from the (Charleston) Courier on Tuesday last that she
arrived again in Charleston on Tuesday last, making the whole
trip from Charleston to this place and back again, with full
cargo and passengers coming and returning, in seven days and
seven hours. She again left Charleston yesterday at one
o'clock and will arrive here Saturday morning. She advertises
to take passengers for the Charleston Races.
