JAMES MORGAN bought heavily also at the sale...However he did not buy as much as  
was the share of his wife JANE WOODWARD MORGAN and the share paid to James Morgan  
was not equal to the shares of the others.

JANE WOODWARD wife of JAMES MORGAN can be documented as the daughter...In some way  
she shows along with her sister NANCY in this file (Error apparently by recording  
clerk) as NANCY MORGAN sister of NANCY WOODWARD...Other data shows her as JANE...Jenne

A REPLY TO EACH ONE OF YOU... None of you seem to know just what I intended to type in #155... The old Woodward Cemetery is not in Newberry County at all... You leave Winneboro over the Newberry Road... travel out that road for 7 miles to the Lebanon Presbyterian Church (In Fairfield Co.) and here you turn northwest toward Chester Co nty line and over a hard surface road and travel this road a few miles to a farm house where you turn into a dirt road and travel a couple of miles to a negro house (All in FAIRFIELD CO) and inquire for the old cemetery.... This cemetery may be the KEY but it may prove to be of no value... See #121-c and others of this family where money was spent for tombstones... IF THIS old cemetery is where those tombstones were erected, then this is your family grave yard..... I have no car to travel there and a taxi-cab is too expensive and then perhaps not find it to be your family after all.

*Do you know if Richard is in this cemetery? we could not find the cemetery we were there.*

S. C. Senate, Spartanburg, 1886-88. Member of State Agricultural Society. Officer in State Grange, master of County Grange. Member of Knights of Honor. First known advocate in county for terracing lands. Removed to Hendersonville, N. C., in 1894. Encouraged improvements in agriculture in North Carolina. An organizer of first Board of Trade in Hendersonville; president several terms. Member of Methodist Church. Died in Hendersonville June 7, 1919; buried in Hendersonville.

**WOOD, Henry Machen**, Senator from Greenville District.—Son of \_\_\_\_\_ Wood and Mary Machen of Virginia. Planter, of Greenville District. In Revolutionary War, captain of horse; served 432 days in 1780-81. Justice of peace, Spartan, 1785; Greenville, 1794. County court judge. Commissioner to locate Greenville court house, 1793. S. C. Senate, Greenville, 1796-97; resigned on election as sheriff of Washington District December 16, 1797, serving until 1801. Commissioner to investigate putting wagon road over the Western mountains. In S. C. militia, lieutenant colonel of Greenville regiment, 1787-88, 1796; colonel, 1800.

**WOODLE, Alexander Hamilton**, Senator from Greenwood County.—Born September 4, 1913, in Greenwood, the son of Alexander Hamilton Woodle and Eula Hughey. Attended Greenwood High School. Jeweler, of Greenwood. Married Ruby Anderson March 22, 1942. During World War II, chief specialist, U. S. Navy, January, 1942, to August, 1945. Mayor of Greenwood, 1949-53. S. C. House of Representatives, Greenwood, 1954-56. S. C. Senate, Greenwood, 1956-59; resigned February 27, 1959, on appointment as acting postmaster of Greenwood; postmaster, July 31, 1959, to date. Lions Club; president, 1941. Junior Chamber of Commerce, director, 1941. Shriner. American Legion Post No. 20, commander; state chairman, American Legion Junior baseball, two years; member of 40 & 8. Member of Baptist Church. Lives at Greenwood.

**WOODWARD, Thomas William**, Senator from Fairfield County.—Born May 7, 1833, at his father's plantation near Winnsboro, the son of William Thomas Woodward and Esther Smart. Attended King's Mountain Military Academy; Hillsboro Military Academy; Mt. Zion College; Wake Forest College for a few months in 1847; South Carolina College, expelled in famous "steward's hall rebellion" of 1851 as a junior. Planter, of Winnsboro. Owned "Rock City" granite quarries southwest of Winnsboro. Married, first, Cornelia Dantzler of Orangeburg, sister of Olin M. Dantzler, February 15, 1854; second, Rebecca Valentine Lyles, on January 9, 1879. Read law but never practiced. During Confederate War, major of 6th Regiment, S. C. Infantry; wounded at Dranesville; re-enlisted as a private and made quartermaster of 20th Volunteer Regiment in June, 1862; served throughout war. Mason. Taxpayers' Conventions of 1871 and 1874. Chairman of county Democratic executive committee, 1876. S. C. House of Representatives, Fairfield, 1860-62. S. C. Senate, Fairfield, 1884-92. Delegate to State Democratic Conventions of 1876, 1902. Master of Winnsboro Grange. Survivors Association of S.C.V. 6th Regiment; president. Died at his home at Rockton September 4, 1902; buried in Episcopal Cemetery at Winnsboro. Portrait in Senate chamber.

**WORTHAM, James J.**, Senator from Parish of All Saints.—Born about 1827-28 in North Carolina. Large

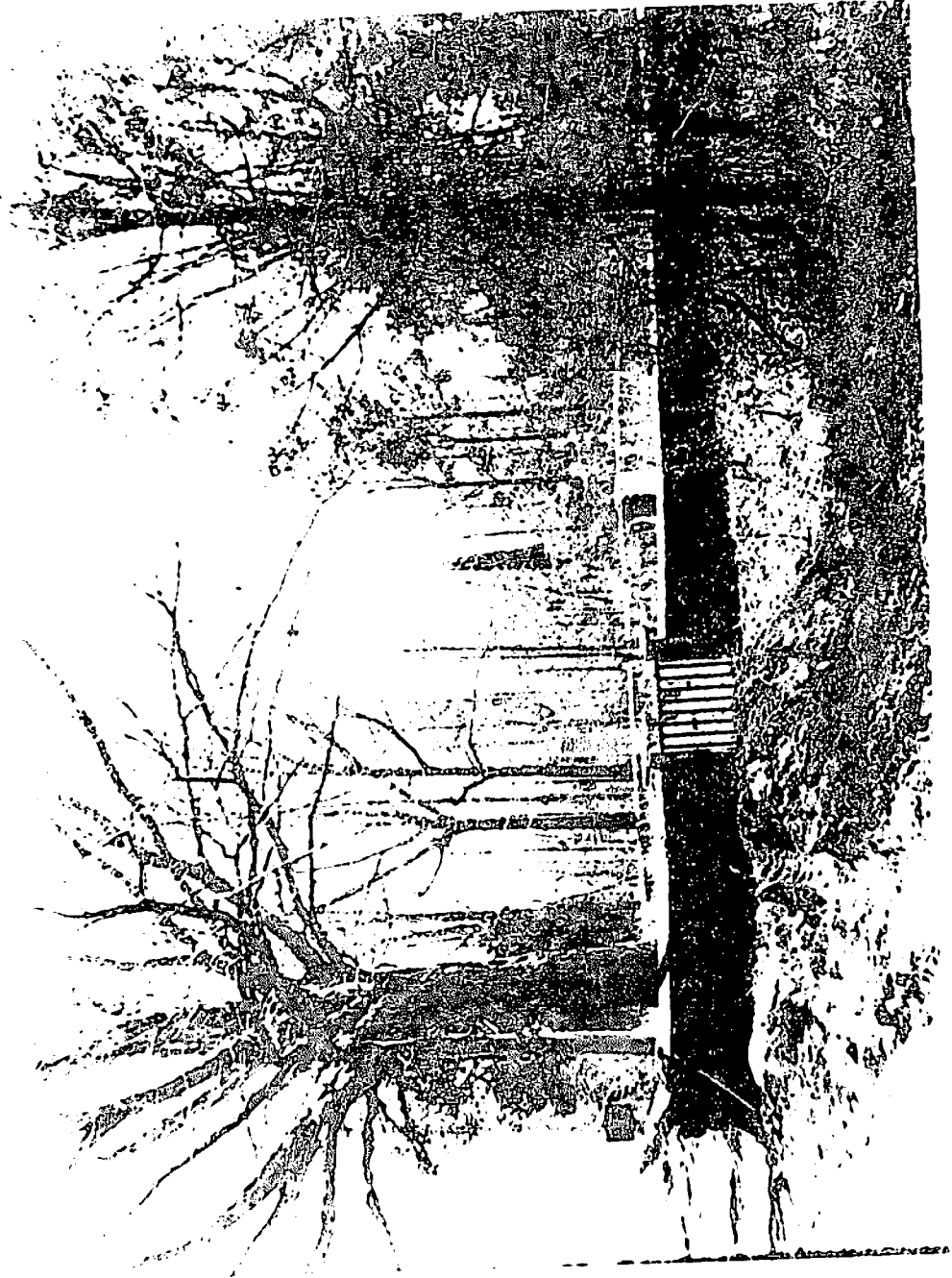
planter, of Little River section of All Saints' Parish; owned 91 slaves in 1860. Married Martha \_\_\_\_\_, before 1850. S. C. Senate, All Saints', 1862-65. During Confederate War, enlisted January 20, 1862, as third lieutenant in Lt. Joshua Ward's Light Artillery; promoted to second lieutenant and senior second lieutenant; arrested March 19, 1863, for having challenged Lt. Mayham Ward to a duel; resigned September 17, 1863.

**WRIGHT, Jonathan Jasper**, Senator from Beaufort County.—Born February 11, 1840, in Luzerne County, Pa., of presumably free parents of the Negro race. Attended Lancasterian University, Ithaca, N. Y.; studied law at Montrose, Pa.; first Negro admitted to Pennsylvania Bar, 1866. Taught while studying law; admitted to S. C. Bar September 23, 1868. Never married. In 1865, sent by American Missionary Society to South Carolina to organize schools for Negroes, for one year. In 1868, returned as legal advisor to refugees and freedmen, locating at Beaufort. Member of Constitutional Convention of 1868. S. C. Senate, Beaufort, 1868-70; resigned on election to Supreme Court February 1, 1870; probably only man of his race at this time to hold such position; re-elected in 1874; impeachment proceedings begun by House of Representatives June 8, 1877, but dropped on his resignation December 1, 1877. Law professor of Claflin College, Orangeburg, 1881. Removed to Charleston and conducted law classes at his home on Queen Street until death. Died February 18, 1885, in Charleston; buried in Charleston.

**WYLD, John**, Senator from Little River District.—Surveyor and planter of Little River District. Married Susannah \_\_\_\_\_. S. C. House of Representatives, Little River, 1781-82. S. C. Senate, Little River, 1782-84. Took up bounty lands and bought lands in Winton County, Orangeburgh District, 1784-90; extensive property holder. During Revolutionary War, 480 days of Continental duty in 1779 and 1781. Magistrate of Orangeburgh District, September 11, 1779; justice of quorum, 1783. Commissioner of locations, Orangeburgh District, March 23, 1784. S. C. House of Representatives, Fork District, 1786-88. Justice of peace, Winton, 1789. Justice of quorum. Gave lands for public buildings of Winton County; commissioner to build buildings on land given by William Robison.

**WYLIE, John Dunovant**, Senator from Lancaster County.—Born December 14, 1833, in Lancaster District, the son of Dr. Richard Evans Wylie and Rachel McCullough. Attended Chester Male Academy, under Giles Jared Patterson; graduated from The Citadel, 1855; read law under Minor Clinton and admitted to S. C. Bar in 1856. Lawyer and planter of Lancaster. Married Eliza Jane Witherspoon on April 22, 1857. Practiced law with Thomas N. Dawkins, 1856-65. Magistrate, 1856-61. During Confederate War, captain of 9th S. C. Regiment, April 8, 1861; promoted to major at Battle of Seven Pines; promoted to lieutenant colonel of 5th S. C. Regiment June 27, 1862; in Longstreet's Corps; served until end of war. Returned to practice of law. County Democratic chairman, 1872. Active in Red Shirts campaign. S. C. Senate, Lancaster, 1877-82. Knight Templar and chapter Mason. Member of Presbyterian Church. Died May 15, 1894, in Lancaster; buried in Presbyterian Churchyard.

**YONCE, William Preston**, Senator from Edgefield County.—Born September 6, 1889, at Johnston, the son of Lawrence Yonce and Adella Vansant. Graduated from Johnston High School. Married Julia Elizabeth Zobel of Newberry June 4, 1914. Removed to Edgefield in 1918. Farmer and automobile dealer, of Edgefield. S. C. Senate, Edgefield, 1938-40, 1944-48, 1952-56. Trustee of Newberry College. Mason; Shriner. Delegate to Na-

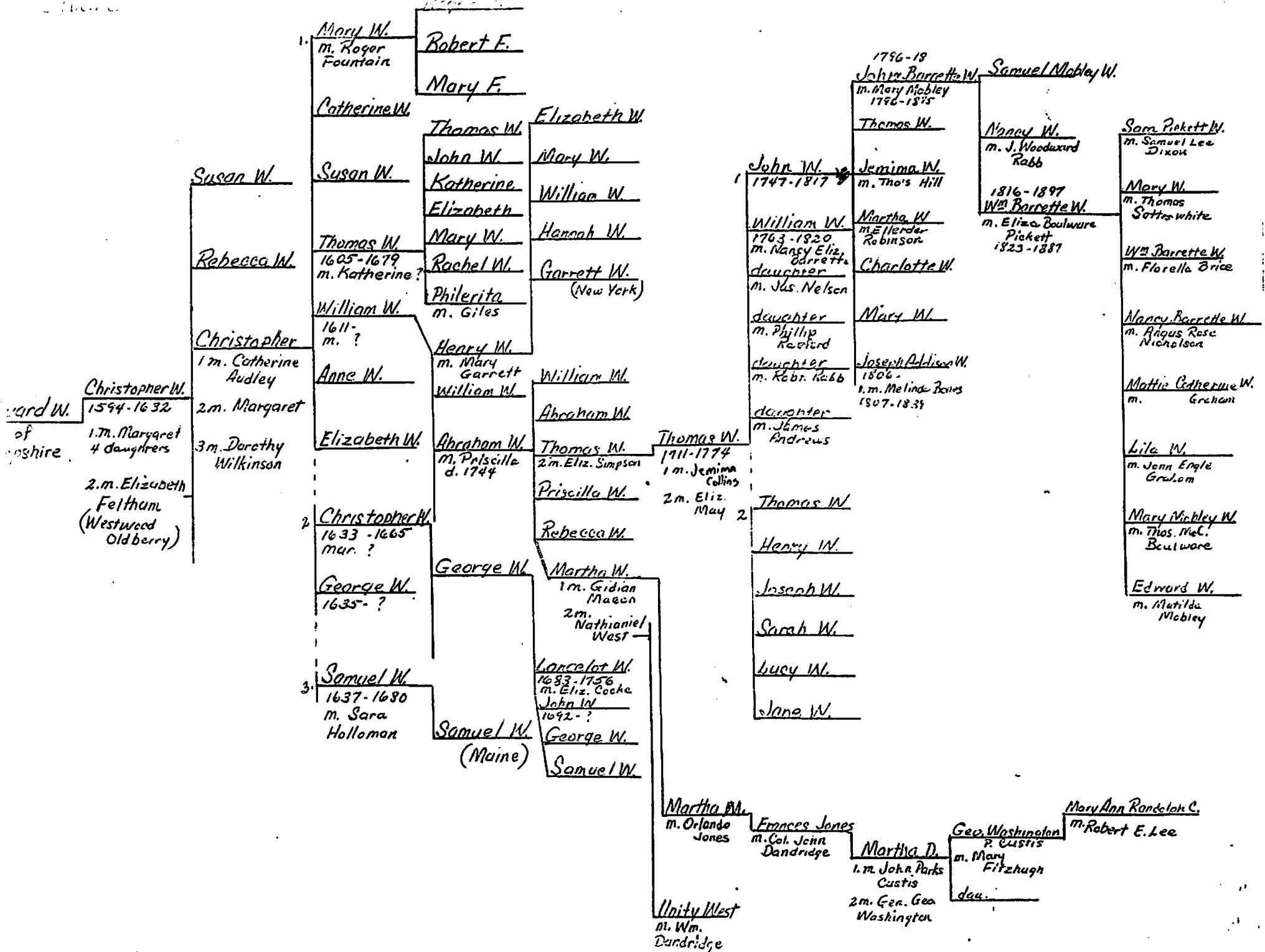

The Thomas Woodward Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is in its 50th. year of existence. It meets today in celebration of this anniversary, and is most happy to have you present for this occasion.

Organized under the direction and enthusiastic guidance of Mrs. F.H.H. Calhoun, the then State Regent of South Carolina on May 3, 1915 at the home of Mrs. David de Vere de Verelle Walker, Senior, (Alice Buchanan Walker) on Congress Street, Wimsboro, this group of women through the years has earnestly endeavored to contribute to the ideals, incentives and splendid goals laid out in general plans of the work of our noble and patriotic Society.

The chapter name is that of a noted patriot and soldier, Thomas Woodward, "The Regulator", whose forebears came to America with Calvert, Lord Baltimore, in 1632, settled in Maryland, then Virginia. A grandson of the pioneer, Abraham Woodward- Thomas Woodward known as "The Regulator", was born in Fairfax County, Virginia between the years 1711 and 1727.

Coming to Camden District, Fairfield County in 1753 he acquired thousands of acres of grant land here and in adjoining counties.

When very young he fought in the French and Indian Wars under a family friend, George Washington, then major or colonel; and he attained the rank of captain as reward for bravery and military prowess.

Before and during the Revolution when lawlessness in the "Up-country" of South Carolina could not be controlled through power of the distant Royal Colony capital, Charleston, Thomas Woodward led a group of prominent citizens of Fairfield County in a movement called "The Regulation", which held local courts and meted out punishments to thieves. These leaders of order suffered imprisonment in Camden, South Carolina, by British officials who resented the patriots taking authority in their hands. These <sup>brave</sup> men were soon released and allowed to continue the effectiveness of their plan to stamp out crime. This was the beginning of the state Circuit Courts.

Thomas Woodward organized and out-fitted one of the first military companies in the upper part of the state. He was made captain of Horse Rangers which served under Colonel William Thompson of Union, South Carolina. The Horse Rangers took an active part in several battles. Woodward aided in the defense of Charleston against the British under Sir Peter Barker. His two sons, Captains William and John Woodward, fought in the Revolution.

When Thomas' health failed he was succeeded in the captaincy by John Woodward, the while continuing a limited activity in late skirmishes and in the work of "The Regulation".

He was mortally wounded by the British and Tories while facing the foe in the Ligtown section of Fairfield on MAY 12, 1779. He is buried in the old Woodward cemetery three miles south of Winnsboro in ground first owned by him.

Many descendents of Thomas Woodward can be found in Fairfield, over the state, and in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Georgia, Arkansas, North Carolina and elsewhere.

acres divided among thirty-six tracts ranging from the Santee River in South Carolina to the Tombigbee in present Alabama. This total was undoubtedly augmented by confiscations from Whig opponents. Kirkland also claimed to own thirty-six slaves, personal property valued at £1,315.5.0., and debts owed him amounting to £2,092.17.10.

In return for the numerous opportunities by which he increased his estate, Kirkland did render active service to the King. After falling in and out of the clutches of his Whig enemies in 1775 and 1776, Kirkland became John Stuart's deputy superintendent for the Seminole Indians in 1777, and in 1778-79 he commanded Tory refugees in Georgia. Kirkland memorialized Sir Henry Clinton and the Carlisle Commission in 1778 with a plan for the conduct of the war in the South in which he strongly advised the British to raise a slave rebellion. Himself a large slaveholder, Kirkland argued that the Negroes were the basis of the Whig war effort in the South, that their uprising would be a blow to the Americans, and that their labor for Britain would solve the supply problem of the King's forces.

After the British captured Charleston in 1780, Kirkland, a lieutenant colonel of Tory militia, returned to the South Carolina Back Country for the first time in five years. Later in 1780 when the British passed over Kirkland and made former Regulator Robert Cunningham brigadier general of the Tory militia, Kirkland wrote a resentful letter to Lord Cornwallis and washed his hands of loyalist military affairs. Having found refuge in Jamaica after the war, in 1787 he was lost at sea on his way to England. He was survived by the twenty-two-year-old son of his first marriage with Patience Raiford of the Congarees and by his second wife, Catherine, and their three-year-old son. The career of Moses Kirkland, a pre-eminent man of property ever alert to the main chance, underscores the fact that, while most Regulators participated in the movement for the basically idealistic end of establishing law and order, the motives of many were tinged if not dominated by calculation and self-seeking.<sup>46</sup>

The straightforward life of Thomas Woodward stands in sharp contrast to Kirkland's devious history. Woodward was born in

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was surgeon of the Tenth Regiment South Carolina Volunteers. True, these lands are, and have been, in their possession during three generations; but that seems to be a peculiar characteristic with the inhabitants of this strip of country. The Craftons have ben here for generations, the Meriwethers, the Nixons, and the Middletons, with others, have held their forefathers' lands with a tenacity and fixedness not observed in other sections. The Nixons have a most honorable record. The father came here and settled near Clark's Hill (named from a blacksmith who had a shop and a tract of land just below), the site of the depot now bearing that name. Mr. Thomas Nixon, called Esquire Nixon, was a public-spirited citizen, as well as a useful one. He began here as a school teacher and farmer. Was a superintendent of public works and represented Edgefield District in the Legislature. He died in the prime of life, having contracted, as was then supposed, a fever from a brothr-in-law who had recently returned from Charleston, where yellow fever was then epidemic—suffering a similar affection.

When war with Mexico was declared, and the famous Palmetto Regiment was being made up, two of Thomas Nixon's sons, Jefferson P. and Thomas, volunteered along with Wm. E. Middleton, son of Major John Middleton, and Joseph Meriwether, since Auditor for Edgefield County, and son of Thos. Meriwether, one of the founders of Bethlehem Baptist Church. joined Captain Preston S. Brooks' company, which formed part of that regiment. Thomas died at or near Vera Cruz. Jefferson P. went through to the City of Mexico, distinguishing himself for gallantry on many fields, and especially at Chapultepec, where he behaved with such conspicuous bravery as to gain promotion, and after returning to his home, where the Hon. G. D. Tillman now lives, a silver pitcher, suitably engraved, was given him as an acknowledgment of the high appreciation accorded him by his fellow-citizens to his deeds of glory.

The Tillman family, the name of which occupies so conspicuous a place in State records today, does not belong properly to this locality. The father of the two prominent representatives of the family to-day lived on Chavis' Creek, on the old Stage road leading from Edgefield Court House to Hamburg.

G. D. Tillman, the Congressman, now living at Clark's Hill, came here after his marriage to Miss Margaret Jones, a lady of wealth, whose parents resided two miles above Clark's Hill and owned extensive tracts of land and numerous slaves.

Middleton, a name familiar to the history of the country, is also linked intimately with the annals of the west side of Edgefield. It has been suggested that the land tenure idea which has prevailed so uniformly in this locality is due to the fact that its settlers came chiefly from Maryland and Virginia strongly imbued with ideas which cling to their descendants. The Middletons illustrated this. Hugh Middleton came here from Maryland and bought large bodies of land, and small ones as well—the custom in those days being to exchange lands for cattle. A man with small holdings and desirous of "going west," would trade forty, eighty, or more acres of land, which he cared not to occupy, for a cow and calf, which he would take with him. Thus he, Mr. Middleton, widely extended his possessions, having much cattle and a goodly number, nearly a hundred slaves.

He settled near the Savannah River, three miles southwest from Clark's Hill depot, where his remains now lie buried. Mention is made of him in the history of the country and particularly how he defeated a body of the enemy at Briar Creek. His son, John, Major Middleton, was also a distinguished man of this community. He in early life went to the African coast and brought back a number of natives, some of whom lived out their days in the possession of his sons. He suffered shipwreck on the home voyage during which he took a distaste to rice, upon which he lived for a long while, and could never after be induced to eat rice. He was a most upright and honest man; his decision of a matter between neighbors was received without question. He also represented his people in the Legislature. He died at a ripe old age, about 84, honored and respected by all.

At one time the Wares were large landholders in this section. Captain Robert Ware had a then elegant residence near Woodlawn, say four hundred yards distant, on an eminence, perhaps the highest in this section, where he must have lived in ease and elegance if not in luxury. Large orchards, brick walks, a distillery and other evidences of wealth and prosperity, were
