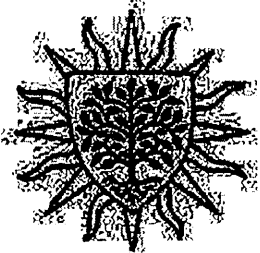

I have visited numerous libraries, scoured the South Carolina Department of Archives and History online documents, and used other online resources such as NARA, Heritage Quest, Ancestry, and Footnote to try to find further documentation on my Huston family tree. I seem to have "hit the wall" in my research for my ancestor, **John Huston**, and would very much appreciate some assistance from one of your volunteers at the Fairfield County Museum.

There are several things that I DO know about John Huston, his family, and his connections to Fairfield County:

1. He is one of the heads of household on the Fairfield 1790 Census with a family that includes 3 males under the age of 16 and five females.
2. John Huston served during the Revolutionary War as a lieutenant in the militia with Col. Richard Winn and Col. Lacy (under Captains Turner, Adair, and Adams). He served from 1780 to 1782.
3. John Huston received a memorial for 200 acres on a small branch of the Wateree Creek in Craven County in 1774. I have a copy of a survey plat for 200 acres dated 18 Aug 1772 and a plat for 100 acres in Camden District on Wateree Creek dated 1784.
4. He is reported to have married Mary Miller.
5. John Huston is on the list for Petit Jurors between the Broad and the Catawba Rivers, 1778-1779.
6. John Huston died intestate 19 February 1790 in Fairfield County. I ordered a copy of information regarding his death and the sale of his effects from SCDAH, but the film was so badly scratched that most of the 11 pages I received cannot be read and several pages are essentially just black lines. I can make out some names such as Burr Harrison, the coroner, and can read most of the list of his personal effects. (SCDAH did send a little note of apology for the condition of the copies.)
7. His son, my great, great, great grandfather, William Huston, was born in Fairfield County 12 June 1787, and he listed on a payroll form for Capt. William McCreight's Company (McWillies) showing that he was discharged 5 March 1815 to his place of residence in Fairfield. William Huston's obituary for his death in 1876 in Union County, MS, provided information regarding his birth in Fairfield and the residence of his parents, John and Mary, as Fairfield. At some point after the War of 1812, William Huston left Fairfield and moved to Anderson County, SC, where he married Maria Clark Keys in 1823. The Huston family moved to Pontotoc County, MS, in 1838.

My questions are these:

1. Do you have a legible copy of the papers for administration of his estate and, if so, can you tell me if these paper note the cause of his death, who his heirs were, or if there was a guardian assigned to protect the interests of his children? If you do not have copies of the estate papers, was there some other resource such as a local Colonial newspaper that might have published an obituary for John Huston?

2. Since William was only three-years-old at the time of John's death, I am very curious as to what happened to him and his siblings following the death of his father. For example, could William enrolled in a school in the area or been placed as an apprentice? Did Mary remarry? What other Fairfield records might be available to help me identify the rest of the family and what happened to them?

3. The Huston family attended the Presbyterian Church, but I do not know what church(es) might have served the Wateree Creek area during Colonial times. Can you help me identify churches that might have cemetery information or marriage information for John and Mary Huston? Do you have any colonial era church records as part of your archive?

4. Do you have an index to Fairfield deeds? If so, could I request a look up? The first record I can find of William owning property in Anderson County is 1817. I am hoping that he may have inherited some of his father's property and sold it prior to his departure from Fairfield. I would also be interested in documentation of any property sales by John's widow, Mary Huston.

I do appreciate your time and any assistance that you can provide to me regarding John Huston and his family. Please let me know what charges are applicable for this research and any possible copies. Thanks again.

I am attaching a copy of our last genealogy chapter newsletter and will send you the upcoming museum newsletter when I get it done. The Lions Club presentation I made last week tells an interesting story about 3 pianos connected to my family.

Henry Lee Hunter.

A telegram was received here on Saturday afternoon, announcing the death of Mr. Henry Lee Hunter, of Charlotte, North Carolina, on December 18, of heart trouble, aged seventy-nine years.

With him at the time of his death, were his three children, Mrs. Wm. Anderson, of this city, who was called South ten days ago by news of her father's illness, and two sons, Malcolm Beall and Henry Pettit Hunter, both of Charlotte.

Mr. Hunter came of an old and prominent North Carolina family of Scotch descent, and was the son of Major George Ross Hunter, who served in the Mexican War, and a grandson of Dr. Humphrey Hunter, of the Revolutionary army. He was himself a Confederate soldier and served throughout the war between the States. He was one of four brothers, only one of whom, Dr. William Hunter, of Central America, survives. Mrs. Hunter, who was Miss Eliza Pettit, of Frederick, died March 30, of this year.

Besides the three children he leaves four grandchildren, William T., Henry Lee H., Alexander H. and Mrs. Floyd L. Strawn, of Washington, D. C.

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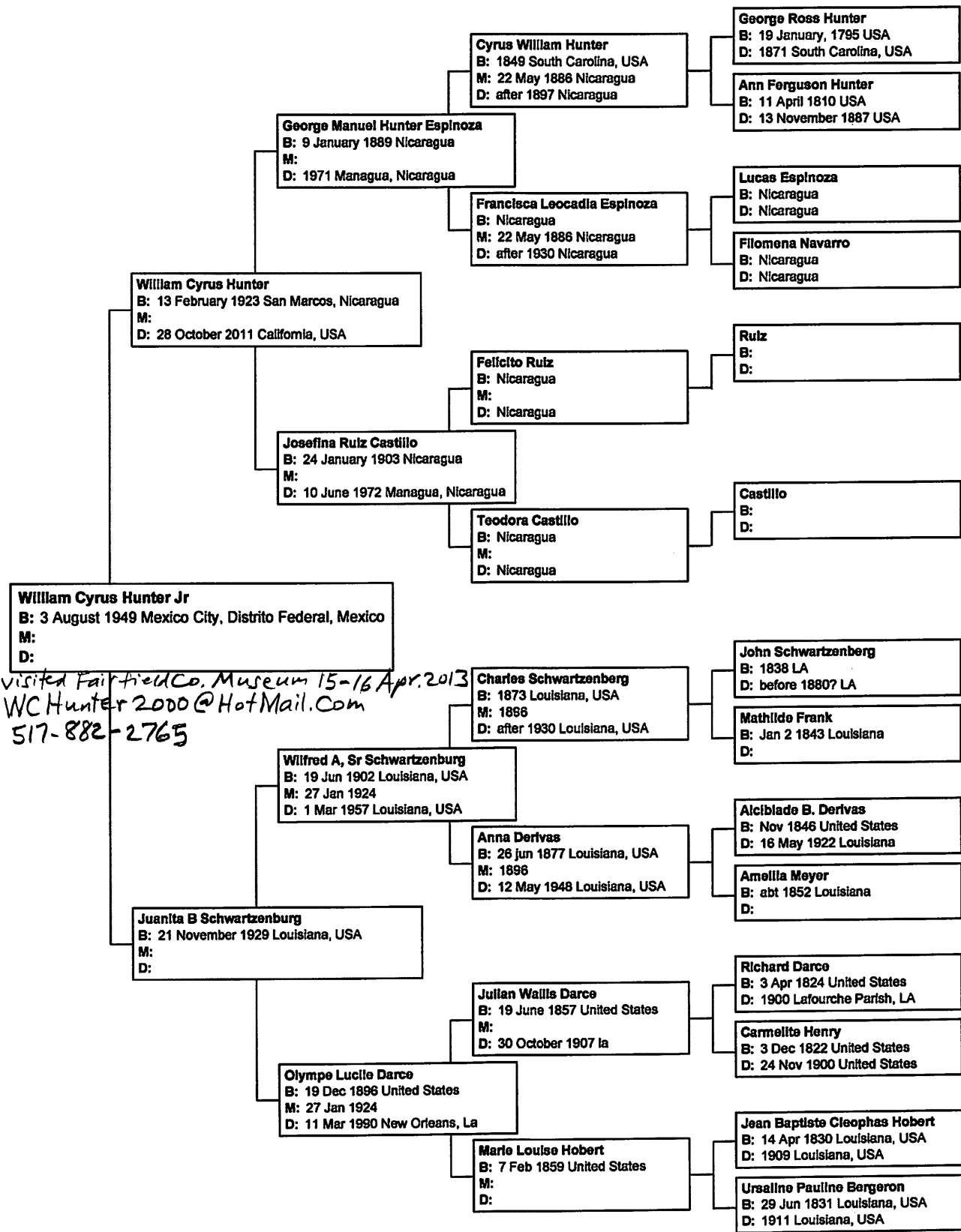
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Hunter Family Tree

Silver Tea Set For Sunday At The Ross Robinson Home in Monticello

A silver tea will be given at the colonial home of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Robinson, near Monticello, on Sunday, May 15, between the hours of 3 and 6 p.m. The public is invited to tour the home and garden of the historic place. Proceeds will go to the Monticello Methodist Church.

Rich in history and tradition, the Robinson home was built well over a century ago by Dr. James Bolton Davis, first American importer of Brahman cattle. The house commands a magnificent view from a high point in Fairfield County, one mile south of Monticello.

Dr. Davis, a descendant of Captain James Kincaid of Revolutionary War fame, was born Dec. 31, 1799, at or near Monticello. He received his M. D. degree from the Medical College of Pennsylvania, after having studied at Jefferson Academy, South Carolina College and the South Carolina Medical College.

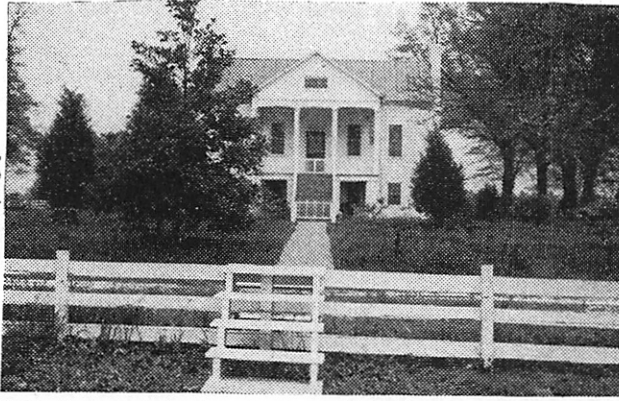
Handsome and talented, Dr. Davis lived a rich and colorful life. In 1830, he married Mary Elizabeth Scott of Richland County, a noted beauty of her day. After practicing for two years, Dr. Davis gave up medicine to devote his time to agriculture and the raising of thoroughbred stock. He is a leader in the early agricultural societies of county and state and in 1845 accepted the appointment as Minister of Agriculture to

Set well back from the Long-mong those featured in "A Fair-town Road, behind an old-fashioned Sketchbook" written and illustrated by Julian Stevenson Bolton, attractive and oldest homes in low-lick. This 150 year old home was, er Fairfield County.

The house was built before 1820, for it was in that year that Kathleen, but continues to carry the will of the builder, Abraham Ferguson, was probated. His as it is furnished with many of the original antiques. The family history and a family tree was compiled and plans for making the Martin reunion an annual affair was the business for the day.

Mr. Hunter, and thus the place became known as the Hunter Place. The Hunter family lived here until after the War Between the States. When the North was declared the victor, Mr. Hunter, a firm supporter of the Confederacy, stated that he would never live in a country ruled by Yankees. Being a

man of his word and one true to his principles, Mr. Hunter, with his family, moved to British Honduras, where his descendants still live.

The house looks like a small cottage, but its outside appearance is deceiving, for the house is larger than it appears to be at first glance. The first floor on the ground level is built of brick. The interior walls are paneled with wide pine boards. All of the trim and decorations are simple, and some of the old English-made locks are still in use.

Several years ago Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Rion of Columbia bought six of the property. Since that time they have done much to restore the house in a most charming manner, and they use it as a walls, country home. Although the Rions reside in Columbia, they spend part of each week and most of the summer at this quiet little house near Ridgeway.

The Annals of Lincoln County dedicates a page to him.

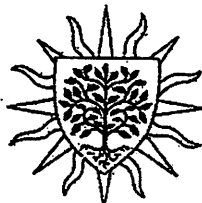

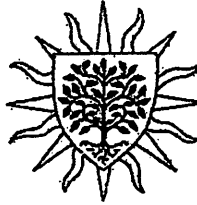

Here is the information on my great-great-grandfather you requested:

Major George Ross Hunter

Born: 19 January 1795 in Marion County, SC.

Died: 24 November 1870 in Ridgeway, SC.

According to his obit [by Amicus], he was a "Bright" mason in the Masonic Lodge at Ridgeway and an elder in the Aimwell Presbyterian Church.

He represented Fairfield District in the SC General Assembly – 1828-1829.

He was appointed Postmaster for Ridgewood [sic], Fairfield, SC in August 1844.

A member of the SC Bar, he was a compeer of Clarke, Evans, Buchanan, McDowell and McCall in Winnsboro.

DO NOT KNOW DIED INTESTATE { LEFT A WIFE - ANNA
2.4 SONS

To date, I've been unable to locate his will or his place of burial. I believe he is buried in the old sector of the Aimwell Church Cemetery or somewhere on his property – possibly next to his father-in-law (Abraham Ferguson.)
