
It is my present intention to vote against the legislation.






Your letter has been received in the absence of Senator Thurmond who is on two weeks of active duty with the Army.


Thank you for your letter of March 24.

I have your letter of March 11, expressing your opposition to the ratification of the convention for the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

At a meeting of the Committee on Foreign Relations last week, this treaty was approved unanimously. The Committee also agreed upon an interpretation of the treaty, which is set forth on page 13 of the Committee report enclosed herewith. It has also been made clear in the hearings and elsewhere that the OECD will not assume broad trade functions, will not cut tariffs, nor will it in any way infringe upon or control the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. It will have nothing to do with tariffmaking.
