

Descendants of SAMUEL Jackson I

Generation No. 1

1. SAMUEL¹ JACKSON^I was born Abt. 1759 in Richland Co., S.C., and died Abt. 1818 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C.. He married CHRISTINA HUNNICUTT Abt. 1786 in Richland Co., S.C..

Notes for SAMUEL JACKSON^I:

According to his grgrgrandaughter, Winnie Austin Carpenter, he served in the American Revolution. I have not been able to find no record of this, however.

There is a memorial headstone for both him and his wife Christina Hunnicutt in the Sion Presbyterian Cemetery, Washington St., Winnsboro.

Christina Hunnicutt Jackson, age 84, is listed in the 1850 Census as living with her son Samuel II, in Winnsboro.

They lived in a section called "Oakland" which would have been south of Winnsboro, on the Columbia Road. We have letters written by Harriet C. Jackson Due from Oakland, in 1852 and 1863.

Notes for CHRISTINA HUNNICUTT:

In Aunt Winnie's* notes she states that Christina Hunnicutt Jackson died at the age of 90 at Oakland, which is a section south of Winnsboro, S.C., off the Columbia Road. The Jacksons evidently had a home there for he is listed as planter and tailor in the 1850 SC Census. Harriet C. Jackson Due wrote her letters during the Civil War from "Oakland", so probably she and her husband James H. Due lived there, also.

Christina is listed in the 1850 Census of SC, as living with her son, Samuel Jackson and his 2nd wife, Lucinda R. McCreight Jackson, in House No. 399, in Winnsboro, SC.

She was 84 years of age.

Living at the same location were Jesse Haskell, age 40, tanner(b. Maryland); and William Miller age 25 (b. Fairfield Co), laborer. (Note: could this Wm. Miller be brother to first wife Eliz. Miller?)

Aunt Winnie* was born in 1881, the daughter of Thomas Allen Austin who was in the Civil War, and she remembers many of the names and incidents which he spoke about to his children. Aunt Winnie also states that the Jackson-Due home was burned by Sherman on his deadly and infamous march up through the south and Fairfield Co., SC. He virtually destroyed Winnsboro, especially the churches and the records therein, for it was his intent to break the backs of the "people." He did it, physically perhaps, but not spiritually. Their spirit still lives today.

Descendants of SAMUEL Jackson II

Generation No. 1

1. SAMUEL² JACKSONII (*SAMUEL*¹) was born December 29, 1804 in Richland Co., S.C., and died September 11, 1869 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C. (bur. Sion Presb. Cemetery). He married (1) ELIZABETH HOLLIS MILLER October 28, 1828 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C., daughter of JOHN MILLER and MARGARET HOLLIS. He married (2) LUCINDA R. MCCREIGHT Abt. 1839 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C..

Notes for SAMUEL JACKSONII:

Samuel Jackson was a tailor, to whom were apprenticed a number of young men who wished to learn the business. The Jackson home was located on Congress Street which is the main street in Winnsboro, S.C. He built his home next door to that of John Miller, also a tailor, who was the father of his wife Elizabeth. The old Miller home is still standing and is at present (1997) owned by the Lippert family who are supposed to be in the process of restoring it. There are sketches of both homes in the Historical Winnsboro Sketchbook, which was published sometime in the 1970's.

I quote from the text of the book:

"The house was built by Mr. Samuel Jackson, a son-in-law of John Miller, who built and lived in the "Wolfe House" sometime shortly after 1830. The same workmen evidently constructed both houses about the same time...." Over the years it was owned by several families, but it was razed during the 1970's, though Albert Douglass purchased it and was supposed to make extensive restoration of the property.

"Samuel Jackson owned the Historic Johnston House on Liberty St. in Winnsboro, SC., for the years 1860 to 1862. He purchased it for a rather low figure, and sold it for a much higher figure to A. R. Taft of Charleston, SC. Many of the Charlestonians came to the Upper Country during the Civil War. Described in Winnsboro Sketchbook:a large, two and one half storey building, with a two-storey wing extending to the rear. Two large inside chimneys come through the roof covering the center section of the house which contains the front entrance, an impressive fanlight frame trimmed and ornamented with hand-carved moldings. At the turn of the century it was the Reformed Presbyterian Manse, and remained so to well into the 40's and 50's. "

When I visited it, the lady living there was most emphatic in stating that the correct name for the House was "Johns T on," not "Johnson." I believe her. The Rev. Dr. Oliver Johnston had lived there for many years.

I am deeply grateful to Ruth Stevenson, of the Genealogical Room in the Fairfield Museum on Congress Street, in Winnsboro, who furnished us with the handwritten listing of the headstones. She, or someone on the staff, actually went to the cemetery and made copies of the information.

2. HARRIET CHRISTINE³ JACKSON (*SAMUEL², SAMUEL¹*) was born March 02, 1831 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C., and died July 14, 1864 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C. (bur. Sion Presb. Cemetery). She married JAMES HARRISON DUE December 14, 1848 in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C., son of ROBERT DUE and ELIZABETH McLAUGHLIN.

Notes for HARRIET CHRISTINE JACKSON:

We have several letters from Harriet C. Jackson to her half-sister Mary. These are quite touching and poignant, for she appears to have been a very spiritual young woman, with a tendency toward melancholy. It is possible that she was ill for she died at the age of 33, and is buried in the Sion Presbyterian Cemetery in Winnsboro, S.C. Her father, Samuel Jackson, married Lucinda McCreight and had six more children, one of whom (a little girl) died.

The old McCreight home is also listed in the Historical Winnsboro book, along with a sketch. It is badly in need of repair, and at the present time is used for offices, etc. Winnsboro simply does not have the financial means to restore these old places, and they are sadly neglected.

Notes for JAMES HARRISON DUE:

James Harrison Due was in the Mexican War (1846-1848) as a Third Corp.

On the Index to Mexican War Pension Files, is found the following:

DUE, James H., Jane D., WA-10031, 8 Aug 1891 & SC-6257, both in SC, srvc Co G Palmetto Regt of SC Vols. His "Survivor's Pension" states that it was approved on January 29, 1887. He was a Corporal in Company "G", Palmetto Regiment, South Carolina Volunteers. His "Declaration of Service" dated April 10, 1886, states that he was aged 67 years, he enlisted in Fairfield Co., S.C., December 21, 1846, and was honorably discharged April 26, 1847, in Mobile, Alabama, that he was born in Columbia, Richland Co., SC, that he is 67 years of age, 5'7" high, blue eyes, light hair. He is a tin and copper smith. It is signed by him. At the time of his application he was living in Lancaster, Lancaster Co., SC. His Post Office address is Lancaster Court House, SC.

Later he served in War Between the States in the 6th S.C. Infantry. His first wife, Christine Jackson Due, had died in 1864, and after the war he moved with his children, to Monroe, N.C., where his oldest daughter, Irene Jackson Due, married Thomas Allen Austin.

He is listed in the 1880 Census as living in Lancaster Co., SC, with his second wife, Jane D. Usher Due, and their two daughters.

His second wife, Jane D. Usher Due, while living in Lancaster, S.C., applied for a Widow's Pension on July 7th, 1891, for his service in the Mexican War. The application was witnessed by Amos McManus, and her uncle, John W. Gent (evidently her mother's brother), both of whom served in the same regiment with James H. Due. The application also states that he died in Columbia, S.C., October 10th, 1890. (It may be that he died in a Veteran's hospital.) At that time he would have been about 73 years of age. To date, (June 1998) we have not found out where he is buried.

4. IRENE JACKSON⁴ DUE (*HARRIET CHRISTINE³ JACKSON, SAMUEL², SAMUEL¹*) was born May 30, 1853

in Winnsboro, Fairfield Co., S.C., and died April 02, 1929 in Columbia, Richland Co., S.C.. She married THOMAS ALLEN AUSTIN March 13, 1870 in Monroe, Union Co., N.C., son of JAMES AUSTIN and WINNIE THOMAS.

Notes for IRENE JACKSON DUE:

Irene Jackson Due was the daughter of James Harrison Due, and Harriet Christine Jackson. She was born in Winnsboro, S.C. and attended the O'Bear School in that city. Her mother died in 1864, and after the Civil War ended James H. Due moved his family to Monroe, NC. There Irene met and married Thomas Allen Austin. They lived in Monroe until 1946, at which time they moved to Columbia, SC, where they both died.

Her obituary in the Journal, Monroe, NC, April 2, 1929, reads as follows:

" Mrs. Irene Jackson Austin, age 77, died at her home at Columbia, SC, at nine o'clock Tuesday morning. She had been ill but a short time, and was a vigorous, well-preserved woman, considering her years.

" Mrs. Austin's husband, T.A. Austin, well-known Union county citizen died at his home in Columbia on March 31, 1928, just a year before, and the body interred in the Monroe cemetery. Mrs. Austin was interred this afternoon at three o'clock by the side of her husband.

"Mrs. Austin was a most excellent woman, her maiden name being Due, a daughter of the late James Harrison Due of Winnsboro, SC. She was a devoted member of the Baptist church. Before moving to Columbia about three years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Austin lived several years in Monroe where they made many friends.

" Numerous relatives and friends of Mrs. Austin accompanied the body from Columbia today, the funeral service having been conducted at the home early in the morning. Interment was in the Monroe cemetery at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, a short service being conducted at the grave by Rev. J.D. Harte, and W.B.S. Chandler. Many Monroe friends attending. The floral offerings were numerous and exceptionally beautiful.

" The active pall bearers were Geo. S. Lee, Sr., W.C. Heath, N.C. English, T.R. Beaver, R.L. Payne, J.E. Eford. Honorary: J.C. Sikes, Ed Austin, Vernon Brooks, Frank Austin, Dr.J.E. Ashcraft, Allan Heath, Jas. H. Lee, T.L. Love, J.W. Fowler and J.R. Shute.

" Surviving Mrs. Austin the following children: Mrs. D.V. Brannon, Union, SC.; Mrs. Lula Witter, Charlotte; Mrs. E. P. Carpenter, Columbia; Mrs. Harry Ellsworth Bemis, Palm Beach, Fl. and New York City; Mrs. Spencer Waters, Black Mountain; and John Austin and James Austin of New York City. John Ell Austin of Monroe is a nephew of the deceased, and Mrs. Austin paid him a visit only a few months ago."

Notes for THOMAS ALLEN AUSTIN:

Thomas Allen Austin enlisted a foot soldier in The Army of the Confederacy on April 15, 1861, at the age of 21. He left Charlotte May 20, 1861. He was in Co.B, 5th Reg. of NC Volunteers. Later in 15th Reg. due to reorganization. In 1863 he was transferred to th 48th Reg., Co. "I". One of the Battle Flags of the 48th Reg., is in the Museum in New Market, VA , proudly displayed.

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The following is taken directly from notes made by Thomas A. Austin's grandson, R. Victor Brannon. Even down to the spelling.

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Thomas Allen Austin was one of those Men from North Carolina who marched, ragged, weary, and desolate among other decimated troops at the surrender of the Confederacy, when General Robert E. Lee handed his sword over to General Ulysses S. Grant. On April 9, 1865, at Appamattox Courthouse, VA, the South gave her last gasp and supposedly died. But believe me, she is still very much alive in the hearts and spirits of true Southerners: Those whose families lived here prior to 1865.

There is a place at Appamattox, where the troops from North Carolina were encamped that April in '65. You get

out of your car, walk down a long path about 300 feet into the woods, to a monument to our men. It is quiet there, with only the shimmer of sunlight drifting through a canopy of leaves, a slight breeze caresses your face, and a sighing comes through the boughs, almost unheard, but there, nevertheless. My daughter, Melinda, and I were standing, listening, when she whispered to me, "Mother, did you hear that man walking behind us?" I did not, I must confess, but I had had a strange feeling as I read the words on that monument, tears streaming from my eyes; cold electricity ran over my body, as I wept. My daughter was sure someone was there, and perhaps there was, for the spirit will linger in a place of pain.

The Austin burial plot is located in Monroe, N.C. in Suncrest Cemetery. In the center stands a large obelisk approximately 14 ft. high, around which are located the markers of a number of family members, including Thomas Allen Austin and wife Irene Jackson Due Austin, Inez Austin Bemis, Winnie Davis Austin Carpenter, Thomas J. Austin, and several others.

Notes for JESSIE BRIGHT AUSTIN:

She was known as "Granny Brannon" or as I remember, simply "Brannon". My last memories of her were when she lived on Pinckney Street in Union, S.C. Her house was always full of people, with kids running wildly about. We played on the pipes under the house, which was open, with the yard sloping down, so there was lots of room. We used to run in the front door, down the hall, dart into the dining/sitting room, where there was a large round table with a white sheet thrown over whatever was left over from the former meal. We would grab a chicken leg or pork chop, or whatever, and a biscuit, and out the back door we would fly! Across the back porch and down the steps into the back yard.

Grandma had a garden down behind the barn, and I remember there were goobers (peanuts), corn, beans, tomatoes, squash, and a number of other vegetables. She always had a cow, and I can tell you, that what they sell for milk nowadays (1998) is nothing at all like the wonderful, delicious, milk that came from grandma's cow.

And we had fresh buttermilk. What a treat! Buttermilk with cornbread broken up in it, and eaten with a spoon is one of the pure delights of my childhood. Or, a roasted sweet potato, still warm from the oven, with the skin peeled about halfway down, and split open and filled with real "Honest-to-God" home-made country butter.

I can still see Grandma sitting in her chair on the back porch, a butterchurn between her knees, plunging the churn handle up and down, ker-plunk ker-plunk ker-plunk. She would stop from time to time to check and see if the butter had come to the top. Finally she would stop, scoop it out, and work it in her hands to get all the liquid out. She would then pat it into a butter mold, and set it in the ice box. THAT was good butter.

Some times an old black lady "Aunt Rose" would come by to visit with Grandma. They were great friends. Aunt Rose only had a few teeth, and I seem to remember a stray hair or two on her chin. She was a well known person around Union, and always welcome. Anywhere.

Ahhh, memories. I could go on, but enough for now.

(For the reader, I shall tell you that as of this writing, July, 1998, I, Victoria Brannon A. Pickrell, shall be 74 years of age, so you will know that this all took place many years ago.)

Grandma Brannon and Granddad Brannon are both buried on Pinckney Street, in Forest Lawn Cemetery, not too far from where they lived. Theirs is a double headstone.

Her obituary in the Union, SC newspaper follows:

"Mrs. Jessie Bright Austin Brannon, 83, widow of Doyle Victor Brannon, died at 2:20 PM Sunday (March 9, 1958) in a Union hospital after a brief illness.

"Mrs. Brannon was born in Monroe, NC, a daughter of the late Thomas Allen and Irene Jackson Due Austin. She had been a resident of Union for the past 50 years and was affectionately known as "Granny Brannon" to her friends. She was a member of the First Baptist Church.

"Surviving are two daughters Mrs. F.P. Pollen Jewett of Nyack, NY, and Mrs. William Franklin Edmondson of Greenville; 3 sons, Robert Victor Brannon of Chappells, Staff Sgt. Kinsey Paul Brannon of the US Army, and Jean Neal Brannon of Greenville; 2 sisters, Mrs. Eugene P. Carpenter of Charlotte, N.C. and Mrs. Spencer Waters of New York City; 19 grandchildren and 25 great-grandchildren."

The following is paraphrased->> Funeral Tuesday 11 AM at First Baptist Church Chapel, by the Rev. James L. White III. Burial Forest Lawn Cemetery.

Pallbearers will be grandsons. Honorary escort will be Dr. Gerald Fielder, Dr. Francis P. Owens, Holbert Wetmore, Ben Young, Wallace Harris, J. Harold Lam, and Charlie Eades, and the Men's Bible Class of the

church.

The body is at the home of a granddaughter Mrs. Marion Vaughn, 205 Catherine St. (This is Dinah, who later divorced Bim Vaughn, and now lives near Hillsborough, N.C. She is now married to Earl Apple)

Notes for DOYLE VICTOR BRANNON:

Doyle Victor Brannon was born in New Prospect, S.C., according to the Family Bible. New Prospect no longer exists, but it was located about 6 mi. east of Campobello. It was probably a very small town, as was normal back in those days.

Grandad Brannon was quite a musician. He played the violin very well, and I can remember him coming back home after playing for a dance, or something. He also wrote music, and I understand he wrote the "Joan Polka" for his granddaughter, Joan Brannon, daughter of his son, Jean Neal Brannon. I always hoped he would write a "Victoria Waltz", but he never did, to my knowledge.

His obituary in the Union SC newspaper reads as follows:

"Doyle V. Brannon, age 73, passed way at his home on North Church St. following a sudden illness Wednesday morning (November 28, 1944).

Surviving are his wife, Mrs Jessie Austin Brannon; Mrs Winnie Jewett of Nyack, N.Y.; Mrs. Frank Edmondson of Greenville, SC.; Victor Brannon of Chappells, SC; Sgt Paul Brannon, US Army Air Corps, Ft. Wayne, Indiana; Chief Petty Officer (US Navy) Doyle M. Brannon, Nyack, NY; Jean N. Brannon, Greenville, SC.

The following brothers and sisters - Charlie Brannon of Greer; Virgil Brannon of Washington, D.C.; Milledge Brannon, Blacksburg; Mrs. Alice Linder, Clifton; Mrs. Rendy Sprinkle, Clifton, SC."
