Hi Pelham,

This is Mike Thomas, from the Captain Lyle ceremony, and I hope this finds you doing well. I am asking if you might be able to assist me on a particular Confederate soldier whose residence prior to and after the War Between the States is said to have been in Fairfield County. I am hopeful

there might be local information on his wartime service. The particulars are:

J. Dickerson Hogan, born September 3, 1838 married to Cynthia M. Cloud in 1866. His parents were Sandal S. & Margaret (Crankfield) Hogan and, supposedly, each came from prominent Fairfield County families. In 1888, J. Dickerson Hogan liquidated all his holdings in South Carolina and moved to Arkansas where he lived out his life. He died after a short illness in Atkins County, Arkansas January 23, 1923.

His military service was incredibly full and I have quite a bit on him. He was a private, later Sergeant, in Company I, 2nd South Carolina Cavalry. He served as one of Wade Hampton's Scouts (sometimes called the Iron Scouts) from late 1862 until his capture in February 1865. I'm hopeful there might be something of interest in local histories or old newspaper accounts.

The reason for this interest is that I am writing a book on Wade Hampton's scouts. Hogan was one of the key figures in this little detachment & served in a most credible manner. His contributions were recognized by
