WILLIAM HILL

The earliest known Hill to be in Kentucky was a William Hill.

"LIFE AMONG THE HILLS AND MOUNTAINS" by William R. Thomas mentions a William Hill on page 111: "While Washington was actively engaged in the lower part of the Big Sandy Valley, it has recently been shown that Daniel Boone, the popular hero of Kentucky discovery and settlement, in company with WILLIAM HILL, was hunting and camping on the upper waters of the Big Sandy. Boone, who was in search of the rich land reported to be located in Kentucky, had crossed over the headwaters of the Big sandy, and, somewhat discouraged by the rough nature of the county which he encountered in what is now Pike and Floyd Counties, went into camp at a salt lick located about ten miles west of Prestonburg on Middle Creek. Game was plentiful, and all Boone and his companion, HILL, had to do was to await at their little shack the coming of the deer and buffalo to lick the salt. Their discovery of this salt lick was an inestimable value to Boone and HILL. for with the scant supply of ammunition, which was at their disposal, they were thus able to husband their stores and tide themselves over the hard months of the enforced winter encampment. It is not at all improbable that this salt lick played an important part in the saving of the lives of both of these two hardy woodsmen, and enabled Boone to return to the Yadkin, and later to take part in the well known explorations led by Findlay through Cumberland Gap into the Bluegrass region in 1769."

"DANIEL BOONE FAMILY" by George & Mary Boone mentions a WILLIAM HILL on page 73: "It is thought Squire Boone accompanied his brother Daniel Boone and WILLIAM HILL to Kentucky in the fall of 1767. They crossed the Blue Ridge and Allegheny Mountains, the Holston & Clinch Rivers near their sources, and finally reached the head waters of the West Fork of the Big Sandy. Going on westward from here about 100 miles, they went into what is now Floyd County Kentucky. After spending the winter here in trapping and hunting they returned in the spring to the Yadkin."

2. WILLIAM HILL was witness to marriage on 20th April 1795 in this county of Daniel Burch and Rebekah Hunter, widow. Surety was LEONARD HILL.

Note by Mrs. Summers: The Inventory of the estate of WILLIAM HILL is found in Book 6, Page 254. I do not have a copy of this document.

WILLIAM HILL was administrator of the estate of ELIZABETH HILL (his mother). Produced in Clark County Kentucky Court of February 15th 1825, Pages 497-499.

LEONARD HILL

There is proof that Leonard Hill resided in S.C. until ca. 1788-89 (Camden District, today's Fairfield County). He fought in the American Revolution and served as a Constable in S.C. In 1788, he sold 82 acres of his land to a Thomas Hill, who is believed to be a brother, as was Moses Hill of same District and County of S.C. At the time of the sale, Leonard's wife, Elizabeth Hill also signed the deed. Later when the above Thomas Hill sold the land, his wife Judith signed with him.

LEONARD HILL

Born: (Believed to be ca. 1760-1763)

Died: Ca. after 4 July 1825 in Clark County, Kentucky.(Note: Death may have been in August of 1825).Married: Elizabeth ??? (She signed a deed in 1788 in S.C.).

He does not mention a wife in his 1825 Kentucky will BUT names mother of his children as: Susannah Dunford & Rachel Dunford. For lack of information I have attempted to estimate their births. They are estimated by the following method: For the females, I am allowing their ages to be between 16-18 when married, for the males I allow their ages as 21.

Known children: By Susannah Dunford as stated in Will of Leonard Hill 1/: (Clark Co. Ky. Will Book 6, Page 30, dated 4th July 1825, proved in October Court 1825). Births estimated and based on daughters being between 16-18 years old at time of marriage.

- 1. MARY (POLLY) HILL 2/, b. ca. 1786-1788 (S.C. or KY ??), married 1st James Gibson Sr. on 9th August 1804 in Kentucky. 2nd marriage to Nathan Williford before July 1825 in Kentucky.
- 2. ELIZABETH HILL 2/, b. ca. 1791 (Clark Co, KY.) married John Foster on 27th March 1809.

Known children of Rachel Dunford as stated in Will of Leonard Hill 1/: Birth based on daughter's age 16-18 years and sons being age 21 when married.

- 3. JOHN HILL 2/, b. ca. 1791 (Clark Co., KY.), married Polly Ecton on 6th June 1812, dau. of Smallwood Ecton.
- 4. SARAH HILL 2/, b. ca. 1800-1802 (Clark County, KY.), married Matthew Lillard on 12th September 1818 in Kentucky..
- 5. MOSES HILL 2/, b. ca. 1805 (Clark Co., KY.), married Maria Wilson on 6th January 1826 in Kentucky.

Mary (Polly) Hill 2/ married 1st James Gibson Sr. and from the wording of Leonard Hill's 1/ will, it is appears that Polly is the same person as MARY, who re-married 2nd to Nathan Williford.

The first land transaction I have found in Clark County related to Leonard Hill 1/ reads as follows:

THIS INDENTURE made the 7th day of September in the year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred & Ninety Six (1796)

Between John Holder & Fanny his wife of the county of Clarke and the Commonwealth of Kentucky of the one part and LEONARD HILL of the county aforesaid and Commonwealth aforesaid of the other part WITNESSETH that the said John Holder & Fanny his wife for and in consideration of the sum of One Hundred Pounds current money of Kentucky, to him in hand paid, the receipt whereof---do hereby acknowledge and forever----and discharge the said LEONARD HILL and his heirs, Executors and Administrators, have granted bargained sold aliened and confirm and by these presents do grant bargain sell alein and confirm unto the said LEONARD HILL his heirs and assigns forever all that tract or parcel of land, lying and being in the County of Clarke on the Kentucky River, beginning at MIKOL (MICHAEL?) DUMPORTS (DUNFORD?) upper corner of his four hundred acre survey where the corners on the Kentucky River on a Maple Tree thence North, 100 and 50 poles to John Heronimous' corner of 100 acres to two sugar trees, thence west 160 poles to an Elum in the line of Rebeckay (Rebecca?) Huntur (Hunter) 100 acre survey, thence south 150 poles to the Kentucky River, thence up the meanders of said river 160 poles to the beginning to contain 150 acres more or less, Together with all improvements, water courses, profits & Appurtenances whatsoever to the said premises belonging or in any wise appertaining and the revisions, remainders & profits thereof and all the estate right title interest property claim and demand of them the said John Holder and Fanny his wife, of in and to the same. TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the lands hereby conveyed with all and singular the premises and every part and parcel thereof with every of the appurtenances unto the said LEONARD HILL his heirs and assigns forever to the only proper use and behoof of his, the said LEONARD HILL his heirs and assigns forever, And the said John Holder and Fanny his wife for themselves their heirs Executors and Administrators do covenant promise and agree to and with the said LEONARD HILL his heirs and assigns by these presents that the premises before mentioned now are and forever here after shall remain free of and from all former and other gifts, grants, bargains, sales, dower rights and title of dower, judgements, executions, title troubles, charges & incumbencies what so ever done or suffered to be done by them the said John Holder and Fanny his wife and the said John Holder & Fanny his wife and their heirs all and singular the premises hereby bargained and sold with the appurtenances unto the said LEONARD HILL his heirs and every other person or persons whatsoever And we the said John Holder & Fanny his wife doth and will warrant and forever defend by these presents IN WITNESS whereof them the said John Holder & Fanny his wife have HEREUNTO set their hands and seals the day and year first above written (7 September 1795). (Signed) John Holder (Seal)

Notes by Mrs. Summers: Polly Hill married 1st James Gibson and from the wording of Leonard Hill's will it is assumed that Polly is the same person as Mary, who married 2nd time to Nathan Williford. Both Polly (Mary) 2/ and John Hill 2/ were children of Leonard Hill.

It is believed (by some) that Leonard Hill, John Hill & William Hill, early settlers of Clark County, Kentucky are related. (Speculative).

Clark County Kentucky: Dumford (Dunford), Rachel and Jesse Hodges married on 27th April 1826; surety MOSES HILL 2/.

1850 CENSUS (CLARK COUNTY) Page 8, Dwelling # 108 shows: RACHEL ROGERS (HOGES?) 75 years old, born NC and is living with the George W. Hill (son of Moses) Family. This indicates that Rachel was living with a grandson (son of her son Moses) at this time. (This indicates Rachel Dunford was born ca. 1775).

Despite the fact that Leonard Hill 1/ named Susannah & Rachel Dunsford as mother of his children, he did not, at any time, refer to either of them as his wives.

Leonard Hill 1/ first appears on the 1790 tax list for Kentucky.

JOHN HILL 2/ SON OF (LEONARD HILL) 1/

Born (ca.1791)?? Died ca. 1845-46. He is mentioned as deceased at time of daughters marriages. Married: Polly Ecton in Clark County Kentucky on 6th June of 1812.

She was daughter of Smallwood Ecton (B. 14 Sept. 1755-d. 25 March 1844) and wife Mary (b. 1 May 1760-d. 2 Oct. 1819). Both parents are buried in Ecton Graveyard, Clark County, Kentucky.

Polly Ecton appears to have been dead before 1846 when the Estate of grandfather Smallwood Ecton was distributed among the grandchildren. Polly was not mentioned.

2 2 Known children of JOHN HILL & POLLY ECTON. JOHN HILL WAS SON OF LEONARD HILL 1/. POLLY ECTON WAS THE DAUGHTER OF SMALLWOOD ECTON.

All of these were grandchildren of Leonard Hill 1/ & Rachel Dunford, and children of John Hill & wife Mary (Polly) Ecton, the daughter of Smallwood Ecton.

- 1. Polly Hill 3/ married George W. Parido on 12 January 1841. Consent given by her father John Hill. Witness was Moses Hill.
- Rachel Hill 3/ married Richard Litrell on 20 August 1845. Consent given by her father John Hill. Witness was Leonard Hill; surety, Granderson Hill. Henry Gibson, guardian of Rachel Hill sanctions the certificate of consent. She is believed to be dead by March 31st, 1849 when her husband signed for a portion of her grandfather's estate and her name was not mentioned. (See No. 4 below).
- Beth Ann Hill 3/ married Thomas Green Jr. on 12 August 1846. Daughter of John Hill Deceased. Surety George W. Hill. Witness Leonard Hill. Consent of Henry Gibson, guardian of Beth Ann Hill.
- 4. Thomas Hill 3/ married Portian Comb on 10th March 1847. Consent given by her mother, Sally Blackwell.
- 5. Moses R. Hill 3/.

All marriages were in Clark County, Kentucky.

NOTE: The relationship of the guardian Henry Gibson to these children is not known for sure but their aunt, who was also

named MARY (POLLY) HILL, was the daughter of Leonard Hill & Susannah Dunford (ref. Leonard Hill's will).

Their father (JOHN HILL) was a son of Leonard Hill & Rachel Dunford. The aunt Mary Hill (daughter of Leonard & Susannah Dunford) was married first to a James Gibson on 9th August 1804 and 2nd time to Nathan Williford before July of 1825. I suspect he (the guardian Henry Gibson) was a son of James Gibson and Mary Hill (dau. of Leonard). This would indicate that Henry Gibson was a cousin to the children of John Hill & Polly Ecton, due to the fact that he was probably a son of their aunt Mary (Polly) Hill who was married 1st to James Gibson Sr. This has not been proven.

Based on evidence found in South Carolina and ALL other evidence found in Kentucky, it is strongly indicated that all of the children named in Leonard Hill's will by BOTH SUSANNAH & RACHEL DUNFORD were born out of wed-lock. These two women are suspected to have been sisters, and may have been the daughters of Michael Dunford. 1850 Census shows Rachel born ca. 1765 in N.C. I believe Susannah Dunsford was born earlier (ca. 1762-63).

Thus it appears that this is the Henry Gibson that was the guardian to the above Beth Ann Hill 3/, and who gave his consent for her to marry. As I understand it he would be her cousin).

INDENTURE BETWEEN JOHN HILL 2/ & MOSES HILL 2/.

INDENTURE, MADISON COUNTY, KENTUCKY This Indenture made and entered into this 7th June 1828 between JOHN HILL of Madison County and State of Kentucky of one part and MOSES HILL of Clarke County Kentucky of the other part, WITNESSETH that JOHN HILL doth for and in consideration of five thousand dollars in hand paid, grant bargain and sell unto said MOSES HILL the following property, to wit: Two Hundred and Sixteen Acres of land lying in Madison County on the Kentucky River about three miles below Boonsborough, it being the same on which he the said JOHN HILL now lives, also five slaves, namely Nat, Anny, Betsey, Will and Cloe, all now in the possession of said JOHN HILL, four head of horses, one cart and a voke of oxen, four beds, bedsteads and furniture and fifty head of hogs. TO HAVE AND TO HOLD unto said MOSES HILL said property to him and his heirs forever. Corner to said preemption thence running South ninety seven and six tenths poles to a walnut and small Hickory, thence east one hundred and sixty four poles to an IronWood thence North ninety seven and six tenths poles to the beginning. Together with all and singular the houses buildings and water courses profits Commodities Hereditaments & appurtenances WHAT SO EVER to the same belonging or in anywise appertaining unto the only proper use and behoof of him the said JOHN HILL his heirs and assigns forever and further the said James Martin and Sarah his wife doth convenant grant and agree with the said JOHN HILL that they have good right and Lawfull authority to sell and convey the said land free from all incumbencies WHATSOEVER and that they will warrant and in fee simple make a general warrantee and forever defend the said land and premises before mentioned and sold against all and every claim that shall ever arise by from or under him her or either of them, their heirs or either of their or any other claim that ever shall arise in opposition to the peaceable possession of him the said JOHN HILL his heirs, executors and administrators of in and to the said land and premises before mentioned and sold. I JOHN HILL of Clarke County and State of Kentucky being in a low state of health but perfectly sound in mind do declare the following distribution to be my last will and testament (to wit)

First I direct that my just debts be paid out of my estate by my executors.

Secondly, I will and bequeath to my wife Elizabeth Hill all my estate both real and personal save what I dispose of otherwise in this will, during her natural life or widowhood and in case of either of these it is to revert back to my children in the manner which in this will will be here after described.

Thirdly, my will is that my son JOHN HILL is to have no more than what I have already given him until my wife's death or marriage. Also my son in law Richard Empson and my son in law Nathan Martin are to have no more than what they have already got until my wife's death or marriage.

Fourthly, I will and bequeath to my son in law Josiah Ashley one Sorrel mare that came of my old riding mare, a new woman's saddle and bridle, one bed and furniture and such other little necessaries as make him equal to that which I give my other daughters when they went to house keeping.

Fifthly, I will and bequeath to my son WILLIAM HILL my Thunderbolt mare also a saddle and bridle, my watch, my gun and ammunition.

Sixthly, I will and bequeath to my daughter LUCY one last springs horse, Cow, a new saddle and bridle, one bed and furniture and such other things as will make her equal to her sisters when they were set to house keeping.

Seventhly, my will is that my wife have all the residue of my estate during her natural life or widowhood (as above mentioned) and when either of these takes place the the whole to return cash to my children in the following order (to wit.) my son GARLAND HILL is to have Six Shillings and the balance is to be equally divided between my other six children before mentioned and Lastly I do hereby ordain and appoint my wife ELIZABETH HILL and my son JOHN HILL to my just and lawful executors...IN WITNESS whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 21st day of August and in the year of our lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Four (1804).
