The Woodward Family Cemetery is located on Highway 34 between Ridgeway and Winnsboro -- near the Mack Truck Company intersection. The cemetery is surrounded by a stone fence.

The cemetery was maintained by the Buchanan Family but Mrs. Buchanan died and it is not known who is currently in charge of taking care of the cemetery.

Per Mrs. Hagle:

(1) The individual(s) in charge of the Woodward Cemetery would have to provide a letter authorizing the placement of a NSDAR marker on Thomas Woodward's grave (she will send me a form).

(2) We would have to prove Thomas Woodward was buried there.

(3) If Thomas Woodward is not actually buried in the Woodward Family Cemetery, our plaque would have to read that we are honoring Thomas Woodward but his actual grave site is unknown.

(4) It is perfectly proper for two Chapters to mark a grave -- e.g., Freedom Hill Chapter could provide the marker and the Thomas Woodward Chapter make the other arrangements (guests, reception, etc) -- both Chapters could be included on the marker.

Mrs. Hagle also said that the Department of Veteran Affairs can supply a grave marker for unmarked graves (e. g., people lost at sea, on the battlefield, unknown places). She said there is a law stating this although the Director of the Department of Veteran Affairs does not promote it, and while

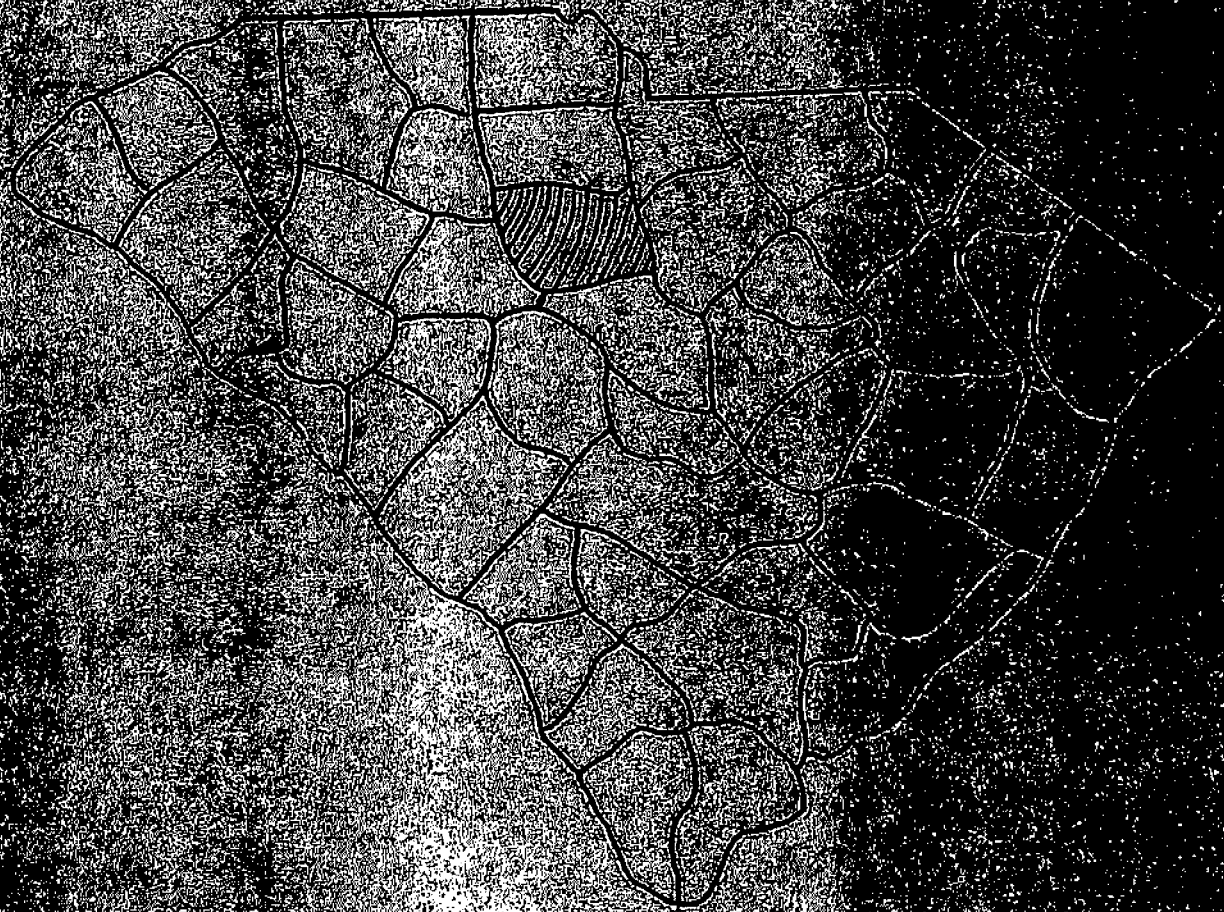

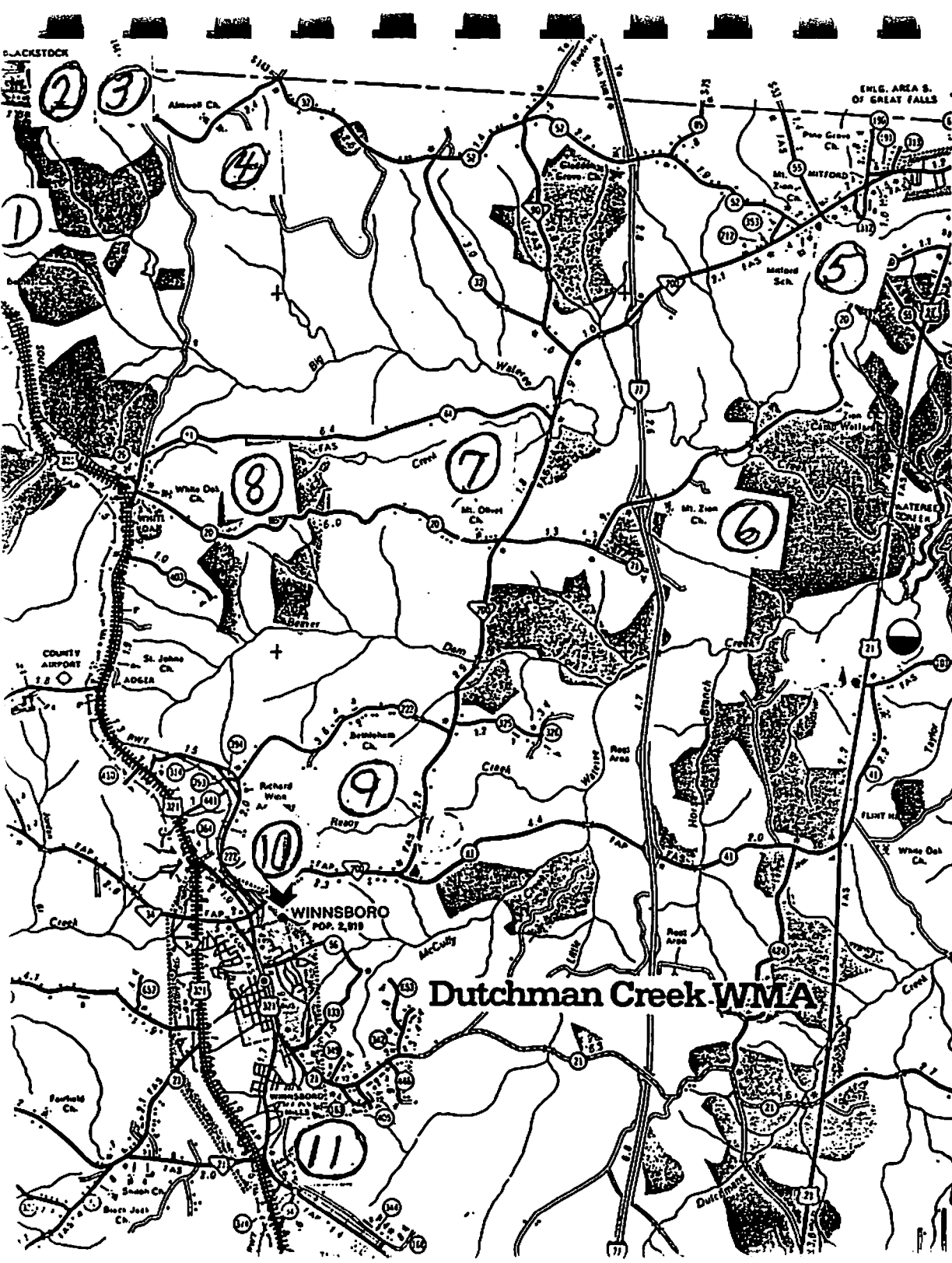

Thomas Woodward's first American ancestor was Abraham Woodward, who came to Virginia with Lord Calvert, Baron of Baltimore, about 1634.

Thomas Woodward was born in Fairfax County, Virginia 1727 or 1729, and he and his wife, Jemima Collins, arrived in Camden District in what is now Fairfield County, South Carolina in 1748 later taking out large land grants.

Sturdy in body, given to study in a number of fields, with keen interest in military tactics he promptly joined the ranks of the military group of 1000 prominent planters called "The Regulators"- which was first organized and activated in the years of 1760-61. These men started small local courts to bring to trial and punishment the excessive number and scattered horse thieves and robbers in the "up-country", these criminals often escaping their captors enroute to the one colony courts in Charleston.

Among the names of the Regulators found as of November, 1767 are Thomas Woodward, Moses Kirkland, Barnaby Pope, Thomas McGraw, Sr. of Camden District, South Carolina. Governor Bull of Carolina Colony seeing the efficiency of the Regular Activities started the circuit courts in Carolina, 1768. This was the beginning of the judicial system in South Carolina.

Thomas Woodward organized and equipped one of the first military companies in South Carolina for the Revolution, he being Captain of the company called, "Woodward's Horse Rangers". He was in a number of battles and fought valiantly, and on May 12, 1779 while rooting out a vicious nest of British and Tories near Ridgeway he was fatally wounded and died on Jackson Creek and secretly buried.

There is a granite marker to him in the old Woodward grave yard near the site of his former home at Rockton, near Winnsboro.

Woodward was active when called to survey the contraversial state line between the two Carolinas. His survey was accepted by the government.

He was a member of the Provincial Congress 1775- also he had numbers of honors in his late life.

Many descendants of Thomas Woodward are in Fairfield County, South Carolina, and in the state of Louisiana. These are men of prominence in the professions.

He was in the battle of Eantaw Springs - had come to Fairfield (his home County) to get a herd of cattle to drive from to Charleston, which was badly in need of meat at the time - had cows over at the Dutchman Creek. There they were being corralled to take to C. when it was discovered the British were stealing and driving them to their camps. Thomas Woodward & his men went to the rescue of the cows, when he was killed - where he was buried is not known - Ethel Buchanan

The Life Of The First William M. Woodward; Doctor,
Minister, and Congressman, by Wm W. Dixon

There hangs on the brick wall of the old Woodward Baptist Church in Chester County a marble tablet bearing this inscription:

Sacred
To The Memory of
Elder William Woodward
Who departed this life in the year of
our Lord, 1820, on the 23rd day of
July; Aged 57 years, 9 months and
18 days.

This tablet
is erected to his memory by this
church, which he planted by his in-
strumentality through the indulgence
of a kind Providence, A. D. 1789.
He was also the means of planting
some and building up many of the
Neighboring Baptist Churches,"

The subject of this sketch is the second son of Thomas Woodward, the Regulator by his first wife, Jemima Collins. When his father, Thomas Woodward, was killed by Indians and toried out here on Dutchman's creek on the 12th day of May, 1779, though second in command, he was only seventeen and relinquished his claims to his father's stepson, Ben May, a one-eighth Indian of great courage and ability, who was captain thereafter. He fought in the Revolutionary war and mentioned for gallantry in the reports of the battle of Eutaw Springs. He served as a Colonel of a regiment in the War of 1812. We find in the U. S. Census for 1790 that he was a large land and slave owner. He became a member of Congress from this District after the Revolution, studied medicine, became a doctor and also an ordained Baptist Minister, and his services were none the less appreciated when he would accept nothing for preaching.

It is worth noting that this man of such versatile parts and piety married a French woman, Elizabeth Barette, an emigrant or refugee from France to the Island St. Martinique. She was well read in French philosophy. (Rosseau, Voltaire and Victor Hugo) and it affected her to this extent that she never joined any church, though her husband was a preacher. Otherwise, she must have been a wonderful woman, because she attended entirely to the plantation operations and the large number of slaves while her husband practiced medicine, attended to his Congressional duties and preached on Sundays. I once could enumerate her children, but recollection now fails, except as to her son Joseph, who succeeded his father in Congress, her son John whom Calhoun thought the brightest man in private life he ever knew; a daughter Nancy, a daughter Mary and a daughter Ellen. The daughters naturally took the religion of their father and for some reason the sons took the skepticism of their mother, and I don't think there has been a male of the name of Woodward of this union who has ever been connected with any church, unless it be the descendants of Congressman Joseph Woodward of Alabama.

to her son William left in Ireland.
(Rachel was the mother of Capt. John, Lt.
Robert, William and Creighton; dau. Mary)
"Mr William Buchanan near Ballymena
: : Much but for want of your presence
in this country but as you feel disposed
to spend your day in your native country
I must endeavor to set myself down easy
upon the subject. A short space of time
will finish my course here and I shall go
to my long home. My blessing you have
pray for yourself and me that we may all
be happy in the world to come. I will
remain at your brother Creighton's. His son
John is now is grown to be a fine boy and
about one month ago was inoculated for the
small pox and is now finally recovered. Your
sister Mary is also well. Your brother John
and family but much amacuated in
consequence of his fatigue in the late war. I
received your letter by John Gray. Am sorry
to hear of the loss of your daughter but
hope she is happier than with you. Your
brother says he will not write to you as he
has written you many long letters and has

no reply. Our last account from Ireland
and England is rather alarming. We
wish that you may not be too premature
stop your proceeding untill by the 3rd
is underground and then.

Your friends here all join in their kind
wishes for you. My blessing and best
respects to my daughter Nancy (your wife)
Remember the one thing needful.

W^m Buchanan was Rachel's son. His wife
was Nancy Ray Buchanan. When her husband

fought in the War of 1812 and who married
Harriet Yongue the daughter of Parson
Samuel Whorter Yongue. They lived
in Fairfax District, S.C. in

1856 Old Fortune

Printed in the Times & Herald by G. H. McMaster)
Dr. Meres Moore of Spartanburg many years ago wrote for the Yorkville Enquirer the following incident of Lafayette's visit to Columbia in 1824. A body guard had been placed before the door of Lafayette's quarters with instruction to let no one enter without permission. An old African neatly dressed came to the door and started in, but the sentinals interposed their bayonets to bar his entrance. The old man contemptuously pushed them aside saying "Pshaw, see guns 'fore you was born, 'been where they been shot by soldiers too" and without further opposition gained his way. He went straight to the room where the distinguished guest was standing in a crowd and cried out "I come to see General Lafayette". Lafayette turned and looked on him and remarked "An old acquaintance don't tell me who he is". The negro advanced and bowing held out his hand and said "Howdy Mass Lafayette how you do, sir. You remember me." "Yes stop don't tell me your name. Ah, I have it. Fortune belonging to Captain Buchanan's. The first servant who waited on me

when I came to America. When I first landed at Georgetown I was taken first to the camp of Captain Buchanan near there and Fortune waited on me" he said as he shook warmly the old man's hand. The nobleman called for a glass of champagne for Fortune which that worthy took with great dignity. Then he extended his hand and said "God bless Mass Lafayette we are getting old; we will never meet again. God bless you". They shook hands again. Fortune went out mounted his pony and started for his home at Wynnabers saying that he had come to see General Lafayette now he'd done that he was going home.

When I was a small boy I remember old Fortune. He was taken care of by General John Buchanan and had nothing to do except work a little for himself. He had a rice patch on the land now owned by the town and hence the favourite place for military barbecues and picnics.

This is a letter written by Capt. John Buchanan of Little River, Fairfield Co., S.C. to his brother William Buchanan his brother and husband of Nancy Ray Buchanan written May 23, 1790 who were living at Ballymuna, County Antrim, Ireland. Their mother was Rachel who came over with (Creighton's family)

Dear Brother:

Yours of last fall I read in which you mentioned your having disposed of your property to come to this country (but was sorry to read what followed) that you had changed your mind or some other case either had taken place, that you declined coming. However, I think it would have been much in your favor not to take that premature step until you had been fully determined to prosecute the matter to effect which I must confess would give me infinite pleasure provided you and my sister could reconcile the business fully yourselves in the first place because I should be extremely glad to see you and her; and in the next place as I know this country will suit you (or any other person who are obliged to work for a living) much better than where you are. And I must

now be allowed to be something of a judge as I am pretty well acquainted with both thro' this state and indeed the principal part of the continent of America are rather disagreeably situated at present owing entirely to the scarcity of cash, which has been in some measure a grievance ever since the late war and appears every year to be getting worse and which indeed is not hard to account for in that most of the time ^{the British} had possession of Charleston very large quantities of goods. Some were imported from England and consequently upon bad terms or risque of the sea was much greater then, in consequence of war than in peaceable times.

The British evacuating the garrison left their goods and their garrison there who immediately petitioned for and became subjects to the United States. The consequence then was that they must sell off their goods upon the best terms they could.

The distressed citizens of the state being at the conclusion of the war was left almost entirely divested of every necessity of life - led to their market

and being urged to purchase whatever they chose a credit of two, three, or four years provided the price was all O. K. then which was generally one hundred per cent higher than they were ever known to sell before, the consequence was the citizens indiscriminately went into debt to very considerable amounts - the principal part the necessity and some from speculative motives, until the goods were all purchased up and consumed in the lapse of a little time.

The seasons since that period have been much against the planter and what they were able to make was sold so low that upon a calculation there is not more than one sixth part of their debts yet discharged.

After draining almost every farthing of cash of the state which we formerly had in circulation creditors being kept so long out of their debt have become mercenary and now are seeing indiscriminately and neither cash nor produce to pay them are executing and selling the debtors, land, houses

then intrinsic value.

In this situation our domestic representatives at present for want of a medium among us * * * * * to represent prosperity.

However, our new Congress is now sitting in New York and who are about consolidating the debts of the union at large and it is generally thought will fall upon some mode of bringing some of money into circulation equal to the necessity of inhabitation.

A general convention of the people of the state by their delegates is now sitting in Columbia near Fardie's Ferry on the Congaree River (about 50 miles from this place) in order to frame a new constitution or bill of rights of the people of this state. By virtue of an act of the General Assembly held in Charleston in 1778 (?) there is a magnificent house built at that place and town established by the name of Columbia where our seats of government by the convention now sitting is to be permanently fixed which will give spirits and popularity

to this part of the state. I have given you a small sketch of the public transaction of our country and state now turn my thoughts a moment on private matters which with regard to myself and the rest of your relatives are much the same in situation as when I wrote you last. Your mother seems to be enjoying a fairly good state of health; - your sister and family are all well and appear to be doing as well as their friends could reasonably wish to expect them; your brother Brighton is well. In short your relatives here are well so far as is known to me.

My wife begs to present her best respects to you and her sister though unacquainted. I dare say you think it high time for me to quit writing having spun my letter out to a considerable length and subscribe myself,

Capt Thos. Woodward, 1730-1779, - our first South
Carolina ancestor. His grandfather, William Woodward,
settled in Maryland about 1640. He was a
nephew of George Calvert, as you know the Calverts
were the "Lord Baltimore's"; that is to say, they
were entitled to this title. Our family arms indicate
our relationship with the Calverts, and Woodwards
were then and still are members of the nobility in
England.

I have met many Woodwards in Alabama. Some
descend from Col. John J. Woodward, some from
Hon. Joseph A. Woodward, member of Congress
and son of Hon. William Woodward, your great-
great grandfather, shown on the chart I have
prepared. Others, the rich ones in Birmingham,
who own the Woodward Iron Co., are descended from
the northern branch of our family. Incidentally,
Senator Foster Hill of Alabama descends from
our branch of the family through Hon. Joseph
A. Woodward. I have visited Joseph's Woodward's
old home which still stands in Fala deega, Ala.
It contains our family portraits, some swords
of revolutionary officers, etc. Joseph Woodward
is ancestor of Ridgeway Timmers. He retired from
Congress in 1843, and moved from Warrabord to
Alabama in that year.

Note: Capt Thos. Woodward had only two sons by J. Collins. They were, John, his older son, and William his younger son, our direct ~~ancestor~~ ^{ancestor}. Apparently many ~~Woodwards~~ ^{Woodwards} descend from his marriage with Widow ~~Collins~~ ^{Collins}, but they are not known to me except for Gen. Thos. Woodward mentioned below.

Note: Capt Thos. Woodward was killed at battle of Dutchman's Creek in Revolutionary War. He had an older son, John Woodward, whose descendants included Major Thos. Woodward of Winstons; Col John J. Woodward, Commanding officer of the 10th Alabama Regt, Civil War. He was killed in action in 1862. It should be remembered that Capt. Thos. Woodward had a number of children by a second marriage with a widow, named May. One of these descendants was General Thos. Simpson Woodward of Alabama, Soldier and Author.

Hon. William Woodward, M.C., was a Colonel in War of 1812, a member of Congress, a medical doctor, and friend of Thos. Jefferson. You may see his name in "Papers of Thos. Jefferson". He founded many Baptist churches.

Capt Thos. Woodward, 1730-1779, is our first South Carolina ancestor. His grandfather, William Woodward, settled in Maryland about ~~16~~ 1640. He was a nephew of George Calvert, so you know the Calverts were the "Lord Baltimore's"; that is to say, they were entitled to this title. Our family arms indicate our relationship with the Calverts, and Woodwards were then and still are members of the nobility in England.

I have met many Woodwards in Alabama. Some descend from Col. John J. Woodward, some from Hon. Joseph A. Woodward, member of Congress and son of Hon. William Woodward, your great-great grandfather, shown on the chart I have prepared. Others, the rich ones in Birmingham, who own the Woodward Iron Co., are descended from the northern branch of our family. Incidentally, Senator Luta Hill of Alabama descends from our branch of the family through Hon. Joseph A. Woodward. I have visited Joseph's Woodward's old home which still stands in Talladega, Ala. It contains our family portraits, some swords of revolutionary officers, etc. Joseph Woodward is ancestor of Ridgeway Palmer. He retired from Congress in 1843, and moved from Warrasboro to Alabama in that year.

MAJOR THOMAS WILLIAM WOODWARD OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY

(Brave soldier in the War Between the States, hero in Reconstruction days and man prominent in the rehabilitation of South Carolina.)

Born May 7, 1833, at his father's plantation near Winnsboro, the son of William Thomas Woodward and Esther Smart. Attended Kings Mountain Military Academy, Hillsboro Military Academy, Mt. Zion College, Wake Forest College and South Carolina College, where he took part in the "steward's hall rebellion and was expelled in 1851 in his junior year. Planter, owned "Rock City" granite quarries south of Winnsboro; married first Miss Cornelia Dantzler of Orangeburg in 1854; second, Miss Rebecca Valentine Lyles in 1878. He read law but never practiced. During Confederate War he was Major of 6th Regiment, South Carolina Infantry. Wounded at Dranesville, re-listed as private and made quartermaster of 20th Volunteer Regiment in June 1862 and served throughout war. Mason, Taxpayers' Conventions of 1871 and 1874. Chairman of county Democratic executive committee in 1870. S. C. House of Representatives, Fairfield, 1860-62, Senator from Fairfield 1884-1892. Delegate to State Democratic Conventions of 1876, 1902. Master of Winnsboro Grange. Survivors Association S. C.V. 6th Regiment, President. Rode abreast horseback with General Wade Hampton down Columbia's Main Street in the Red Shirt Parade. A man of fearless courage and strongest convictions for right. He was a hero in Fairfield County. Died at his home at Rockton, September 4, 1902; buried in Episcopal Cemetery at Winnsboro. Portrait in Senate Chamber, Columbia.
