

M.032 INFORMATION ON OUR HILL FAMILY AND ALSO DATA PROVIDED FROM MRS. CHRISTOPHER REGARDING MOSES HILL & JUDITH E. STEWART, WIFE OF NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL, (OUR 2ND GREAT GRANDMOTHER).

Compiled by Robert R. Hill Sr. in June of 1986; updated in June of 1992.

Note by Robert Hill: There is quite a bit more details known on our family but I am only going to give highlights for now.

THE GENEALOGY OF OUR HILL FAMILY LINE:

Note: The day of week that the event took place was taken from the "Perpetual Calendar," issued by the Smithsonian Institution Press of Washington, D.C.

MOSES HILL 1/

Moses Hill 1/ (born ca. 1757 after 1st July 1757 or in 1758)... suspected to have been originally from Pennsylvania or Maryland. He was a Revolutionary Soldier in S.C., served two tours, (1780 and 1781) for a total of 120 days as a Private. He was a land surveyor and after the war was a Justice of the Peace. He was married to SAVILLA N. (NANCE?) RODEN. Moses Hill 1/ died on (Sunday) the 1st of July 1821 in Fairfield County, S.C. Their children (in order of birth) were:

1. Thomas Hill 2/, born 1780 (MY LINE) m. Jemima Woodward. He died between January & May of 1824
2. James Hill 2/, born on (Thursday) the 21st of November 1782, married on (Tuesday) the 10th June 1806 to Susannah Glenn. He died on (Friday) the 27th of October 1854 in Union Co., S.C.
3. Sarah Caroline Hill 2/, born ca. 1785, married Rev. John Pearson.
4. Littleton Hill 2/, born ca. 1790, he died after 1810 census, was in his late teens and never married.
5. Elizabeth Harrison Hill 2/, born on (Tuesday) the 29th of January 1793, m. Stephen Terry on (Tuesday) the 4th of July 1809. She died in Georgia on (Monday) the 3rd of December 1838.
6. Moses Berry Hill 2/, born 1795 m. Mary Bowles Glenn. He died on (Thursday) the 14th of October 1824.
7. Harriet Windham Hill 4/, born on (Friday) the 5th of March 1802, married Edward Pickett Mobley. She died on (Thursday) the 30th of April 1857.
8. George Washington Hill 4/, born in September 1803, married Sarah A. Moore. He died on (Tuesday) the 8th of September 1857.
9. Rebecca Carlisle Hill 4/, born on (Sunday) the 20th of

December 1807, married Dr. John Trezevant DeGraffenreid (M. D.) on (Tuesday) the 25th of March 1828. She died on (Thursday) the 11th of August 1842 in Greene County, Alabama.

The son Thomas Hill 2/ lived and died in Fairfield County between January & May of 1824.

The son James Hill 2/, became a large and wealthy plantation owner in Union County, S.C. His home is still standing today (1993) and Mrs. Jeannette Christopher (his great granddaughter) lives there.

The son Littleton Hill 2/ died in his late teens without ever marrying. He is buried by his father in an unmarked grave.

The daughter Elizabeth Harrison Hill 2/ and her husband had twelve children. They moved to Georgia, in the area of today's Atlanta. The Atlanta Historical Society states that the husband Stephen Terry built the first commercial hotel there and also helped with the first water works.

The son Moses Berry Hill 2/ was a surveyor, lived and died in Chester County but at his death, he was taken by his brother James Hill 2/ and buried in his family plot in Carlisle, (Union Co.) South Carolina.

The daughter, Harriet Windham Hill 2/ and her husband lived their lives on their plantation known as "White Hall" near today's White Oak in Fairfield County.

The father, Moses Hill 1/, died on (Sunday) the 1st July 1821, (age 63 years.) and was buried on (Tuesday) the 3rd of July 1821 and is buried by the son (Littleton Hill) in the Younge Cemetery, near Buckhead in Fairfield County. This was once the site of Moses Hill's home and the cemetery was once the yard of his plantation.

After the father, MOSES HILL 1/ died in 1821, his family stayed on in Fairfield County, South Carolina until about April of 1831, when the children and their families began to move westward into Greene County, Alabama.

The wife and widow of Moses Hill 1/, SAVILLA RODEN, was born in 1759 in Virginia and died (AGE 85) on (Tuesday) the 23rd July 1844 and is buried in the Old Bigbee Cemetery near Pleasant Ridge, Alabama (Green County) beside her son George W. Hill and very close to her daughter, Rebecca Carlisle (Hill) DeGraffenreid.

The daughter Sarah (Caroline?) Hill 2/ married Rev. John Pearson, is believed to be buried here too but, the cemetery is very badly overgrown with briars, bushes and some

tombstones are buried in over 2 inches of silt. Her grave was not found.

THOMAS HILL 2/, (MY LINE)

Thomas Hill 2/ (born 1780 in Fairfield County, S.C.) was the oldest of eight children. He operated a store in the northwest corner of Fairfield County, just south of the Chester County line, where he also lived. He married about 1805 to Jemima Woodward, daughter of Rev. William Woodward & wife, Nancy Elizabeth Barrett. The children were (in order of birth)

1. Nancy Barrett Hill 3/, born on (Friday) the 4th June 1806. She 1st married Edward Mabry Mobley in 1825; 2nd marriage to William Price on (Thursday) the 27th of July 1847 in Alabama; Her 3rd marriage was on (Friday) the 4th of November 1853 to James H. Sims, She died in Sumter Co., Alabama after 1860 census.
2. Jemima Hill 3/, born ca. 1807-08, no other information.
3. Charlotte Louise Hill 3/, born on (Tuesday) the 8th August 1809, married Moses Cockrell in 1824, moved to Mississippi. She died on (Friday) the 28th October 1864.
4. Nathaniel Barrett Hill 3/, (MY LINE) born in 1811, married Judith Eliza Stewart about 1835-36, he died in NY City on (Wednesday) the 13th of December 1854.
5. William Woodward Hill 3/, born ca. 1812, m. a cousin Mary Glenn. She died young with no children. No other information found.
6. Savilla Hill 3/, born ca. 1813-1814, married ca. 1832 to Green B. Mobley, they moved Alabama. She died between 1839-1840. Appears to have had 3 children.
7. Moses Hill 3/, may have gone to Pickens Co., Alabama, no other information.
8. Thomas Hill (Jr.?) 3/. may be the Thomas Hill listed in the 1830 Census for Fairfield County, S.C., no other information.

Nancy Barrett Hill 3/ married 3 times, first to Edward Mabry Mobley, they first moved to DeKalb County, Georgia, then they moved to Green County, Alabama. Her 2nd marriage was to William Price Sr., and her 3rd marriage was to James H. Sims, the last two being in Alabama.

No information available on Jemima Hill 3/.

Charlotte Louise Hill 3/ married Moses Cockrell and they moved to Noxubee County, Mississippi.

Nathan Barrett Hill 3/ moved to Columbia. He was Sheriff in Richland District in 1848 until 1851 when he resigned in order to run and operate his own personal business. He was part owner of a firm known as 'STALKER & HILL.' He was also a

member of the committee that pushed for "Withdrawal from the Union" that met in Charleston in the early 1850's.

William Woodward Hill 3/, moved to Mobile, Alabama.

Savilla Hill 3/ married Green B. Mobley and they moved to Green County Alabama. Census records for 1840 seems to show she had 3 children, a son and two daughters.

Moses Hill 3/ moved to Pickens County Alabama.

Thomas Hill 3/ is believed to have stayed on in Fairfield County.

The father, Thomas Hill 2/ died in Fairfield County between 7th January 1824 and May of 1824. The exact location of his grave has not been determined except it is safe to say it is somewhere in Fairfield County.

The mother and widow, Jemima (Woodward) Hill is said to have moved to Noxubee County with daughter Charlotte and died there ca. 1851. This has not been proven.

NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL 3/.

NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL 3/, was known in the family and friends as "Barrett" was the 4th of eight children, but eldest son. He was born in Fairfield County in 1811. He married JUDITH E. (ELIZA?) STEWART. (Her name is listed as Smith on the death certificate of her son but that is wrong!). She is said to have been the widow of a Frank McCu;;ough, but has not been proven. (If so, they apparently had no known children).

Nathan Hill 3/ usually signed business transactions as N. B. HILL or N. BARRETT HILL. Nathan Hill 3/ & Judith Stewart married in S.C. (Columbia) ca. 1835-1836. They had (in order of birth) the following children:

1. Woodward D. Hill 4/. my great grandfather.
2. William Stewart Hill 4/.
3. Eliza M. Hill 4/.
4. John Hill 4/ (killed in war at Petersburg, Va.)
5. Lawrence Barrett Hill (Lonnie) 4/.

All four sons fought in the Confederate Army in the 7th S.C. Volunteers, Infantry, Company "C." The son John Hill 4/ died in Richmond Army Hospital as a result from wounds received near Petersburg, VA. In 1864.

Nathan Hill 3/ was Sheriff of Richland County from November of 1848 till April of 1851 when he "resigned" due to increasing personal business affairs. He was on the Board of

Directors for the Bank of South Carolina, half owner of a steamship line (Stalker & Hill) that operated between Columbia and Charleston. His partner, Gilbert Stalker, died first. Nathan Hill later became partners in both Columbia and Charleston with Charner Terry Scaife, who married a daughter of his uncle, James Hill. Scaife also was administrator of Nathan's estate. This company was known as "SCAIFE & HILL COMPANY."

Nathan Hill 3/ took his family to New York City in 1854 but died very shortly after arriving. Nathan 3/ died on (Wednesday) the 13th December 1854 in New York City. Medical evidence seems to point to pneumonia as cause of death and he is known to have suffered from "gout."

The family preceded and returned by boat to Charleston. Nathan's boat followed on another boat the next day, arriving on (Friday) the 22nd December 1854. His burial location is suspected to be in an unmarked grave in Elmwood Cemetery in Columbia but this has not been proven.

WOODWARD D. HILL 4/.

The name of Woodward, was often spelled as WOODARD in and among family members as well as on his death certificate, however his father spelled it as Woodward as does all census records. (NOTE: WOODARD is simply a distorted spelling of Woodward).

One family member (around 1900) stated and actually had his name entered in her records as THOMAS WOODWARD HILL (after his paternal grandfather (Thomas Hill 2/). This was a popular custom of the times BUT no other record has been found to show this name.

The fact is that a daughter, Beulah Hill 5/, stated that he had no middle name so he often used the last letter in his first name (viz: the letter "D") thus signed his name as W.D. HILL or Woodward D. Hill 4/. He was obviously named after his maternal grandmother's (Jemima Woodward's) side of the family. He fought in the civil war (CSA) and was injured in that war.

Woodward Hill 4/, was born in Columbia, S.C. on (Sunday) 10th of September 1837, married in what was then Lexington County, South Carolina in 1866 to SALLY ELIZABETH RUCKER. (This area became Calhoun County S.C. in 1908).

Census records state they had 11 children but two must have died as infants at a very early age because only 9 are known of. Woodward D. Hill died in Old Soldier's Home in Columbia, South Carolina on (Thursday) the 27th November 1919. He is buried in Calhoun County S.C. near Sandy Run, in what is today the Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard. Their

children were (in order of birth)

1. Emma Cornelia Hill 5/, born on (Friday) the 14th February 1868 in what was then Lexington Co., S.C. She married Victor Bates, ca. 1887-88, she died on (Saturday) the 28th of September 1940 in the town of North, South Carolina (Orangeburg County).
2. Sally Elizabeth Hill 5/, born 18th February 1869 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Anson Price Dannelly ca. 1898, moved to Statesboro, Ga. She died there about 1918.
3. Nathaniel Barrett Hill 5/, (called "Barrett" and obviously named after his paternal grandfather) born on (Sunday) the 8th October 1871 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Mary Elizabeth Geiger, he was killed in logging accident on (Friday) the 1st of April 1927. Buried in Elmwood Cemetery in Columbia, S.C.
4. Peter Joseph Hill 5/, MY GRANDFATHER. He was born on (Saturday) the 31st of October 1874. He married Mary Jane Rickenbaker on (Friday) the 28th of December 1900, he died in Dec. of 1906 or January of 1907. Buried in Congaree Baptist Churchyard (today's Calhoun Co., S.C.).
5. James Franklin Hill 5/, born on (Sunday) the 13th of January 1878 in Lexington Co., S.C. he married Essie Isota Furtick on (Friday) the 13th of January 1903, he died on (Monday) the 21st March of 1950. Buried in Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.
6. William Woodward Hill 4/, born on (Friday) the 14th May 1880 in Lexington Co., S.C., he married Rosa Belle Meetze on (Thursday) the 21st of April 1910, he died on (Thursday) the 20th June 1957. Buried in Elmwood Cemetery in Columbia, S.C.
7. Susan Hill 5/, born on (Sunday) the 15th April 1883 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Charles Saylor, date unknown, she died on (Sunday) the 16th of March 1947 in Columbia Hospital. Buried in the Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.
8. Beulah Lee Hill 5/, born on (Tuesday) the 19th January 1886 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Edward K. McQuatters on (Wednesday) the 25th of December 1907, she died on (Thursday) the 13th August 1970. Buried in Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.
9. Michael (Mike) Hill 5/, born on (Tuesday) the 1st of October 1889 in Lexington Co., S.C., he never married. He died on (Sunday) the 15th of January 1968. Buried in Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.

Woodward D. Hill 4/ and his three brothers all fought in the civil war and all were members of the 7th SOUTH CAROLINA VOLUNTEERS, COMPANY C, (INFANTRY). He taught school after the war.

William (Stewart) Hill 4/ was captured by Union troops but survived the war. John Hill 4/ was injured near Petersburg,

Virginia and died in 1864 in an army hospital, near Richmond, Va.

Lawrence (Lonnie) Hill 4/ was a drummer boy and survived the war. He moved to Union County, S.C. as a Deputy Sheriff in Union Co., SC, had trouble with the KKK, then moved to Mississippi and married a cousin, Martha Louise Glenn. Lost an arm after the war due to a unknown accident.

The daughter, Eliza Hill 4/, married Henry C. Nunnamaker. They later moved, lived and died in Columbia. & operated a grocery store.

Fifth Known Generation: Each individual will have to name his or her own descendent, OR the child of Woodward D. Hill that they are descended from. In my case, the fifth generation was:

PETER JOSEPH HILL 5/
(my grandfather)

Pete Hill 5/ was the 4th child and was born on (Saturday) the 31 October 1874 at Sandy Run S.C. (Lexington Co., later Calhoun Co.). Pete was baptized (christened) in the Sandy Run Lutheran Church on (Friday) the 15th August 1875, as was his brother Barrett and older sister Sally. (Ref: Church Records). Pete Hill 5/ married MARY JANE RICKENBAKER on 28th December 1900. He died either in December of 1906 or January 1907 and is buried in the Congaree Baptist Churchyard, near St. Matthews South Carolina. After his death, his widow Mary Jane remarried William J. Lambert and they moved to Portsmouth, Virginia.

Pete Hill 5/ and wife Mary Jane Rickenbaker had three children:

1. NOLTON RAYMOND HILL SR. 6/, born on (Wednesday) the 23rd of October 1901 and he died on (Monday) the 31st of July 1972 he was my father. He married Minnie Ola Blow on (Thursday) the 17th of March 1921 in Central Methodist Church in Portsmouth, Virginia.
2. Gertrude Hill 6/, born on (Thursday) the 11th of June 1904 in what was then Lexington Co., S.C. (now Calhoun Co.,) she married Aubrey George Sweet Sr., she died in Portsmouth, Va on (Monday) the 12th of December 1955.
3. Flora Dell Hill 6/, born on (Tuesday) the 24th of October 1905 in Lexington Co., S.C. (Now Calhoun Co.), married Willard Reed Sr., (divorced), she died in Norfolk, Va. on (Monday) the 28th of December 1981.

INFORMATION RELATING TO SOME OF OUR HILL DESCENDENTS.

Explanation by Robert Hill: Mrs. Christopher was A DESCENDENT of James Hill, the second son and child of Moses Hill. He was a brother of Thomas Hill.

WOODWARD GENEALOGY:

Thomas Woodward is the first known generation. He was born in ca. 1729 Fairfax County Virginia, moved to what is today Fairfield County, S.C. He was a leader in the famous "Regulator Movement" that took place in the early 1760's. He was a Captain in the American Revolution, resigned due to age but lead his neighbors in a fight against TORIES. He was killed in this battle at Dutchman's Creek (Fairfield County) on 12th May 1779.

The second Woodward generation that relates to our family line was WILLIAM WOODWARD. He was born on 7th October in 1762 in Fairfax County, Virginia. His mother (Jemima Collins) died just after his birth and the Woodwards moved to S.C. William married Nancy Elizabeth Barrett ca. 1820. He served in the American Revolution, then served one term in the 14th U.S. Congress (House of Representatives). He was a physician BUT is known more for his ministry in the Baptist church. He was one of the founders of the WOODWARD BAPTIST CHURCH, located near Chester, South Carolina, in Chester County and that church is still active today. Reverend William Woodward died on 23rd July 1820 in Chester County, S.C. but said to have been buried in Fairfield, location unknown.

Third Woodward generation that pertains to our HILL line was: JEMIMA WOODWARD... (born ca. 1785 in Fairfield County, South Carolina. She is said to have moved with a daughter and her family to Noxubee County, Mississippi and died there about 1850 or 1851. To date, we have found no proof of her death date or the location of her residence after 1830, which was in Fairfield County. JEMIMA WOODWARD married ca. 1805 at age 13 to THOMAS HILL, who was my 3rd great grandfather (viz: great great great grandfather). She was a mother by June of 1806 and this was not a particular unusual thing for a girl to marry so young. **THUS THE HILL-WOODWARD CONNECTION, ALSO THE SOURCE OF THE NAME OF WOODWARD (WOODARD) AND THE NAME OF BARRETT.**

Anyone in our Hill Family is eligible to join the Sons of American Revolution (males) or the Daughters of American Revolution (females). I am a member of the Sons of American Revolution. (Tampa Chapter, Florida Society SAR)

INFORMATION RELATING TO JUDITH E. STEWART, WIFE OF NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL (OUR THIRD GENERATION HILL).

Comments by Robert Hill: Judith E. (Eliza?) Stewart was the wife of Nathaniel Barrett Hill, (our third generation Hill & she was my 2nd great grandmother. Nathan was the son of Thomas Hill & Jemima Woodward). The 1850 Census indicates Judith was born in South Carolina in 1811 and I have some strong circumstantial evidence that she died in 1864 in Columbia. As with Nathan, her burial location has not been found. New information says she was the daughter of Jesse Stewart & wife Wilmouth Williamson, of Virginia but who came to S.C.

Meanwhile, I have already explained above just who Mrs. Christopher is and how she relates to the HILL Family. I have been attempting to locate and find out some information relating to Judith Stewart for several years. It is apparent that there is a line of descendents of our Nathan Hill, that we know nothing of but Mrs. Christopher does, thus she was able to obtain the following information.

Mrs. Christopher wrote to me on 2nd of December 1987 and provided me the following information.

I should explain here that the following Judith (Hill) Garner and those mentioned below are descended through William Stewart Hill, the brother of our Woodward D. Hill.

The following are excerpts from Mrs. Christopher's letter:

"Here is an early Christmas present for you. Last summer Judith Hill Garner in Union County (S.C.) wrote to me that she had gotten a photo from her nephew James William Hill (she never did say where he lived, but I think Chicago) of a stock pin (similar to a man's tie stick pin) that had been handed down in her family ever since Moses Hill gave it to his eldest son Thomas. She sent the picture to me to see, and with her permission I had a negative made from it and several prints. One is enclosed for you along with a copy of a letter written by Judith's mother Bertha (Hill) Hill to her son Andrew (James William's father) when she gave the pin to him. (Note: Bertha Hill married William Hill, unrelated). It is a beautiful pin, originally had a topaz setting which was lost by N. BARRETT HILL while it was in his possession as the eldest son of Thomas Hill. Barrett had the stone replaced with the black cameo shown in the picture. But, if all of this tradition is correct, it means that MOSES HILL was somebody's eldest son- or at least, was the eldest when his father died. And it had been in the family for at least two generations before Moses got it! It was given to Moses' father by the father's mother, who must have been a widow. Unfortunately, Cousin Bertha didn't know the names of the father and grandmother.

Judith also sent a little additional information on the Stuart/Stewart family. She says that Judith Stuart McCullough was the daughter of JESSIE STEWART and WILMOTH WILLIAMSON. Jessie was a twin and Judith thinks his twin sister was named Judith. Traditionally, the Stuarts were from Virginia. Judith didn't say so, but surely the Stuarts/Stewarts were in South Carolina when Judith married N. BARRETT HILL. Incidentally, did Brent Holcomb send you a copy of that letter written by N. BARRETT HILL to my grandfather GEORGE W. (Washington) HILL? If he didn't, let me know and I will make another copy for you."

THIS ENDS THE LETTER EXCERPT.

NOTE BY ROBERT HILL: I have a picture of the pin mentioned above. Below is a letter that Mrs. Christopher received from Judith (Hill) Garner. it was wrote by BERTHA (HILL) HILL, the mother of Judith (Hill) Garner and was wrote sometime between 1935 and 1940. This is a quote of that letter...

(This note was wrote by Judith (Hill) Garner of Union County, S.C. in spring of 1987. "This letter as you can see was written by my mother to my oldest brother about the stock pin which (I thought) was a family crest but I was mistaken. It is a pin much cherished by my mother's family."

letter begins here

Dear Andrew;

Please read this document carefully and then put it away in case you need it at some future time.

Years and years ago. long before the Revolutionary War, my great great grandfather had a pin given him from his father, who had received it from his mother, my great great grandfather's grandmother. This pin was a gentleman's stock pin, remember the old fashion of men wearing clothes wrapped around their necks and a lace jabo? (word is unclear) in front? Well this pin was worn in my great, great, great grandfather's stock. When my great great grandfather MOSES HILL died he left the pin to his eldest son with instructions to the effect that each eldest son of an eldest son be given the pin. Well my great grandfather, THOMAS HILL, willed the pin to his eldest son, my grandfather, NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL, who in turn left the pin to my father. When my oldest brother William Stuart Hill was twenty one, mamma turned the pin over to him. Bud, in turn asked me to wear the pin until he married. So I kept it till 1905 when Bud married FAITH FARRIS, the daughter of a Presbyterian Minister in Miami. Then I sent it on to Bud, who gave it in turn to Faith to wear till their son William should have a son. Bud died when William was 17 years old. After taking a business course William accepted a position some where in Georgia, and has

never been heard of since. Faith spent all she had trying to find him. That was in 1930. She wrote me she had put the pin in the bank to keep till William came home. She waited till today I received the pin. She has at last found some sort of proof of his death. Now I am the sole living heir of my father's and the only heir or male heir of our family. So it has come to me, not in trust, but as heir and as the line is broken I can leave the pin to whom I please. This is what I feel is right. Jimmie Hill, your son, though he gets his name from your father's family is still my descendent and I am glad to say a Hill, though not my Hill. I am going to keep the pin and wear it till I die and when that time comes, I want you to keep it in trust for Jimmie till he marries when he will let his wife keep it till his own son is grown and married. If anything should happen to Jimmie's heir before he should marry, the pin is to go to Richard's son, If Richard does not have sons, then the pin is to go to Judith's son. I hope though a Hill will always have the pin.

Now this pin is about the size of a postage stamp. It has between thirty and fifty pearls around the border and the center stone was originally topaz, but my grandfather lost the topaz and replaced it with a black cameo.

I hope the persons whom inherit the pin will value it as the generations gone by and will never pawn it as so many things have been in this family.

Hope you are feeling well and are not suffering too much in this awful sub zero weather. Papa joins me in love.

End of letter

Following was wrote by Mrs Christopher to explain the relationship of the above persons...

Jimmie Hill was son of Andrew Hill, who was son of Bertha (Hill) Hill. (Bertha Hill married a William Hill, unrelated and from another Hill Family). BERTHA HILL was the daughter of William Stewart Hill, who was a son BUT NOT THE ELDEST of Nathaniel Barrett Hill, who was son of Thomas Hill, who was son of Moses Hill, who was son of ???? Hill, who was son of ???? Hill (who's wife was the grandmother of Moses Hill), and who gave the pin to Moses Hill.
