John Wynn Esq sold William Holley  
150 acres of land for 29 pounds lawful  
money on Feb 10, 1790. This land was the  
north west corner of 181 acres of land granted  
to John Wynn on May 4, 1775; lay on  
Owers Creek.

Charlotte E. Chappes born June 13, 1817

Married Captain Nathaniel B. Holley in 1835  
at the age of 18 years and died June 12, 1907.

Captain Nathaniel B. Holley was born March  
10, 1811 and died Sept 5, 1878. Their

children being to maturity Burtis, Mary  
Nathaniel (?) David, Walter, John and  
Alexander.

Captain John C. Holley probably the eldest  
son of Nathaniel & Charlotte died in the  
Confederate war on June 8, 1862 at the Battle  
of Seven Pines - aged 25 years

Alexander was wounded at Battle of Seven  
Pines and died June 5, 1862 three days before  
his brother age 19 years



P. M. B. Hooley son of Nathaniel + Charlotte  
was born Sept 25, 1847 and died May 11  
1913. His wife Mary Aurelia was born  
Dec 8, 1853 and died Jan 18, 1929

Walter was born Oct 3, 1863 (?) and died  
Feb 23, 1939 His wife Agnes Seyler was  
born Oct 17, 1866 and died Oct 15, 1943

Mary was born Nov 26, 1849 and died  
Sept 17, 1930 She married William Clarence  
Rahl.

Lizzie Hooley daughter of Nathaniel B + Charlotte  
Chappell Hooley was born March 27, 1852  
and died May 11, 1873
