CHILDREN: (All born in Fairfield County S.C.)

- 1. Thomas Hill born 1780; married ca. 1805 to Jemima Woodward, dau. of Rev. Wm. Woodward and granddaughter of Thomas Woodward, the Regulator. Thomas Hill died between Jan. 7th 1824 and May 1824. South Carolina deeds in both Chester & Fairfield County shows that Thomas was engaged in several land transactions and is known to have operated a store. They had 8 children. (MY LINE).
- 2. James Hill born 21 Nov. 1782; married 10th June 1806 to Susannah Glenn. He was the ancestor of Mrs. Christopher, who provided a large amount of Hill Family information. James lived in Fish Dam, Union County (today's Carlisle). He built "Hillside Plantation" where Mrs. Christopher still lives and the house is on the NATIONAL HISTORICAL PRESERVATION LIST. He died 27th of October 1854. They had seven children but only 3 lived till adulthood. James was a very wealthy man and large slave owner at time of death.
- 3. Sarah (Caroline?) Hill born ca. 1785; married Rev. John Pearson III, (b. 1785) and the son of General John H. Pearson, a Revolutionary Soldier and member of U.S. Congress, and Sarah Raiford. This was the 2nd of 3 marriages for Reverend Pearson. In April or May of 1831, Sarah and her husband moved to Green County Alabama, along with her widowed mother, her brother George and his family, and her younger sister, Rebecca and her family. She died very shortly after the move, ca. 1831-1835 in

Green Co., Ala. Her and her husband, Rev. John Pearson, had only one child, a son named MOSES HILL PEARSON, born ca. 1823 (The 1850 Census gives his birth as being in N.C.). It is believed that Sarah Hill married at a fairly late age in her life.

- 4. Littleton Hill born ca. 1790 (never married) died ca. late 1810 or 1811. He and father are buried in cemetery that today is called the "Old Younge Cemetery" located just east and adjacent to the old Moses Hill plantation house. (Littleton is buried by his father in a grave visible by a stone at head and foot but no legible inscription).
- 5. Elizabeth Harrison Hill was born on the 29 January 1793; in Fairfield County, S.C., married on 4 July 1809 to Stephen Terry, born in Chester County S.C. and the son of John Terry and Priscilla Stokes, his 2nd wife. Stephen and Elizabeth moved briefly to Lancaster County, South Carolina then to DeKalb County Georgia, (today's Fulton Co.) in what is today the southeast part of the city of Atlanta (Lakewood Park). She was the mother of 12 children and she died on the 3rd of December 1838 in DeKalb Co., Ga.
- 6. Moses Berry Hill born in 1795; married Mary Bowles Glenn. He was known to have been a land surveyor (as was his father). They had four children, and his descendents moved into Mississippi and Arkansas. He located himself up in Chester County, South Carolina, but when he died, he was brought into Union County (just across the river) and buried in the Hill Family plot of his older brother, James Hill, located in Fish Dam, Union County, South Carolina (today's Carlisle). Moses Berry Hill died on the 14th of October 1824 in Chester Co.
- 7. Harriett Windham Hill was born on the 5th of March 1802; married Edward Pickett Mobley in Fairfield County S.C. ca 1831-1832. Harriet and her husband lived their entire lives in Fairfield County S.C., becoming very wealthy people, large land and slave owners. She and her husband, Edward, were very influential in the community. They had 5 children. She and her husband, along with some of the children, are buried in the family graveyard, located on the old home plantation, near WHITE OAK, in Fairfield County. She died on the 30th of April 1857 in Fairfield Co., S.C.
- 8. George Washington Hill was born in September of 1803; married Sarah A. Moore. He and his family, along with his widowed mother, and his two sisters (Sarah & Rebecca) and their families, all moved to Green County Alabama ca. April or May of 1831. He and his wife are known to have had a total of 12 children. George Hill died in Green

County, Alabama on the 8th of September 1857 and is buried by his mother in the OLD BIGBEE CEMETERY, located near Pleasant Ridge (Greene County Alabama.)

9. Rebecca Carlisle Hill was the youngest child. She was born on the 20th December 1807. She married Dr. John Trezevant DeGraffenreid, M.D. Rebecca and her husband had 6 children. The year of 1842 was a year that Dr. DeGraffenreid would never forget. An epidemic (Bilious Fever) swept the family and in April of 1842, their daughter (also named Rebecca) died of the illness. was tragic enough (especially for a physician) but he was dealt an even more devastating blow. In August of 1842, on the 11th, he lost his wife (Rebecca Carlisle Hill) and the very next day (12th August 1842) the same illness laid claim to another of his daughters, Celestia. Today's medical terminology for this disease is called "infectious hepatitis." Rebecca and most of her children are buried close to the grave of her mother (Savilla Hill) and brother (George W. Hill) in the OLD BIGBEE CEMETERY near Pleasant Ridge Alabama.

NOTES: Moses Hill is believed to be the brother of Leonard Hill and a Thomas Hill, who also fought in the Revolution in S.C. Leonard Hill & wife Elizabeth, moved to Clark County, Kentucky ca. 1788 and just before moving sold his land to a Thomas Hill. Later when Thomas sold the land again, his wife Judith signed the deed.

Thomas Hill, (not the above but my 3rd great grandfather) 1st son of Moses, married Jemima Woodward. She was the daughter of Reverend William Woodward & his wife, Nancy Elizabeth Barrett. Wm. Woodward was a Revolutionary Soldier, served one term in the 14th U.S. Congress, a Physician but more important he was a Baptist Minister, and founded the church in Chester County named after him "THE WOODWARD BAPTIST CHURCH" which is still functioning today.

Rev. William Woodward, was the son of Captain Thomas (The Regulator) Woodward and his first wife, Jemima Collins. Both William & his father Thomas were born in Fairfax County, Virginia and they came to S.C. ca. 1763, just after Jemima Collins Woodward died.

Thomas Woodward, known in S.C. as "The Regulator" was killed on 12th May 1779 in the battle at Dutchman's Creek in Fairfield County.

EAST (SE 25degrees?) 31 chains and 62 links to a staked corner, bounded by land laid out to THOMAS WILLIAMS and THOMAS CALORLE???, thence running SOUTH 65 (degrees?) WEST (SW 65 degrees?) 31 chains and 62 links to a stake corner, bounded on land called JAMES BUTLERS, but was granted to WILLIAM PHILLIPS, thence running NORTH 25 (degrees?) West (NW 25 degrees?) 31 chains and 62 links to a White Oak corner, bounded by land laid out to JOHN GIOEN???, thence running NORTH 65 (degrees?) The Thomas Hill, listed above as J.P. could be him BUT I have never found any record or evidence that he was ever a Judge of J.P. Since we do not know the origins of Moses Hill, or his parents, brothers etc.. I do not know the identity of Thomas Hill, the J.P. Neither do I know who the other witness was, named Greenberry Hill. There has been found absolutely no evidence among the records of Moses Hill's family of any Greenberry Hill. Perhaps he was a brother to Moses Hill and Thomas Hill, the J.P. could be a brother or his father? Sarah Hill maybe the wife of Greenberry or Thomas Hill BUT Moses Hill, also had a daughter named Sarah Hill. Was Greenberry & Moses Hill related?

Because of the name Greenberry.. suggest to me he was of a

Hill family who's origins were in Maryland. Now there was a Thomas Hill that lived in adjacent Union County, SC that was part of a Maryland family (Ref: Skip Hill's data). This Thomas Hill had a son Greenberry Hill that was born ca. 1790 in SC and died on the 22nd of June 1870. It is possible that these were the two men named as witnesses, but Greenberry Hill would only have been a boy of about 17 years old if it were him.

NOTE BY ROBERT HILL OF BRANDON, FL)

It is well known that Stephen Terry & wife Elizabeth Harrison Hill, filed a law suit in the Fairfield Court of Common Pleas, asking for the estate to be divided EQUALLY among all the heirs and they won their case. The reason why they filed the law suit is unknown. I suspect, based on the above list of property and the fact that Stephen Terry selected the appraisers, that the cause for the law suit was that the Terrys felt that they had not been treated as equally as some of the other heirs, also a son Littleon Hill had died and perhaps his share was not divided equally. It is true that the Terrys received only about half the value as did James and Moses B. Hill. The Terrys later moved to the vicinity of today's Atlanta, Ga. while the widow (Savilla Hill), her son, George W. Hill & family, daughter Rebecca Carlisle Hill DeGrraffenreid and family moved to Greene County, Ala. mother and daughter, Elizabeth Terry, seems to have retained

no hard feelings as Savilla willed a slave to her daughter, Elizabeth Terry.

I desire that my executors herein after named, shall from money due me and the proceeds of my crops an the cotton that I have on hand pay all my just debts and the balance, should there be a balance, to be approximated as herein after set forth and should there not be enough to pay all just debts, my sons J.T. HILL (John Thompson Hill) and G.W. Hill (George Washington Hill) and JAMES H. SCAIFE and MR. G. B. SCAIFE (Green Berry Scaife) are to each to make up one third the amount that as JAMES H. and M.G.B. SCAIFE is recognized to make up one third this amount for that purpose. (NOTE: JAMES H. SCAIFE & M.G.B. SCAIFE, Moses Green Berry Scaife, were two grandsons).

2ND... I give and bequeath to my wife SUSANNAH (GLENN) HILL my dwelling house, household and kitchen furniture, my carriage and a pair horses or mules, THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS in cash and in case there is not enough left after paying my debts to make this amount, J.T. HILL and G.W. HILL is each to make up one third this amount and JAMES H. and M.G.B. SCAIFE is to make up the other one third for her and in case this amount should prove insufficient to support her, the parties before mentioned, shall out of their share (herein) after set forth, make up the amount in ratio, as above specified and an old Negro woman named VASTI and at the decease of my wife, the said VASTI is to go to those of my sons or grandsons she may please and they must support and take care of her during her life.

WHOMEVER shall keep the horses or mules shall be entitled to those work for their feed and care and my wife can do as she pleases with the carriage and horses or mules at her desires. The dwelling house is to go at her decease to

G.W.HILL and the household and kitchen furniture is to be disposed of as herein after mentioned and should there be any balance of the three thousand dollars left at the decease of my wife, it must be divided one third to J.T. HILL, one third to G.W. HILL and one third to JAMES H. and M.G.B. SCAIFE.

3RD... I give and bequeath to my grandsons JAMES H. and M.G.B. SCAIFE the following Negroes, Jack and his family, Jackson and his family, Dafney and her family, Eliza and her two children, making twenty seven Negroes in numbers. These Negroes together with others given to C.T. SCAIFE, years ago for the benefit of my grandsons, I give in this way if JAMES H or M.G.B. SCAIFE die without children, the other brothers or children of these other brothers is to have all and in the event that neither of them shall have any living child or children then the said Negroes together with their increase, are to descend to my sons J.T. HILL and G.W. HILL or their child or children, the child or children representing their father and in case that my sons J.T. HILL and G.W. HILL shall have deceased and have no living child or children, why ? then it is to go to the child or children of either. ????? I also give and bequeath to JAMES H and M.G.B. SCAIFE each a fine horse, bridle and saddle to be purchased for them out of the funds of my estate by my executors herein after named.

I give and bequeath to M.G.B. SCAIFE my blacksmith tools and all my stock, cattle, horses, mules, hogs-grain, fodder, farming implements and at the death of my wife, one third of the household and kitchen furniture and should there by any money remaining of the three thousand dollars given her, they are to have one third the amount and after paying all my debts and approximating the three thousand dollars for my wife, should there be any found left, they are to have one third of that amount and after paying my just debts, my executors herein after named shall not have found sufficient to make the three thousand dollars for my wife, why then JAMES H. and M.G.B. SCAIFE shall make up out of their share given them, one third the amount. I also give and bequeath to JAMES H. and M.G.B. SCAIFE each FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS, to be paid (BY??) G.W. HILL.

HILL to commence on J.P.Sartor's line at the intersection of new ground fence, thence said new ground fence across the creek thence to out (1 or 2 words not legible) fence, thence from the (commenioer??) without said fences straight down to a holler thence up the Means??Swamp?? of said holler to Pesickney Road thence straight to the corner of Heminway's Old Field, thence along the edge of said old field to the Blanton Road, cornering on a Turkey?? Oak, thence the said road to the crossing of Railroad, thence up said railroad to where it intersects

J.L.S. HILL'S (James Leslie Stewart Hill, a nephew). And I also give and bequeath to him one third of my stock, cattle, horses, mules, hogs, grain, fodder, farming tools and at the decease of my wife, one third the household, kitchen furniture and also one third of the funds left after paying my debts, should there by any and one third of the money remaining from the three thousand dollars given to my wife, at her decease, and after the payment of my debts. Should there not be funds enough to make this three thousand dollars for my wife, why then G.W.Hill shall make up one third of the amount out of his share now the condition of the above gift is that the property, both personal and real, including that given off before, is to remain the said G.W. Now the condition of the above gift and of this property here to fore given to him is this; that the property both real and personal is to remain (to) the said J.T. HILL and his child or children and should said J.T. HILL die and leave no living child or children, then the said property to descend to G.W. HILL and his child or children and JAMES H and M. G. B. SCAIFE and their children, that is G.W. HILL one half and then SCAIFE or SCAIFES the other half. And I also give and bequeath to J.T. HILL one thousand dollars, to be paid by G.W. Notes of explanation by Robert Hill: J.L.S. Hill was James Leslie Stewart Hill, son of Moses Berry Hill and brother of James Hill. Charner Terry Scaife had married Elizabeth Hill, youngest child of James Hill. She died very young in delivering her last child and they were the parents of James H. (Hill) Scaife and M. G. B. Scaife, Moses Green Berry Scaife).

Charner Terry Scaife and James Hill were known to operated a store in Fish Dam (today's Carlisle) S.C. in Union County and Scaife is listed in 1850 Census as a resident of Chester County. He too was a wealthy planter and slave owner. He is also the same man who administered the estate of Nathan Barrett Hill, who was the son of Thomas Hill and Jemima Woodward. Thomas Hill was the oldest brother of James Hill and Moses Berry Hill. (IN other words, G.W. Hill, J.T. Hill, J. L.S. Hill all mentioned in this will were cousins to Nathan Barrett Hill).

In other words Edward Pickett Mobley was the father in law to John Thompson Hill 3/.

M.025 GENEALOGICAL DATA RELATING TO THE GLENN FAMILY & WHOSE DAUGHTER MARRIED MOSES BERRY HILL, A SON OF MOSES HILL & SAVILLA RODEN.

Nathan Glenn was the son of James Glenn of Hanover County Virginia. Nathan was born ca. 1735 in Hanover County Virginia and died in Union County S.C. in 1805. He moved from Hanover County to Cumberland County Virginia, where he married Lucy Coleman on 24 May 1756. Lucy was the daughter of Daniel Coleman II and his wife Patience Elliott of Cumberland County (formerly Goochland County).

Nathan was willed 350 acres of land in Cumberland County Virginia by his father James, part of the 1000 acre tract that James purchased in 1739. In 1771 Nathan bought an additional 200 acres on Great Guinea Creek in Cumberland County from William Basham of Bedford County Virginia. One of the adjoining landowners was a brother, James Glenn, who also moved to Chester County S.C. The deed was witnessed by Matt Sims, Nathan's brother in law.

Nathan Glenn, Daniel Coleman and George Wright, all kinsmen, were serving as vestrymen of LITTLETON PARISH in Cumberland County Virginia in 1772. (NOTE BY R. HILL...Moses Hill named

a son Littleton Hill and naturally there is some Speculation on my part as to this being the source of that name).

In 1777 Nathan conveyed by deed of gift 200 acres on Great Guinea Creek to his son in law Byrd Bowker, the same being the land where Bowker "now lives," and again showing brother James Glenn as an adjacent land owner. Both Nathan & James Glenn served in the Revolution in Virginia; they were lieutenants in the Cumberland County Militia.

In 1783 Nathan's brother in law, David Hopkins of Chester County S.C., signed a bond for 1000 pounds sterling "unto Nathan Glen of Virginia, Cumberland County" for a 250 acres tract and a grant of 1000 acres "when he received it...lying above and below the Fishdam Ford on Broad River" in what is now Union County S.C.

In 1787 Nathan Glenn (now of) Union County S.C. bought 2 additional tracts of land, so Nathan and his family moved to S.C. sometime between 1783 and 1787, probably in 1784 or 1785.

He received 995 acre grant in 1793 from S.C. and is shown on the 1790 Census of Union County with five males and two females in his household and 28 slaves. His estate was entered into probate on 25 July 1805 in Union County S.C.

His children were:

Bernard Glenn (1757-1831) never married..served in the Revolution (in Va.) and never put in a claim for bounty land warrants or back pay for that service. After his death in 1831, his heirs, one sister and 18 nieces and nephews, filed claim, and it was through the names of those heirs that descendents of Nathan Glenn were able to definitely prove the names of Nathan's children and grandchildren.

Bernard Glenn moved to Union County S.C. lived on the Enoree River and is buried in a cemetery on the tract of land where he lived. He was a Justice of Peace, a member of the Union Library Society, a deputy surveyor, and he took an active interest in political activities. He served in the S.C. House of Representatives from 1806-1816 and records show him as being called CAPTAIN BERNARD GLENN.

Orano Glenn born ca. 1758, died after 1794, m. Major Bird Bowker in Cumberland Co. Va., moved to Union County S.C. They had 7 children, several of whom moved to Gadsden Co. Fla.

Patience Glenn, B.ca 1759, D. 1823, M. 1st her cousin Newton Hopkins of Chester County S.C., the son of David and Mary (Glenn) Hopkins. They had one daughter Mary T. N. Hopkins (1787-1849) who married Reuben Simms (1784-1840) and lived in Union County. Both are buried in Fishdam Cemetery. After the death of Newton Hopkins in the late 1700's his widow patience

married a second time to Colonel Benjamin Herndon (1749-1819) of Newberry County and had 3 more children, Lucy, John Newton and a child who died as an infant. Patience was the second wife of Colonel Herndon.

William Coleman Glenn (1761-1827) M. Elizabeth Wright (died 1854) on July 13th 1788 in Cumberland County Va. She was the daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth (McGeehee) Wright of Virginia. William Coleman and Elizabeth (Wright) Glenn moved to Union County and established their home on Tyger River, between Fishdam (Carlisle) and the Newberry County line near Whitmore. They had nine children. Both William C. and Elizabeth Glenn died in Union County and William C. is buried in the Glenn Cemetery near Carlisle and Elizabeth is probably buried there also, but her grave is unmarked.

Sytha Glenn (1762-1844) was the fifth child of Nathan and Lucy (Coleman) Glenn, married in 1782 Joseph Coleman. They moved from Cumberland County Va. to Union County S.C. around 1785 where Joseph died around 1806. They had 12 children. Sytha (Glenn) Coleman Married a second time to John Bowles, a revolutionary soldier who is also buried in the Fishdam Cemetery. There were no children by the second marriage.

Littleton Spilsby Glenn (1763-1830) was the sixth child of Nathan and Lucy (Coleman) Glenn, Married his cousin Sarah Bowles Glenn, the daughter of James and Elizabeth (Bowles) Glenn of Chester County S.C. Spilsby and Sarah Glenn lived on Broad River at Fishdam and Spilsby is buried in Fishdam Cemetery. Census records indicates that his father Nathan lived with him during Nathan's latter years. Spilsby owned many acres of land around Fishdam and he and his partner James Thomas, operated a ferry at Fishdam for many years. In 1791 the Union County court "ordered that Spilsby Glenn be the overseer of the road from Fishdam Ford from Broad River to Ninety-Six Road that leads to Hamilton's Ford on the Tyger River to Cain Creek and that he keep the same in good repair." It was Spilsby and his father Nathan that gave the land for the Fishdam Meeting House, one of the first Methodist Churches in the area.

In 1843, when his sons James B. and John F. Glenn sold the land to A. V. Jeter, they accepted "two acres around the Fishdam Meeting House and Burying ground." By the time that Spilsby and Sarah Glenn married, all of the Glenns were attending the Methodist Church since there were no Episcopal Churches in the South Carolina "back country," and they were all staunch supporters of Methodism— there were several Methodist ministers in the family.

Spilsby wife Sarah died during the decade ending in 1810 since she is not shown on the 1810 census. On October 24th, 1830 when he was 67 years old Spilsby was stricken while attending church at Fishdam Meeting House and died before

they could get him home.

Spilsby and Sarah had 3 children John Faut Glenn (1803-1862) M. his cousin Jane S. C. Glenn and moved to Mississippi in 1843; James Blanton Glenn who married first Eliza Lyles and second her sister Frances Lyles, the daughters of Ephraim and Frances Foote Lyles; and Mary Bowles Glenn (1797-1864) who married Moses Berry Hill (1795-1824), the son of Moses and Savilla (Roden) Hill of Fairfield county S.C.

After Moses B. Hill's early death, his widow married a second time to John Johns. There were 4 children by the first marriage to Moses B. Hill. They were James Leslie Stewart Hill, Mary Glenn Hill, Sarah Savilla Hill and Moses Hill, all of whom moved to Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas.

Daniel Glenn was the seventh child of Nathan and Lucy (Coleman) Glenn. He was born in 1764 and died in 1821 in Union County. He is buried in the Glenn cemetery near Carlisle. He married Elizabeth Stokes, the daughter of Colonel Stokes of Chester County (one source states his wife was Jency Plyler). He had 2 known children, Lucy C. Glenn who married Dr. James Meacham; and Bernard Glenn (1795-1824) who married his cousin Mary Hopkins the daughter of George W. and Martha Hopkins. His widow (Mary) married a second time to Samuel McAliley of Chester County S.C. Bernard Glenn and Mary had 3 children: Daniel Wade Hopkins Glenn, David George W.H. Glenn and Mary T. W. Glenn.

Alexander Glenn (1765-1826) eighth and youngest child of Nathan and Lucy (Coleman) Glenn married Anna Sims, and lived first in Union County where he was a business partner with his brother Bernard (Union County records called them merchants). In 1825 Alexander sold 450 acres near the Fishdam on the Broad River to his brother Spilsby, land described as "given to me by my father." He seems to have moved to Laurens County S.C. about that time where his will was probated on 5th June 1826. His daughter Nancy was his sole heir and in case of her death to "either of here children."

Alexander and his wife Anna are buried in a family cemetery 5 miles south of Clinton S.C. Their daughter Nancy was born in 1806, married Dr. Hezekiah Rice who was the son of Hezekiah and Mary Saunders Rice, who were born in Virginia and died in Union County.

In 1808 in Laurens County S.C. Reuben Glenn named Alexander Glenn as the sole executor of his will in which he willed his entire estate to his wife Elizabeth, who probably was the daughter of Bird and Orano (Glenn) Bowker of Union County. Reuben may have been the son of Alexander Glenn.

M.026 GENEALOGICAL INFORMATION ON GEORGE WASHINGTON HILL, OF UNION CO., S.C. & SON OF JAMES HILL, & GRANDSON OF MOSES & SAVILLA HILL (PROVIDED BY JEANNETTE CHRISTOPHER).

George Washington Hill was born on May 5th 1822 in Fishdam (Carlisle) Union County S.C. and was the son of James Hill and Susannah (Glenn) Hill. He was a grandson of Moses & Savilla Hill. George was a graduate of South Caroliona College (now University of S.C.) and was a Latin & Greek Scholar, as well as a very able historian. He was greatly interested in genealogy, and it was he who preserved much of the history of his family by making note of the family relationships. He was offered a position teaching at the South Carolina College but turned it down to come home and help his elderly father with the extensive farming operations.

In his will, James Hill specified that George was to receive the homeplace which included 2250 acres of land and the house "HILLSIDE." George was a Confederate veteran and was serving in the office of the quartermaster in Columbia when the city was burned by Sherman's troops towards the end of the war. The burning of the city made a great impression on him, and as long as he lived he entertained his family and friends with tales of the things that he saw during that catastrophe.

When the war was over he returned to "Hillside" and farmed until his death on May 3, 1909. He was twice married and is buried in Fishdam Cemetery with both of his wives and most of his children and grandchildren.

George W. Hill married first on October 15, 1851 to Sarah Young, born August 2, 1832, died March 12, 1862. She was the daughter of Dr. C.C. Young of Union County. Notice of their marriage appeared in the October 28, 1851 issue of the "Unionville Journal."..."Married on the 15th instant by Rev. Thomas Young, Mr. George W. Hill to Miss Sallie Young, daughter of the late Dr. C.C. Young." Dr. Young died in 1850 while his daughter Sallie was a student at Salem Academy, a well known school for girls operated by the Moravians of Winston-Salem, N.C. George W. & Sallie Hill had three children:

M.027 GENEALOGY DATA ON THE JAMES HILL FAMILY (BY JEANNETTE CHRISTOPHER). THIS ALSO INCLUDES GENEALOGY OF THE GLENN FAMILY OF VA. & S.C.

James Hill was born in Fairfield County, South Carolina on November 21, 1782. He was the (2nd child) and son of Moses Hill, who died in Fairfield County on 1st July 1821, aged 63, and Savilla (Roden) Hill, who died in Greene County Alabama

in 1844, to which place she had moved with her son George Washington Hill and several other members of her family. She was born in 1759 and was the daughter of Thomas Roden and Mary (Potts) Roden of Chester County S.C. but originally of Maryland.

On June 120th, 1806, James Hill married Susannah Glenn, the daughter of James and Elizabeth (Bowles) Glenn of Chester County. James and Susannah Hill moved to Fishdam (Carlisle) in Union County where they lived for the rest of their lives. They built a log barn, which is still standing, and a big log house in which they lived for several years. Eventually they built their permanent home, a large two-story white house on top of a high hill, just north of the present town of Carlisle. Construction of the house required several years and it was completed during the 1820's. Named HILLSIDE for the family, and also because of its site, the house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is presently owned and occupied by Jeannette May Christopher (compiled of this data) a great-granddaughter of James & Susannah Hill. Mrs. Christopher's children are the fifth generation of the same family to occupy the house.

James Hill bought many tracts of land, farmed extensively, and supported the Methodist Church, both financially and spiritually. At one time he and his son in law, CHARNER T. (TERRY) SCAIFE, owned a store in the Fishdam area, which was known as the firm of HILL & SCAIFE. (SEE NOTE BELOW). He shipped his cotton by boat down Broad River to Columbia and Charleston where it was exported to England and New England by the cotton factor who handled it for him. Once or twice a year he would make trips "down country" (Charleston) to settle up with the firm that represented him and to buy supplies for the coming year. The only foods purchased were items that could not be raised on the farm-coffee, tea, sugar, salt. Cotton and wollen materials were woven at home, but he always brought back fancy materials and trimming for his wife and daughters--velvet, silk, satin ribbons, lace, fancy buttons and an occasional piece of jewelry. And needles-many needles! Items for use on the farm including coils of rope, balls of twine, bars of iron and barrels of tar. He subscribed to newspapers and bought books-he had a sizeable library. He meticulously saved receipts of bills paid and the statements that he received from his cotton factors, which give interesting sidelights on the time period in which he lived.

NOTE: Reference made to James Hill's cotton exports...his older (deceased brother Thomas Hill) had a son named Nathaniel Barrett Hill, who operated a business with Mr. Charner Terry Scaife, the business partner of James Hill. This firm operated in Columbia & Charleston and is believed to be somehow tied in with the cotton business and while James Hill's and Scaife's store was known as HILL & SCAIFE,

indicating James was the senior partner, Nathan's business with Scaife was listed in Columbia & Charleston as "SCAIFE & HILL" indicating that Scaife was the senior partner.

Another point of interest...Nathan Hill was also part owner of a steamship line that operated from Columbia to Charleston and his partner in this adventure was Gilbert Stalker. This firm was known as "STALKER & HILL." IT is almost a certainty that they were involved with James Hill in the shipment of his cotton from Columbia down to Charleston.

Charner Terry Scaife, business partner (and son-in-law) of James Hill also was the administrator of the estate of Nathan Barrett Hill, who died on December 13th 1854.

Near his home he built the Fishdam Academy, a school for the education of his and his neighbor's children. In 1968 a gentleman then living in Houston, Texas, wrote that he owned a set of school books used by his great-grandfather as a student at the Academy. The books were inscribed "FISHDAM ACADEMY" on the inside cover and consisted of texts on Latin, Greek, mathematics, English grammar and spelling. The gentleman remarked in his letter that the Academy students received a good solid education considering the ground covered in the text books.

James and Susannah Hill were the parents of seven children of whom only three lived to maturity. Between 1823 and 1827 the four oldest children died as teen-agers, traditionally the victims of some type of fever that was prevalent in those years. James Hill died on October 27th, 1854, and Susannah lived less than a year after his death. She died on June 9th, 1855 and she and James and all of their children, except their son John Thompson Hill, are buried in Fishdam Cemetery. Their children were:

James Glenn Hill, born March 4, 1807 and died December 27th 1823.

Moses Greenberry Hill, born December 9, 1808 and died August 17, 1827.

Sarah Anderson Glenn Hill, born January 21, 1811, died December 12, 1827.

William Henry Harrison Hill, born August 27, 1813, died December 25, 1824.

John Thompson Hill, born February 13, 1816, died 1887, married first on July 5, 1842 to his first cousin, Elizabeth Pickett Mobley, the daughter of Edward Pickett Mobley and his aunt Harriet W. Hill of Fairfield County. Elizabeth (Mobley) Hill was born March 1, 1824 and died May 8th, 1854 and she is buried in Fishdam Cemetery. They had five children.

John Thompson Hill married a second time on July 29, 1862 to Mrs. Ann E. (Meng) Wallace (1828-1914), the daughter of C.S. & Mary Meng of Union County. She had several children by her first marriage and she and John Thompson Hill had three more children. Following his second marriage, John Thompson Hill moved to Union where he operated a store and real estate firm, known as "J.T. HILL & CO." (SEE NOTE BELOW) John Thompson Hill and Ann Hill are buried in Grace Methodist Churchyard Cemetery in Union.

Susannah Elizabeth Glenn Hill, born May 14, 1817 died July 28, 1838, married CHARNER T. (TERRY) SCAIFE, of Chester County. They made their home in Fishdam and had three sons, one of whom died in infancy. After Susannah Elizabeth's death, her husband married again and moved back to Chester County. Their two surviving sons, James Hill Scaife & Moses Green Berry Scaife, made their home with their grandparents, James & Susannah Hill, for many years.

George Washington Hill, born May 5, 1822 died May 3, 1909 (See data on George W. Hill)

GENEALOGY DATA OF THE NATHAN GLENN FAMILY (RELATES TO WIFE OF JAMES HILL....

NATHAN GLENN, Son of James Glenn of Hanover County, Virginia was born ca. 1735 in Hanover County Virginia and died in Union County S.C. in 1805. He moved from Hanover County to Cumberland County, Virginia where he married Lucy Coleman on May 24, 1756. Lucy was the daughter of Daniel Coleman (the 2nd) and wife Patience Elliott of Cumberland County Virginia (formerly Goochland County). Nathan Glenn was willed 350 acres of land in Cumberland County by his father James Glenn, part of the 1000 acre tract that James purchased in 1739. In 1771 Nathan Glenn bought an additional 200 acres on Great Guinea Creek in Cumberland County from William Basham of Bedford County, Virginia, and one of the adjoining land owners was Nathan's brother James Glenn (Jr.) who also moved to Chester County S.C. The deed was witnessed by Matt Sims, Nathan's brother in law.

Nathan Glenn, Daniel Coleman and George Wright, all kinsmen, were serving as vestry men of Littleton Parish in Cumberland County in 1772. In 1777, Nathan Glenn conveyed by deed of gift, 200 acres on Great Guinea Creek to his son in law Byrd Bowker, the same being the land where Bowker "now lives" again showing James Glenn as an adjoining land owner. Both Nathan & his brother James served in the Revolution in Virginia; they were Lieutenants in the Cumberland County Militia.

In 1783 Nathan's brother in law, David Hopkins of Chester County S.C, signed bond for 1000 pounds sterling "unto Nathan

Glenn of Virginia, Cumberland County" for a 250 acre tract and a grant of 1000 acres "when he received it...lying above and below the Fish Dam Ford on Broad River" in what is today Union County S.C.

In 1787 Nathan Glenn of Union County bought two additional tracts of land on Lower Fish Dam Creek from John McPherson, so Nathan and his family moved to S.C. sometime between 1783 and 1787, probably in 1784 or 1785.

He received a grant of 995 acres in 1793 from the State of S.C. and is shown on the 1790 Census of Union County S.C. with five males and two females in his household and 28 slaves. His estate was entered for probate on 25 July 1805 in Union Co., S.C.

Nathan and Lucy (Coleman) Glenn had the following children:

- 1. Bernard Glenn (1757-1831) never married. He served in the Revolution in Virginia and never put in a claim for bounty land warrants or back pay that was due him at the end of the war. After his death in 1831, his heirs, one sister and eighteen nieces and nephews, filed claim for the money and bounty land warrants, and it was through the names of those heirs that descendents of Nathan Glenn were able to definitely prove the names of Nathan's children and grandchildren. Bernard Glenn moved to Union County S.C., lived on the Enoree River, and is buried in a cemetery on the tract of land where he lived. He was a Justice of Peace, a member of the Union Library Society, a deputy surveyor, and he took an active interest in Union County political activities. He served in the S.C. House of Representatives from 1806 to 1816. In Union County records he was referred to as Captain Bernard Glenn.
- 2. Orano Glenn, born ca. 1758, died after 1794, married Major Bird Bowker in Cumberland County Va., moved to Union County S.C.. They had seven children, several of whom moved to Gadsden County, Florida.
- 3. Patience Glenn, born ca. 1759, died in 1823, married a first cousin Newton Hopkins of Chester County S.C., the son of David & Mary (Glenn) Hopkins. Newton and Patience (Glenn) Hopkins had one daughter, Mary T.N. Hopkins (1787-1849, who married Reuben Sims (1784-1840) and lived in Union County S.C.. both buried in Fish Dam Cemetery (Today's town is known as Carlisle). After the death of Newton Hopkins in the late 1700's, his widow Patience, married a 2nd time to Colonel Benjamin Herndon (1749-1819) of Newberry County S.C. and had three more children, Lucy Herndon, John Newton Herndon and a child who died in infancy.
- 4. William Coleman Glenn (1761-1827) married Elizabeth Wright (d. in 1854) on the 13th of July 1788 in Cumberland

County, Virginia. She was the daughter of Thomas & Elizabeth (McGeehee) Wright of Virginia. William Coleman & Elizabeth (Wright) Glenn moved to Union County S.C. and established their home on Tyger River, between Fishdam (Carlisle) and the Newberry County line near Whitmire. They had nine children (See William Coleman Glenn Family). Both William C. & Elizabeth Glenn died in Union County S.C. William Coleman Glenn is buried in the Glenn Cemetery near Carlisle, and Elizabeth is probably buried there also, but her grave is unmarked.

- 5. Sytha Glenn (1762-1844), the fifth child of Nathan & Lucy (Coleman) Glenn, married in 1782 to Joseph Coleman. They moved from Cumberland County Va. to Union County S.C. ca. 1785 where Joseph Coleman died ca. 1806. They had 12 children (See article on Joseph Coleman). Sytha (Glenn) Coleman married a 2nd time to John Bowles, a Revolutionary Soldier, who is buried in Fish Dam Cemetery. There were no children of the 2nd marriage.
- 6. Littleton Spilsby Glenn (1763-1830) 6th child of Nathan & Lucy (Coleman) Glenn, married his 2nd cousin Sarah Bowles Glenn, the daughter of James & Elizabeth (Bowles) Glenn of Chester County S.C. Spilsby & Sarah Glenn lived on the Broad River at Fish Dam (Carlisle) and Spilsby is buried in Fishdam Cemetery. Census records indicate that his father Nathan lived with him during Nathan's latter years. Spilsby owned many acres of land in the Fishdam area, and he and his partner, James Thomas, operated a ferry at Fish Dam Ford for many years. In 1791 the Union County Court "ordered that Spilsby Glenn be the overseer of the road from the Fish Dam Ford on Broad River to the Ninety Six Road that leads to Hamilton's Ford on the Tyger River to Cain Creek and that he keep the same in good repair." It was Spilsby and his father Nathan who gave the land for the Fish Dam Meeting House, one of the first Methodist Churches in the area. In 1843, when his sons James B. & John F. Glenn sold the land to V.A. Jeter, they excepted "two acres around the Fish Dam Meeting House and burying ground." By the time that Spilsby and Sarah Glenn married, all of the Glenns were attending the Methodist Church since there were no Episcopal Churches in the South Carolina "Back Country," and they were all staunch supporters of Methodism-there were several Methodist ministers in the family. Spilsby's wife Sarah died during the decade ending 1810 since she is not shown on the 1810 Census Records. On October 24, 1830, when he was 67 years old, Spilsby was stricken while attending church at Fish Dam Meeting House and died before they could get him home. Spilsby & Sarah Glenn had three children; John Faut Glenn (1803-1862) who married his cousin Jane S.C. Glenn and moved to Mississippi before 1843; James Blanton Glenn who married first Eliza Lyles and second Eliza's sister Frances Lyles, the daughters of of Ephraim & Frances Foote Lyles (see the Whitney-Lyles Connection in this Volume); and MARY BOWLES GLENN (1797-1864)

who married MOSES BERRY HILL (1795-1824), the son of MOSES HILL and SAVILLA (RODEN) HILL of Fairfield County S.C. After Moses B. Hill's early death, his widow remarried to John Johns. There were four children by the first marriage to Moses B. Hill; they were James Leslie Stewart Hill, Mary Glenn Hill, Sarah Savilla Hill & Moses Hill, all of whom moved to Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas.

- 7. Daniel Glenn, 7th child of Nathan Glenn and Lucy (Coleman) Glenn, was born in 1764 and died in 1821 in Union County S.C. He is buried in the Glenn Cemetery near Carlisle. He married Elizabeth Stokes, the daughter of of Colonel Stokes of Chester County S.C. (One source says that his wife was Jency Pyler). He had two known children...Lucy C. Glenn who married Dr. James Meacham and Bernard Glenn (1795-1824) who married his cousin M. Hopkins, daughter of George W. & Martha (Bowker) Hopkins. Bernard Jr.'s widow, Mary (Hopkins) Glenn married 2nd time to Samuel McAililey of Chester County S.C. She and Bernard Glenn Jr. had 3 children: Daniel Wade Hopkins Glenn; David George W.H. Glenn and Mary T.W. Glenn.
- 8. Alexander Glenn (1765-1826) youngest child of Nathan & Lucy (Coleman) Glenn married Anna Sims and lived first in Union County S.C., where he was a partner in business with his brother Bernard-in the Union County Deed Books they are called "Merchants." In 1825 Alexander sold 450 acres near the Fish Dam on Broad River to his brother Spilsby, land described as "given to me by my father." He seems to have moved to Laurens County S.C. about that time, and his will was probated in Laurens County on 5 June 1826. His daughter Nancy was his sole heir, and in the event of her death to "either of her children."

Alexander Glenn & his wife Anna are buried in a family cemetery 5 miles south of Clinton S.C. Their daughter Nancy (b. 1806) married Dr. Hezekiah Rice, who was the son of Hezekiah & Mary Saunders Rice, who were born in Virginia and died in Union County S.C. In 1808 in Laurens County S.C., Reuben Glenn named Alexander Glenn as sole executor of his will in which he willed his entire estate to his wife Elizabeth, who probably was the daughter of Bird & Orano (Glenn) Bowker of Union County S.C. Reuben may have been the son of Alexander Glenn.

M.028 TWO LETTERS TO ME FROM PROFESSOR THOMAS D. CLARK, OF 248 TAHOMA ROAD, LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY 40503, WHO PRESENTLY OWNS THE LAND IN FAIRFIELD COUNTY S.C. THAT MOSES HILL ONCE OWNED AND LIVED. IT GIVES A HISTORY OF THE PROPERTY.

Notes of Explination....In the early summer of 1986, my son and I visited the old homesite of MOSES HILL, which is

located in Fairfield County, in and area known as "Buckhead."

Moses Hill was the first person buried in the cemetery, which is located just east of the site of a small house. Buried by his side was a son, Littleton Hill, who died just prior to reaching manhood. His grave is maked by two stones (one at head, one at foot but no writings visible). This grave is beside that of his father's grave, Moses Hill.

Finding no one at the house, I left a note to the owner (unknown) and told him about my connection to Moses Hill and who once lived there. I gave him my name and address, left a few brief questions and asked him to write, which he did.

Below is the reply I received.

Mr. Robert R. Hill 631 S. Echo Drive Brandon, Fla. 33511

Dear Mr. Hill:

When I went down to the Trunwell Plantation (was home of Moses Hill) house next to the Younge Cemetery I found that Mr. Jack Coleman had placed your note on the desk in the house. We maintain that little house as an anchorage in which we have spent our summers, and as a base of management of our timberlands.

I have undertaken without full success to establish the succession of ownership of the Turnwell property. At the present time it contains 670 acres. I know that the original holding was much larger. I assume that MOSES HILL was living there at the time of his death.

There were two rather large plantation houses on the place. One just south of our present house was a two story log structure with large rooms and tall chimneys. It was very well furnished inside. There was a wide porch, and an extensive "L" which contained the kitchen, dining room, and maybe another room. There was a back porch.

I know that some of the past owners were ESTES and CLOWNEY. Once there was a horse cotton gin, maybe a store, and a post office. I have been told there was were nineteen tenant houses on the place. The 85 foot dug well is said to have been dug before the Revolutionary War. It is solidly sealed with round quartz and sand stones.

Spratt Clowney became deeply involved in debt, and literally

dredged the land growing cotton. He lost the place to the BLAIRS or BLAIR. They undertook to grow enough cotton to recover their loss, but were unable to do so. The land was mortgaged to the FEDERAL LAND BANK, and in 1931, my fatherin-law, W. W. Turner purchased it, and in 1957 it came into the possession of my wife Elizabeth Turner Clark. Today it is covered in lob-lolly pines.

I don't know whether you ask for this sort of information or not. I am sorry to have missed you.

Dear Mr. Hill:

I appreciate greatly your tremendously interesting report on what is now Turnwell Plantation. You gave me wonderful leads which I am going to follow up in the coming months. I of necessity have to be vague about history of the place. I walk over the land trying to visualize what has happened there. I do find from time to time fragments of chinaware, plow tools and other metal. Most of the things, however, are of the old cotton tenant farming days.

In your letter you mentioned another plantation house less than a quarter of a mile away on a second hill. The old open well was there until I had it filled, so were the old chimney places. I judge from what old timers told me that this, too, was a large double log house of the same type construction as the Hill place.

The old plantation house which stood near our present small house was of rather heavy construction. There was a deep cellar lined with large rocks. The two large rooms were of hewn log construction. There were two upstairs rooms divided by a hall. The downstairs log pens were also divided by a rather broad hall. All (of) the rooms were ceiled with heart pine lumber of 1 x 12 dimensions. The flooring was of narrow grooved heart pine. I rescued much of the ceiling material which I used in lining the playroom area of my house here in Lexington. Too, a good bit of original material went into the construction of our small house in S.C. I also made some pieces of furniture from the wood. There is a table in the S.C. house which reveals the rich heart properties of the

wood.

The old house had been badly abused by its tenants over the years. When I first knew it it was beyond repair. My wife and I greatly regretted this fact because we would have restored it.

I think that you would like to know that there are two remains on the place, along the drive way, which reflect something of the economy of the times. There are two pits, (the) remains of horse cotton gins. I am reasonably certain there go back to a very early period.

I believe I told you that on our adjoining Bolick tract is the site of the Battle of Mobley's Churchyard. From your letter I gather Moses Hill was at the time in Colonel Winn's Company which repulsed the Tories at this place. I am sure you saw the historical marker out at the entry off the state road.

I never cease to be amazed at things which turn up about the old place. When we leveled off the lawn around the house I began to find arrowheads. Then when we clear-cut and disced the land preparatory to planting pines, I began spotting sites where paleolithic natives had their work places, and I now have a right considerable number of ancient artifacts from that place. When I was there week before last, I found a dozen or more. There is a rather large unexplored mound on the bank of Little River.

Again, the history of land involves the intimate personal history of people. I think I am about as thoroughly acquainted with the lay of the land and its features as is possible for an individual to learn from surface observations. I wish I could get inside the human emotions and ambitions of the former owners. None I am sure have had greater affection for the land than my wife and I.

In answer to your questions about the drive way entrance and the stone pillars. The pillars were built I think within my memory. I am unable to say precisely where the old entry way was, except I know that it led directly up to the front of the house. The depression is still there. Just inside of the stone pillars and to the left, and at the entry of the field road, is a red spot worn bare over a century or more, I was told, of Negroes loafing there. I was told by old timers that I could heal over that scar. It has been difficult but I think I have done it. There was a very old tenant house near this spot. My impression, however, is that the drive way up to the house tied into the old Chester Road, down below the present gate. The plantation store stood about one hundred yards south of the gate.

The river (Little River) is approximately a half mile from

the house. By a straight line the site of Mobley's Churchyard is about a mile plus.

I should tell you that there is a rather extensive slave graveyard back of the fenced in Younge Cemetery. I have taken every possible legal step to protect it. Too, on the south bank of Little River, directly south of the house, about a half miles plus, is a second Younge Cemetery, containing approximately twenty graves.

I am sorry that I have to be so vague about the history of our place. I am very anxious to do some searching myself and establish as clear a record as possible. The land is in loving hands with a fair degree of assurance that it will pass down to our heirs intact and in good state of preservation.

P.S.

I forgot to mention above the fact that the 85 foot dug well is still there. I used it until the local water line was extended up to our mail box. I was told the well was dug before the American Revolution. Anyway it never seemed to be effected by the conditions of the weather-dry or wet. Too, the old tree directly in front of the house is a laurel oak and I have never been able to establish it's age beyond a century at least. The barn stood directly in front of our present house, about two hundred feet to the west. It rested on very heavy rock corners, and was partly of log construction.

FIRST OF ALL, MY COMMENTS.....

The following are my conclusions, based on what I have read from the following documents, plus the information Mrs. Christopher gave me from the remains of a bible, thought to

have once belonged to Moses Hill... Since in that bible, Mary Heyll (Hill) was called coz (cousin) and was SAID TO BE THE WIFE OF CHARLES C. HILL, I think that Charles C. Hill was actually the cousin, to Moses Hill (thus his wife was also called cousin as was often the case in my own family). It therefore appears to me that if Charles C. Hill was a cousin to Moses Hill, this means that the father of Moses Hill and the father of Charles C. Hill were probably brothers. While this is speculation at this time it does offer possibilities, especially when considering the following land sales. Of course the question is... was it Charles C. Hill Sr. or Jr.?? I think it was Charles C. Hill JR. that is the suspected cousin to Moses Hill. IF SO THEN THE FATHER OF CHARLES HILL SR. WAS A BROTHER OF THE UNKNOWN FATHER TO OUR MOSES HILL...

I AM OF THE OPINION THAT OUR MOSES HILL AND LEONARD HILL WERE BROTHERS TO THE THOMAS HILL (WIFE JUDITH) WHO IS INVOLVED BELOW... I THINK THE FAMILY ORIGINATED FROM EITHER PENNSYLVANIA OR MARYLAND.

- 2. The remains of that bible record Jeannette told me about and the records I have showing Leonard Hill's land deed signed by Moses Hill.

(In other words the 3 men seem to be connected). This is the very same Thomas Hill (wife Judith & who bought Leonard Hill's land) that later buys the land that once belonged to Charles Hill Sr., William A. Hill, who sold to Joseph Rogers. His son, Richard Hill inherited the land (or the mortgage) and when Joseph Rogers died, resold it to Jane Rogers, who sold to Shadrick Knowland and then he to Thomas Hill...

COPY OF BIBLE RECORD OBTAINED BY JEANNETTE CHRISTOPHER AND GIVEN TO ME...

In the remains of a page from the family bible of Moses Hill of Fairfield County, (wife Savilla Roden), it states the following... "Coz (Cousin) Mary Heyll (Hill) departed this life on the 7th June in the year of our Lord 1827- the wife of CHARLES C. HEYLL (HILL). The hand writing (according to Mrs. Christopher) appears to be of a young girl. Since Mary

is referred to as Cousin, it is believed that Charles C. Hill was a cousin of Moses Hill, or definitely related somehow.

Now we know that Charles C. Hill had a wife named Mary. A Charles Hill Sr. (Charles C. Hill Sr. ?) purchased land in Fairfield County by lease and release from John Griffin, who obtained the original land grant in 1759. (Reference DEED BOOK L, Page 146, dated 17th June 1765.

HISTORY OF THE LANDS INVOLVED

I HAVE REARRANGED THE FOLLOWING ACCORDING TO DATES SO THAT THEY APPEAR IN A CHRONOLOGICAL ORDER ...

(REFERENCE GEORGE HILL'S BOOK, PAGE 115) WILLIAM HILL RECEIVED A LAND GRANT OF 100 ACRES ON BOWERS MILL CREEK, "ALL SIDES VACANT." SIGNED JOHN GASTON D.S. 13TH AUGUST 1762.

THEN WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL WAS GRANTED 100 ACRES ON N PRONG OF WATEREE CREEK ON 4TH SEPTEMBER 1764. (REF: GEORGE HILL'S BOOK, PAGE 113).

IT APPEARS THAT CHARLES HILL SR. OBTAINED (HE BOUGHT IT) LAND IN CRAVEN COUNTY S.C. (FAIRFIELD DISTRICT) ON NORTH PRONG OF WATEREE CREEK FROM JOHN GRIFFIN ON 17TH JUNE 1765. ORIGINAL GRANT TO JOHN GRIFFIN IN 1759. (REF: DEED BOOK L, PAGE 146, FILED 13 MAY 1798), (THIS SEEMS TO IMPLY THAT THE FATHER CHARLES HILL SR. BOUGHT THIS LAND AFTER HIS SON WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL WAS GRANTED HIS 100 ACRES, WHICH WAS ADJACENT LAND. NOTE THAT WILLIAM A. HILL ALREADY WAS GRANTED ANOTHER PIECE OF LAND ON BOWERS MILL CREEK IN 1762, SOME 3 YEARS PRIOR TO THIS....

IN 1768... A CHARLES HILL WAS GRANTED 100 ACRES ON NORTH PRONG OF WATEREE CREEK... "ADJOINING THE LAND OF WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL AND CHARLES HILL SR."

GEORGE HILL'S BOOK (PAGE 114) SHOWS THAT IN FAIRFIELD DEED BOOK C, PAGE 101, (NO DATE OF DEED) BUT RECORDED IN 1789, "BETWEEN CHARLES HILL AND WIFE MARY TO PHILLIP RAIFORD. (I ASSUME THIS WAS LAND BEING SOLD AND IT APPEARS TO ME TO BE THE SAME CHARLES C. HILL AND WIFE MARY THAT IS REFERRED TO AS "COUSIN" IN THE MOSES HILL BIBLE.

AGAIN IN GEORGE HILL'S BOOK (PAGE 114) IT SHOWS THAT IN 1792 CHARLES HILL AND WIFE MARY SOLD LAND TO T. DEVILE? ON 2ND OCTOBER 1792, ORIGINAL GRANT TO CHARLES HILL ON 28TH NOVEMBER 1771, 100 ACRES ON WATEREE CREEK, BOUNDED NW BY LANDS LAID OUT TO WILLIAM HILL, ON SOUTHWEST BY LANDS SURVEYED FOR CHARLES HILL SR., OTHER SIDES VACANT. 150 POUNDS CURRENT MONEY FOR 100 ACRES.

(I THINK THIS IS THE CHARLES C. HILL, AND WIFE MARY THAT IS CALLED COUSIN AND MENTIONED IN MOSES HILL'S BIBLE AND IS CHARLES C. HILL JR.. I AM OF THE OPINION THAT CHARLES HILL SR. DID NOT LIVE TO RECEIVE HIS LAND GRANT FOR 100 ACRES THAT IS MENTIONED ABOVE AND WAS LOCATED SOUTHWEST OF THE LAND FOR CHARLES C. HILL JR. (HIS SON).

GEORGE HILL'S BOOK (PAGE 113) REFERS TO THE APPEARANCE THAT CHARLES HILL SR. DIED PRIOR TO 26TH JULY 1797... (HE DIED IN LATE 1768 OR EARLY 1769) AND LEFT LAND TO HIS SON & HEIR WILLIAM THAT HE PURCHASED IN 1765 FROM JOHN GRIFFIN AND IN THIS DEED HE (WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL) CONVEYS THE LAND ON WATEREE CREEK TO ELY KERSHAW. (REFERENCE DEED BOOK L, PAGE 146, FILED 13 MAY 1798)

WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL HAD DIED PRIOR TO 5TH APRIL 1788 AND OBVIOUSLY THE LAND WAS TRANSFERRED OVER TO SON RICHARD HILL. THIS STATEMENT IS BASED ON THE FOLLOWING:

WILLIAM A. HILL SEEMS TO HAVE SOLD THE LAND ON BOWERS MILL CREEK FOR 100 POUNDS TO JOSEPH ROGERS. THE ACTUAL DATE OF THE SALE WAS NOT GIVEN IN GEORGE HILL'S BOOK BUT ON 5TH APRIL 1788 (BOOK B, PAGE 112 OF FAIRFIELD DEEDS) SHOWS FOLLOWING..

"CLERK OF COURT, WINNSBORO, FAIRFIELD COUNTY, 5TH APRIL 1788 BETWEEN RICHARD HILL AND AGNES, HIS WIFE, OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY AND JANE ROGERS, SPINSTER, AND WEAVER, GRANTED ON 13TH DAY OF AUGUST 1762--- DID GIVE UNTO WILLIAM HILL, PLANTER 100 ACRES ON BOWERS MILL CREEK. WILLIAM HILL, FOR 100 LBS. OF GOOD AND LAWFUL MONEY OF THE PROVINCE PAID BY JOSEPH ROGERS FOR 100 ACRES---AND RICHARD HILL DOTH GRANT AND GIVE JANE ROGERS A NEW RIGHT AND TITLE." Recorded in 1788.

I SUSPECT THAT JANE ROGERS WAS RELATED (A DAUGHTER OR SISTER) OF JOSEPH ROGERS, AND WHEN HE DIED, SHE BOUGHT THE LAND, AND THUS WAS GIVEN A NEW TITLE BY RICHARD HILL, SON OF THE DECEASED WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL.

JANE ROGERS IN TURN TRANSFERRED 50 ACRES OF THIS LAND TO SHADRACK NOLAN (KNOWLAND) ON 27TH SEPTEMBER 1788.

IMPORTANT NOTE: I DO NOT HAVE ALL OF THE LAND DEEDS BUT IT SEEMS THAT ORIGINALLY WILLIAM HILL MUST HAVE SOLD HIS 100 ACRE TRACT TO JOSEPH ROGERS (SUSPECTED BROTHER OF JANE ROGERS). TO ME, IT SEEMS THAT PERHAPS THE LAND WAS NOT PAID FOR FULLY AND JANE ROGERS PURCHASED THE 100 ACRES. TO ME IT SEEMS THAT WILLIAM A. HILL (WHO HELD THE MORTGAGE) DIED, LEAVING THE LAND TO HIS SON RICHARD HILL, AND THAT RICHARD HILL AND WIFE AGNES THEN GRANTED JANE ROGERS A NEW "RIGHT AND TITLE" FOR THE COMPLETE TRACT OR 100 ACRES. FAIRFIELD DISTRICT BOOK B, PAGE 112).

SHADRACK NOLAN (KNOWLAND) SOLD THE 50 ACRES OF THE LAND TO THOMAS HILL (WIFE JUDITH) ON THE 16TH MARCH 1790. THIS THOMAS HILL (WIFE JUDITH) IS THE SAME THOMAS HILL THAT PURCHASED LAND FROM LEONARD HILL (WIFE ELIZABETH) JUST BEFORE LEONARD MOVED TO KENTUCKY. I SUSPECT THOMAS AND LEONARD WERE BROTHERS OF MOSES HILL.

THOMAS HILL (WIFE JUDITH) THEN SOLD THE LAND BACK TO JAMES KNOWLAND IN 1798... THAT DEED IS BELOW AND SHOWS WHICH OF THE THREE KNOWN THOMAS HILLS THAT WERE IN FAIRFIELD COUNTY IS THE ONE THAT BOUGHT THE LANDS THAT WERE ONCE OWNED BY CHARLES HILL, WILLIAM A. HILL, RICHARD HILL FAMILY THAT WAS SOLD INTO THE ROGERS, KNOWLAND FAMILY BEFORE RESELLING BACK TO JAMES KNOWLAND. IT ALSO SHOWS HE IS THE SAME ONE THAT BOUGHT LAND FROM LEONARD HILL...

THE FIRST LAND DEED

THIS IS A LAND SALE BY THOMAS HILL AND WIFE JUDITH OF FAIRFIELD CO, S.C. TO JAMES KNOWLAND IN 1798. IT WAS SIGNED BY MOSES HILL, WHO WAS A JUSTICE OF PEACE.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA) Know all men by these presents, that I THOMAS HILL of the County of Fairfield and State aforesaid, for and in consideration of ten (10) pounds sterling, to me paid by JAMES KNOWLAND of the state and county aforesaid, have granted, bargained and sold and released and by these presents, do hereby grant, bargain, sell and release unto the said JAMES KNOWLAND, all that parcel of land containing 50 acres be the same more or less being the South part of 100 acres which was granted to WILLIAM HILL but transferred from RICHARD HILL, son and heir of law of said WILLIAM HILL, to JANE RODGERS- also conveyed from JANE RODGERS unto SHADRACK KNOWLAND, the 27th day of September 1788, also conveyed from said SHADRACK KNOWLAND to THOMAS HILL, the 16th day of March 1790, said land situate on BOWERS MILL CREEK, in Craven, now Fairfield County, beginning on a stake? ALEXANDER CHESTNUT'S corner upon the West original line of the whole (land??) and running NORTH 71 (degrees?) EAST (?) LITTLE RIVER, to a small stream, thence up the small stream to the original EAST line, bounded by ALEXANDER CHESTNUT'S land, being part of the same survey, thence SOUTHWARD on the original line, to the original corner, thence WESTWARDLY on the original line (bounding?) It is possible that George Augustus Hill is also a son of Charles C. Hill, but have not found any definite proof, but the name "Augustus" would seem to offer that possibility.

William Augustus Hill was the son of Charles Hill SR., who

died in late 1768 or very early 1769 (Reference Fairfield DEED BOOK L, page 146). This shows that Charles Hill Sr. left land to son William Augustus Hill. William Augustus Hill was definitely the father of Richard Hill, who along with his wife Agnes, conveyed the above land to Jane Rogers, who conveyed land to Shadrick Knowland, and said Knowland sold to the above Thomas Hill and wife Judith.

SECOND DEED OF INTEREST THAT TIES LEONARD HILL IN WITH THE ABOVE THOMAS HILL...

IT APPEARS THAT SOME HOW THIS CHARLES HILL-WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL-RICHARD HILL FAMILY MAY HAVE TIES WITH THE MOBLEY FAMILY AS HEIRS OF WILLIAM HILL SOLD LAND ETC TO EDWARD MOBLEY... (REFERENCE ROLL C-300, VOLUME L, PAGES 170 AND 171 OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY DEEDS.... (I HAVE NOT CHECKED THIS OUT YET).

NOW, ANOTHER QUESTION.... WAS GEORGE AUGUSTUS HILL, (WIFE JANE) OF CHESTER COUNTY, S.C. RELATED TO THE ABOVE FAMILY OF HILLS? I THINK HE WAS A BROTHER TO WILLIAM AUGUSTUS HILL AND CHARLES HILL JR. GEORGE HILL IN HIS BOOK (PAGE 116) STATES IN 1790 CENSUS HE (GEORGE AUGUSTUS HILL) WAS LISTED OVER 16 YEARS OF AGE WITH 2 FREE WHITE FEMALES AND WAS SHOWN IN CHESTER COUNTY DEEDS AS FOLLOWS: (BOOK D, PAGE 133, FILED APRIL 1794)... (IF WHAT I UNDERSTAND IS CORRECT, A PERSON HAD TO BE 21 YEARS OF AGE FOR A LAND GRANT SO GEORGE MUST HAVE BEEN 21 IN 1774).

THE NAME OF BURRIL HILL IN FAIRFIELD COUNTY RECORDS IS ALSO QUITE INTERESTING...IN DEED BOOK N, PAGE 419, RECORDED 1802,

IT SHOWS BURRIL HILL OF RUTHERFORD COUNTY, N.C. SELLS TO ANDREW MCDOWELL, OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY, 100 ACRES OF LAND ORIGINALLY GRANTED TO CHARLES HILL ON 23RD OF JUNE 1774.

GEORGE HILL (in his book) SAYS THAT IN THE 1790 CENSUS OF N.C. (RUTHERFORD COUNTY) A BURRELL, WILLIAM (2) AND A GEORGE HILL ARE PRESENT.

WHEN BRENT HOLCOMB RESEARCHED FOR ME, HE WROTE ME IN A LETTER THAT A THOMAS HILL OF VIRGINIA BOUGHT LAND (I THINK IN SURRY OR SUSSEX CO.) FROM A BURWELL HILL OF EITHER CRAVEN OR CAMDEN DISTRICT) IN S.C. AND ALSO THAT A BURWELL HILL FOUGHT IN REVOLUTION IN S.C. (I can not find the letter right off hand).

THIS LAND WAS RESOLD TO ZACHARIAH WHITE "BY THOMAS HILL" OF FAIRFIELD DISTRICT SOUTH CAROLINA ON 28TH NOVEMBER 1793. (THOMAS HILL SIGNED HIS NAME TO THIS SALE.) REFERENCE TO THE SALE IN BOOK C 2, PAGE 261.

NOTE: Now obviously this Thomas Hill was not the son of Moses Hill as that Thomas (my ancestor) was born in 1780 and was only 13 years old when a Thomas Hill resold the above land to Zachariah White.

IT APPEARS THAT SOME HOW THIS HILL FAMILY MAY HAVE TIES WITH THE MOBLEY FAMILY AS HEIRS OF WILLIAM HILL SOLD LAND ETC TO EDWARD MOBLEY... (REFERENCE ROLL C-300, VOLUME L, PAGES 170 AND 171 OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY DEEDS.... (I HAVE NOT CHECKED THIS OUT YET).

NOTE: SOMEWHERE IN MY FILES I HAVE A COPY OF A TAX LIST FROM FAIRFIELD COUNTY SHOWING THAT IN 1793 A THOMAS HILL WAS ON THE ROLLS AND A THOMAS HILL SR. WAS TOO BUT BY HIS NAME WAS WROTE THE WORD "DECEASED"....I JUST CAN NOT FIND IT RIGHT NOW, BUT SOMEHOW I SEEM TO THINK HE HAD DIED IN 1792.....

Whereas Stephen Terry and Elizabeth, his wife, lately sued out of the Court of Common Pleas, a summons in petition for the purposes of effecting a division and partition of the real (land?) estate of Moses Hill, deceased, lying and being in the district of Fairfield, on the waters of Little River, containing upwards of eight hundred (800) acres, composed of several different grants and conveyances (viz) one indicated deed from THOMAS MEEKS to MOSES HILL, for one hundred acres, more or less, on Phillips Branch of LITTLE RIVER, bounded on all sides by vacant land when surveyed, beginning on a white oak and running South 25 (degrees?) East 34 (degrees?) 62 links of chains to a staked corner, bounded by land laid out to THOMAS WILLIAMS, thence South 62 West 31 (degrees?) 62 links of chains to a staked corner, bounded on lands of JAMES BUTLER, thence North 25 West 31 and 62 links of chain to a white oak, thence North 65 East 31 (and) 62 (links of chains?) to the white oak corner, on lands of WILLIAM JONES -one other tract of land from JAMES BUTLER to MOSES HILL for two hundred and fifteen acres, lying on the Northeast side of BROAD RIVER, on branches of the South (East?) fork of LITTLE RIVER, beginning on a post oak, original corners and corner of land granted to WILLIAM PHILLIPS, then South 35 East 18 (degrees?) on the original line to a red oak, bounded by lands of WILLIAM PHILLIPS, thence South 54 West 15 to a stake, thence South 37 East 62 (degrees?) 50 links of chains, to a staked corner, bounded by ANDREW YOUNG'S land, thence NW (not legible) to a staked corner, bounded by lands of (WOODWARD ?) HILL, administrator, and GEORGE W. HILL, administrator of all and singular of MOSES HILL, deceased, EDWARD MOBLEY and HARRIET, his wife, and REBECCA C. HILL, by MOSES B. HILL and GEORGE W. HILL, administrators of aforesaid children of the said MOSES HILL, deceased, which land on the death of MOSES HILL, deceased, descended to the said SAVILLA HILL, widow of MOSES HILL and the children above mentioned. AND WHEREAS the said STEPHEN TERRY and ELIZABETH, his wife, have prayed (for) the said court to grant or writ of partition, to be directed to certain commissioners, authorizing and requiring them to divide the said land (word not legible) between and among the parties aforesaid, so that you give one third to the widow aforesaid, and divide the other two thirds to the children of the said deceased (MOSES HILL)...SHARE AND SHARE ALIKE, so that they hold it in severality, as provided otherwise therein as by law directed. THEREFORE you are hereby authorized and commanded in you persons to go to and upon the lands and premises aforesaid, and after being first duly and solemnly sworn fairly and equally and impartially, to make partition and division of

the land aforesaid, then and there in the presence of ALL the parties by you to be (word not legible but appears to be warned??) if they would be present, the said land with the buildings, premises and other appurtenances there unto belonging respect ???being had to the true value thereof to allot share and divide in the manner following TO WIT our third part thereof to the widow of MOSES HILL, deceased, and the other two thirds, to the heirs and legatus above mentioned of MOSES HILL, deceased, you caused to be divided and assigned to be held in severalty so that neither of the said parties have more of the inheritance of (right??) to them doth belong and that they their respective parts to them belonging may severally improve BUT if the said lands and premises cannot, in your opinion be fairly, equally and impartially divided between the said parties, in manner aforesaid, WITHOUT MANIFEST INJURY, to them or some of them, THEN, you are to make a special auction to the said court of the five severalty and guaranty? of the said land and the value thereof by you truly appraised and certify your opinions whether it will be worth for the benefit of all the parties concerned to the children above to one or more of them if the estate otherwise cannot be otherwise divided upon the payment of a certain sum of money by you to be appraised or to sell the same at PUBLIC AUCTION, and which you shall have made partition of the land and premises aforesaid OR a certificate of your opinion, respecting the same manner aforesaid. twelve (12) months, and the purchasers giving bond and approved reasonable security and a mortgage of the premises and that the proceeds their of be paid to the clerk of this court, subject to the order thereof. (order) this copy given to SHERIFF (word not legible) on the 19th November 1823 in Winnsboro (SC).

NOTE: THIS WAS THE JUDGE CONFIRMING THE COMMISSIONERS RECOMMENDATION TO SELL THE PROPERTY OF MOSES HILL AND EQUALLY DIVE THE PROCEEDS.

Notes by Robert Hill of Brandon, Fl.: Stephen Terry had married Elizabeth Harrison Hill, daughter of Moses Hill & Savilla Roden. Apparently they were not satisified with the distribution of the estate of Moeses Hill, thus the reason for this law suit.

Following from Perputal Calander: 22nd March 1822 was on a Friday. This was date this suit was filed with the courts.

On unknw date in November of 1822 the commissioner replied to the court & stated the estate could not be divided equally as was wished..

1st of July 1823 was on a Tuesday, the date that the appraisers (commissioners) appeared in court & made their final recommendations.

10th of November 1823 was on a Monday and was the date that the courts ordered the recommendations of the commissioners to divide the estate.

 M.032 INFORMATION ON OUR HILL FAMILY AND ALSO DATA PROVIDED FROM MRS. CHRISTOPHER REGARDING MOSES HILL & JUDITH E. STEWART, WIFE OF NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL, (OUR 2ND GREAT GRANDMOTHER).

Compiled by Robert R. Hill Sr. in June of 1986; updated in June of 1992.

Note by Robert Hill: There is quite a bit more details known on our family but I am only going to give highlights for now.

THE GENEALOGY OF OUR HILL FAMILY LINE:

Note: The day of week that the event took place was taken from the "Perpetual Calendar," issued by the Smithsonian Institution Press of Washington, D.C.

MOSES HILL 1/

Moses Hill 1/ (born ca. 1757 after 1st July 1757 or in 1758)... suspected to have been originally from Pennsylvania or Maryland. He was a Revolutionary Soldier in S.C., served two tours, (1780 and 1781) for a total of 120 days as a Private. He was a land surveyor and after the war was a Justice of the Peace. He was married to SAVILLA N. (NANCE?) RODEN. Moses Hill 1/ died on (Sunday) the 1st of July 1821 in Fairfield County, S.C. Their children (in order of birth) were:

- 1. Thomas Hill 2/, born 1780 (MY LINE) m. Jemima Woodward. He died between January & May of 1824
- 2. James Hill 2/, born on (Thursday) the 21st of November 1782, married on (Tuesday) the 10th June 1806 to Susannah Glenn. He died on (Friday) the 27th of October 1854 in Union Co., S.C.
- Sarah Caroline Hill 2/, born ca. 1785, married Rev. John Pearson.
- 4. Littleton Hill 2/, born ca. 1790, he died after 1810 census, was in his late teens and never married.
- 5. Elizabeth Harrison Hill 2/, born on (Tuesday) the 29th of January 1793, m. Stephen Terry on (Tuesday) the 4th of July 1809. She died in Georgia on (Monday) the 3rd of December 1838.
- 6. Moses Berry Hill 2/, born 1795 m. Mary Bowles Glenn. He died on (Thursday) the 14th of October 1824.
- 7. Harriet Windham Hill 4/, born on (Friday) the 5th of March 1802, married Edward Pickett Mobley. She died on (Thursday) the 30th of April 1857.
- 8. George Washington Hill 4/, born in September 1803, married Sarah A. Moore. He died on (Tuesday) the 8th of September 1857.

9. Rebecca Carlisle Hill 4/, born on (Sunday) the 20th of December 1807, married Dr. John Trezevant DeGraffenreid (M. D.) on (Tuesday) the 25th of March 1828. She died on (Thursday) the 11th of August 1842 in Greene County, Alabama.

The son Thomas Hill 2/ lived and died in Fairfield County between January & May of 1824.

The son James Hill 2/, became a large and wealthy plantation owner in Union County, S.C. His home is still standing today (1993) and Mrs. Jeannette Christopher (his great granddaughter) lives there.

The son Littleton Hill 2/ died in his late teens without ever marrying. He is buried by his father in an unmarked grave.

The daughter Elizabeth Harrison Hill 2/ and her husband had twelve children. They moved to Georgia, in the area of today's Atlanta. The Atlanta Historical Society states that the husband Stephen Terry built the first commercial hotel there and also helped with the first water works.

The son Moses Berry Hill 2/ was a surveyor, lived and died in Chester County but at his death, he was taken by his brother James Hill 2/ and buried in his family plot in Carlisle, (Union Co.) South Carolina.

The daughter, Harriet Windham Hill 2/ and her husband lived their lives on their plantation known as "White Hall" near today's White Oak in Fairfield County.

The father, Moses Hill 1/, died on (Sunday) the 1st July 1821, (age 63 years.) and was buried on (Tuesday) the 3rd of July 1821 and is buried by the son (Littleton Hill) in the Younge Cemetery, near Buckhead in Fairfield County. This was once the site of Moses Hill's home and the cemetery was once the yard of his plantation.

After the father, MOSES HILL 1/ died in 1821, his family stayed on in Fairfield County, South Carolina until about April of 1831, when the children and their families began to move westward into Greene County, Alabama.

The wife and widow of Moses Hill 1/, SAVILLA RODEN, was born in 1759 in Virginia and died (AGE 85) on (Tuesday) the 23rd July 1844 and is buried in the Old Bigbee Cemetery near Pleasant Ridge, Alabama (Green County) beside her son George W. Hill and very close to her daughter, Rebecca Carlisle (Hill) DeGraffenreid.

The daughter Sarah (Caroline?) Hill 2/ married Rev. John Pearson, is believed to be buried here too but, the cemetery

is very badly overgrown with briars, bushes and some tombstones are buried in over 2 inches of silt. Her grave was not found.

THOMAS HILL 2/, (MY LINE)

Thomas Hill 2/ (born 1780 in Fairfield County, S.C.) was the oldest of eight children. He operated a store in the northwest corner of Fairfield County, just south of the Chester County line, where he also lived. He married about 1805 to Jemima Woodward, daughter of Rev. William Woodward & wife, Nancy Elizabeth Barrett. The children were (in order of birth)

- 1. Nancy Barrett Hill 3/, born on (Friday) the 4th June 1806. She 1st married Edward Mabry Mobley in 1825; 2nd marriage to William Price on (Thursday) the 27th of July 1847 in Alabama; Her 3rd marriage was on (Friday) the 4th of November 1853 to James H. Sims, She died in Sumter Co., Alabama after 1860 census.
- 2. Jemima Hill 3/, born ca. 1807-08, no other information.
- 3. Charlotte Louise Hill 3/, born on (Tuesday) the 8th August 1809, married Moses Cockrell in 1824, moved to Mississippi. She died on (Friday) the 28th October 1864.
- 4. Nathaniel Barrett Hill 3/, (MY LINE) born in 1811, married Judith Eliza Stewart about 1835-36, he died in NY City on (Wednesday) the 13th of December 1854.
- 5. William Woodward Hill 3/, born ca. 1812, m. a cousin Mary Glenn. She died young with no children. No other information found.
- 6. Savilla Hill 3/, born ca. 1813-1814, married ca. 1832 to Green B. Mobley, they moved Alabama. She died between 1839-1840. Appears to have had 3 children.
- 7. Moses Hill 3/, may have gone to Pickens Co., Alabama, no other information.
- 8. Thomas Hill (Jr.?) 3/. may be the Thomas Hill listed in the 1830 Census for Fairfield County, S.C., no other information.

Nancy Barrett Hill 3/ married 3 times, first to Edward Mabry Mobley, they first moved to DeKalb County, Georgia, then they moved to Green County, Alabama. Her 2nd marriage was to William Price Sr., and her 3rd marriage was to James H. Sims, the last two being in Alabama.

No information available on Jemima Hill 3/.

Charlotte Louise Hill 3/ married Moses Cockrell and they moved to Noxubee County, Mississippi.

Nathan Barrett Hill 3/ moved to Columbia. He was Sheriff in Richland District in 1848 until 1851 when he resigned in order to run and operate his own personal business. He was

part owner of a firm known as 'STALKER & HILL." He was also a member of the committee that pushed for "Withdrawal from the Union" that met in Charleston in the early 1850's.

William Woodward Hill 3/, moved to Mobile, Alabama.

Savilla Hill 3/ married Green B. Mobley and they moved to Green County Alabama. Census records for 1840 seems to show she had 3 children, a son and two daughters.

Moses Hill 3/ moved to Pickens County Alabama.

Thomas Hill 3/ is believed to have stayed on in Fairfield County.

The father, Thomas Hill 2/ died in Fairfield County between 7th January 1824 and May of 1824. The exact location of his grave has not been determined except it is safe to say it is somewhere in Fairfield County.

The mother and widow, Jemima (Woodward) Hill is said to have moved to Noxubee County with daughter Charlotte and died there ca. 1851. This has not been proven.

NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL 3/.

NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL 3/, was known in the family and friends as "Barrett" was the 4th of eight children, but eldest son. He was born in Fairfield County in 1811. He married JUDITH E. (ELIZA?) STEWART. (Her name is listed as Smith on the death certificate of her son but that is wrong!). She is said to have been the widow of a Frank McCu;;ough, but has not been proven. (If so, they apparently had no known children).

Nathan Hill 3/ usually signed business transactions as N. B. HILL or N. BARRETT HILL. Nathan Hill 3/ & Judith Stewart married in S.C. (Columbia) ca. 1835-1836. They had (in order of birth) the following children:

- 1. Woodward D. Hill 4/. my great grandfather.
- 2. William Stewart Hill 4/.
- 3. Eliza M. Hill 4/.
- 4. John Hill 4/ (killed in war at Petersburg, Va.)
- 5. Lawrence Barrett Hill (Lonnie) 4/.

All four sons fought in the Confederate Army in the 7th S.C. Volunteers, Infantry, Company "C." The son John Hill 4/ died in Richmond Army Hospital as a result from wounds received near Petersburg, VA. In 1864.

Nathan Hill 3/ was Sheriff of Richland County from November of 1848 till April of 1851 when he "resigned" due to

increasing personal business affairs. He was on the Board of Directors for the Bank of South Carolina, half owner of a steamship line (Stalker & Hill) that operated between Columbia and Charleston. His partner, Gilbert Stalker, died first. Nathan Hill later became partners in both Columbia and Charleston with Charner Terry Scaife, who married a daughter of his uncle, James Hill. Scaife also was administrator of Nathan's estate. This company was known as "SCAIFE & HILL COMPANY."

Nathan Hill 3/ took his family to New York City in 1854 but died very shortly after arriving. Nathan 3/ died on (Wednesday) the 13th December 1854 in New York City. Medical evidence seems to point to pneumonia as cause of death and he is known to have suffered from "gout."

The family preceded and returned by boat to Charleston. Nathan's body followed on another boat the next day, arriving on (Friday) the 22nd December 1854. His burial location is suspected to be in an unmarked grave in Elmwood Cemetery in Columbia but this has not been proven.

WOODWARD D. HILL 4/.

The name of Woodward, was often spelled as WOODARD in and among family members as well as on his death certificate, however his father spelled it as Woodward as does all census records. (NOTE: WOODARD is simply a distorted spelling of Woodward).

One family member (around 1900) stated and actually had his name entered in her records as THOMAS WOODWARD HILL (after his paternal grandfather (Thomas Hill 2/). This was a popular custom of the times BUT no other record has been found to show this name.

The fact is that a daughter, Beulah Hill 5/, stated that he had no middle name so he often used the last letter in his first name (viz: the letter "D") thus signed his name as W.D. HILL or Woodward D. Hill 4/. He was obviously named after his maternal grandmother's (Jemima Woodward's) side of the family. He fought in the civil war (CSA) and was injured in that war.

Woodward Hill 4/, was born in Columbia, S.C. on (Sunday) 10th of September 1837, married in what was then Lexington County, South Carolina in 1866 to SALLY ELIZABETH RUCKER. (This area became Calhoun County S.C. in 1908).

Census records state they had 11 children but two must have died as infants at a very early age because only 9 are known of. Woodward D. Hill died in Old Soldier's Home in Columbia, South Carolina on (Thursday) the 27th November 1919. He is buried in Calhoun County S.C. near Sandy Run, in

what is today the Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard. Their children were (in order of birth)

- Emma Cornelia Hill 5/, born on (Friday) the 14th February 1868 in what was then Lexington Co., S.C. She married Victor Bates, ca. 1887-88, she died on (Saturday) the 28th of September 1940 in the town of North, South Carolina (Orangeburg County).
- 2. Sally Elizabeth Hill 5/, born 18th February 1869 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Anson Price Dannelly ca. 1898, moved to Statesboro, Ga. She died there about 1918.
- 3. Nathaniel Barrett Hill 5/, (called "Barrett" and obviously named after his paternal grandfather) born on (Sunday) the 8th October 1871 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Mary Elizabeth Geiger, he was killed in logging accident on (Friday) the 1st of April 1927. Buried in Elmwood Cemetery in Columbia, S.C.
- 4. Peter Joseph Hill 5/, MY GRANDFATHER. He was born on (Saturday) the 31st of October 1874. He married Mary Jane Rickenbaker on (Friday) the 28th of December 1900, he died in Dec. of 1906 or January of 1907. Buried in Congaree Baptist Churchyard (today's Calhoun Co., S.C.).
- 5. James Franklin Hill 5/, born on (Sunday) the 13th of January 1878 in Lexington Co., S.C. he married Essie Isota Furtick on (Friday) the 13th of January 1903, he died on (Monday) the 21st March of 1950. Buried in Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.
- 6. William Woodward Hill 4/, born om (Friday) the 14th May 1880 in Lexington Co., S.C., he married Rosa Belle Meetze on (Thursday) the 21st of April 1910, he died on (Thursday) the 20th June 1957. Buried in Elmwood Cemetery in Columbia, S.C.
- 7. Susan Hill 5/, born on (Sunday) the 15th April 1883 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Charles Saylor, date unknown, she died on (Sunday) the 16th of March 1947 in Columbia Hospital. Buried in the Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.
- 8. Beulah Lee Hill 5/, born on (Tuesday) the 19th January 1886 in Lexington Co., S.C., married Edward K.

 McQuatters on (Wednesday) the 25th of December 1907, she died on (Thursday) the 13th August 1970. Buried in Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.
- 9. Michael (Mike) Hill 5/, born on (Tuesday) the 1st of October 1889 in Lexington Co., S.C., he never married. He died on (Sunday) the 15th of January 1968. Buried in Oak Grove Methodist Churchyard in Calhoun Co., S.C.

Woodward D. Hill 4/ and his three brothers all fought in the civil war and all were members of the 7th SOUTH CAROLINA VOLUNTEERS, COMPANY C, (INFANTRY). He taught school after the war.

William (Stewart) Hill 4/ was captured by Union troops but

survived the war. John Hill 4/ was injured near Petersburg, Virginia and died in 1864 in an army hospital, near Richmond, Va.

Lawrence (Lonnie) Hill 4/ was a drummer boy and survived the war. He moved to Union County, S.C. as a Deputy Sheriff in Union Co., SC, had trouble with the KKK, then moved to Mississippi and married a cousin, Martha Louise Glenn. Lost an arm after the war due to a unknown accident.

The daughter, Eliza Hill 4/, married Henry C. Nunnamaker. They later moved, lived and died in Columbia. & operated a grocery store.

Fifth Known Generation: Each individual will have to name his or her own descendent, OR the child of Woodward D. Hill that they are descended from. In my case, the fifth generation was:

PETER JOSEPH HILL 5/. (my grandfather)

Pete Hill 5/ was the 4th child and was born on (Saturday) the 31 October 1874 at Sandy Run S.C. (Lexington Co., later Calhoun Co.). Pete was baptized (christened) in the Sandy Run Lutheran Church on (Friday) the 15th August 1875, as was his brother Barrett and older sister Sally. (Ref: Church Records). Pete Hill 5/ married MARY JANE RICKENBAKER on 28th December 1900. He died either in December of 1906 or January 1907 and is buried in the Congaree Baptist Churchyard, near St. Matthews South Carolina. After his death, his widow Mary Jane remarried William J. Lambert and they moved to Portsmouth, Virginia.

Pete Hill 5/ and wife Mary Jane Rickenbaker had three children:

- 1. NOLTON RAYMOND HILL SR. 6/, born on (Wednesday) the 23rd of October 1901 and he died on (Monday) the 31st of July 1972 he was my father. He married Minnie Ola Blow on (Thursday) the 17th of March 1921 in Central Methodist Church in Portsmouth, Virginia.
- 2. Gertrude Hill 6/, born on (Thursday) the 11th of June 1904 in what was then Lexington Co., S.C. (now Calhoun Co.,) she married Aubrey George Sweet Sr., she died in Portsmouth, Va on (Monday) the 12th of December 1955.
- 3. Flora Dell Hill 6/, born on (Tuesday) the 24th of October 1905 in Lexington Co., S.C. (Now Calhoun Co.), married Willard Reed Sr., (divorced), she died in Norfolk, Va. on (Monday) the 28th of December 1981.

INFORMATION RELATING TO SOME OF OUR HILL DESCENDENTS. Explanation by Robert Hill: Mrs. Christopher was A DESCENDENT of James Hill, the second son and child of Moses Hill. He was a brother of Thomas Hill.

WOODWARD GENEALOGY:

Thomas Woodward is the first known generation. He was born in ca. 1729 Fairfax County Virginia, moved to what is today Fairfield County, S.C. He was a leader in the famous "Regulator Movement" that took place in the early 1760's. He was a Captain in the American Revolution, resigned due to age but lead his neighbors in a fight against TORIES. He was killed in this battle at Dutchman's Creek (Fairfield County) on 12th May 1779.

The second Woodward generation that relates to our family line was WILLIAM WOODWARD. He was born on 7th October in 1762 in Fairfax County, Virginia. His mother (Jemima Collins) died just after his birth and the Woodwards moved to S.C. William married Nancy Elizabeth Barrett ca. 1820. He served in the American Revolution, then served one term in the 14th U.S. Congress (House of Representatives). He was a physician BUT is known more for his ministry in the Baptist church. He was one of the founders of the WOODWARD BAPTIST CHURCH, located near Chester, South Carolina, in Chester County and that church is still active today. Reverend William Woodward died on 23rd July 1820 in Chester County, S.C. but said to have been buried in Fairfield, location unknown.

Third Woodward generation that pertains to our HILL line was: JEMIMA WOODWARD... (born ca. 1785 in Fairfield County, South Carolina. She is said to have moved with a daughter and her family to Noxubee County, Mississippi and died there about 1850 or 1851. To date, we have found no proof of her death date or the location of her residence after 1830, which was in Fairfield County. JEMIMA WOODWARD married ca. 1805 at age 13 to THOMAS HILL, who was my 3rd great grandfather (viz: great great great grandfather). She was a mother by June of 1806 and this was not a particular unusual thing for a girl to marry so young. THUS THE HILL-WOODWARD CONNECTION, ALSO THE SOURCE OF THE NAME OF WOODWARD (WOODARD) AND THE NAME OF BARRETT.

Anyone in our Hill Family is eligible to join the Sons of American Revolution (males) or the Daughters of American Revolution (females). I am a member of the Sons of American Revolution. (Tampa Chapter, Florida Society SAR)

Comments by Robert Hill: Judith E. (Eliza?) Stewart was the wife of Nathaniel Barrett Hill, (our third generation Hill & she was my 2nd great grandmother. Nathan was the son of Thomas Hill & Jemima Woodward). The 1850 Census indicates Judith was born in South Carolina in 1811 and I have some strong circumstantial evidence that she died in 1864 in Columbia. As with Nathan, her burial location has not been found. New information says she was the daughter of Jesse Stewart & wife Wilmouth Williamson, of Virginia but who came to S.C.

Meanwhile, I have already explained above just who Mrs. Christopher is and how she relates to the HILL Family. I have been attempting to locate and find out some information relating to Judith Stewart for several years. It is apparent that there is a line of descendents of our Nathan Hill, that we know nothing of but Mrs. Christopher does, thus she was able to obtain the following information.

Mrs. Christopher wrote to me on 2nd of December 1987 and provided me the following information.

I should explain here that the following Judith (Hill) Garner and those mentioned below are descended through William Stewart Hill, the brother of our Woodward D. Hill.

The following are excerpts from Mrs. Christopher's letter:

"Here is an early Christmas present for you. Last summer Judith Hill Garner in Union County (S.C.) wrote to me that she had gotten a photo from her nephew James William Hill (she never did say where he lived, but I think Chicago) of a stock pin (similar to a man's tie stick pin) that had been handed down in her family ever since Moses Hill gave it to his eldest son Thomas. She sent the picture to me to see, and with her permission I had a negative made from it and several prints. One is enclosed for you along with a copy of a letter written by Judith's mother Bertha (Hill) Hill to her son Andrew (James William's father) when she gave the pin to him. (Note: Bertha Hill married William Hill, unrelated). It is a beautiful pin, originally had a topaz setting which was lost by N. BARRETT HILL while it was in his possession as the eldest son of Thomas Hill. Barrett had the stone replaced with the black cameo shown in the picture. But, if all of this tradition is correct, it means that MOSES HILL was somebody's eldest son- or at least, was the eldest when his father died. And it had been in the family for at least two generations before Moses got it! It was given to Moses' father by the father's mother, who must have been a widow. Unfortunately, Cousin Bertha didn't know the names of the father and grandmother.

Judith also sent a little additional information on the Stuart/Stewart family. She says that Judith Stuart McCullough was the daughter of JESSIE STEWART and WILMOTH WILLIAMSON. Jessie was a twin and Judith thinks his twin sister was named Judith. Traditionally, the Stuarts were from Virginia. Judith didn't say so, but surely the Stuarts/Stewarts were in South Carolina when Judith married N. BARRETT HILL. Incidentally, did Brent Holcomb send you a copy of that letter written by N. BARRETT HILL to my grandfather GEORGE W. (Washington) HILL? If he didn't, let me know and I will make another copy for you."

THIS ENDS THE LETTER EXCERPT.

NOTE BY ROBERT HILL: I have a picture of the pin mentioned above. Below is a letter that Mrs. Christopher received from Judith (Hill) Garner. it was wrote by BERTHA (HILL) HILL, the mother of Judith (Hill) Garner and was wrote sometime between 1935 and 1940. This is a quote of that letter...

(This note was wrote by Judith (Hill) Garner of Union County, S.C. in spring of 1987. "This letter as you can see was written by my mother to my oldest brother about the stock pin which (I thought) was a family crest but I was mistaken. It is a pin much cherished by my mother's family."

Dear Andrew;

Please read this document carefully and then put it away in case you need it at some future time.

Years and years ago. long before the Revolutionary War, my great great grandfather had a pin given him from his father, who had received it from his mother, my great great grandfather's grandmother. This pin was a gentleman's stock pin, remember the old fashion of men wearing clothes wrapped around their necks and a lace jabo? (word is unclear) in front? Well this pin was worn in my great, great, great grandfather's stock. When my great great grandfather MOSES HILL died he left the pin to his eldest son with instructions to the effect that each eldest son of an eldest son be given the pin. Well my great grandfather, THOMAS HILL, willed the pin to his eldest son, my grandfather, NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL, who in turn left the pin to my father. Then I sent it on to Bud, who gave it in turn to Faith to wear till their son William should have a son. Bud died when William was 17 years old. After taking a business course

William accepted a position some where in Georgia, and has never been heard of since. Faith spent all she had trying to find him. That was in 1930. She wrote me she had put the pin in the bank to keep till William came home. She waited till today I received the pin. She has at last found some sort of proof of his death. Now I am the sole living heir of my father's and the only heir or male heir of our family. So it has come to me, not in trust, but as heir and as the line is broken I can leave the pin to whom I please. This is what I feel is right. Jimmie Hill, your son, though he gets his name from your father's family is still my descendent and I am glad to say a Hill, though not my Hill. I am going to keep the pin and wear it till I die and when that time comes, I want you to keep it in trust for Jimmie till he marries when he will let his wife keep it till his own son is grown and married. If anything should happen to Jimmie's heir before he should marry, the pin is to go to Richard's son, If Richard does not have sons, then the pin is to go to Judith's son. I hope though a Hill will always have the pin.

Now this pin is about the size of a postage stamp. It has between thirty and fifty pearls around the border and the center stone was originally topaz, but my grandfather lost the topaz and replaced it with a black cameo.

I hope the persons whom inherit the pin will value it as the generations gone by and will never pawn it as so many things have been in this family.

Hope you are feeling well and are not suffering too much in this awful sub zero weather. Papa joins me in love.

End of letter

Following was wrote by Mrs Christopher to explain the relationship of the above persons...

Jimmie Hill was son of Andrew Hill, who was son of Bertha (Hill) Hill. (Bertha Hill married a William Hill, unrelated and from another Hill Family). BERTHA HILL was the daughter of William Stewart Hill, who was a son BUT NOT THE ELDEST of Nathaniel Barrett Hill, who was son of Thomas Hill, who was son of Moses Hill, who was son of ???? Hill (who's wife was the grandmother of Moses Hill), and who gave the pin to Moses Hill.

Mrs. Christopher goes on. "If Barrett Hill or his widow Judith had given the pin to their eldest son, WOODWARD, the pin might now belong to you Bob! (me).

Comments by Robert Hill: If Woodward Hill had received the pin, (as was supposed to) it should have gone to his son Barrett Hill, and probably passed on to his son Oscar Hill

and from there I do not known the family line... I do have a picture of the pin.

I am of the opinion that Judith Stewart Hill, widow of Nathan B. Hill, gave the pin to their 2nd son, William Stewart Hill because of his name having the 2nd name of STEWART. I have no proof, but why else would she break the tradition?

Explanation: Mrs. Jeannette Christopher, is a descendent of Moses Hill, though his 2nd son, James Hill. We descend through the first son, Thomas Hill. Jeannette obtained this letter from a family member she calls Cousin Bertha (Hill) Hill. She had married a James Hill (no relation to our family of Abbeville County, S.C.).

Bertha Hill was a daughter of William Stewart Hill, the 2nd son of Nathan Barrett Hill and brother to Woodward D. Hill. Mrs. Christopher provided me with a copy of both the letter and picture. I retyped the letter into my computer and had a negative of the picture made. The bold print was a printed "Letterhead." Jeannette stated the letter was wrote sometime around 1935 or 1940.

Woodward in turn should then have passed it on down to his eldest son NATHANIEL BARRETT HILL, known as Barrett Hill, the father of Mrs. Edna Godbold.

You see Edna, this pin SHOULD HAVE COME INTO YOUR FAMILY, not mine. My grandfather was the 2nd son, after your dad.

Note by Robert Hill Sr: The above transactions are very important for the following reasons... When Leonard Hill sold his land in 1788, he sold it to a Thomas Hill. Later when Thomas Hill sold the same piece of land, his wife JUDITH signed, thus showing us which of the three Thomas Hills, known to have been living in the area, it was that bought the land. It is my contention that Leonard Hill originally sold the land to his brother THOMAS HILL.

It was the same piece of land that William Augusta Hill had left to his son Richard Hill (wife Agnes) and then Richard & Agnes Hill had sold to Jane Rogers (spinster).

Charles Hill Sr. is named as the father to the William Augusta Hill. Since Charles C. Hill (wife Mary) appears to be Charles Hill JR. (son of Charles Hill Sr.) he would then be the brother to William Augusta Hill.

Now, since Charles C. Hill is now believed to be Charles Hill Jr. and since his wife MARY HILL was referred to as "COZ." (Cousin) in the Moses Hill Bible remains, it is believe that it was acutally Charles C. Hill who was the COUSIN, thus William Augusta Hill and Charles C. Hill (Jr.) would be cousins to Moses Hill.

Now assuming that Moses Hill, Leonard Hill and Thomas Hill (wife Judith) were brothers then, the three would all be cousins to William Augusta Hill and Charles C. Hill Jr. Therefore Charles Hill Sr. (wife Nancy) must be their UNCLE and AUNT (who came to SC from Pennsylvania).

General information.... The origins of Moses Hill 1/ are unknown as of this writing but some evidence that he, or at least his parents, may have come from the area of Pennsylvania. The names of his parents are also unknown for sure, but some evidence that his father was a Thomas Hill. The mother is unknown.

Moses Hill 1/ was born after 1 July 1757 or in 1758. The location of birth is unknown. He married Savilla N. Roden ca 1778-1779 in S.C.

He was a surveyor, Justice of the Peace, a member of the Methodist Church and owned a large amount of land as well as slaves for the times.

Moses HILL died on Sunday, 1st July 1821, at age of 63. He died in Fairfield County and is buried by son Littleton Hill 2/, in the yard of what was once his home near the community of "Buckhead" in what is known today as the "Old Younge Cemetery."

Moses Hill 1/ first appears in SC records in May of 1778. His marriage must have taken place shortly after the above date of MAY 1778 because the first child, Thomas Hill 2/ was born in 1780.

This helps to pin down the time that Moses & Savilla married. It is believed that the marriage took place at the residence of the Rodens, which was in Chester County. Both the Hills and Rodens lived close to each other but just across the county line, the Hills in Fairfield County, the Rodens in Chester County S.C.

Moses Hill 1/ was a Revolutionary War Soldier against the British, having served 120 days in the S.C. Militia. After the war, he was a land surveyor and a Justice of the Peace in Fairfield County, SC.

SAVILLA RODEN, WIFE OF MOSES HILL 1/.

Based on information that was provided by a member of the Roden Family, the Rodens moved from Maryland through Virginia and finally into S.C.,

Savilla Roden was the daughter of Thomas Roden & Mary Potts of Maryland, who came to SC via way of Virginia, about 1760. The time of Savilla's birth in 1759 indicates she was born in Virginia. She moved with her parents, Thomas Roden & Mary Potts into SC

In May of 1778, Savilla witnessed a deed by her father and witnessed by her future husband, Moses Hill 1/. She signed as Savilla Roden, indicating they had not yet married.

After the 1821 death of her husband, Moses Hill 1/, Savilla Roden Hill, along with some of her children and their families, all moved from SC to Green County. Alabama about April of 1733.

The names of the children that moved into Alabama were George Washington Hill 2/ and family, Rebecca Carlisle Hill DeGraffenreid 2/ and her family. Another daughter, Sarah Caroline Hill 2/. had earlier married Reverend John Pearson and they had moved to Alabama.

They all moved into Green County, Alabama, near today's community known as Eutaw, near Pleasant Ridge.

Savilla died there on the 23 July 1844 and is buried in the Old Bigbee Cemetery, located near Eutaw near Pleasant Ridge along with her children named above.

CHILDREN OF MOSES HILL 1/. AND WIFE SAVILLA N. RODEN.

1. Thomas Hill 2/, born in 1780. He married Jemima Woodward, daughter of Rev. William Woodward & Nancy Elizabeth Barrett and Jemima was the granddaughter of the famous S.C. Regulator Thomas Woodward & 1st wife Jemima Collins. Thomas Hill 2/ died between January 1824, when he sold

- some land, and May 1824 when his wife confirmed a land sale by him, stating she was now widowed.
- 2. James Hill 2/b. 21 Nov. 1782. He married Susannah Glenn on 10th June 1806. He became quite wealthy and built a large plantation near Fish Dam in Union County South Carolina (today known as Carlisle). He built his home with slaves he owned (several) and the house still stands. It is on the list for National Registry of Historical Preservation. It is called "HILLSIDE" and his great granddaughter still lives in the house. (This family was blessed by the fact that the grandson of James Hill 2/, GEORGE W. Hill 3/, lived until 1909. George lived in the house and was it was passed on to his daughter and then to his granddaughter (Mrs. Christopher, who still lives there. This is where a lot of our information comes from).
- 3. Sarah Caroline Hill 2/. Sarah was born ca. 1785-1788. Evidence points to her being somewhat older than most women were when they married for the times. She was the 2nd of 3 wives for Rev. John Pearson, son of the Revolutionary General John Pearson. It appears that Sarah married ca. 1821 as their only child, and a son, was born in 1823. The 1850 Census shows that this son was born in N.C. and for this reason it is believed that the Pearsons lived there for a short spell. (The Pearson Family originally settled this county around New Bern NC). John Pearson remarried on 6 August 1835 in North Carolina. He still owned land in Green County, Alabama and returned there right after this marriage, indicating again a connection to that state. Sarah Hill 2/ apparently was dead and her death date is unknown but probably ca. 1831-1834. She is suspected to be buried in the Old Bigbee Cemetery in Green County Alabama, near Pleasant Ridge, as is husband John. Due to the poor condition of the cemetery, which is extremely bad, their graves have not been found, but records exist of tombstones in the cemetery being found under "eight inches of silt." It is possible and probably they are buried here as their home was very close by.
- 4. Littleton Hill 2/. Littleton is rather obscure, but the knowledge exists that he was the 3rd son of Moses Hill 1/. Information passed down through the family is that he died as a "teen" & unmarried. A study of the 1810 Census on the Moses Hill Family, along with knowledge of marriages etc of the other children, points to Littleton being alive at the time of this census. Nothing afterwards shows his existence. His name is not mentioned in the estate affairs of his father but one genealogist apparently found that he had "signed" to receive his share of his inheritance that his father gave him. (This apparently was a custom Moses 1/ did with all his sons. He gave them

money, apparently to get a start in life etc). For these reasons plus a statement later by a family member that he died "just before reaching manhood," gives strong evidence that maybe he lived until about 20 years old. (Adulthood was considered to be 21 for a male before he could be granted land etc). According to family information, Littleton never married. He apparently died in late 1810 or 1811. Family information is that he was buried by his father in an "unmarked" grave. Such a grave does exist. The grave has a stone at both head and foot, but it is rough sand stone with no visible inscriptions.

- 5. Elizabeth Harrison Hill 2/. She was born on 29th January 1793. The fact that her middle name was Harrison has caused some thought of a connection with the Harrison Family, especially a Reuben Harrison, who lived close to Moses 1/. James, her older brother, named a son Henry HARRISON Hill, and this was before the times of the President who bore that same name. Elizabeth married Stephen Terry on 4th July 1809 at age 15. They moved to DeKalb County Georgia ca. 1826. Elizabeth died in Georgia on 3rd December 1838 and had 12 children. She is believed to be buried in the family cemetery located today in the area known in Atlanta as "Lakewood Park." (Information by Atlanta Historical Society, Terry Bible Record and his will).
- 6. Moses Berry Hill 2/. He was born in 1795 (day and month) not given. He was a surveyor, as was his father. He married Mary Bowles Glenn and they lived in Chester County. They had four children and it is through him that several members of the Hill family, in Arkansas, are descended. Moses was one of the two administrators of his father's estate. (His brother George was the other). Moses died while the estate was being probated, death occurring in Chester County on 14 October 1824. (Brother Thomas died same year between Jan.-May 1824). Moses Berry Hill was taken across the Broad River into Chester County by the family, and is buried in the "Fish Dam Cemetery in Union County, where member of his brother James are also buried. (Note: Fish Dam today is Carlisle, SC).
- 7. Harriet Windham Hill 2/. She was born on 5th March 1802. She married Edward Pickett Mobley, son of Samuel Mobley Jr. and wife Elizabeth Pickett Whitehead. Edward became a large slave and plantation owner in Fairfield County. The Mobleys were highly respected in the community and were generous in helping others. They had 5 known children. Harriet died on 30th April 1857. Her husband was born on 7th March 1799 in South Carolina and he died on 4th February 1861. Both, along with other members of the family, are buried in the family graveyard on the old home site known as "White Hall." It is located about 5 and 1/2

miles East of the town of White Oak, in Fairfield County.

- 8. George Washington Hill 2/. He was born in September 1803 (exact day unknown) and he was married to Sarah A. Moore, probably ca. 1827-1828 in South Carolina. He was one of the two sons that applied to administer the father's estate in 1821. (His brother Moses Berry Hill was the other). George moved to Green County Alabama with his widowed mother and his family and the family of his youngest sister Rebecca and her family ca. April or May of 1831. George had 11 known children. Several died quite young. George Hill 2/, died in Green County Alabama on 8th September 1857 and is buried by his mother's side in the Old Bigbee Cemetery.
- 9. Rebecca Carlisle Hill 2/. She was born on 20th December 1807 and the name of Carlisle is believed to be after the first methodist preacher that was a circuit rider in the area of Fairfield and Union Counties in South Carolina. She married Doctor John Trezevant DeGraffenreid, son of Christopher and his wife Hannah Sartor. The doctor was born in Union County, S.C. on 22 August 1799. He received his medical degree in New York. They were married on 25th March 1828 in South Carolina, moved to Alabama with the Hills (I.E. the widow Savilla, George, Rebecca and probably Sarah & John Pearson, who moved about the same time). The DeGraffenreids had six known children, and had a tragic time after moving to Alabama in 1831. A serious disease known as "bilious fever" (hepatitis?) swept the family. In 1842, they lost two daughters to this disease and Rebecca herself died from it just eight days after her daughter died. Rebecca Carlisle Hill 2/ died on 11 August 1842 in Green County and is also buried in the Old Bigbee Cemetery near Pleasant Ridge. Dr. DeGraffenreid remarried in 1850 (after Census).

CHILDREN OF THOMAS HILL 2/. HIS WIFE WAS JEMIMA WOODWARD.

1. Nancy B. (Barrett?) Hill 3/. Family & friends called him "Barrett." Based on an entry in the "fly leaf" (remains) of an old bible that once belonged to Moses Hill 1/, Nancy was born on 4th June 1806. (Census data of 1840, 1850 & 1860 show 1 year later or 1807). Nancy was married three (3) times. Her first was to Edward M. Mobley of South Carolina. They apparently went to DeKalb County Georgia ca. 1828-30 and in the 1830 Census (page 48) are found listed NEXT to Nancy's aunt and uncle, Elizabeth Hill 2/ and husband Stephen Terry. In the 1840 Census, they were in Tuscaloosa County of Alabama. Edward Mobley died ca. 1846-1847 (Sumter Co., Ala.??).

They had eight known children. Nancy remarried a 2nd time to William Price (Sr.) on 27 July 1848. They had one child, a daughter. In the 1850 Census, the Price Family was in Green County Alabama and apparently Wm. Price died shortly afterwards because on 4 November 1853, Nancy remarried a third time to James H. Sims. They had no children. By the time of the 1860, Nancy was widowed again and she is found in Green County Census of 1860 on page 72, family number 562 as N. B. Sims (female) age 52. She is listed with a son and daughter. Nancy is not heard from again and her death date and place is unknown.

- 2. Jemima Hill 3/. We have no information on her except she was apparently born in 1807 or 1808 in S.C. and is one of the three (3) female children listed in the 1810 Census of the Thomas Hill 2/ Family in Fairfield County. Perhaps she died young.
- 3. Charlotte L. (Louise?) Hill 3/. She was born on 8 August 1809 in S.C. She married Moses Cockrell (b. 28 Feb. 1799-d. 9 April 1867) in South Carolina. Based on Census information of children, they moved to Noxubee County Mississippi ca. 1839. In the 1840 Census they are listed in the household of one Mordicai Harrison. (That Harrison connections again appears, relationship unknown). They had 5 known children. One source has stated that the widowed mother, Jemima Hill, moved and lived with the Cockrells and that she died in 1851 in Miss. We have not found any such evidence. Charlotte Hill 3/, died on 28 October 1867 in Noxubee County Mississippi. She and her husband with some children are buried in Soule Methodist Church yard near Macon Mississippi.
- 4. Nathaniel Barrett Hill 3/, the great great grandfather of Robert R. Hill of Brandon, Fl., the compiler. He was born in 1811 (1850 Census) and married Judith E. (Eliza?) Stewart (b. ca. 1811 based on 1850 Census). He was a banker, elected as "Sheriff of Richland District S.C." in November 1848 and resigned in March or April of 1851. He was a partner with Gilbert Stalker in a steamship company known to have carried both freight and passengers between Charleston & Columbia S.C. The company was known as "Stalker & Hill." Nathan was known among family as "Barrett" and was apparently named after his maternal grandmother Nancy Barrett. There is some suspicion that he was named after Nathaniel Barrett, a Revolutionary Soldier in the area of Fairfield County, and who might be the father or brother of Nancy Barrett. This has not yet been proven. Nathan Hill 3/ died on 13 December 1854 in New York City. (His estate papers and article in Charleston paper Charleston Mercury dated 15th Dec. 1854. City records of New York say death was on the 12th). Records in New York show he was returned to

Charleston for burial, but since he lived in Columbia it is believed he is buried somewhere here. A rather good investigation has failed to locate his grave. Wife Judith was still in Columbia, SC in 1860 Census but that is the last known of her. They had 5 children.

- 5. William W. (Woodward? Hill 3/. He is believed to be the 2nd son and 5th child of Thomas Hill 2/. He was probably born ca. 1812-1813 and is believed to have been the cousin that married Mary Glenn Hill 3/, daughter of his uncle Moses Berry Hill 2/. Nothing else is known of him expect he was obviously in Mobile, Alabama around the time of the 1840 census and in 1843, he gave his brother Nathan a power of attorney. Some suspicion exist that the widowed mother (Jemima Hill) was with him instead of Charlotte 3/, his sister, as had been suggested by others. There is an elderly adult female in the 1840 Census with him in Mobile. We have no other information.
- 6. Moses Hill 3/. Said to have moved to Pickens County Alabama. No other information.
- 7. Savilla Hill 3/. Based on age of 1830 Census, she was born between 1815-1820. She married Green B. Mobley of South Carolina. Census Records of 1830 show them first in Green Co, Alabama (on page 406 of 1830 Census (Green Co., Ala). The 1840 Census Records locate this family in Sumter Co., Ala. (page or family number 110). Savilla is believed to have died in Sumter County, Al. about 1839-1840, and she appears to have had 3 children, all born in Alabama. Green B. Mobley remarried a widow, Henrietta Wilson and they are in Sumter County, Al. in the 1850 Census. (page 288 #494/500).
- 8. Thomas Hill 3/. Nothing known of him except one source states it was him that married his cousin Mary Glenn Hill 3/, a daughter of his uncle Moses Berry Hill 2/. This has not been proved. and is questionable.
