## Generation 9 Overview

Following are some interesting 'tidbits' regarding Ann Ella' GGGGGGrandparents:

### 9.10 Robert Kimbrell & Sarah Thompson

- a) Robert and Sarah have twins - Nancy and Thomas. Nancy and Thomas each then become a grandparent to Joseph Cartee - of Ann's GGGrandparents.

### 9.13 Thomas Lamb

- a) The Lamb family were Quakers in both Virginia and South Carolina. At least three members of the family were disowned by the Quakers because each married a non-Quaker.

### 9.18 Rev William Robinson

- a) The Rev William Robinson and his son John married sisters.
- b) The Rev William Robinson spelled his wife's name as 'Agness' on their marriage certificate and again in his Will. These names strongly imply the lineage of Agness Robinson Stephens (i.e., wife of William Franklin Henderson).

### 9.13 Hugh Montgomery

- a) Hugh's first wife was related to royalty and had a title - family lore talked about how she ignored her family's wishes and married Hugh anyway. Hugh's second wife was about the same age as his children - this created much scandal in family lore.
- b) Hugh, his 2nd wife, and six children immigrated from Ireland through Charleston, SC. Three of his children met their future spouses during the voyage and each was married soon after they arrived in America.

James Willard Cartee and Nancy Ann Cullen Dashiell emigrated from Augusta County, Va to Spartanburg County, SC shortly after they were married in ~1757.		Beginning NLT 24Dec1741, Nancy's parents lived (& died) in Stepney Parish, Somerset, Maryland.
Apparently, James Matteson Cartee (8.5) was an only child. In reviewing 150+ family trees, each one of them identified only James Willard Cartee as child of James Willard Cartee and Nancy Cullen Dashiell.		
James was a Private in South Carolina 3rd Regiment during the Revolutionary War - released 1Nov1779.		
James Cartey owned 100 acres on Buffalo Creek of Roanoke on 14Mar1765. Purchased from David Robinson on 12Nov1755.		
1704 - James Cartee (likely James' father or grandfather) immigrated into Virginia.		

James Cartee (George suspects he was the grandfather of James Willard Cartee because he was listed as 'primary immigrant') immigrated to America and arrived in Virginia in 1704. James Cartey (George suspects he was father of James Willard Cartee because he was listed as 'primary immigrant') arrived in Virginia in 1722. Patent abstracts of this time period include numerous references to land patented by 'French refugees', the Protestant Huguenots who fled France after Louis XIV revoked their religious freedoms.

There appear to be three consecutive generations with same name:

- 1) James Willard Cartey ( - ) - Immigrant who arrived in Virginia in 1704
- 2) James Willard Cartey ( - ) - Immigrant who arrived in Virginia in 1722
- 3) James Willard Cartee (1733-1802) - Born in Augusta County, Va; married Nancy Ann Cullen Dashiell (1733-1760?) in Va about 1757, and emigrated to Spartanburg, SC - probably shortly after being married.

John was a Private in the Revolutionary War. The Metter, GA chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution honored John's service for his country with a ceremony on 29May1994 at Lake Church Cemetery in Chandler County, GA.	John and Ann gave birth to their 4th child in 1776 and their 7th child in 1793. Unless there were multiple infant deaths during this period, George would almost suggest that John was married to wife#3 for these youngest 4 children. No record as yet that John was married for a 3rd time.	
Sally and Ann Holloway were sisters who married brothers William and John Holloway. They were daughters of Benjamin & Sarah Griffin of Craven County, NC.		
Per 1800 Census, John, Sr lived in Edgefield, SC and owned 1 slave. Per 1790 Census, John, Sr lived in Craven County, NC and owned 6 slaves.		
George found a record which indicates John, Sr sold some land on 25Sep1749 which was located in Norfolk County, Va..		

Note: Lake Church Cemetery in what is now Candler County, Ga - area was part of Bulloch County, Ga in the early 1800s.

**John Holloway**, born in North Carolina, served in the Revolutionary War (DAR). He moved on to Georgia with his brother William, where they farmed and lived a good life. The family were devout **Quakers**, originally from England. John and his wife **Ann Griffin** Holloway raised eight children: John, William, **Elizabeth**, James, Mickleberry, Nancy, Jeremiah, and Thomas. The Metter GA chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution honored John's service for this country with a ceremony on May 29, 1994 at Lake Church Cemetery in what is now Candler county GA, formally Bulloch county GA.

### Revolutionary War Patriot

John, Sr. was granted 640 acres of land in Craven Co. April 7, 1750 (or 1758) He was listed as a Private in Captain Peter Rutger's Troop of Horse in N. C. Militia from New Bern in Craven County.

Thomas was member of Quakers in Virginia which disowned him on 29May1766 for marrying Sarah ?? who was not a Quaker. Their first child Robert was born 23May1766 in Fairfax, Va. Thomas received some sort of letter introducing him to Quaker Congregation in SC. Apparently, Thomas and Sarah left for SC shortly after Robert was born.		Given Katherine's age (i.e. 29) when she married Thomas, this was a 2nd marriage for both.
28Apr1871 - Bush River Quaker Monthly Meeting, Newberry, SC. Thomas Lamb, Jr produced a paper at this meeting condemning his misconduct in taking up arms and going out in a warlike manner.		Sarah's death of 15Apr1791 was reported by Quakers Cane Creek monthly meeting of Union County, SC.
After Sarah's death in 1791, Thomas and several of his children emigrated to Williamson County, TN. Son Robert married Frances Williamson in SC and this couple stayed in SC.		Apparently, there was 'my' Sarah (1748-1791) who who married Thomas Lamb Jr in Loudoun County, VA in 1765. There was a 'Sarah Moore' who married a Thomas Lamb in 1766 in Fairfax County, VA. The similarity of these names (and likely kinship) has generated enormous confusion among researchers.
Interestingly, the Lamb family were members of Quaker Church in SC and TN even though Thomas had been disowned by Quaker congregation in VA.

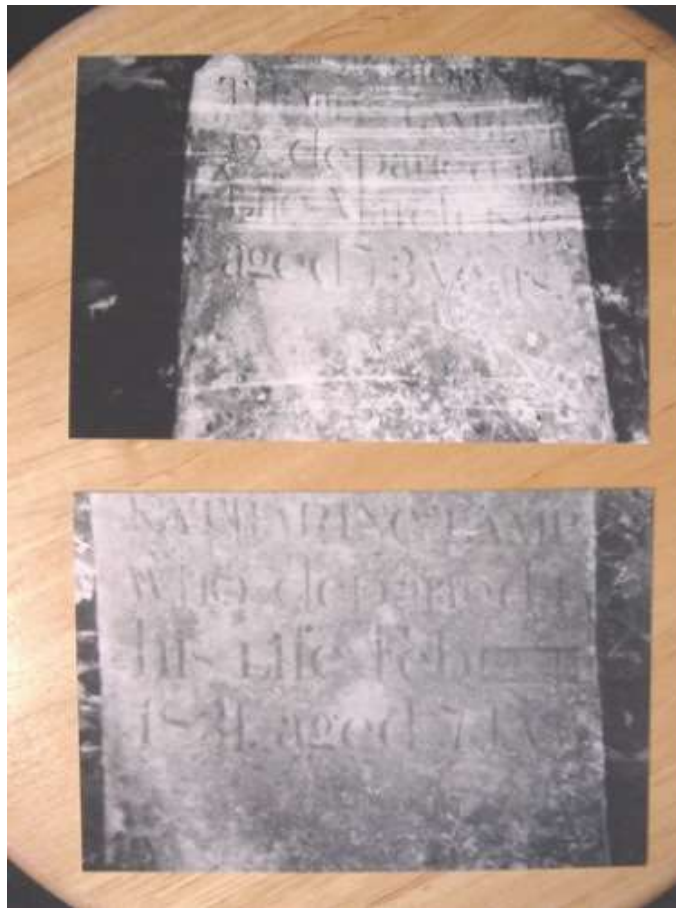

Note: **Thomas Lamb** (1743- ) was disowned by the Quakers' Fairfax Monthly Meeting, Virginia on 29May1766 for indiscretion with a woman (i.e., Thomas married a non-Quaker). As often happened among the Quakers, a disowned family could apply for membership to another Monthly Meeting. On 28Jun1766, Thomas Lamb (1721), Alice and six youngest children were granted a certificate from the Fairfax MM to go to the Wateree MM, Kershaw County, SC. Thomas (1721) and Alice had nine children named in his will. As Thomas (1743-) had been disowned, Margaret was born in 1766, and Phoebe was born in 1768, the six children relocated to South Carolina with William, Longshore, Alice, Sarah, Esther, and John.

On 25Feb1775, Thomas Lamb Jr's paper of acknowledgement was received and accepted and granted certificate to Bush River Monthly Meeting, SC based of recommendation of Padgett's Creek PM, a branch meeting of Bush River MM.

### **Comments on Dorothy Jemina Waller's Find-a-Grave website**

Dorothy's paternal grandfather, John Waller, was born 23Feb1673. He emigrated from Buckinghamshire, England to King & Queen County, Virginia. He arrived before May 1696 when he bought 1,039 acres of land in Pamunkey Neck from Elias Downes. In 1701, this became King William County. John Waller married Dorothy King and built his home Enfield on this land. He died in Spotsylvania County in September 1754.

Interestingly, Dorothy Jemima's brother, William Edmund Waller, married Mildred Smith who was the daughter of Stephen Smith and Phoebe Hawkins. The second wife of Stephen Smith was Blessing Stephens, the mother of Benjamin Stephens (Dorothy Jemima's husband). So, William Edmund Stephens married the stepsister of Benjamin Stephens.

### **Per Benjamin Stephens monuments page**

The lineage of Benjamin Stephens, Jr is shrouded in mystery. His mother was Blessing Stephens, daughter of William & Sarah Stephens of Orange County, Virginia. His father died in 1767.

Blessing became the second wife of Stephen Smith on 4Jul1773 when Benjamin was 19. Court documents show that Smith and his two brothers were also known by the last name of Noblet. The day before their marriage Blessing Stephens and Stephen Smith entered into a more or less equal contract (i.e., prenuptial agreement) whereby each agreed to respect one another's property and to manage and dispose of it as each saw fit. Stephen Smith was 58 and Blessing was about 20 years younger than he. Many efforts have been made to determine Smith's exact relation to Benjamin Stephens, Jr - to no avail.

Benjamin Stephens, Jr married Dorothy Jemima Waller in 1775. They lived on a hilltop near the home of Stephen and Blessing Smith on Riga Run, about one mile north of Orange Springs in Orange County, VA. In 1779 the legislature of Virginia appointed Dr Thomas Walker and Daniel Smith to join with Richard Henderson and William Bailey Smith of North Carolina to draw the boundary of the territories of Kentucky and Tennessee westward. The two components parted in dispute and Walker ran the line to the Tennessee River. The boundary deflected 17 miles north and there was much ado about this for many years. Benjamin Stephens was appointed as a guard for the expedition and disappeared into the wilderness, leaving a wife with 3 or 4 small sons. It was a bitterly cold winter and a ruptured endeavor. It is not known how long he stayed on the job. We know that in September 1757, two individuals Stephen Smith & Stephen I.K. Smith of Orange County were employed to survey a road past Pine Stake Church to the Spotsylvania line. It is not altogether surprising to see that Benjamin Stephens was appointed to serve with the Walker party. His stepfather was a surveyor.

Meanwhile, there was a migration from Orange and Spotsylvania to South Carolina and Georgia. Two of Dorothy Stephens' brothers, John Waller and Leonard James Mourning Waller were Baptist preachers who joined a group of impressive size. The intent was to tame and settle this section of the new nation. (Note: Tina Henderson Robinson of Virginia says she has found evidence this mass migration was in response to Government's offer of free land in return for 'evangelizing the heathen'.) The Wallers, Nelsons, and others left Virginia about 1793. Four sons of Benjamin and Dorothy Stephens followed within a few years: Richard Stephens, Waller Stephens, Edmund Waller Stephens, and Benjamin Stephens, Jr. Most of what is known about this period was told by a Stephens slave, Aunt Milly.

Shortly after the younger Benjamin, Jr and his wife Agnes Nelson Stephens arrived in South Carolina there was what Milly termed 'serious trouble'. Benjamin, Sr and his youngest son Leonard went south on the Great National Road to "bring them out". The nature of the trouble has not been determined but it is known that Agness Smith Robinson (first wife of Edmund Waller Stephens) died there. It is also known that members of the first group of settlers suffered for years from a disease similar to malaria.

Edmund Waller Stephens and his younger brother Benjamin, Jr did not return to Virginia but resided in SC for several years before migrating to northern Kentucky (in 1829). Their father returned to Orange County where, on 6Oct1805, he sold his land in Riga and settled the estate of Stephen Smith. Probate documents also suggest his mother had died. Very soon after this, Benjamin and Dorothy emigrated to Kentucky, staying for about two years in the vicinity of Bryan's Station in Fayette County before deciding to take land in that part of Campbell County which become Kenton County in 1840. Their children John, Nancy Jane Waller, Mary Waller & Leonard Stephens were with them.

**Per H.E. Ryle notes:** "Sometime after 25Oct1805, Benjamin, Dorothy, and most of the children moved to Kentucky, near Bryant's station. In 1802, Benjamin, Jr & Edmund and their families go to South Carolina (Edgefield District). Circa 1807, Benjamin Sr and Jr (back from SC), William, Leonard, and John moved by the Ridge Road toward the north to the Ohio River (on Gunpowder Creek).

No mention of Edmund returning to Kentucky. Richard is mentioned in his father's will (1839) and family lore says he went to Brazil (however, census records indicate he emigrated to Greene County, AL, married, and raised a family there). In 1810, William and family moved to Monroe County, Missouri. Waller seems to have stayed in Orange County, Virginia where, in 1798, he bought land on Wizel Run.

Like most of his male relatives, William served in the militia. Unlike his brother Beverley who elected to stay loyal to the crown, William was a patriot. He was : "commissioned a Major of Militia 17 Sept., 1743." He was a "Colonel of Militia in the American Revolution, Adjutant of the 9th Virginia Regiment and later annexed to the 5th Virginia Regiment." (By the time the Revolution got underway, William was in his 60's--but--even George Washington was in his mid-40's at that time.

William Robinson was a Lt. in the Spotsylvania Co Virginia Militia at the time of the Revolutionary War. He is in the DAR index. He was in the battle of Hot Water fought on the 26 of June 1781 not far from Williamsburg Virginia. He was also at the small Battle of Jamestown. The Revolutionary War pension of Thomas Vines states that he had marched under Capt Given and Lt. William Robinson to the above stated battles. This was when Tarleton plundered Charlottesville. They then joined Gen Lafayette's army and were at the battle of Yorktown. William also supplied the Militia with beef.

William Robinson was a large slave owner. His will has 8 slaves named in the document and he gave the slaves to his wife and children at the time of his death.

## History of Hewick Plantation Home

### *History*

Three centuries ago, in 1678, one of the most significant manor homes in Virginia, originally named The Grange, was constructed by Christopher Robinson, who had arrived in the Colony from England about 1666. This home was the gathering place for many of the important families of Virginia who helped shape the colony into the commonwealth it would eventually become.

His son, Christopher Robinson II, upon inheriting the estate, renamed the plantation Hewick for the Robinson ancestral home in England. Christopher Robinson II was Clerk of Middlesex County and served in the House of Burgesses. He was a member of the Kings Council, appointed the Secretary of Foreign Plantations and was an original Trustee of the College of William and Mary.

Old accounts of Hewick describe it as being located amidst beautiful trees, with a lane lined by sixty ancient oaks on each side, leading to the house, and with beautiful lawns bordered by the poplar boxwood. It was a village unto itself with a blacksmith, carpenter, cobbler, and butcher shops to take care of the plantation needs. The slave quarters were near the river where there were docks for the loading shipments of tobacco to England and receiving manufactured goods. The grounds included gardens and orchards, family burial grounds, spring and spring house.

Hewick was a gathering place for the Robinsons, Wormsleys, Beverleys, Braxtons, and others to discuss the affairs of the Nation they were helping to build. With all the strength and elegance today as it epitomized three centuries ago, it is indeed a monument to the past where these men met "Who first placed the name of Virginia on the maps of all the civilized world and laid the foundation for her greatness."

Hewick is currently undergoing an extensive restoration. The plantation grounds are available as a full service wedding and event venue, offering simple elegance in an historical setting. It is listed in the Virginia Historic Landmarks Register and on the National Register of Historic Places.

Built in 1678 by Christopher Robinson who arrived in the Va. Colony from England about 1666. His son Christopher, named it Hewick for the Robinson ancestral home in England.

Hewick, which appears on the National Register of Historic Places for the county of Middlesex in Virginia, was added to the register on 17 Nov 1978. It is northwest of the town of Urbanna at 37°38'26N 76°35'15W. It was named for the British Robinson estate near Cleasby, a village and civil parish in the Harrogate district of North Yorkshire, England, about two miles east of Ripon. Hewick, one of the most significant manors in Virginia, was the home of the Robinson family in Virginia and was constructed by the immigrant Christopher Robinson (1645-1692/3) in 1678. He served the colony in the House of Burgesses (1685-1692; was a member of the Governor's Council 1691 (equivalent to elevation to the House of Lords in England); was secretary of state of the colony (1691-1692); was a member of the board of trustees at the founding of the College of William and Mary (1693); was appointed Councillor and Secretary of Foreign Plantations by King William III of England (1692); and served as senior vestryman and warden of Christ Church Parish, Middlesex County, Virginia. He was one of the best known residents of the colony. His home was the gathering place for many of the important families of Virginia, families who in time helped shape the colony into the commonwealth and state it eventually became. The master of Hewick and the owners of Rosegill, Brandon, and Buckingham, three other important estates along the shores of the Rappahannock River in Middlesex, were considered among the most intellectual men living in Virginia. They were referred to as "Barons of the Rappahannock River."

The son of Christopher I, John Robinson (1683-1749), who was named acting governor of Virginia in 1749 upon the departure of Governor Gooch to England, was born in the house. His son, Christopher Robinson II (1703-1738), upon inheriting the estate, renamed the plantation "Hewick" for the ancestral home in England. His brother was the Honorable John Robinson (1704-1766), Treasurer of Virginia and speaker of the House of Burgesses in Williamsburg for seven sessions (1738-1765). Carter Braxton (1736-1797), a signer of the Declaration of Independence, married Judith Robinson, granddaughter of the original owner, Christopher.

Sir John Beverley Robinson (1791-1863), probably the most distinguished Canadian of the 19th century, was a descendant of Christopher Robinson of Middlesex County, Virginia. He became one of the governors of Upper Canada, and was eventually known as Chief Justice Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart.

Hewick is on the National Register of Historic Places and the Virginia Landmarks Register of Historic Places. The plantation still consists of 66 acres within walking distance of the original 1680 port town of Urbanna. An article can be found in *The William and Mary Quarterly*, Vol. 1, Series 2, page 134, 1921. Christopher Robinson, one of the first trustees of William and Mary College, with his home "Hewick on the Rappahannock" featured in *Colonial Williamsburg*, the journal of the Colonial

Williamsburg Foundation in the Spring, 1995, issue, pp. 34-38. (See "For gods sake refuse not," by Harold B. Gill, Jr. The last page features an aerial photo of Hewick Plantation. The Bishop of Bristol, later the Bishop of London, was the brother of Christopher Robinson of Virginia. His portrait, labeled Rev. John Robinson, D.D., hangs at Fulham Palace in England.

Historical Marker N-45, the marker for Hewick, is located on I-17 in Middlesex County, Virginia, and reads: "Three Miles east of Hewick, built about 1678 by Christopher Robinson, Clerk of Middlesex County, it was the birthplace of John Robinson, Speaker of the House of Burgesses and Treasurer of Virginia, 1738-1766, the leading man of the colony! Hewick has been lived in continuously since 1678 by Robinson descendants until 2005."

### Stringtown

The Stringtown community lies along the watershed that in former days was called the "dividing ridge." Rainfall along the ridge flowed north to Crooked Creek in Grant County or south to Raven's Creek in Harrison County. The families settled along three different paths or roads, a feature that may have suggested the name Stringtown. Today the three roads are listed as the Stringtown-Corinth, the Stringtown-Webber, and Kentucky Highway 36 East - formerly the Old Leesburg Pike. The first settlers, the Thompson and Robinson families, migrated from Virginia. They joined a wagon train for the sake of safety and arrived along the Grant County-Harrison County line about 1818. The new arrivals included Francis and Mary Terrell Robinson, their son-in-law, Thomas Thompson, and his wife, Frances Robinson, several children of each couple, and twenty-five slaves. Also with them was a tiny girl who was discovered early one morning in one of their wagons. After an unsuccessful search for her family, she was brought up as a Thompson. Francis Robinson chose land on the south side of the "dividing ridge" about one-half mile from the Old Leesburg Pike. He built a huge log house for his family and built several cabins for the slaves. The total number of Robinson children was fourteen - three sons and eleven daughters.

For a burial ground the Robinson family used their own front yard for family members and also for slaves. The Robinson Cemetery was not established until forty-four years after the two families settled near the "dividing ridge." The unmarked grave of Francis Robinson lies beneath a clump of bushes in the former Robinson yard on the Stringtown-Webber Road.

In July 1862, Benjamin Robinson and his son William Benjamin marked off a generous plot of land on the west side of the mud road for a family cemetery. A few days later, William Benjamin rode horseback to Cynthiana on business - a distance of approximately twenty miles. On that day Morgan's Raiders invaded Cynthiana; William was hit by a stray bullet and died a few days later, July 17, 1862. Thus, William Benjamin became the first person to occupy a grave in the new cemetery.

The Dunn Cemetery, slightly north of the Robinson Cemetery was established on land donated by Abraham Dunn, who had married Agnes Robinson in 1822 (daughter of Francis Robinson). The plot includes many graves of the Dunn descendants but has often been used by distant relatives and neighbors.

According to oral history, Thomas Thompson purchased two thousand acres of land on the north side of the dividing ridge for twenty-five cents an acre. For his home site, he chose a hollow near a spring at the foot of a hill. A half-mile ridge that branched off from the Leesburg Pike led to the house in the hollow. As each son or daughter married, Mr. Thompson gave the couple a plot of land and a slave and built a cabin in the vicinity of his own house. In time, his dwelling was encircled with the cabins of his children. Until recent years "the original Thompson home site could be recognized by the circle of chimneys that remained standing long after the buildings had collapsed". The five Thompson daughters married into families with the well-known names of Daugherty, Denny, Dunn, Harris, and Ramey. According to family accounts, the Thompson couple had sixty-six grandchildren. Although Mr. Thompson established a cemetery at the north end of the ridge, at least five of his ten children usually clung to the old custom and buried their dead in their own front yards.

A son, Napoleon B. Thompson, established the Thompson and Skinner Cemetery at his home on Denny Road. The first marked burial there was that of his wife, Sarah Elizabeth Barnes Thompson, 1829-1878, a sister to Samuel Barnes of Stringtown and Charles Wesley Barnes of Cartersville, and a granddaughter of Harrison County's Revolutionary veteran John Barnes. She was, according to Barnes genealogists, Ms. Byron and Ms. Pease, born in Danville, Vermillion County, Illinois, where probate records gave Family Bible birth dates. She came to brother Samuel's Stringtown home in 1846 after her parents Oliver and Mary Brown Barnes died. Her 1847 marriage to Napoleon B. Thompson brought them four children, with three of them (Mary, John and Ada) also being buried in this graveyard. This cemetery has thirteen marked burials spanning 88 years (1889-1966), with at least ten unmarked graves.

The name of Thomas (Tommy T. Thompson) has been perpetuated by his countless descendants and until recent years by the annual Thompson-Robinson reunion at Stringtown. Nellie Thompson Hill (now deceased) provided the following story to explain the slight change in Thomas Thompson's name -- When the two families arrived in the area that became Stringtown, a tribe of Indians lived at Cordova. The Indians were friendly and shared their knowledge of medicinal herbs. As a result, the two large families never required a doctor except in times of childbirth. The chief suggested that Mr. Thompson insert an additional "T" in his name to bring good luck and promised that his name would never die. The "T" may have been in honor of the Famous Indian warrior Tecumseh who had been killed in 1813 during the War of 1812. Mr. Thompson accepted the chief's suggestion and from that time until the present he has been called Tommy T. Thompson. Thus far, his name has endured for more than two hundred years from the of his birth October 22, 1787, and his name is always spoken or listed before the name of this father-in-law, Francis Robinson.

In his account of the Thompson-Robinson family, the late Milford Readnowler stressed the number of schoolteachers, doctors, lawyers, and politicians among the descendants. A son James Henry Thompson served Grant County as a judge and as a superintendent of schools - five grandsons became doctors - including Dr. W. H. Daugherty, a prominent citizen of Corinth. A Thompson daughter who married William Denny has ten daughters, all of whom became teachers.

The first Stringtown school was a log building near the junction of Denny Road with the Leesburg Pike. The one-half acre of land was donated by W. H. Morgan and wife. The first trustees were James C. Ruddle, Thomas J. Oder, and William Denny, a grandson of Tommy T. Thompson. When the log school was replaced by a white frame building about 1909-1910, the first teacher was Nannie Mae Stone Lowe, of Cordova and Williamstown, now one hundred and one years ago. In 1926, the school was abandoned. Stringtown children were picked up by a school bus and transported to the new Corinth Consolidated School.

The first recorded business in Stringtown was that of Samuel Barnes who, with his wife Sara Dunn Barnes, kept a tavern at his home "thirteen to fourteen miles southwest of Williamstown" according to tavern licenses issued for 1852 and 1853. After he died in 1856 at age 46, he along with his fifteen year old daughter Malissa became the first marked burials in the Samuel Barnes Cemetery on the east side of the road one-half mile from the Stringtown Church. This cemetery was inventoried in 1989 and contained 35 to 40 unidentified graves plus a 1914 Patterson and a 1924 Dunaway burial. In 1859 Mr. Barnes' widow, guardian of their four underage children, an experienced businesswoman, married Alexander William, a grocer with a liquor license in Cordova.

The best known business in the history of Stringtown was the general store of Newt and Lute Dunn. The small store was a part of their dwelling at the intersection of the Stringtown-Corinth Road and the Old Leesburg Pike. The Dunn's store with no refrigeration carried only non-perishable foods and other household needs. After a few automobiles appeared in the vicinity, the Dunns installed a gas pump operated by a handle; a glass bulb at the top showed the number of gallons; the cost was twenty cents per gallon.

The Stringtown Christian Church was the first and only congregation ever established at Stringtown. Organized July, 1848 by Minister Cyrus H. Williams, the first elders were Perry Wheat, Leonard Barker, T. S. Oder, and James Dunaway. The first deacons were Abraham Dunn (who had married Agnes Robinson), J. M. See, and John Colson. The first building was log; the first person baptized was Elizabeth Robinson.

In 1877, a white frame church was built on land donated by Elizabeth's father, Benjamin Robinson, who seemingly stipulated that the church be called "Elizabeth." The new sanctuary was thirty feet wide and fifty feet long. Short benches were placed on each side with long benches in the middle divided by a partition that ran through the entire center. Inside the door, men and women separated; men always sat to the right of the

dividing partition and women to the left. The custom prevailed until the church was remodeled 76 years later.

During the years before and after 1900, the congregation was fortunate to have a singing master (teacher) named Luke Stone who taught adults, young people, and children how to sing in harmony. His only musical instrument was a pitch pipe, and the tiny song books without notes contained only the words and the key, yet most of the people in the church were able to sing parts. When permission to use a musical instrument other than a tuning fork was granted about 1900, the congregation purchased an organ; at some time later, the Ladies Aid obtained a piano.

On November 21, 1954, the church celebrated its 105th anniversary with a dedication service for the new improvements. Seventeen years after the remodeling, May 1971, the church was struck by lightning and burned to the ground. All improvements and furnishings were completely destroyed. Under the supervision of the church officer, Harold Milner, a new brick church was built with labor donated by members. Furnishings were replaced with help from other churches, and from the Corinth Fire Department. The new church was dedicated in 1972; the building was insured. Approximately one year later, June 27, 1973, the new brick church building was also struck by lightning and destroyed. Using the same plans with a few improvements, Harold Milner built a second church. This time lightning rods were installed. The building was dedicated May 12, 1974.

Records suggest that John and Margaret lived near each other in Augusta County, Va during their youth where they fell in love. Her family moved to Abbeville, SC. 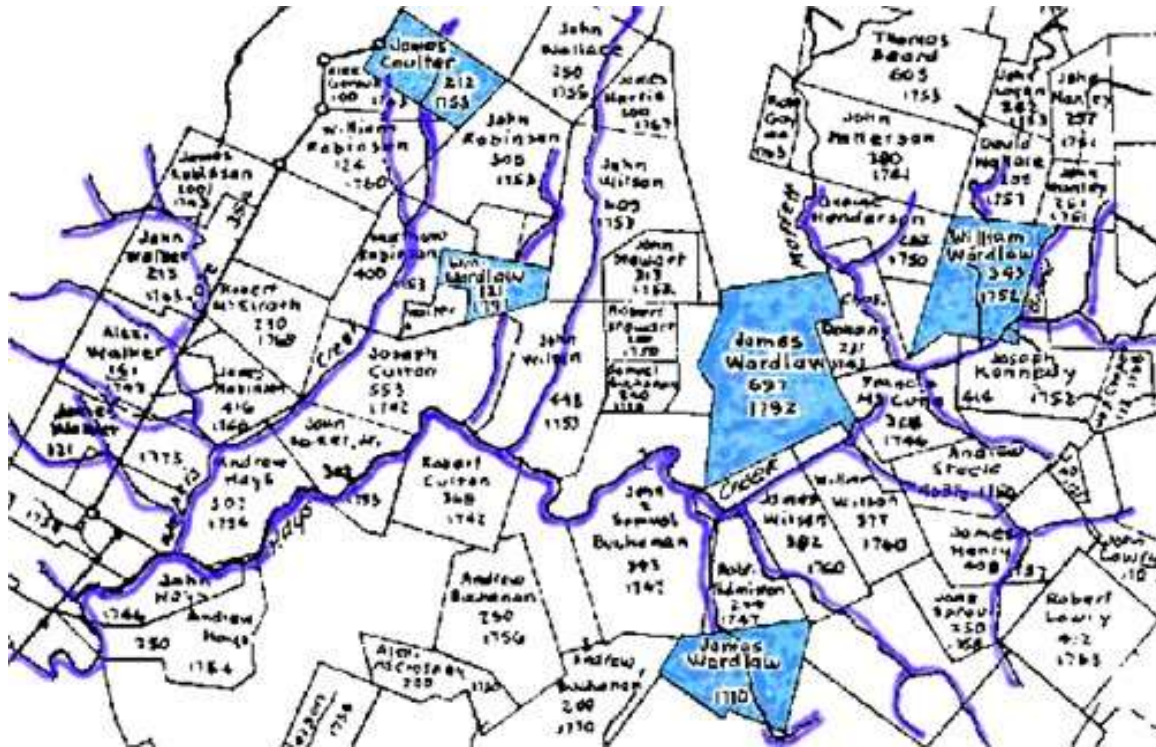

John was a soldier in the Revolutionary War during period of 1779-4Apr1782. He was in Militia Duty in Charleston, SC. He moved to Abbeville, SC in 1767 and settled on Long Cane Creek. A land grant for 100 acres dated Nov1769 is recorded in Volume 21, p306 in the Secretary of State Office in Columbia, SC.

Records indicate that John Wardlaw, Sr served under Col Anderson and General Pickens during the Revolutionary War. According to an application for a veterans Tombstone, John also served under Major General Sumter.

Per DAR application filed in Oklahoma ~1956, John Wardlaw, Sr and his son John Wardlaw, Jr fought under Captain Samuel Mecer in the battle of Musgoves' Mill, August 18, 1780. John, Sr fought as a lieutenant while John, Jr fought as a private. War Department records in Washington, DC show that John Wardlaw, Sr served in the Revolutionary War as a member of Irwin's Company on duty from 4May1781 to 4Apr1782 under Col Anderson which show that he was on horseback for 3 days. Indent No. 107 issued 6Jun1785 to Mr John Wardlaw for 84lbs for militia duty before and since the reduction of Charleston for a horse lost in 1780." Issued 18Aug1785 to Mr John Wardlaw, Sr for military duty and wagon service and account from the Comars.

Per 1790 US Census, John Wardlaw, his wife, and one child lived in Abbeville, SC. At that time, John owned 6 slaves.



### Borden's Grant & Lands Owned by William Wardlaw

Borden's Grant is an area that was settled early in 1700's, situated between Lexington, Virginia and Staunton, Virginia and west of I-81. Brownsburg is a little town in Borden's Grant. Raphine is close by it toward I-81. Just to the left of James Wardlaw 697 acres you will see a little Z mark on the creek. That is where Brownsburg is located. Robert the immigrant's land is not shown on this map, but his land is what Brownsburg was built on. This is a map showing part of Borden's Grant and lands that William (B1) and his sons owned. Also a piece of land owned by James Coulter (Coalter), a relative of the Wardlaws. This is where Robert Wardlaw and his son William first came to America and settled in the 1720's. New Providence Church, where the Wardlaws went is located on the large James Wardlaw land (697 acres), on the far right corner.

*Notes from published book "Descendants of James Johnson, Sr*

*James Johnson, Sr., b. abt 1740 in Chesterfield County, Virginia, or Scotland, d. Nov 05 1784 in Mecklenburg County, Virginia. The birth place of James Johnson, the father of Howell Johnson, Sr., has not been ascertained. He was living in Chestefield Co., Va., in 1762, when his son Howell Johnson was born. In about 1764, he moved to Mecklenburg Co., Va., where he died perhaps some time in Oct. 1784.*

*On June 9, 1770, James Johnson purchased 200 acres in Mecklenburg County, Virginia from Batt Crowder, which states the property started at "Atkinson corner stone". On December 24, 1784, there is recorded in the Mecklenburg County, Virginia Court Records that property was being surveyed for Elizabeth Johnson, widow and relict of James Johnson, deceased.*

*James Johnson wrote his Will May 25, 1779 and it was not probated in Mecklenburg County, Va., Probate Court until November 8, 1784 in which he names three sons, John Johnson, the oldest, Howell Johnson and James Johnson, Jr.; which reads: "beginning*

*on Atkinsons old line.". However, James Johnson's wife is referred to as "Sukey Johnson", therefore, this compiler believes this Elizabeth Johnson is the same person as "Sukey" Johnson as mentioned in the Will of James Johnson.*

*James Johnson's Will also mentions William Johnson, a son of Phil Johnson, of James City Co., Va., but there is not mention of any relationship between Phillip Johnson and James Johnson. However, one can surmise there is some relationship.*

*Although James Johnson's "Will" does not mention any daughters, It is recorded in the Court Records of Meckleburg Co., Va., that James Johnson, Jr., was made guardian on Dec. 13, 1784 of a Nancy Johnson and Polly Johnson, orphans of James Johnson. It is also recorded in Mecklenburg Co., Va., marriage records that On Nov. 27, 1787, that Nancy Johnson married David Drummond (who later also moved to Spartanburg County, SC., and died there) and that she had written consent from James Johnson (her brother and guardian) to marry. Howell Johnson was a witness to this marriage. Although James Johnson Sr., did not take an active part in the military actions during the American Revolutionary War, he did give supplies to the American Forces, which qualifies him as a "Patriot" according to the "Sons of the American Revolution".*

*May 25, 1779, the Will of James Johnson reads: "In the name of God, amen, I James Johnson of the County of Mecklenburg being sick and weak in body but of perfect sound mind and memory do make this my Last Will in manner and form following (that is to say) first I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it and commit my Body to the earth to be buried in a decent manner my estate defraying my funeral charges and what worldly goods God has been pleased to bestow on me. I give and bequeath as follows.... I give and bequeath to my loving wife Suckey Johnson during her natural life the plantation I now live on containing two hundred acres also all my furniture all my stock of cattle except eight head such as she can best spare all my hogs and sheep the gray horse black mare & sorrel filly and wench Dafney my desire is that upon the death of my said wife the furniture stock of cattle sheep hogs and horses above mentioned be sold to the highest bidder and the money arising from such sale be equally divided between all my children. Item I give unto my son John Johnson one hundred and fourteen acres of land where he formerly lived adjoining my Plantation to him and his heirs forever. Item I give and bequest to my son Howell Johnson my stallion colt "Jack of Diamonds" also eight head of cattle as his mother chooses to spare to be delivered him at my death also my wench Dafney at his mother's death to him and his heirs forever. Item, I give unto my son James Johnson, Junior my sorrel horse and saddle called Ball my gun & bayonet also the plantation whereon I now live at his mother's death containing two hundred acres more or less to him and heirs forever. Item I leave my oldest son John Johnson & William Johnson Sr., son of Phil Johnson of James City Exors of this my last Will and Testament. In witness there of I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this twenty fifth day of May in the year of our Lord 1779.*

This Will was proved by the oath of William Johnson witness thereto and at a Court continued and held for the said County the 9th day of November the said Will was futher proved by the oath of Enos Matthews another witness thereto and ordered to be recorded and on the motion of John Johnson one of the exectors therein named hoe made oath thereto and together with William Johnson his security entered into and acknowed their Bond inthe penalty of five hundred pounds conditioned as the Law directs certificate was granted him for obtaining aprobate of the said Will in due form.*

James MAYES was born in 1729. He died on 4 Oct 1818 in Union Co., South Carolina. He was buried in Fair Forest Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Union Co., South Carolina. Tombstone inscription says that James was a member of the Presbyterian Church for 60 years and an Elder for 17 years. James received a land grant in 1767 for land along Fair Forest Creek in Union County, South Carolina. In September James sold all or a portion of that land to John Thomas as follows: Union County Deed Book D pp 42-44 3  
September 1783 James Mayes, Blacksmith, in Ninety Six District, South Carolina to John Thomas Jun'r of same place by grant 24 April 1767 by North Carolina to said James Mayes 200 acres on the north side of Fair Forest Creek on both sides of Harris Creek adjacent to Harris land and George Parks line. Witnessed by James McElwain and others.

James was married to Henrietta SCOTT about 1751 in Pennsylvania. Henrietta SCOTT was born about 1731. She died about 1755. James MAYES and Henrietta SCOTT had the following child: Scott MAYES was born about 1752 in Pennsylvania. Scott died young.

James was married to Jane MCIWAIN (daughter of James MCIWAIN and Jane

STOREY ).Jane MCIWAIN was born in 1756. She died on 25 Jun 1824 in Union Co., South Carolina. She was buried in Fair Forest Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Union Co., South Carolina.

*Excerpt from interview with my great grandfather Daniel Wallace Mayes when he was 92 years old on 7-19-1938 where he talks about his great grandfather James Mayes. Interviewer: Caldwell Sims, Union SC*

*My great grandfather, James Mayes is buried in the old Fair Forest Presbyterian Cemetery. He came from Pennsylvania and settled on the Fair Forest Creek or one of its tributaries, the Mill Creek, but in that old historical community. The place where he lived is near the present Kennedy's Mill. James built a home which is still standing. His house was most probably the first frame house in the Fair Forest community where it still stands. The Holcombe's live in it today, but it has been worked over so many times that it does not look like a house built by pioneers.*

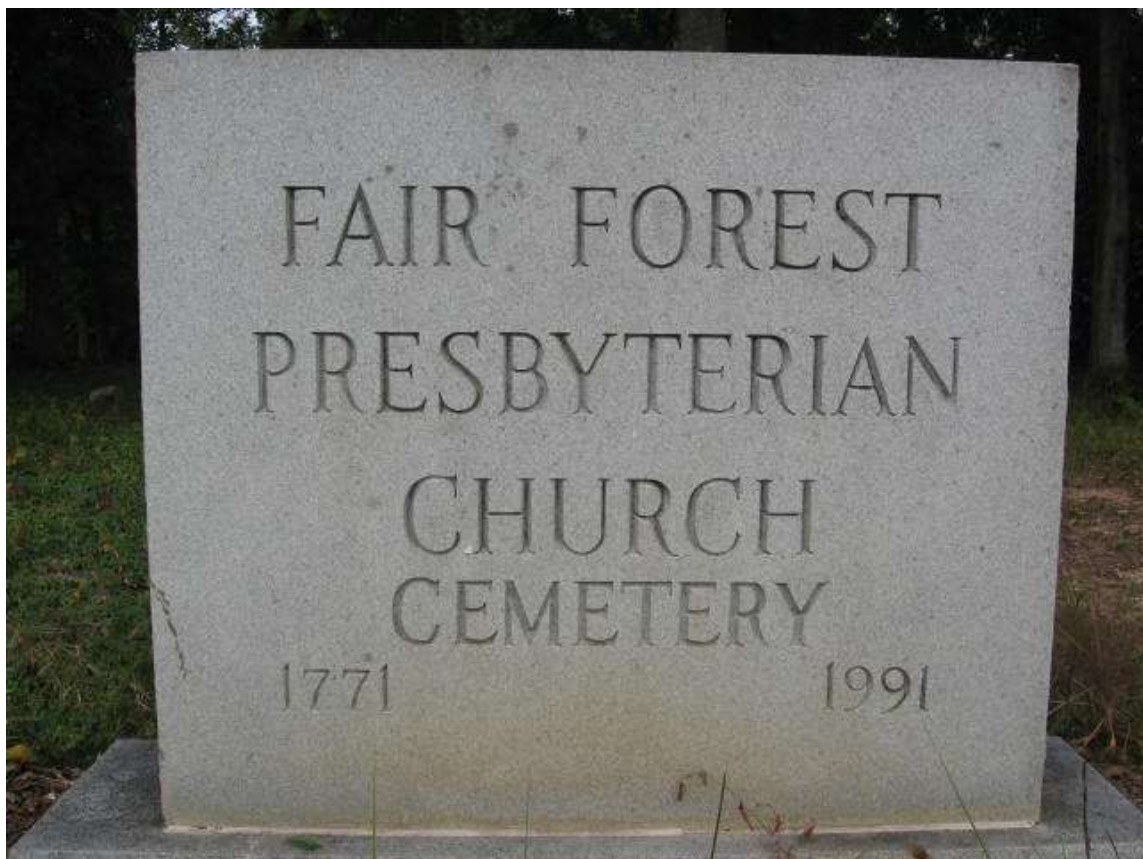
*James Mayes was in the battle of Cowpens. He was too old for regular army service, but when he heard that the American forces were going to make a stand against the British soldiers at Cowpens he decided to go and help the American Hero's out. He got out his old flint and steel gun and some bullets, filled up his powder horn and arrived at Cowpens long before time for the fight. They were glad to have him. He did not get wounded in the battle but came home and went right on with his farm work as if nothing unusual had happened. He was an old man then and he lived to be in his 89<sup>th</sup> year. He was a member of Fair Forest Presbyterian Church for 60 years and an Elder in the church for 47 years.*

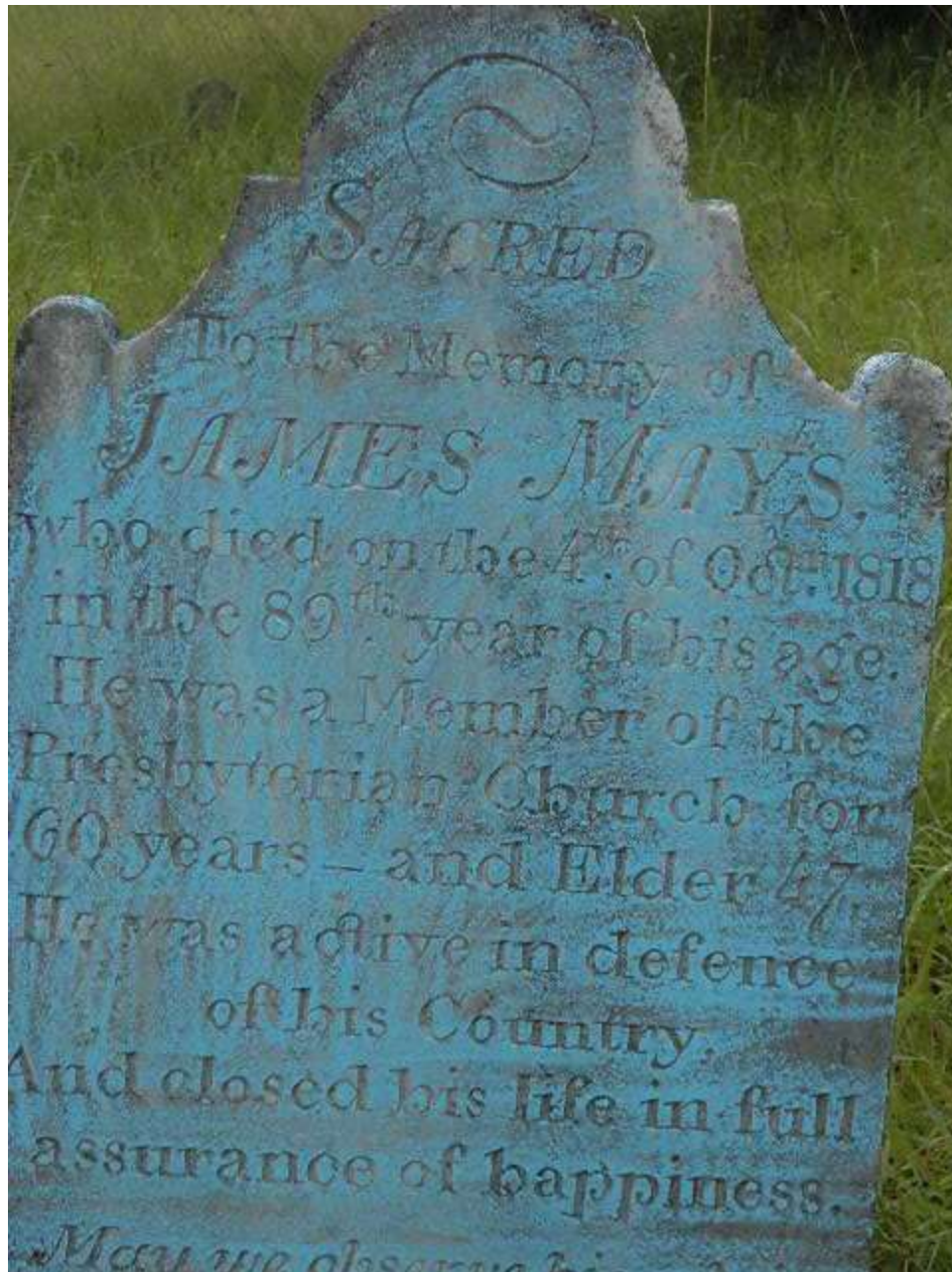


James Mayes (allegedly)

Hugh plus seven of his children immigrated from Ireland via Charleston, SC on 20Dec1772. Three of their children became engaged while still on the ship which brought all of them to America.		Family lore is that Lady Mary Moore's family strongly disapproved of her marrying Hugh Montgomery, Sr. She married him anyway and they had 11 children - before she died in 1765.
Dates make it seem likely that Hugh wed Catherine Sloane in Ireland shortly before his family set sail for Charleston, SC. Family lore indicates there was some sort of scandal - likely because dates indicate his 2nd wife Catherine Sloane was only 12-13 years old when they married in Ireland.		
Hugh Montgomery was a veteran of the War of 1812. As a result, he was awarded two acreages which were commonly known as "bounty lands".		

In 1780, Hugh Montgomery was on a Petit Jury List for the "District of George Town" in SC. This area was called "Parish of Prince Frederick".	
In 1775 Hugh was a member of the Provincial Congress and served on the Committee of Safety.	
In 1776 Hugh was appointed Captain of the Marines and later promoted to Colonel and served until his death on 23Dec1779.

C. Catherine Sloane (1760-31Jul1841) married Lieutenant Devil John Cleveland on 9Jun1781 in Wilkes, NC. The couple then emigrated to Pendleton, Anderson County, South Carolina. Catherine died in Pendleton, Anderson County, SC.

The Rev William Martin was the leader of a group of Scottish-born Protestants which required five ships to transport his congregation from Ireland to America. This migration was obviously in response to religious persecution. One of those immigrant ships was the Lord Dunluce which arrived Charleston, SC on 20Dec1772. The Montgomery family, including Hugh Montgomery, Sr arrived aboard this ship.

This Montgomery family lived in Londonderry, usually called Derry, in the county of Londonderry, Ireland. When these Montgomery brothers and sisters left their home in 1772 to come to America, that part of Ireland was largely settled by Protestants from Scotland.

On a certain ship that left Ireland for America in 1772 were seven Montgomery brothers and sisters, Charles, James, David, Hugh, Margaret, Jane and Nancy.

On this same ship were Benjamin Reynolds and his sister Margaret, and a Bell family, one of which was William Bell Sr. (It is not known, but perhaps the Bell family and Reynolds family were all from Derry and well known to each other.) The ship landed in Charleston, S. C., a British port, as all the United States were at that time in British possession. Three romances grew out of that three months crossing of the Atlantic and three marital unions followed upon reaching America. One such union was between Charles Montgomery, (see 8.17) the oldest of the brothers, and Margaret Reynolds, who fell in love and became engaged during the ocean voyage. Another union was that of Benjamin Reynolds and Nancy Montgomery (or Elizabeth as she was sometime called.). The third union was between Benjamin Bell, Sr. and Margaret Montgomery. These three families intermarried and migrated together from Charleston, S. C. to Fairfield District, S. C. and then to Oktibbeha County, Mississippi.

*Fort Dobbs was an 18th-century fort in the Yadkin–Pee Dee River Basin region of the Province of North Carolina, near what is now Statesville in Iredell County. Used for frontier defense during and after the French and Indian War, the fort was built to protect the British settlers of the western portion of what was then Rowan County, and served as a vital outpost for soldiers, traders, and colonial officials. Fort Dobbs' primary structure was a blockhouse with log walls, surrounded by a palisade and moat. It was intended to provide protection against Cherokee, Catawba, Shawnee, Delaware and French raids into North Carolina. On February 27, 1760, the fort was the site of an engagement between Cherokee warriors and provincial soldiers that ended in a victory for the provincials. After this battle and other attacks by Cherokee warriors on British forts and settlements in the Anglo-Cherokee War, the southern British colonies launched a devastating counterattack against the Cherokee in 1760.*

The name 'Fullerton' appears in Ireland as early as 1602. Those bearing that name in Ayrshire were Covenanters, and as they were subjected to heavy finds there in the time of James II, it is supposed that the progenitors of the American family crossed to Ireland about that time.

Para 11.195 - It is known that a Humphrey Fullerton fought under King William III at the battle of Boyne Water , and was given a sword by the King which was treasured by the family for several generations. This **Humphrey** immigrated to America in 1723 (or 1725) - sailing from Chester, England. He settled in Pequea, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

Para 10.93 - This Humphrey's son also named **Humphrey** (1717-1778) who was six years old at the emigration. Humphrey married a daughter of Daniel Clark - a wealthy London merchant.

Para 9.47 - His son **Humphrey Fullerton** (1748-1795) was born in Pequea, PA and died near Green Castle, PA. He was a surveyor - in that capacity he was an assistant in the survey of the boundary line between Pennsylvania and New York. He was a man of means and of good position. He married **Martha Mitchell**.

***Humphrey Fullerton** served as a Private under Capt. James Young, First Call, 23 October 1777, and in January 1778; under Capt. John Woods in 1780; and in 1782, with Capt. James Poe. Miss Mary L. McFarland, a descendant, stated that Humphrey Fullerton was buried at Brown's Mill Graveyard, Antrim Township, Franklin County, PA. His wife was **Martha Mitchell** of Lancaster County, PA. In his will, he mentions his mother, Ann, who died 14 March 1804. On 18 April 1782, he was appointed a Justice of the Peace for Cumberland County and he continued to serve in the same capacity for Franklin County after its erection in 1784. He was Greencastle's first Justice of the Peace and by 1792, he maintained an office in the town, as stated in the paper on "Early Days of Greencastle" prepared by the late Judge D. Watson Rowe. He died in January 1792. His will, dated 15 December 1791, provides that his widow shall have the sum of 300 pounds, his Negro wench Rachel, a horse, saddle, 2 good cows, 6 sheep, her chest of drawers, a small table, 5 pounds with which to buy chairs and kitchen furniture and that she is to have the benefit of 2 rooms in the east of the house, if she remains his widow. One of the witnesses to the will is Matthew Lind Jr., evidently a son of the Rev. Matthew Lind and his wife, who are buried at Brown's Mill and the latter of whom is described as "among wives, the most dutiful, among mothers the most affectionate, and among friends the kindest and most hospitable". To son **David**, part of my tract adjoining Muddy Run, including my mill, near John Wood's bridge.....to a meadow called Miller's Meadow; along the Great Road....my Negro servant Caesor. To son **Humphrey**, the tract whereon I now lives, 223 acres, also a long strip of my other tract along the Great Road to Adam*

*Hoop's line.....my tract on Sugar Creek, Westmoreland County, PA, and my Negro man Jack. To daughter **Elizabeth**, the tract in my name on the waters of Sugar Creek, adjoining land of Hugh, Henry and James Brown; also my Negro wench, Kate. To son **Thomas**, a tract of land..... William Ballagh (i.e., father of Moses Bellagh) was the first American ancestor of the Bellah lineage. He emigrated from Antrim, Ireland via Charleston, SC in 1692. Moses Bellagh moved his family to Rowan County, NC prior to 1752. It is at that point that the Ballaugh surname was corrupted to 'Bellah'.

Moses moved to Rowan County, Salisbury, North Carolina sometime prior to 1752. He obtained a Crown Grant from Gov. Alexander Martin of North Carolina of 300 acres of land on the waters of the Dutch Buffalo River on 10Oct1783. We do not know why he left his land on St. John's Island to set out at such an early age but he was already married as his first son was born on 2Jan1752.

Four brothers and one sister, Henry, Edward(Neddy), Ephraim, George, and Margaret came to America in about 1748. They came to York County, Pa. from Ireland. The York County records show that George was holding public office in 1749. They were believed to have lived in York County for some time.

Edward was born in 1720 in Northern Ireland. He died in Georgia in 1794. His will was probated February 11, 1795 in Wilks County Georgia. He moved to Mucklenburg County North Carolina from Virginia. Later he moved to Wilks County Georgia. Edward(Neddy) Pharr married Rachel Beard in 1748. she was born in 1730 in Virginia. She died in 1778 in Virginia. She was the daughter of John and Elizabeth Beard of Bedford County Virginia. Rachel and Edward had ten children. They were: Rachel, Margaret, Ephraim, Samuel, Margery, Anne, Edward, Francis, Jonathan and John.

Samuel was born in Virginia, October 30, 1757. He died May 7, 1804 in Abbeville County South Carolina. He served as a Lt. in the calvary in the Revolutionary war from Mucklenburg, North Carolina. Lt. Samuel Pharr married Elizabeth Bailey February 11, 1783. She was born June 9, 1765. She died August 7, 1845 in Guivette County Georgia. They had nine children. They were: Elizabeth, Edward, Thomas, Mary Ann, Thatcher, Joseph Wilson, Margaret, Jane(Janey) and Hezekiah Walt.

They later moved to Dorsey, Mississippi. She married John Sheffield about 1840. John Sheffield served in both the Civil War and the Mexican War. John was born October 30, 1819. He died November 25, 1902. He was the son of Everette and Susannah Sheffield. Sarah Margaret and John had ten children. Isaac Judson Sheffield was born April 18, 1850. He died December 10, 1935. When the war broke out, John Sheffield, his father, enlisted as a confederate soldier. The son, Isaac Judson, was too young to enlist, but served his state by supporting a large family during his father's absence. Isaac married Fannie McBride about 1870. Fannie McBride was born October 22, 1853-died December 16, 1909. She was the daughter of Giles McBride and Mary Norwood McBride. The McBrides' formerly lived in Florence, Alabama but moved to Fulton, Mississippi in 1865. They were of Irish decent. Giles McBride was a Captain in the Confederate Army. Isaac(Pa Jud) and Fannie had eleven children. They were: Robert Sidney, Mary Lillian, Margaret Lula, Albert, Lee Samuel, Carrie, Emma, Nannie, Isaac Lewis, Gilbert, and Eron.

Robert Sidney was born August 16, 1872 and died March 6, 1939. He married Leona Gregory, daughter of Alfred and Laura Lambert Gregory. Sidney was a farmer, teacher, superintendent of county schools and State Representative. Sidney and Leona are buried at Walton Cemetery, Itawamba County Mississippi. They had nine Children, They were: Myrtis, Jeff Aurelia, Stanley, Phillip, Fannie Laura, Agnes, Franklin(Todd), and Mary Sue.
