note: Family records indicate that James Benjamin Stephens, Sr was interned in the Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery. However, since Benjamin died in 1865, he would have been buried in the old (now abandoned) Bethel Church Cemetery. The acidic soil in that cemetery would have completely eroded his tombstone within a few decades after his death. Interestingly, his tombstone was not relocated to the current Bethel Church Cemetery after his wife's death in 1912 - similar to what happened with Agness Stephens tombstone being relocated to near her husband's grave soon after 1890.

David was a farmer, a Freemason for about 40 years, a member of Beulah Baptist Church for about 50 years, and a Bugler in the Confederate Army of Tennessee.

Military History

Elijah S. Sellers moved into Alabama ~1827. It is said that he was in the household of Matthew Picket Smith and being born in 1820, he was ~7 years old. He served in the Confederate Army as a private. The story goes that he, Warren Drummond and his brother, David Thomas Drummond walked to Mobile after gathering their crops and enlisted in the 36th Alabama Infantry Regiment. Clayton's Brigade was organized on May 12, 1862. They were assigned to Company B, 36th Alabama Infantry Regiment which saw action in GA, AL and MS. He may have been assigned to other locations, but

no information shows that he had any other assignment. Warren, Elijah's, brother-in-law, was killed during the war.

On December 27, 1863, General Joseph E Johnston was appointed to command the Army of Tennessee. Morale was very low and there was rampant desertion throughout the Army. One of the first things General Johnston did was declare amnesty for all deserters. Then he furloughed his entire army, a third at a time. David Thomas Drummond was among the last to be furloughed. He left the Dalton, Georgia area for Union, Alabama to see his wife, two daughters, and other family members. Exactly nine months later (27Nov1864) his son James Thomas Drummond was born.

David Thomas Drummond arrived at the front in Columbia, Tennessee. In those short nine months David Thomas Drummond had endured hard marches, hard fighting, deprivations and again saw a change of command of the rag-tag Army of Tennessee to the inept General John Bell Hood - who marched these struggling, barefooted men into Tennessee. From time the army arrived in Columbia, Tennessee on November 27, 1864, David and the entire army endured hard marches, hard fighting, and witnessed or participated in the carnage at Franklin and Nashville.

Their departure from Tennessee was described by their division commander.

"After moving back a few miles the division bivouacked for the night and resumed the march on the following day for the Tennessee River, which it reached at Bainbridge on the 25th of December, after a most painful march, characterized by more suffering than it had ever before been my misfortune to witness."

David was discharged (from 36th Alabama Infantry Regiment) in Atlanta, GA after being wounded in left shoulder and right hand.

The Woodmen Hall also provided a place for entertainment for Union residents. Along with concerts, school plays, and dances, the hall was the site of a Fourth of July picnic held every year.

Early Settlers of the Union Community

Some of colonial Virginia's William Drummond descendants moved into North and South Carolina and probably used the Oconnecchee Trail which began at the crossing in Halifax County and was the chief migration route during the Colonial period. Land transactions and wills show that they may have stayed in one location for ten or fifteen years before some of them began moving further south.

The following families were in the caravan that moved from South Carolina to Alabama in 1827: Thomas James Drummond, of Spartanburg, South Carolina, and his wife, Margaret Legg Drummond, of Prince William County, Virginia, had nine children— Jina Annberry, John,

Nancy Jane, David Thomas, Mahala, Martha, George. Harriet, and Warren. Jina Annberry, born in South Carolina in 1825, was the only child not born in Alabama. Matthew Picket Smith. of William Prince County, Virginia, and his wife, Rianah Smith, of Prince County, William Virginia, had six children-Mary Ann, James, Josephus, Elizabeth, Adeline Rebecca, and Hasseltine, Matthew Picket Smith and Rianah Legg Smith living in were Spartanburg, South Carolina near Thomas

J. and Margaret Legg Drummond and Thomas and Jeanetta Legg when Mary Ann was born in 1825. Their other five children were born in Alabama.

After Rianah Legg Smith died September, 1864, Matthew Picket Smith married his niece, Martha Drummond, the daughter of Thomas J. and Margaret Legg Drummond on July 27, 1865. There were three children from this marriage—Matthew Picket, Jr., Christiana, and John.

Thomas J. Drummond and Matthew Picket Smith married sisters, the daughters of Thomas and Jeanetta Legg from Prince William County, Virginia. Thomas Legg was living with his daughter, Rianah, and son-in-law, Matthew Picket Smith, when he died Easter Sunday 1854.

It has been passed down through the family that Elijah Sellers, born in South Carolina in 1820, was living in the household of Matthew Picket Smith and Rianah Legg Smith when they moved to Alabama in 1827.

Many of the early settlers attended church and were members of

Smith, John Leopard, Thomas J. Drummond, David Brooks, Elizabeth Brooks and Mary Hamilton Leatherwood, the daughter of Captain Peter Hamilton and Mary Thornton Hamilton. Mary Hamilton Leatherwood's son, James Leatherwood, served in the Civil War with the 18th Alabama Infantry Regiment.

Elijah Sellers and Nancy Jane Drummond were married December 31, 1846. had seven children—James, Cephus, Georgia Ann, twins Mary and Martha, John, Fanny.

David Thomas Drummond and Mary Frances Mayes were married December 30, 1857. They had thirteen children—Louisa, Josephine, James Thomas, Mary Anna, Samuel Ephriam, John, Mary Carrie, William Edward, Jesse David, Susan Hasseltine, Robert Stonewall, Ruth, Mabel.

When the Civil War began in April 1861 many of Greene County's men and boys enlisted in the Confederate Army in June 1861 and were sent to Virginia and assigned to the llth Alabama Infantry Regiment which was organized in Lynchburg. Colonel Sydenham Moore, from Eutaw, and Gilbert M. Reynolds, the husband of Mahala Drummond Reynolds were among the first from Greene County to lose their lives in the war. They died at Seven Pines, Virginia, the first engagement the regiment participated in.

Milton Alexander Hamilton and his brother, Matthew Hamilton, from Union, were members of Co. B, 11th Alabama Infantry Regiment. Mrs. Jamie R. Smith enjoyed telling that her grandfather, William Pinkney Robuck, also of Co. B, was happy when the Hamilton brothers went out forging for food because he knew they would always come back with something good to eat.

When the 20th Alabama Infantry Regiment was organized in September 1861 James Smith, from Union, and his friends and neighbors, George Drummond (died at Vicksburg), Luke Thornton (died in the war), Calvin Reynolds, John Reynolds, and John Valentine McCracken enlisted immediately.

On April 16, 1862 the Confederate Congress authorized the call up of all able-bodied men between the ages of eighteen and thirty-five. The age was later extended to forty.

Many of Greene County's men enlisted in the 36th Alabama Infantry Regiment when it was organized May 12, 1862 at Mount Vernon Arsenal, near Mobile.

David Thomas Drummond, his brother, Warren Drummond (died in the war), and Elijah Sellers, his brother-in-law, traveled to Mobile and joined the 36th Alabama Infantry Regiment on November 10, 1862, after the harvest of their crops.

The Village of Mesopotamia

If Eutaw owed nothing to the earlier adjoining community of Mesopotamia for its planning, the same cannot be said for it's buildings, at least not for the domestic examples. Mesopotamia, "the place between the Rivers," taken from the designation for the land bounded by the Tigris and Euphrates rivers in the Levant, was a name like Troy (later called Greensborough), Akron (abbreviation for Acropolis), Rome or Memphis, derived from a center of ancient culture in the venerated Mediterranean world. Unlike its antique namesake, Mesopotamia, Alabama, was not a region but only a small village, located four or five miles west of the Black Warrior and more than ten miles east of the nearest point on 'the Tombigbee River.

Mesopotamia was the proverbial wide stretch in the pike, this being the road that led from Clinton to Finche's Ferry; and its buildings were scattered more than a mile southeastwardly from the

The population of Greene in 1850 was 9,273. These people live 1,730 separate households. The population was pretty evenly divi among men and women, at 51.6% and 48.4% respectively.

Not surprisingly, the population was predominantly young. Tl aged 29 and younger comprised 72% of the population, while thos and older comprised just 16%. The two oldest residents were 90 y old.

In accordance with his instructions, the census taker also n the following among the population: Blind-3; Deaf-1; Deaf and du 2; Idiotic-4; Insane-7; Pauper-7; and, Twins-9 sets.

One item included on the 1850 census was the value of the property. Listed in this census were 1,303 individuals owning property. The property values ranged from \$25 to \$83,580.

By 1850, Alabama was the birthplace of 57% of the popular This is not surprising since settlement in Greene County had be over 30 years before and the average age was low. 



Note: James Calvin Rogers was apparently married twice before he married Elizabeth McMillan. James' Tombstone epitaph identifies three children (i.e., John Humphrey Rogers, David Rogers, and Ella W Rogers Saunders) - none of these individuals was born to Elizabeth. Note: Per 1850 census, (widow) Isabella Montgomery (age 53) is listed next to Brainard Bardwell on the roll. Uncertain of her relationship to Ann Ella's ancestors. Her wealth includes ~45 slaves and property value estimated at \$5,000 (vs \$3,000 for Brainard). Her children were:

 - Nancy and Elizabeth were sisters who married brothers
- B. Lucinda Marellan Vaught Fridell married Hugh A Westmoreland (1830-) on 7Oct1855 by a JP in Jackson County, AL
 - The 1880 US Census lists Hugh W Fridell (4 years old) as living with Hugh and Merilla (i.e, Marellan) Westmoreland. Uncertain what his relationship might be to Lucinda - but he could be their grandson - son of James Andrew Fridelle and Nancy Bellah.

Note: George suspects (but cannot yet prove) that John W and Frina Fridelle (brother of James Andrew Fridelle) adopted two (i.e., Sophia and Michael) of James and Nancy Fridelle's children after Nancy's death in 1886. Marriage records indicate that Sophia and Michael were in Angelina, TX by 1895. There is also an implication that John and his wife Susan were practicing Mennonites because the two children apparently married Mennonites.

Note: 1850 census spells family surname as 'Fridell'. Incidentally, Michael Graham (son of James who moved to Texas) kept this spelling of his surname throughout his life. In 1850, the 74th Regiment of Cherokee County generated a report called "Products of Industry" in which Isaac Fridell is listed. (Note: Isaac's status seems similar to what we would now call a deferment from military service for good of the nation.). Anyway, Isaac had a sawmill business listed on the report as follows:

The children of Isaac and Lucinda apparently decided to add the 'e' to change their surname from 'Fridell' to 'Fridelle'. Also, there was a large family in the Atlanta, GA area in 1830 who emigrated from SC in 1820-1830s while changing their surname from 'Friddell' to 'Fridell'. George suspects that Isaac was part of this family.

The 1850 census lists a second older family named 'Fridell' who lived in Cherokee County, AL (i.e., Stevenson, AL). This older Fridell family included the following family members. Census records indicate this couple are likely to have been the parents of Isaac Fridell - both men have occupation listed as 'carpenter' in the 1850 census.

- * John Fridell (1795) born in SC (birth year from 1850 census)
- * Elizabeth Unk Fridell (1795) born in SC
- * Martha J Fridell (1833) born in SC

The 1850 census also lists a family named 'Fredell' who lived in Cherokee County, AL (i.e., Stevenson, AL). George assumes that the 'Fredell' family listed in the 1850

Cherokee County, AL census is an older son of John Fridell (and brother of Isaac Fridell) since he also lists his occupation as 'carpenter' on the census. Note this additional change in spelling of the family surname - or there could have been a misspelled surname on the census record. Its family members include:

- * Andrew Fredell (1813-) born in SC;
 - Andrew is assumed to be widower since Mary is not old enough to be the other two children's mother.
- * Mary Fredell (1831-) born in GA
- * Elizabeth Fredell (1836) born in TN
 - TN birthplace is suspect unless the family first settled near Chattooga County, GA

which is near Alabama state line before moving on to Alabama. Chattooga County is where Isaac and Lucinda were married.

* Euney C Fredell (1845-) - born in GA

William Henry Fridelle married Elizabeth Lovinia Bellah on 23Sep1866 and James Andrew Fridelle married Nancy Delitha Bellah in 1874. William was born about 1843 and died 29Mar1893. Elizabeth died in Birmingham 15May1911. Note that both Elizabeth and her sister Frances (i.e., Aunt Fanny) were widows living in Birmingham during the period after Lola and Ella Fridelle graduated from Athens State University in 1902 and were living in Birmingham (more likely Enlsey) and teaching school. George suspects that the four of them were living together in Ensley for the four years between 1902 graduation and the girls being married in late 1906.

Barbour County (location of Elamville, AL) - where James and Nancy Fridelle later lived - was created on December 18, 1832, and its original boundary lines encompassed lands acquired from the Creek Indians in the 1814 Treaty of Fort Jackson as well as lands in the eastern part of Pike County. It was named in honor of James Barbour (1775–1842) a distinguished statesman and governor of Virginia. The initial non-Indian settlers came from Virginia, the Carolinas, and Georgia via the Federal Road. The first towns in the area were Williamstown (no longer in existence), Eufaula (known as Irwinton between 1837 and 1843), Louisville (established by Daniel Lewis as a trading post), and Clayton.

Note: There are members of the 'Vaught' family buried in the Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery at Ralph, AL. However, George has been unable to find any record of "Catherine Merilla Vaught Fridelle" which is name listed by several "Alabama Henderson" family trees as being the paternal grandmother of Ella Fridelle. However, there is a Chattooga County, Georgia marriage record which shows that "Lucinda Marellan Vaught" married Isaac Fridell of Jackson County, Alabama. Lucinda is also the name listed in the Bellah Family History as being the mother of William and Andrew Fridelle. Suggest this confusion arose because of misspelling of Lucinda's middle name when she married her 2nd husband Hugh Westmoreland in 1855.

William Fridell (James' brother) was a private in Company G of the 7th Alabama Infantry Regiment. He listed Jackson County as his residence.

George has a record which indicates that "The Southern Advocate" - in Huntsville, AL - published an obituary for Isaac Fridell on 20Sep1854 - which is about one year prior to Lucinda's 2nd marriage to Hugh Westmoreland.

Per 1850 census, a number of Fridels are listed in Selected U S Federal Census Non-Population Schedules, 1850-1880

- a) Isaac Fridel was a member of Regiment 7 in Cherokee County, AL on 1Jun1850.
- b) John Fridel was a member of Regiment 74 in Cherokee County, AL on 11Dec1850.
- c) Isaac Fridel was a member of District 26, Cherokee County, AL on 9Jan1850
- d) Andrew Fridell was member of Regiment 74 in Cherokee County, AL on 22Nov1850

Note: George now has some questions regarding actual military service of these four people. In at least one case (involving Isaac), it looks like the individual was living in a military-controlled district and the military regiment was just submitting a report on civilian businesses (e.g., Isaac's sawmill) which happened to operate within its jurisdiction.

Isaac Fridell (- 1853) paid cash for two land purchases as follows:

a) 40 acres on 1Aug1853 located at SESE HUNTSVILLE No 8S 10E 21 (Lebanon Land Office)

b) 40 acres on 2Apr1857 located at SENW HUNTSVILLE No 2S 8E 4 (Huntsville Land Office)

Note: There was a second James Fridell (uncertain of his relationship to 'our James') who lived in the Stevenson area ~1870 and later moved to Stockbridge, Georgia area. This individual was about the same age as 'our James' and this duplication of names has caused a lot of confusion among researchers.

Holmes Baptist Cemetery

Located about 3 miles from Ariton, Dale Co., Al. On Highway 51, in Barbour Co., Al. The Church no longer holds services.(2002). The Church was built in 1949 at the Cemetery site which was used by the disbanded James Chapel, which was located about a mile from Ariton on the River Road, near the Nance home. The Holmes Church was named for Henry Holmes , b.1798; d.25 June 1867, who owned the land which was donated for the burial grounds. His Great, Great grand-daughter came from Washington, D.C., in 1991, and placed coping and a marker at the site of his and his wife's graves.

There are many unmarked and broken graves but it is a well kept cemetery. On March 24, 2002 writer of this epitaph was met at the cemetery by Bea Scovill and her brother Abe Garner. Bea had found a Survey that was done in 1992 by Dave and Virginia Myer. Since this earlier survey there have not been many burials but looks like there has been new Tombstones placed.

Henry County was named for Patrick Henry, the famous statesman and orator from Virginia. The earliest settlers (including the Bellahs) came to the area from Georgia and the Carolinas via Fort Gaines after the 1814 Treaty at Fort Jackson, in which the Creeks ceded their lands along the Chattahoochee River to the United States. The first settlements were made in the northeastern part of the county and along the banks of the Chattahoochee River. Earliest settlements and towns included Abbeville, Headland, and Newville.

In 1825, mail from New Orleans to Washington, DC by way of Natchez Trace took at least two months. In 1806, President Jefferson signed a law authorizing the construction of a "Horse Path" from the Ocmulgee River (near present day Macon, Ga) to New Orleans. By 1830, this road had become one of America's primary highways westward. The road from Augusta, Georgia to the Creek Indian Agency west of the Ocmulgee River was the southernmost road one could travel by wagon. This westward 'highway' could be reached by traveling on either the Upper Road or Fall Line Road from Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina. The start of the Federal Road became the southern end of the Fall Line Road which connected back to Augusta, Georgia.

The Federal Horse Path crossed many lowland areas that required the building of raised causeways through wetlands. In 1806, the entire route from Okmulgee River in Georgia to Mobile River passed through treaty lands of the Creek Indians. In five years time, this route was to become the Federal Road, the most important wagon road of the 'Old Southwest'.

Between 1815 and 1840, over 300,000 people used this road to migrate to new settlements in Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Texas. Most of the migrants left their homes in the Carolinas and Georgia and traveled from as far north as Virginia and Maryland. Plantation owners of the Old South mover their entire slave populations, wagons, cattle, equipment, and extended family members along the Federal Road to reach richer cotton fields.
