The Leopard indicates brave and lience fighters.

Colors represent the personal characteristics of the bearer, and are granted only upon merit.

Blue denotes loyalty and truth, piety, and sincerity. Yold denotes generosity and elevation of the mind.

The Hicklin Family of South Carolina as compiled by Ann Carson Hicklin, Arden, N. C. 1968

Hicklin on Hicklin ia an English local surname, taken from a place-name. There is a HI(KLING, a Parish in Northneyham, and Hickling, a parish in Northolk. One of these districts, on what is more likely, both districts, gave nise to the surname Hickling.

In the earlier days, when a man moved to a new locality, he was likely to have the name of his former lacality added to his one and only name. In the day of suname formation, this might be adopted by his children and become a surname in the modern sense. If an Englishman moved to another country, he might be given the name of his native land. Thus English is in Scotland a Scottish surname. (onversely, in England, Scott is an English surname. No man in Scotland would be called Scott, for all men there are Scots.

Without question, this surname had its beginning as Hickling. For some centuries after surnames were adopted in Europe, people never saw their own names in written form. When the rolls were made up, the person or clerk spelled it, as he caught it from the lips of the man who bore it. With the English, spelling was a matter of little consequence untils the reforms of the nineteenth century. We find Medieval rolls with the name of man and wife, standing side by side, yet spelled differently. We find the name of an individual in a single page of a document spelled in several different ways.



It appears that the Hickling form of the name is more frequent in the U.S. than is the Hicklin form. The inssachusetts historical Register has records of three marriages between the Hicklings and the descendants of Governor Bradford. According to the London Directory, the derivative holds its own well with the original form.

Now when the writer treats of personal nomenclature, he considers that

he has finished his part of the task, when he has pointed out the place giving rise to the surname. It remains for the student of geographical names to explain the origin of the place name itself. I do not find an explanation of the parish name Hickling in any work to which I have access. Hoever, I give you my own idea of its origin, for what its worth. It is as follows:

The second element of the name "Ling", means a heath. The plant Ling is the common heather of England and Scotland, and Ling is a very common East Anglican surname. The frequency of the name is due, in large part, to a Ling in Suffolk, a Lyng in Norfolk, and a Lyng in Samerset.

The first element of the name, Hick, is from one of the many nicknames of Richard. This very popular Christian name produced a denies of nicks in D: Dick Dob, Dodge, and a series in H: Hick, Hob, Hodge, as well as the more obvious Rich and Rick. The surnames from these nicks, with their diminutives and variants are legion. Hick produced a softened form, Higg, which finally won over it, so that Hick, Hickson, Hickens, Hickox, etc are outnumbered in our directories by Higgs, Higgson, Higgins, Higginsons, etc.

And so, I think, that the parish name of Hickling means the heath of Hick, the dwelling place of Hick(Richard). One could think of it as meaning the home of the Hicklings, -ling, or -ing being the patronymic suffix of the Anglo-Saxons, and signifying the family and kindred of Hick, or Richard.

The Hicklin Family of South Carolina, as complied by Ann Carson Hicklin Arden, N. C. Jan. 11, 1968.

The first Hicklin to arrive in South Carolina was Arthur Hicklin. Jason Calvin Hicklin, great, great grandson of Arthur I, in his journal, stated that the family came from Tyrone County, Ireland, to Pennsylvania. Their stay in Ireland was of short duration, probably not more than 20 years. Sometime between 1750-1760, they, along with several brothers came to Penn. Again they idid not tarry, but came to the Carolinas with that great migration of other Ulstr-Scots, prior to the Revolution.

The first positive date of Arthur's South Carolina residency is a Land Grant in the S. C. Archives, Columbia, S. C., dated June 18th, 1765.

The Land Grant reads: One hundred and fifty acres, situate in (raven (ounty, (now Lancaster (ounty) on a branch of Rocky (reek, bounded on all sides by vacant land. What a story that tells of the great primeval forests to which he and his family came.

Anthur I died in 1789, and his wife, Jane, died in 1791. They as well as all other members of the family who died there, except George, are buried in the family burying ground, about 3 miles from the Catawba River in Lancaster (o., on land now owned by the Duke Power (o.

To reach this place from Lancaster, go south on the Great Falls road to Mt. Moriah Negro (hurch. Across the road is a cemetery, in one corner of which is the Douglas family plot. Turn right at crossroads, and go 2 or 3 miles. When you cross creek, go up a steep hill. The hill on the left is the place where Arthur Hicklin I lived. The burying ground is on it, and the graves are unmarked. Just beyond is the Jack (askey farm. (Information supplied by Or. Robert Davis).

Jane and Anthur Hicklin had the following children:

(i) William Hicklin, who was probably born in County Tyrone, Ineland, about 1734, and died Oct. 10, 1819. He married Sarah Isbel(1), sister of Lyttleton Isbell, Rev. soldier from Kershaw District, S. (. Sarah Isbel Hicklin died July 29, 1841, at the age of 93 years.

2. George Hicklin, born April 27, 1754, died Nov. 15, 1824. He was a Methodist and a Bible teacher. His Bible is preserved in the descendants of the Cole family. George never married but he reared the two daughters of his brother, Arthur II and wife, Elizabeth Williams Hicklin. George is buried at Camp Creck Methodist (hurchyard. Dates from George's Bible.
