Generation 8 Overview

Generation 8 includes the 32 sets of GGGGGrandparents for Ann Ella Henderson Collier. Following are a number of previously unknown 'surprises' regarding these individuals.

8.7 Robert Lamb and Frances Williamson

a) The Lamb family were Quakers - originally in VA and later in SC. Several Lamb family members were disowned by the Quakers in both locations for marrying a non-Quaker.

8.9 Edmund Waller Stephens

a) His children from marriage #1 (i.e., Benjamin and Dorothy) emigrated to Greene County in 1824. Edmund's second family emigrated to Kentucky in 1829.

b) The marriage of John Franklin Stephens (son of Edmund) and Elizabeth Wardlaw (granddaughter of William C Wardlaw) in 1837 in Greene County proved that the Stephens and Wardlaw families maintained contact during the 1824-1837 time period. This marriage also proved the Stephens, Wardlaw, Logan, Griffin, and (likely) Henderson families were neighbors in Donalds, SC prior to 1820.

8.10 William C Wardlaw & Lydia Heard

a) William and Elizabeth Wardlaw are the only two (out of 27) of Ann's grandparents known to have died in Greene County for which we do not have a burial location. The other 25 individuals were buried in church cemeteries. George's analysis suggests the couple are buried in the Wardlaw Family Cemetery.

b) Daughter Lydia married Theophilous Murphy - both just 'disappeared on their way to Texas' per family lore. George suspects that this couple (and William) died of common cause in summer of 1840 and are buried in the family plot.

c) The fate of Lydia Heard is presently unknown. George suspects that Lydia actually survived the move to Greene County in 1824 but died sometime prior to 1840. Further George suspects that Lydia is buried in the Wardlaw Family Cemetery.

8.14 Thomas Legg & Jeannetta Nully

a) George's analysis suggests that Thomas and Jeannetta were buried in Beulah Baptist Church Cemetery. Their son-in-law and daughter were founding members of the church.

8.15 Edward Mayes & Nancy Archibald

a) The Mayes family was VERY wealthy. Each of their Wills required about 30 pages to list distribution of assets.

8.16 Sarah Caroline Lamb

a) Sarah proved to be the mother of two of Ann Ella's GGrandmothers - Mary Frances Mayes and Elizabeth Jane Cartee.

b) George suspects (but cannot yet prove) that Sarah Caroline Lamb worked as an indentured servant in the Mayes household - this would be the means by which she met husband #1 - Samuel James Mayes.

8.17 Charles Montgomery & Margaret Reynolds

a) The Montgomery and Reynolds family were Irish immigrants who sailed on the same ship to Charleston, SC. Three sets of these children (including Charles & Margaret) became engaged while on that voyage.

Per Roster of South Carolina Patriots in the American Revolution:

After moving to Spartanburg District, Thomas returned to serve in the 3rd Virginia Regiment. Later in the war he joined Capt. Samuel Earle, Lt. Harry Wood and Col. Roebuck against the Indians and Tories. In addition, he was under Capt Robert McDowell, Col. Thomas and Col. Brandon. He was in the Battle of Little River and Jimmy's Creek. Next, he was under a Capt. McDonald Collins.

Pension Statement South Carolina Spartanburg District

Personally appeared before me the subscribing Justice Solomon Crocker, Sworn to & subscribed before me 2nd September 1839 who being duly sworn according to law, deposes & saith, that he was in the Revolutionary war that he served under Colonel Benjamin Roebuck of South Carolina

This deponent further states, that he has a distinct recollection of Thomas Kimbrill, that the said Thomas was in service with this deponent and there was no other man commanded by Colonel Roebuck of that name that he has been well acquainted with Thomas Kimbrill ever since the Revolution that they have both resided in this District

This deponent is well satisfied that, that Thomas Kimball mentioned in the return of the Comptroller Generals office in this State, is the one who served with him in the war & the one who is now applying for a pension and the deponent can only account for the mistake by supposing that it was an error in spelling the name (i.e., should be spelled Kimbrell).

Solomon Crocker, X his mark

Personally came before me, Captain John Collins,

Sworn & subscribed before me 10th day of April 1838 a Soldier and Officer of the Revolution, who being sworn saith, that he knows Thomas Kimbrell, who is now applying for a Pension that he has no distinct recollection of him during the war, nor does he know of any particular act of service rendered by him

But this deponent has conversed with the said Thomas Kimbrell, and the said Thomas has related particulars, which come within the knowledge of this Deponent, which has brought him to the conclusion that he was a Soldier of the Revolution.

S/ John Collins

South Carolina State Spartanburg District: Personally came Solomon Crocker of the District aforesaid and an old Revolutionary Soldier and made oath before me one of the Justices for said District that he was acquainted with Thomas Kimbrell in the old revolutionary war about 1780, 1781 and 1782 and that he was a good Soldier [3 lines of text obliterated] of General Pickens brigade and that to the best of his recollection the said Thomas Kimbrell was pretty constantly engaged in that line of service for the term above mentioned. Sworn to and subscribed before me this 10th April 1838.

Solomon Crocker

In 1873, Thomas filed for a pension as listed in the U.S. Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty-Land Warrant Application Files. Apparently, his application was rejected.

Edmund Waller's 2nd wife was Jane Griffin (1788-1839) - who died on 23Jul1788. She was the mother of Ezekiel Pickens Stephens (1819-1899). Edmund's first wife was Agness Smith Robinson, daughter of Rev William Robinson and Agness Smith of Spotsylvania County, Virginia.

Shortly after the younger Benjamin (i.e., brother of Edmund Waller Henderson) and his wife Agness Nelson Stephens arrived in South Carolina there was what Aunt Milly (a Negro slave) termed 'serious trouble'. Benjamin, Sr and his youngest son Leonard went south on the Great National Road to "bring them out". The nature of the trouble was not specified but it is known that Agness Smith Robinson (1st wife of Edmund Waller Stephens) died there. It is also known that members of the first group of settlers suffered for years from a disease similar to malaria.

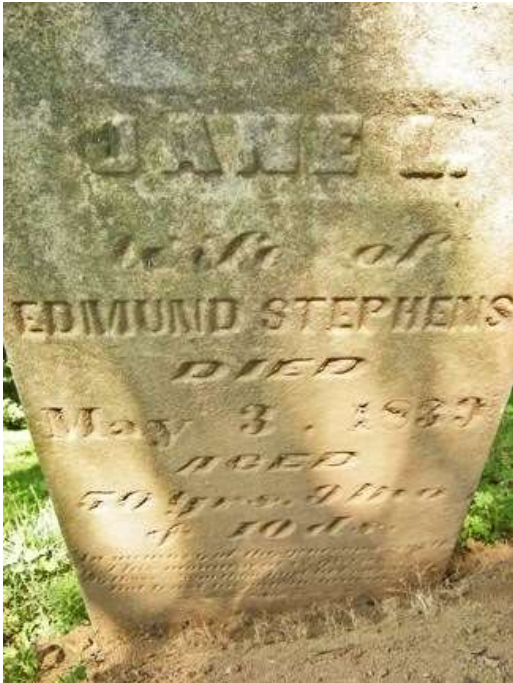
Aug2016 - George believes he has found proof that several of the Henderson-related families were neighbors both in SC and in Greene County during the early 1800s. My reasoning for this was a marriage between Elizabeth Susan Wardlaw (1821-1882) and John Franklin Stephens (1813-1884) which occurred in Greene County on 15Dec1837. The couple spent their married lives in Kenton County, KY and are buried there.

John Franklin Stephens was a son of Edmund Waller Stephens and Jane Griffen - presumably he went with them from SC to Kenton County, KY in 1829. Otherwise, he went to Greene County in 1824 (or 1827) where he married in 1837 and then decided to move to Kenton County, KY. In either case, there must have been communication between the Stephens & Wardlaw families in Kentucky and those in Greene County - at least between 1824 and 1837.

Elizabeth Susan Wardlaw was a granddaughter of William C Wardlaw & Lydia Heard - her father was John Lewis Wardlaw. She obviously went to Greene County with her parents in 1824. The moral: Young love does have a way to communicate - even under difficult circumstances. As I understand the situation, Elizabeth left SC in 1824 and John did not show up in Greene County to get married until 13 years later.

The Wardlaws lived near Donalds in Abbeville County, SC prior to emigrating to Greene County in 1824. I believe this marriage indicates that Edmund Waller Stephens,

Benjamin Waller Stephens, Zachary Logan (husband of Dorothy Stephens), and William C Wardlaw families were neighbors in SC. It does not take much of a stretch to conclude that the Hendersons and 1st wife of Benjamin Waller Stephens also lived nearby. Now if we only had a census listing of all families who lived near Donalds, SC in 1820 perhaps we could identify parents of William Franklin Henderson and mother of Agness Robinson Stephens.

Note: Family lore says that Lydia and Theophilous were 'lost' while 'on their way to Texas. There two orphan daughters were raised by their maternal grandparents Benjamin and Margaret Stephens. Interestingly, Theophilous was named executor of William Wardlaw's Will which was signed in early 1840 and William died in June 1840. George suspects the Lydia, Theophilous, and William all died of the same cause (e.g. disease) in the summer of 1840. Further, the three of them (as well as William's wife Mary) may be buried in the Wardlaw Family Cemetery (if it exists) located on their homestead located about 3 miles NE of Eutaw, AL.

Note: The version of William Wardlaw's Will as transcribed in the Stephens Family book published by Judge Laurie Paul Stephens includes a sentence which indicates that William was setting aside a 1-acre plot for the family cemetery. If so, this plot designation should appear on deed to the original Wardlaw family farm - the deed should be in the Greene County courthouse in Eutaw, AL. In October 2016, George visited the Eutaw Courthouse but was unable to find any Will for William C Wardlaw. However, George did identify exact location of William's homestead (about 3 miles NE of Eutaw), visited the site, and talked with two different people who live on the original Wardlaw homestead. Neither individual was aware of any family cemetery in the vicinity.

Know all men by these presents that I, WILLIAM C. WARDLAW, being of sound mind and disposing memory and mindful of my mortality, do hereby declare and publish the following as my last will and testament.

Whereas I have already had my tract of land whereon I now live advertised for sale consisting of 120 acres, now if it should please God that I should die before the day of sale, it is my wish and will that my executor should proceed to sell according to the terms of said advertisement all of my land, and other things now advertised for sale, and in case anything should happen that the sale is not made at that time I direct my Executor to sell as soon thereafter as convenient upon the same credits - and after my death I direct that all the balance of my property be sold by my executor, and out of the proceeds of both real and personal property I bequeath and give unto my granddaughter BETSEY H. WARDLAW the sum of five hundred dollars, unto my grand-daughter CAROLINE MURPHEY five hundred dollars, unto my daughter LYDIA MURPHEY five hundred dollars, unto my daughters MILINDA ROMAN and ELIZABETH formerly ELIZABETH TURNER five dollars each. The balance of the money after paying the

above legacies to be equally divided among my children JOHN L. WARDLAW, THOMAS H. WARDLAW, ZACHRY WARDLAW, ISAAC WARDLAW, PEGGY UNDLY STEPHENS, LYDIA MURPHY and my grand children, the heirs of WILLIAM M. WARDLAW and RICHARD TURNER Deceased. I mean hereby my grand children, the children of WILLIAM M. WARDLAW and RICHARD TURNER alone. The aforesaid legacies are to be paid after my executor shall have first paid all my just debts.

I think proper here to state that one half hogs and cattle I now have on hand belongs to my son ISAAC WARDLAW. I do not wish my family Bible sold. I give that to my daughter LYDIA. I reserve from sale of my land a sufficiency of ground for a road sixteen feet wide leading out from Benson in W. Stephen south, as agreed upon by myself and said STEPHENS.

I do hereby constitute and appoint THEOPHILUS B. MURPHY my Executor to carry this my last will and testament into effect. The word 'advertised' interlined before signing.

Signed and sealed the 11th day of February in the year 1840.

In presence of THOMAS RIDDLE, ROBERT BURNES, WILLIAM PATTON.

Note: William's will identifies 'Isaac Wardlaw' as his son. Unfortunately, researchers have really botched this one. Since Isaac is mentioned in the 1840 will, he must have been alive at that point in time - probably in Greene County, AL. Thus far, George has been unable to identify this 'Isaac'.

Both Theophilous & Lydia (nee Wardlaw) Murphy died before 1850 - apparently near time William died in June 1840. Per 1850 census, both Caroline Murphy and her sister Elizabeth Murphy were living with Benjamin & Margaret Stephens. Per Ruth Kendal, Theophilous was unable to complete his probate duties and someone else had to be appointed. Allegedly, Theophilous and Lydia Murphy disappeared from history "on the way to Texas". However, both daughters went to live with their grandparents Benjamin & Margaret Stephens. George suspects that some sort of disease struck the family in

1839-1840 during which both William and Lydia died (and are buried in Greene County) as well as Theophilous and Lydia died in Greene County rather than 'going to Texas'.

George believes he has found proof that several of the Henderson-related families were neighbors both in SC and in Greene County during the early 1800s.

George's reasoning for this was a marriage between Elizabeth Susan Wardlaw (1821-1882) and John Franklin Stephens (1813-1884) which occurred in Greene County on 15Dec1837. The couple spent their married lives in Kenton County, KY and are buried there.

John Franklin Stephens was a son of Edmund Waller Stephens and Jane Griffen - presumably he went with them from SC to Kenton County, KY in 1829. Otherwise, he went to Greene County in 1824 (or 1827) where he married in 1837 and then decided to move to Kenton County, KY. In either case, there must have been communication between the Stephens & Wardlaw families in KY and those in Greene County - at least between 1824 and 1837.

Elizabeth Susan Wardlaw was a granddaughter of William C Wardlaw & Lydia Heard - her father was John Lewis Wardlaw. She obviously went to Greene County with her parents in 1824. As I read this, Elizabeth left SC in 1824 and John did not show up in Greene County to get married until 13 years later.

The Wardlaws lived near Long Cane northeast of Abbeville in Abbeville County, SC prior to emigrating to Greene County in 1824. I believe this marriage indicates that Edmund Waller Stephens, Benjamin Waller Stephens, Zachary Logan (husband of Dorothy Stephens), and William C Wardlaw families were neighbors in SC. It does not take much of a stretch to conclude that the Hendersons and 1st wife of Benjamin Waller Stephens also lived nearby. Now if we had a census listing of all families who lived in Abbeville County, SC in 1820 perhaps we could identify parents of William Franklin Henderson and mother of Agness Robinson Stephens.

Following is a summary of George's analysis regarding a "Wardlaw Family Cemetery" in Greene County, AL.

George reviewed copy of William C Wardlaw's Feb1840 Will which was reprinted in the Stephens family book. In this version, the will has one extra sentence: "I reserve from sale of my land forever one acre where the burying ground now is." Neither version of the will is the original but I am willing to accept that there was likely a "Wardlaw Family Cemetery". Incidentally, that 1-acre plot is likely still showing on property deed which should be available there at the courthouse in Eutaw. In October 2016, George was unable to locate the original deed to the Wardlaw property but the Tax Assessor's Office

in Eutaw, Alabama does NOT have any indication that there is a family cemetery located on this property.

Following is summary of my experience in finding old family burial plots here in Nashville area: Given a 1-acre plot, the Wardlaw family cemetery would likely be 210' x 210' with some sort of surrounding fence or wall. It will likely be located on a hillside or perhaps just on the edge of hilltop - probably within 200 yards of the family home. In the early 1800s, the family home would have been located 'down the hill' close to the water supply (probably a creek) while the gravesites were located high enough on the hillside to be beyond any future flooding. If any structure still exists it might still be visible on a google satellite image. Thus far, George has been unable to locate any actual evidence of such a family burial site.

George reviewed the will of Rev William Robinson (1708-1792) - he spelled his wife's name as "Agness Smith". To me, this provides proof of my earlier assertion that Agness Smith is the GGrandmother of Agness Robinson Stephens (1818-1873) who married William Franklin Henderson.

Incidentally, Theophilus B Murphy did not purchase any land patent in Greene County - but he was named executor of William's Will in 1840. Presumably, he was a poor boy (allegedly from Massachusetts) who married Lydia and they had two girls Caroline (1837) and Elizabeth (1840). Since William C Wardlaw named Theophilus and Lydia in his will dated 11Feb1840, they both must have been living nearby. However, William died 8Jun1840 and Ruth Kendall said the probate court had to name someone else to be the executor. My suspicion is that a catastrophe happened to Theophilus & Lydia in the summer of 1840 with both of them being buried in the family homestead and the two orphan girls going to live with Benjamin & Margaret Stephens (i.e., their grandparents). It seems unlikely that William would have named Theophilous as his executor in Feb 1840 if they were planning on moving to Texas in the immediate future.

Finally, my suspicion is that William's wife Lydia (rather than dying in 1812) made the trek with the family from SC to Greene County in 1824. If so, she is likely buried in the family plot. There is no evidence I know of that Lydia died in 1812 - that is a confusion researchers have made with a Lydia Wardlaw who died in Elbert, Georgia in 1812 - that Lydia may have been the Governor's wife.

George's Hypothesis (as yet unproven): Elkanah Briggs was born in Massachusetts. Elkanah's family emigrated south and ended up in Camden County, GA sometime prior to 1793. The Briggs and Harris family were neighbors in Camden County, GA and, perhaps earlier, in Massachusetts. Elkanah joined the Georgia militia in Camden County, GA - he was 27 years of age when he was discharged from the militia. While in the militia, Elkanah met Elizabeth Harris (whose family was living nearby in Camden County, GA) and they were married less than one year after Elkanah was discharged from the Georgia militia. Elkanah and Elizabeth lived in Georgia until sometime after 1816 when Elkanah and Elizabeth relocated their family to Crenshaw County, AL.

Notes from published Descendants of James Johnson, Sr

*Nancy Johnson, (James1) b. ca. 1766 in perhaps Mecklenburg County, Virginia, d. in Spartanburg County, South Carolina. Nancy Johnson, who married after her father died, was under age for marriage, and it is recorded in Mecklenburg Co., Va., that consent was give by her brother, James Johnson, Jr., and Howell Johnson was a witness to her marriage to David Drummond. She married **David Drummond, Sr.**, b. ABT 1765 in Mecklenburg Co., North Carolina., d. 1830/1840 in Spartanburg County, South Carolina.*

***David Drummond Sr:** David was a son of Aaron Drummond Jr and Elizabeth Todd. David was a brother to Ephriam Drummond, who settled near Woodruff, SC., and is buried at Bethel Cemetery, Woodruff, SC.*

David Drummond Sr apparently settled in the Ben's Creek Community, Spartanburg County where there was a community called 'Drummondville' in the vicinity of Reidville. David Drummond Sr was a lay minister who was attending Sharon's Methodist Church in Reidville Towshship, Spartanburg County, South Carolina.

David Drummond Sr must have been something of a "character" as he Is mentioned in some of the articles written by William Roy, whose articles concerning the Ben's Creek Community appeared in the Carolina Spartan newspapers between May 20, 1891 to December 20, 1893. In one article he wrote, "Sharon Church was honored with the never-failing attendance of David Drummond, a member of Foster's Church, which was in a declining condition, and he turned his whole energy to the support of the gospel at Sharon. He was perhaps known further by the reputation than any other lay member of the church on this continent. It would take a volume to related his sayings and eccentricities. Few of the preacher's utterances but what he responded to with "Amen", in a thundering voice. I want to correct an error that I saw in newspapers with regard to the use of the word Amen. The paper stated that when David was In a Presbyterian meeting he wished to respond to the sentences of the preacher that he approved, but was not certain that the rules that church would allow him to respond and at last he is said to have shouted, "Amen, rough a venture. " I have heard him use that word with power in his own church. I mean the rough at a venture part of it, but never in the Presbyterian Church. When I heard him annex the phrase "rough at a venture" to the word "Amen", it was next time he had been to hear preaching after he had stood a trial In his church for Improperly using the word Amen. The sentence that he is charged, read something in this we': "~he power and kingdom of the Devil was established on earth" and he was charged with shouting Amen to that sentence. Tourists, Yankee pedlers and Kentuckians, in passing through the country, selected camp meeting time to see Mr. Drummond and hear his utterances. He was on the greatest scripturalists in the world. He had texts of scripture at hand to encourage every sentiment in favor of virtue. At the same time he was able to hurl anthema Neatest voice, citing book and chapter to prove his point.

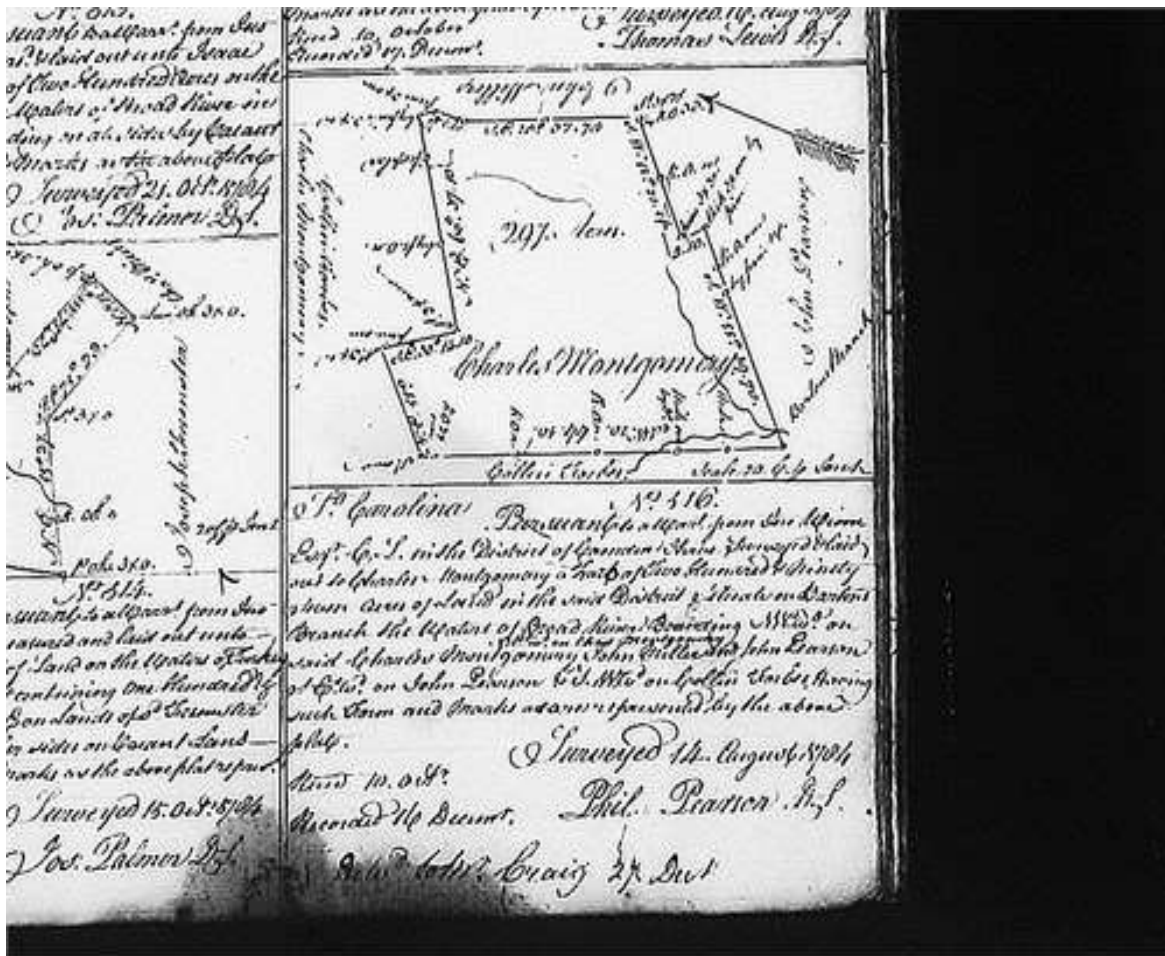

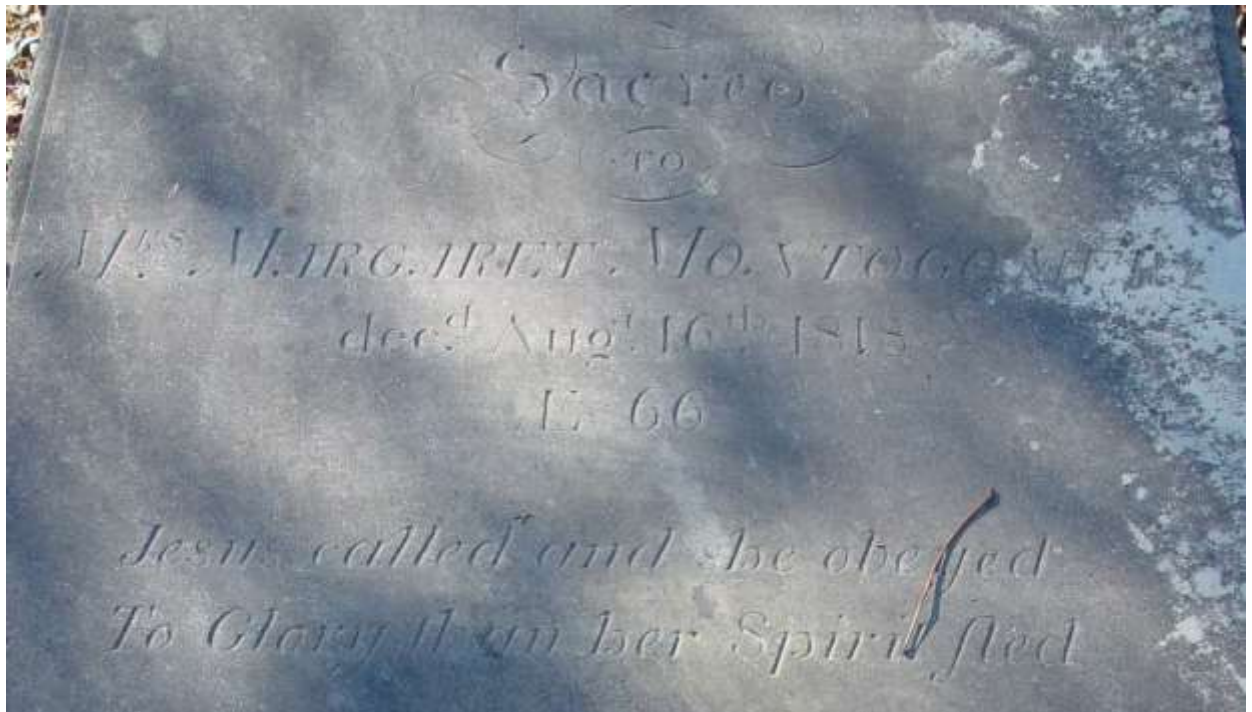

Revolutionary War Story

Elisha Chavis is one of the many Pee Dee Indians that served in the Revolutionary War. His company was formed by Captain John Allston to fight with Gen Francis Marion against the British. His company was called 'Foot Rovers' and also 'Foot Rangers' or Raccoon Company. The next in command Lt James Coachman recruited Pee Dee from those who had lived on the reservation he established for them on his farm on the Edisto River. This company was composed entirely of Pee Dee Indians and part of the regiment serving under **Colonel William Thompson**, "Audited Accounts of Revolutionary Claims against S.C., No. 91.S.C. State Archives, Columbia".



High Point Plantation (circa 1964) - near Jenkinsville in Fairfield County, SC was built by **William Thompson** in 1800. The house is a two-story, frame farmhouse with a gable roof and included the three northernmost bays of the present house. The original house had exterior end chimneys. The interior of original portion of the house is characterized by a hall and parlor plan, wide board walls, an enclosed corner stair, and a corner cupboard. During the early antebellum period the house was extended to five bays. Both the original portion of the house and the addition are sheathed in beaded weatherboard and contain nine-over-nine windows on the first story and nine-over-six windows on the second story. A one story, shed-roofed porch extends across the facade. The porch is supported by square posts connected by a plain balustrade. There are stone steps leading to the porch. A two-story ell on the rear of the house is believed to have been constructed ca. 1870.

Upon his death on 22Nov1842, William Thompson died leaving High Point to his daughter Margaret Jane and her husband Hargrove A. Glenn. The Thompson Family Cemetery is located near the house.

High Point Plantation was listed in the National Register December 6, 1984.

Hugh enlisted in the First Regiment on 4Nov1776 and served as a private under Captain Charles C Pinckney. In addition, he served as a quartermaster, lieutenant, and captain in the Sixth Regiment from 1777 to 1780. He was a volunteer in the battle of Fort Moultrie and the siege of Charleston, where he was taken prisoner and placed on parole until the end of the war. P.I.; S.C.H.&G., I, 52; A.A.5260; C114; X3874; Yearbook, 1893; Crowder, I, 56; Heitman, p340, N.A.853.

Another record indicates that Hugh served with the S.C. 6th Regiment during the period of 1Aug1779-1Dec1779. Hugh's rank listed as 'st'.

William Partridge served in the Third Regiment from 25Jun1775 to 1Jul1781. During 1779, he was under Captain John Hennington. At one time, he was a SERVANT to Captain Hugh Milling. S.C.H.&G., II, 179; V,157; VI,113; N.A.246; N.A.853; N.A.859.

Apparently, Hugh Milling was an energetic and opinionated type into his old age. One article George found says that David Evans was a member of Congress in 1813-1814. During his absence, Captain Hugh Milling took charge of his affairs and physiced his negroes when sick. Further 'the old captain was severe on Generals Hampton and Wilkinson and others in regard to their conduct of the war (of 1812) with the British, saying that they could speculate in tobacco better than command armies.

Note: Based on his military service during the Revolutionary War, on 3Mar1803 Hugh was declared eligible for 300 acres of land under the 'U.S. War Bounty Land Warrants, 1789-1858'.

Note: George does not have any record that indicates either location of the land or if Hugh actually took possession of the 300 acres. There was a petition filed before U.S. House of Representatives on 15Jan1819 to change location of the bounty land. Congress rejected the petition. There was a second petition filed before U.S. House of Representatives during 25th Congress, Session 2 which the heirs of Hugh Milling were requesting commutation of half-pay - presumably some of Hugh's pay was withheld during the war. In this case, Congress 'laid the petition on the table' with an 'adverse' report (i.e., sounds like they rejected it).

The following contributed by Findagrave member GMG, #47391530:

Died May 7, 1837, age 85 years, 2 mos. 16 days of Fairfield District on Jackson Creek, Captain Hugh Milling, an officer in the army in the Amer. Rev. War. He was born in Drumbe County Down, Ireland February 21, 1752 and migrated to America about 1771 and resided in Charleston in 1774 when the first Revolution movements were made there. He joined a company of Grenadiers raised by Captain McCall, by whom the British Arsenal was forced to open. In 1775 he became 1st. Sgt. in a company of Grenadiers commanded by Charles Cotesworth Pinckney. In 1778 he was commissioned as 1st Lieut.

in the 6th Cont. Reg. of SC and in 1779 as Captain of the same Regt. In 1783, he located on his plantation on Jackson Creek and practiced medicine. Published in the Southern Times and Gazette July 7, 1837

Following excerpt is from a 1916 application to the National Society Sons of American Revolution:

Hugh Milling was a resident of Charleston, SC in 1774 when the first revolutionary movements were made in that city. At that time, he joined a company of Grenadiers, raised by Captain McCall, by which the British arsenal was forced open, and that company and others were supplied with arms. In 1775, Hugh Milling became First Sargeant in a company of Grenadiers commanded by Charles Cotesworth Pinckney. In 1778, he was commission 1st Lt in the 6th Continental Regiment of South Carolin, and in 1779 as captain in the regiments. He was engaged in the first and second battles of Fort Moutrie, at the battle of Stone, at siege and storming of Savannah, in the war that carried into the Cherokee Nation in Georgia and Florida, and in the unsuccessful expedition against St Augustine, Florida. The continental regiments of South Carolina became reduced in number by disease and battle and it became necessary to consolidate them. This measure deranged the officers of the 6th Regiemt, and Captain Milling served as a volunteer at the siege of Charleston. A short time before the city fell, he was ordered by Governor Rutlege to endeavor to make his way through lines of the enemy and raise men in the back country and come down in the rear of the besieging army. In this, together with some other officers, he succeeded. He reached the upper districts and was engaged in the service when he was taken by a party of Tories and lodged in the Camden gaol. From there he was sent to Colonel Balfour, the British Commandant in Charleston, and from there to Haddre's Point where he remained a prisoner under parole until end of the war.

According to a Boston Post newspaper article, Captain Hugh Milling died on his farm at the age of 85.

Elijah was in Captain Thomas Wait Foster's Company of Artillery, Col Ruggles Woodbridge's regiment list of men dated Cambridge 25Apr1775. Elijah was also a private in Captain Cowles' Company, Col Woodbridge's regiment. Company returned October 1775 reporting as serving from 19Apr1775 to 9May1775. As that date, Elijah was transferred to the artillery. Also 3rd Sergeant of Captain Foster's Company, Col Richard Girdley's (artillery) regiment. Muster roll dated 1Aug1775: enlisted 28Apr1775, served 3 months and 11 days. Elijah returned Oct1775. Also order for bounty coat or its equivalent in money. Afterwards, Elijah was Captain of militia. Record found in Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in War of the Revolution, Vol I, page 600 and "History of Goshen", Mass. page 134.

Brigadier General Dr Isaac Guion III of North Salem served as a physician and surgeon in Continental Army Commissary and Paymaster for 7th NC Troops. Became POW at Charlestowne in May1780. Ensign in Colonel John Lamb's 2nd Artillery. According to Long Island Genealogy site, Captain Isaac Guion was one of many "Patriot officers, mostly continental, who were refugees from their homes in New York City and vicinity during occupation by the British Army from 1776 to November 25, 1783.

Dr Guion moved to White Oak River Plantation where he owned 12 slaves in 1800. From there, his family moved to New Bern, NC. Member of NC State Convention in 1788. "Worshipful Master" 1788-1790 for St John's Free Masons Lodge. Was partner in a store in Swansborough with William Ferrand.

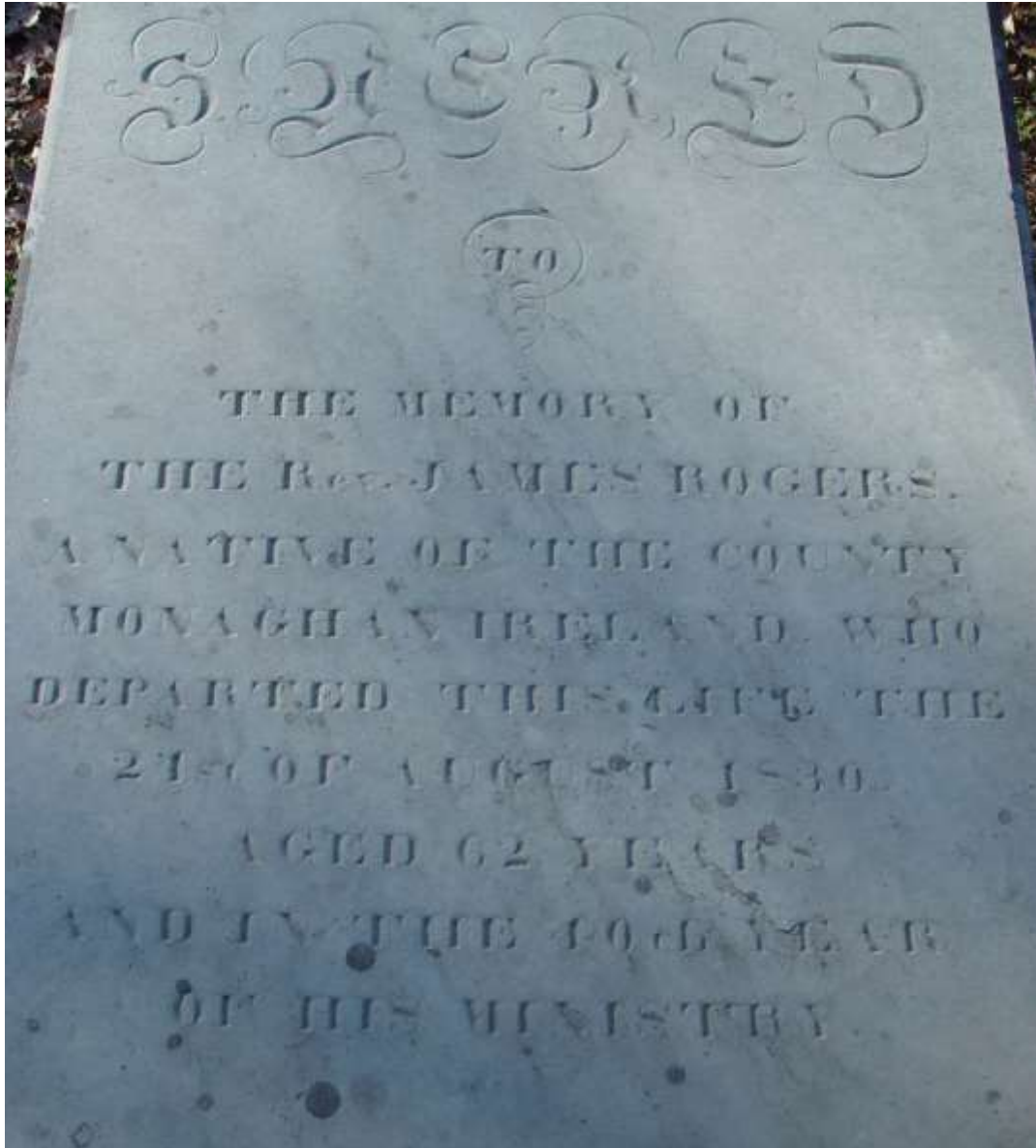
Source from the News & Herald, Winnsboro, SC, June 18,1901: The Rev James Rogers was for many years principal of the Monticello Academy in its early existence. He first married a Miss Boyd; (error) - wife #1 was Jane Wilson Murray) they had one son, John. After her death, he married Miss Celia Davis, sister of Colonel John Davis; she left no children. Rev James Rogers was for many years pastor of the Presbyterian Church near Kincaid's bridge, called the Brick Church. He died at White Hall, where Mr Thomas McGill now lives about the year 1830.

Source: Columbia Telescope, November 12, 1830: Died on the 21st of August, of dropsey at the house of William Adger, Esq, in Fairfield, the Rev James Rogers in the sixty second year of his age. After completing his education in Scotland, Mr Rogers was licensed to preach the Gospel, in Ireland, his native county, at the age of twenty-one. He shortly came to America and located in the Fairfield District.

James graduated from Glasgow University and studied theology two terms with Dr Lawson at Selkirk, Scotland. He was licensed 8Sep1789 so that he might go to South Carolina with a brother and sister. He landed in Charleston, SC on 25Dec1789 and soon afterward went to Fairfield and Abbeville Districts.

George's research indicates following chronology for life of Rev James Rogers

- 1768 - James Rogers was born in County Monaghan, Ireland
- 1789 - James Rogers was ordained as a Presbyterian minister in Ireland
- 1789 - Rev James Rogers immigrated via Charleston, SC aboard the ship Boyer
- 1791 - Rev James Rogers became first past of Old Brick Church in Fairfield District, SC
- 1792 - Rev James Rogers married Jane Wilson Murray (~1774-)
- 1793 - Son John Rogers was born
- 1795 - Founded Monticello Academy and presided over it for more than 25 years. This academy was somewhat famous in its day and many men who afterwards became famous in the South obtained the rudiments of an education in this school.
- 1803 - The Associate Reformed Synod of the Carolinas was organized at Rev Rogers' church
- 1803 - Jane died early - reason unknown. Open question: Why would James call 'Celia Rogers' his 'beloved wife' whom he wanted to be buried next to? Also, Jane is not listed as being buried in Old Brick Church Cemetery. One possible explanation - this new church did not have a cemetery during its first years of operation.
- 1805 - Rev Rogers married wife #2 Celia Davis (1778-1808).
- 1808 - Celia Davis Rogers dies at age 30
- 1815 - Rev Rogers married wife #3 Jane Adger (1796-). Jane would have been 18 years of age in 1815.
- 1830 - Rev Rogers died
 - died of dropsey at home of William Adger, Esq
 - Will named wife #3 (Jane Adger), brother-in-law John Adger, and nephew General James Rogers as executors
 - James' will mentions his "plantation" (size unknown)

Apparently, Rev Rogers was actually the pastor of three churches in the immediate area for many years. He was pastor of King's Creek and Cannon's Creek Churches in Fairfield County until 1815 when he resigned his pastorate of these two churches. He was the first pastor of Ebenezer Church (now called Old Brick Church) from its inception in 1791 until his death in 1830.

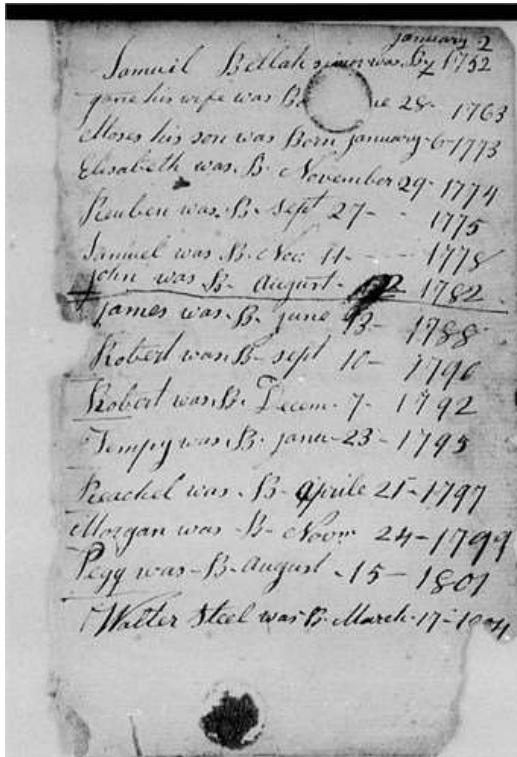
Within 3 years of his marriage to Jane, Samuel began to purchase land in Georgia - where their three younger children were born. In total, he accumulated at least 600 acres of land - including a tract of 202.5 acres in Troup County by state of Georgia as the reward for his services as a Revolutionary War soldier.

Notes on Ephraim

Ephraim recorded his will 12 July 1798 in Oglethorpe Co. He listed his wife as Jane, His daughters were listed as Mary, Elizabeth, Margaret and Jemima and one son Ephraim.

Info from Pharrs and Farris. His Will is in book A pg. 78 at Lexington, Ga. dated 7/12/1798. recorded 10/2/1798. It is signed "Ephraim Phair". His wife Jane and Alexander McEwen are named as executors. He was a Revolutionary Soldier (See Lottery of Oglethorpe Co., Ga. 1804 p. 9). His wife had two draws as a wife of a Revolutionary soldier. His father's will in 1793 left him with "one third of price of land that I sold to Nathaniel Hicks and one ewe and one weather and 1/4 interest in a wagon."

One article told story of elementary student with Ephraim Pharr as the teacher. Ephraim liked to use Dilworth's Spelling Book for spelling. However, he also liked to use the New Testament from which he gave students questions to answer each evening.

Ephraim was also known as Ephraim Farr.

Ephraim Alexander Pharr III (30Oct1757-2Oct1798) was born in Bedford County, Ga. After he married Jane Ashton Smith (1768-1862) in 1792, the couple lived in Oglethorpe County, Ga. Ephraim's father was Edward "Neddy" Pharr (or Phair) (1720-1794) and his mother was Rachel Beard (1730-1780).
