THE JENNINGS FAMILY OF (Old Camden), CHESTER, FAIRFIELD/EDGEFIELD/AIKEN COUNTIES, SOUTH CAROLINA.

Despite all the material written on the name Jennings in America with especially that on the South Carolina Jennings, there are still many unanswered and undocumented facts concerning our branch of the James Jennings family. There are also some differences of opinion regarding this family. However, I believe much of it is due to the fact that some sources are going on part tradition, rather than on documented research, or finding means to prove the facts. These will be explained along in this material on our South Carolina Jennings family.

The known and documented Jennings of our family begins in Chester(Old Camden Dist.), Fairfield Counties of South Carolina, with a marriage into the Grubbs family of that area. This is as far back as these Jennings have been able to be proven to any extent at all. Where they came from before that is unknown-possibly from Virginia. The daughter of Enoch Grubbs(c.1755-1832) & Florid K. Burton(c.1755-1811), was Mary Grubbs,(ca.1777-1816), who married James Jennings, (ca.1760-ca.1830/40). It is believed that his father was John Jennings of that area(Chester/Fairfield) Old Camden Dist. It is also the opinion of Alice Konde, and Paul Crocket, who have done extensive up-dated research on the South Carolina Jennings family, that it was a James Jennings who married Mary Grubbs, not a John Jennings as has been believed by many in the past. There are documents that were sent to the DAR for a Supplemental on Enoch Grubbs, that helps to provide proof, which was carefully studied, and some new materials had to be sent in before it was accepted. This was done by the writer of this book. More details will be given farther on in this paper.

We do not know whether our first Jennings were in the Fairfield area, but do know that they have been more associated with the Edgefield/Aiken area. That is to say that we have more information on those in the Edgefield area, especially around the Graniteville area. They could have come from Edgefield in the beginning, but nothing has been proven to that fact. Graniteville was originally in the Old Edgefield Dist. and later became part of Aiken County, S.C. However, it is possible that they were from the Fairfield/Chester(Old Camden) area, and had been living there before Mary Grubbs married James Jennings(ca.1791). More work needs to be done on this part of the Jennings family history in S.C.

Because of an extensive court case over the estate of Enoch Grubbs(married to Florid K. Burton-ours, and 2nd to Mary Henson), there was a battle of the Jennings heirs (through Mary Grubbs-Jennings) vs. the heirs of the 2nd marriage. The Jennings heirs tried to prove that the large family by the 2nd wife, Mary Henson, was not legitimate, and no marriage(they said) had taken place. The Jennings family lost the case(Civil Court). Then it was heard in Equity Court, but they lost there also, and the estate was eventu ally settled as it had been written in the will of Enoch Grubbs in 1831. It was not settled until 1839, when the youngest child(2nd marriage) became of age. Please see more details under Grubbs family section of the book.

We know that Mary Grubbs was married to James Jennings(named with the sons-in-law on the will of Enoch Grubbs, and on other documents)., and their son John L. Jennings(ca.1799-1864), was married (ca.1823) to an Ann(?). We believe (obituary notice enclosed), that Mary(mother of Ann(?) Jennings, was married 2nd to a Jesse Jay.(his will). Therefore the maiden name of Ann(?) Jennings is unknown at this time. Their daughter, Mary Ann Jennings was married to John Permenter. This is a proven fact, as the tombstone of Mary Ann reads, Mary Anne, wife of John Permenter." Graniteville, S.C. Cemetery. See Photo Section.

THE JAMES JENNINGS FAMILY OF FAIRFIELD/EDGEFIELD COUNTIES, SOUTH CAROLINA: Con't.

There is a headstone at the Springs Methodist Church Cemetery in New Ellenton, S.C. that could possibly be the grave of Ann, mother of Mary Ann Jenning-Permenter. It reads, "Annie, wife of John Jennings." My reasoning is that Sarah Jennings, sister to Mary Ann Jennings-Permenter was married(4th wife) to Joseph Eubanks(gr.grandfather of writer). They were the parents of Joseph Asbel Eubanks. She (Ann) may have been living with her son-in-law and daughter. Some research with the census records might help to prove this. Also the finding of an Obituary would help. Joseph Eubanks and 4th wife, Sarah Jennings-Eubanks are buried at the Springs Methodist Cemetery at New Ellenton, S.C. According to the way people lived in that day, this is a logical explanation, as the children provided for their parents in old age, and took them into their homes.

We know that the wife of John L. Jennings was Ann(on census). Her mother was a Mary (Jay). It was thought by some of us researching Jennings that she was aJay but the finding of the will of a Jesse Jay, seems to prove that Mary was married a 2nd time, after the death of her husband, to a Jesse Jay. Therefore, we do not know the maiden name of Ann ? Jennings, or the name of her father. We do know from census records that the parents of .Ann ? Jennings were born in North Carolina. The will of Jesse Jay, names his wife as Mary. Then we have the Edgefield Death Notices & Cemetery Records, by Carlee T.McClendon, which lists(1512), Mrs. Mary Jay, died at the resident of her son-in-law, John Jennings. She was 83 years old. Died Oct.19, 1860. She left an only daughter (Ann Jennings), and 2 sons, grandchildren and great grandchildren. The material comes from the "Edgefield Adventurer", 12 Dec. 1860. This material confirms that she was the wife of Jesse Jay(her 2nd marriage), and gives us no information as to the maiden name of Ann ? Jennings, wife of John L. Jennings. The 1860 census of Edgefield also shows Mary Jay, as living with John L. Jennings and Ann, his wife. In the 1880 census, Ann(?) Jennings was living with her son, Whitfield Jennings and family. On this it says her parents were born in North Carolina. It will be some job to find the maiden name of Ann(?) Jennings. One of the names of a son of Whitfield Jennings, her son, is BUTLER, which is a strange first name for a boy. Could this be the maiden name of Ann?

The <u>JENNINGS-PERMENTER</u> branch of our family is as follows; See enclosed Charts for more details.

<u>John Jennings,Sr.</u> Ca 1740/45-ca. 1819, m. Mary(name is from 1804 deed names his wife as Mary-Edgefield,S.C. Deed Book"Q"-p. 81). It is not known whether she(Mary) is the mother of the following:

James Jennings: 1765/70-1830/40, m. Mary Grubbs(daughter of Enoch Grubbs & Florid K. Burton). 2nd wife of James Jennings-unknown. (Mary Grubbs-ca.1777-1816.

John L. Jennings: ca. 1799-7Aug.1864 m. ca. 1823 Ann(?) b.ca.1802.Mary, mother of Ann married 2nd Jesse Jay. What was the name of her first husband, father of Ann(?) Jennings?

Mary Ann Jennings: 19 Feb.1827-11 Feb.1916-Graniteville, S.C. m. John Permenter(11 May 1833-7 May 1901)-Graniteville, S.C. Edgefield/Aiken Counties.

Sarah(Salllie)Elizabeth Permenter: 4 July 1859-13 Dec. 1919, m. 1881, Jesse Collington Eubanks, Aiken Co. South Carolina.

Mary Lee(Mamie) Eubanks(1882-1973) m. Milton Anthony Cave(1888-1973).

Mary LaVerne Cave(1917-) m, 1937-Phoenix, AZ Raymond Sidney Davis

According to some Jennings descendents, it has been the belief that it was a John Jennings who was married to Mary Grubbs. The father of the two brothers, James and John was a John Jennings. All this evidence is enclosed in this writing, and was approved by D.A.R. for this writer's Supplemental for Enoch Grubbs. As I had to do some extra research and hard work to prove my line-Eubanks-Permenter-Jennings to Grubbhs, I had to do reasoning and deduction to arrive at these facts. It is also the conclusion of Alice Konde and Paul Crocket, who have been doing research on the Jennings families of Fairfield-Edgefield Counties of South Carolina for many years. I believe that Paul Crocket has completed a book on the family, and I do not at this time know what Alice Konde has been doing on the Jennings families of South Carolina.

Another piece of proof is the Philip Jennings estate file, showing the children of his deceased brother James, as being William, Enoch Jr., John and Thomas, and the Enoch Grubbs deed with witnesses, John Hedgepath, and James Jennings-as sons-in-law, is good evidence that it was James Jennings who married Mary Grubbs. All of this material is enclosed within this book. I will let the readers come to their own conclusion. However, please remember that is has been researched extensively by this writer(in order to satify DAR requirements), and by a number of others, including Alice Konde, and Paul Crocket.

This writer and her daughter, Jocelyn Ruth Davis, visited the home of Minnie Carpenter(daughter of Minnie Permenter and Thomas Carpenter, in Graniteville, S.C. in 1986. Minnie was able to tell us about the Permenter-Jennings families. She said that Mary Ann Jenning-Permenter lived with them in her old age.(after the death of John Permenter.) In order to verify this, one would have to look in census of Graniteville, under the Carpenter name--1910 census, as she(Mary Ann Jennings-Permenter died in 1916. John Permenter died in 1906. We have no reason to doubt her, and she seemed very rational and knew what she was talking about. We felt she had trouble trying to place where we fit into the Jennings-Permenter picture. After all, we did not have a Southern accent. She has since passed away--1989. I presume she is buried at the Graniteville Cemetery in the enclosed plot of the Permenter-Carpenter families. See photo section for pictures of graves of Permenters and Carpenters.

As for the beginnings of our Jennings family in South Carolina, I have not been able to prove any connections with the Virginia Jennings, or any in any other parts of the United States, or where they might have come from before South Carolina. It seems that for us they start with Old Camden Distrist/Ches/cr_Fairfield County, part of South Carolina, either spreading into Edgefield Co. or came from there in the beginning. I can see no relation to William Jennings Bryan family, and no relations to the famous Jennings estate case with English heirs.

It would be great to be able to tie in with something or other Jennings, but such has not been the case. I do not believe in claiming relationships unless they can be proven, or put on a propective basis with some reasonable facts, that may have a chance to be proven. It is possible to speculate with some facts found in research, but say that it is speculation or tradition. I would have liked to have had more material proven before this book was compiled, but I feel that I am fortunate to have proven a Supplemental for DAR through Eubanks-Permenter-Jennings-to Enoch Grubbs, as it has been difficult to prove DAR patriots on these lines-Mary Lee Eubanks-Cave's maiden name. Isaac Toole, and Enoch Grubbs are the only two proven. Many of these families fought in the War Between the States, but few in the Revolutionary War. I believe that some of them were of the Quaker faith, which may account for there being so few.

These are children of James Jennings and Mary Grubbs(dau. of Enoch Grubbs & Florid K. Burton) Proves that James Jennings was husband of Mary Grubbs, as these are her children(sons) on estate of Enoch Grubbs also. See Grubbs section.

Enoch Grubbs, Sr. sg.13 July 1831. Book 13, page 359, Pr. 24 Sept. 1834. Fairfield Co. S.C. names in his will-2nd wife Mary Henson Grubbs, Children "My older children", Mary Jennings, deceased daughter and her children. See will.

Will of Jesse Jay: Box 15,Pkg #543, Joseph Jay Exor. Filed 17 Aug.1837,Edgefield Dist. S.C. Shows Mary Jay as his wife. This is why we realize that Jay is not the maiden name of our Ann(?) Jennings.

Examining the guide to Legislative Petitions we found that no petitions prior to 1776 have survived. Thus the index covers the period 1776-1800. The Archives staff will look in the index for ONE NAME per request.

Should you find no reference to your ancestor by name, it was suggested that copies of petitions from the area of your ancestor's residence might show his presence

by his signature.

The Index to Legislative Petitions is available ONLY in the South Carolina Archives Search Room, and is produced by computer-output-microfilm (COM). They have no plan to produce duplicate copies of this film index for sale to the public, we were told.

Work is underway to prepare an index to legislative petitions for the period 1800 to 1820. No completion date was given us.

Governor William Campbell fled from Charleston September 15, 1775, ending the colonial rule. Although British forces did succeed in recapturing Charleston and holding the city and surrounding countryside for a short time later, this marked the end of the orderly colonial government.

The Rebel Assembly took over rule of the former British colony, and as a Provincial Congress adopted a provisional constitution March 26, 1776, and proclaimed themselves the successor to the royal Commons House of Assembly which ceased to function the preceeding August.

Descendants of Hazekiah Gentry are eligible for membership in Sons of, and Daughters of the American Revolution, in right of his appearance on the 1778-79

2. Copy of tombstone pictures--Graniteville Cemetery--Graniteville, Aiken County, SC. I took pictures in July of 1986. SHOWS HER BIRTH AS: 10 Febre 1827. As she was born in FEBr, and the census was taken in NOV. of same year, she would have been 24, when it was taken. THE TWO FIGURES AGREE.

3. THE TOMBSTONES ALSO SHOW THAT SHE WAS THE WIFE OF JOHN PERMENTER. NOTE: I have attached a Notorized Statement to the fact that I took the pictures, and that they are my ancestors. Copies enclosed.

Regarding the 1860 census with the age descrepency: She would have been 34 years old, and it shows 29. The only explanations I can give are that she was older than her husband--John Permenter, maybe wanted to apprear younger than him, or someone gave wrong age, or that it was a mistake on the part of the census taker. As you can see from my Supplemental, #667755-A 625- on Isaac Toole, Sarah (Sallie) Permenter, her daughter was my grandmother(Proven).

5. 1870 census--Gives her as age 43, and she should have been 44, as she turned 44 in Feb. of that year. I feel that someone who gave out the census infor must have forgotten that she had turned 44. I tried to find her on the 1900, and 1910 census to attempt to do away with the descrepency completely, but could not find her. The 1880 census are completely wrong for almost all the members of the family: John Permenter -- should be 47, Mary Ann should be 54, Amelia-23, Sarah E.(Sallie)-21, Emma-18, John 15, and last one is correct.

HOWEVER, I BELIEVE THAT THE TOMBSTONE PICTURES, AND THE 1850 CENSUS, WHECH IS CORRECT, IS PROOF OF HER PARENTAGE, AND HER MARRIAGE. I tried for birth, death, and marriage certificates, but they are hard to come by in South Carolina in that time. If I am able to find additional census(1900,1910), before I send this in, I will include it with the papers.

As you know from your experience in Genealogy, the census records can often have very bad mistakes, and for example, my mother Mary Lee Eubanks, is down as NORA Lee Eubanks:

PARENTAGE OF JOHN L. JENNINGS: I have done the best that I can to come II up with the necessary proof that you asked for. I was unable to get any death, or birth certificates out of South Carolina. Therefore I have tried to map out the family members, and make a round-about attempt to prove that John L. Jennings was the son of James Jennings, and Mary Grubbs.

L. WILL OF JOHN L. JENNINGS: 4 Aug. 1864, Pro: 30 Aug. 1864-Edgefield Bist.SC Mentions only his wife, Ann, and young daughter, Sarah. All the other children were married by 1864. Sarah was the sister to my Mary Ann Jennings(Permenter). She is on 1850, 1860 census, so is proof that this John Jennings is father. See also John L. Jennings Family Group Sheet.

Jennings) This is complicated, as is all of the Jennings Estate papers.

- 7. I HAVE INCLUDED COPIES OF LINEAGE CHARTS, FAMILY GROUP SHEETS ONLY TO GIVE A MAP FOR THE JENNINGS FAMILY. I realize after being a DAR Registrar for 3½ years, that these are not acceptable documentation for an application. I only send them to show the positions of members of the family. Might help others

My mother was born in 1882, and I have often heard her talking about her Mother's family--Permenters and Jennings. I know that these are my ancestors from her, and from the little lady--Miss Minnie Carpenter-that I spoke about above. (See Enclosed photo Concerning Minnie Carpenter)

It means a great deal to have this go through, as I have 3 proven lines, and this one(Grubbs) is one of 6 Supplementals that I have pending. I cannot spend any more money on it, so I hope this material stands up. I take my DAR seriously, as I have a Museum Correspondent Docent pin, and a NSDAR Lineage Pin, for my hard work as Registrar, and Lineage chairman for 3½ years.

At the time the Supplementals were turned in, I was member of Cahuilla, Palm Springs, CA. but now I have gone At-Large, in order to be an organizing member of the new chapter—Joshua Tree, at Yucca Valley, CA. We are about to have our final ceremonies to becoming a new chapter. So I don't know what you do about this Supplemental(if it goes through). Where will it be sent, etc.

 The Family Record Pages: Julia Ann Inlow is shown Julia Ann, Judy Ann and Juby Ann, & July William Jennings most frequently used Wm except in official papers when he signs William. His name on his tombstone is Wm. It is my opinion that the Mary Jay, who died Oct. 19, 1860 was the grandmother of William Jennings.
A large number of entries appear to have been written at one time and from the handwriting William Jennings could have been the writer. Some of the entries could have been copied from the Inlow family records. I have been unable to find the William Jennings family bible but I shall continue trying. The date of death of John Inlow, blurred by a spot on the enclosed copy is September 24, 1849. The blur on the date of birth of Elizer Missouri, May 5, 1851, covers "of Wm". The name of the son of William Jennings who was born Mar. 12, 1853 and who died the 19 of the same month, was William Abner, a blot covers part of the name on the enclosed copy. The entries of the children of John and Rachel Inlow indicates incorrectness in Page 18 of Dr. Hunter's papers, Julia Ann as only chile The Letters: All the letters I have were written by females and in that era the girls attendance at schools was very limited, much more limited than the opportunities of the boys, which were also limited to a great degree. The letter dated Feb. 11, 1879 appears to have been written by William Jennings' mother. The letter dated April 6, 1880 was written for William Jennings' mother by her granddaughter Bettie Jennings. Bettie also wrotea letter from herself to the two oldest girls of William Jennings, Eliza and Angeline. Part of Bettie's letter is on the page showing Ann Jennings' name. The letter, dated Feb. 11, 1879 contains information confirming the conclusion that John L. Jennings was the father of William Jennings, my grandfather. The writer mentions Whit(Whitfield), Sue(Susan), Jef(Jefferson) and the Sally who would not agree for Jef's child to go to Georgia, apparently is Jef's wife Sarah,

The letter of Feb. 11, 1879 states that money was owed her by John Permenter and Dr. Wn. Jennings. A John Permenter is named as a private in the Confederate Army in Chapman's History of Edgefield County, Page 491. Dr. William Jennings was eulogized in that history, Page359-360.

The letter, dated April 6, 1880 mentions Roseyanas (Rosannah) and

It has only been a few years that this writer has been able to include the name of Grubbs into our Jennings line. By going back to around the Revolutionary War era on Jennings, I STUMBLED upon the fact that a Jennings had married a Grubbs-thus started a new line for my mother's family. It was another line for the book to be written--EUBANKS-PERMENTER FAMILIES AND ALLIED LINES. This discovery also gave me another Rev. War Patriot--Enoch Grubbs. It was not necessary to prove that Enoch Grubbs was in the Rev. War, as he is in the DAR Patriot Index, but I had to prove that his daughter Mary Grubbs married a James Jennings, and so on to our known John Permenter, who married Mary Ann Jennings. This fact had been traditionally handed down by Geneva Eubanks, our Family Historian.

It is believed that the Grubbs came from Denmark into the Hartz Mountains of northern Germany. There were a a number of spellings for the name-Grubbs/Grubs/ Grubbe/, Von Grubbe, Grubenhagen, etc. They were followers of John Huss-Hussites. Due to persecutions of these Protestants, they left Germany for England and Ireland, and finally to America. See printed article in this section for more details. They settled about the year 1430 in Eastwell in the Parish of Pottrne, County Wilts. It is said that John Grubbs arrived from England in 1677, on the ship KENT, to Burlington, N.Y. and then to Grubbs Landing in New Castle County, DEL.

MORE HISTORY:

According to an article in the DAR magazine, Vol.55, p.38, 1921, the Grubbs belonged to an old English family, appearing in the records of Kent, Cornwall, Hertfordshire, and other counties of the 13th century. The English stock seems to have come from Danish descent. They seemed to have come into Germany from Denmark, and then migrated from Germany into England about the year 1430. A John Grubb arrived from England on the ship Kent in 1677 to Grubbs Landing, New Castle County, Deleware. Some consider this is from whence all American Grubbs families descend. It seems some went to Virginia, and then to South Carolina, and Georgia. According to an article by Ethel S. Updike, found in the LDS library in Santa Monica, CA-329.2 ul31-2, "On 12 Feb. 1785 Elizabeth Grubbs was received by letter in Turkey Creek Baptist Church in Abbeville County, South Carolina, indicating that she was a member and a new arrival. Ref: Thurkey Creek Baptist Church Minute Book." This may indicate that our Grubbs could have come from Virginia, but the fact is that we believe our Enoch Grubbs was born in South Carolina, and he would have been born ca. 1755, so others could have come earlier to South Carolina. A group of Grubbs came from Deleware to Worth County, GA.

In the book on the Grubbs Family, compiled by William B. Newby, Jr.2220 Dogwood Lane, N.W. Huntsville, AL. 35810, on page 84, he has record of a will: Some South Carolina Records, (Book-Col.GA Library) Fairfield County, S.C. page 98, Thomas Grubbs, late of Fairfield County, planter, died intestate-adm-inventory rreturned 17 April 1795,p. 109-June 6, 1795 appraisment of the Estate of Thomas Grubbs dec'd L 1052. Rec. 5 Feb. 1796 Could this be the father of Enoch Grubbs?

NOTE: 3 pages from his book(p 6,7, and 8) will be found duplicated in this book. I appreciate being able to use them. I believe some of the research was done byMrs. John B. Williams, 210 South Cannon Avenue, Sylacauga, AL 35150. I do not know how much and just what in the book was done by her.

THE ENOCH GRUBBS FAMILY OF FAIRFIELD DISTRICT, SOUTH CAROLINA-Con't.

The parents of Enoch Grubbs are not known, so this makes it difficult to do much on his backgroud. They lived in Fairfield Dist./county, in the northern part called Feasterville community. His first wife was Florid K. Burton(ours), and they had 6 children: William A. m. Elizabeth Garvey, Mary m. James Jennings, Rhoda, m. John Hedgepath, Sarah m. William Lott, m. Sarah Rhoda Parnell, JOhn Grubbs, m. unknown. Enoch married 2nd-Mary Henson and their children were: Ashford m. unknown, Thomas H. Grubbs, m. 1. Galissiah, 2. Frances J. Taylor, Minerva, m. Pleasant R. Thomas, Serena m. unknown, Methena m. Charles Jones, Lucinda m. Leonard Sinclair Pratt. Between the two wives he had 12 children-6 by each wife.

At the death of Enoch Grubbs in 1832, the dispute between the heirs of his daughter, Mary Grubbs(by 1st wife), and the heirs by his 2nd wife, came to a Civil Court case, with the Mary Grubbs heirs stating that Enoch Grubbs was not legally married to Mary Henson, and therefore her children should not inherit what was left to them by the will. They lost the Civil Court case, and took it to Equity Court, and lost there also. The estate was finally settled in the year 1839-40. Thomas Jennings, grandson, was the orator for the heirs of Mary Grubbs vs. the Henson group. He tried to prove that Mary Henson was not married to their grandfather, but it seems that the minister of the Beaver Creek Baptist church testified that he had married Enoch Grubbs and Mary Henson. Of course the Jennings heirs lost the case. A copy of the Court Cases was obtained from Fairfield Dist.-1839-#6. Thomas Jennings vs. Solomon Coleman and others. Filed 3 April 1837. The estate of Enoch Grubbs was at the time of the case still not administered because one of the youngest children had not reached the age to inherit(according to the will.) His will was dated 1831-Apt.50,pkg. 770, Inventory 29 Sept. 1832. The estate wasn't settled until about end of 1839, as per will of Enoch Grubbs.

Enoch did military service in the South Carolina Militia at the Battle of Four Holes(1781)in the Rev. War. The number of the audited accounts for his pay is AA 3168,pp. ly-7y-N 28, South Carolina Archives. He also provided oats of the Calvary horses of Col. Washington.(William). It is believed by some sources that Enoch Grubbs did duty at the Battle of Eutaw Springs, S.C. It would be interesting to search this out.

Another interesting thing that he did was to give 4 a. of land for the Beaver Creek Baptist Church. He sold it to them for \$20. This church was composed of members of Chester and Fairfield Districts. This was done in Feb. of 1832, and his will was proved in Sept. 1832, so he must have died shortly after he gave this land for the church.

* This deed show James Jennings and John Hedgepath, the two sons-in-law that are on the Grubbs estate papers-1832. This had to be the husband of Mary Grubbs-Jennings, as the date is 1803-4, and there was not a son James Jennings old enough to be a signer of a legal paper. The brother of John L. Jennings, James Jennings, sons of James Jennings and Mary Grubbs, was not born until ca. 1803--4. This proves that JAMES JENNINGS was married to Mary Grubbs-Jennings, not a John Jennings. This proof was sent to DAR-part of the research they used to agree it was a James Jennings.

CIVIL COURT CASE-Thomas Jennings vs. S. Coleman & others. The Jennings heirs were trying to prove that the heirs of Enoch Gruubs by 2nd wife, Mary Henson were not legal heirs-but illegimate children, and should not inherit the estate of Enoch Grubbs. The Jennings heirs lost the case. Was proven that Enoch Grubbs was married to Mary Henson.

Equity Court: 1837-Again with Thomas Jennings as orator, the case was brought before the Equity Court, They lost this also, and the estate was settle in 1839-40. Final returns state that the Grubbs estate was sold on 2 Aug. 1837

The whole thing was quite a battle-lasting from 1832-1839-40-to get it all settled, property sold, and heirs paid off. Some of parts of the case are in this section. The writer has all the copies of the original cases.

Thomas H.Grubbs, his wife Galissiah, with two sons William Cooper Grubbs, and Thomas Pinkney Grubbs, moved from Fairfield, South Carolina to what was then Tippah County Mississippi. Their Post Office was Clarysville. Their first child born after coming to Mississippi was Ashford G. Dec.I3, I845. Susannah Elizabeth was born in I848, John F. in I850, and Martha Ann in I852. Galissiah died in the early I850s and Thomas H.Grubbs married Francis J. (Believed to be a Taylor). They had two children: Parthena I858 and James Pleasant in I860. In I860, the Thomas Grubbs family was living in the Buncombe community, Pontotoc County. Their Post Office was Birmingham, Mississippi. In February I863 Thomas Grubbs was discharged from duty as a private soldier by the Confederate Army. He returned home and was killed later that year by men who wanted the fine Stallion which he was riding. He is buried in the Dunlap Cemetery not far from where he was killed.

William Cooper Grubbs, Thomas H. Grubbs' oldest son, and my Grandfather, was born in S.C. In I842. He served several months in the Confederacy. He enlisted in Tippah County in I861 and served until the end of the war in I865. He was at home on furlough when the war ended. He was captured at Fort Donnelson, Tn. and held prisoner at Rock Island, Ill. After the fall of Vicksburg, he was exchanged for a Northern Soldier and returned to his former Company. His service was with the 23 Inf. CO.E. He died May I3, I9I7, near Keownville, MS., and is buried in the Pleasant Hill Cemetery.

William Cooper Grubbs and Sarah Jane Jones, daughter of Robert L.Jones, were married Feb.28, I867. To this union were born five children. Nancy Ann Elizabeth Oct.2, I868, William John Oct.20. I873, Dallis May I3, I877, Carrie Nov.I, I880 and Lonzo Ashford Sept.28, I884.

Nancy Ann Elizabeth Grubbs married Ivan Tidwell. They had two child-ren, Clara who married Raymond Hall, and Madison who died young and is buried in the Mt.Gilead Cemetery. To Raymond Hall and Clara were born several children but only one lived to be grown, Albert Hall. Albert died in I975 and is buried in Garden City, Kansas.

John Grubbs married Ida Medlin, daughter of Tom Medlin and Martha Ann Grubbs. John and Ida were the parents of two children, Minnie and Willie.

Minnie married Emmett Hall and they had two sons, Clifton Hall and Leon
Hall. Willie married Lillian Smithey, daughter of Ellis Smithey. They had
Two sons: William Edward and Billy Wayne.

Dallis Grubbs and Lone F. Pannell were married Dec. 8, 1892, by T. A, J. Beazley. Their children were: Annie, Lawrence, Lester, Oma and John Edd.

Carrie Grubbs and Ira Medlin were the parents of five sons:

Lonzo Ashford Grubbs and Gertrude Roten, daughter of John Allen Roten and Emma Huffstickler, were married Feb. 25, 1912, by Bro. Billy McKeown, To this Union were born three sons: William Allen Grubbs Dec. 15, 1912, died Aug. 8, 1913. Marvin Lonzo Grubbs born Sept. 14, 1915. Arnold Whitten Grubbs born May 12, 1922.

Marvin Lonzo Grubbs and Ethyleen Springer, daughter of Elbert Springer and Pauline Raines, were married May 27, I939, by Rev.E.S. Hall at Martin Town. They have eleven children. Namely, Elbert I940, Jasper I942, Jean I944, Dennis I947, Thomas I949, Sarah I950, Brenda I953, Linda I955, Glenda I957, Trinda I960, Truitt I96I.

Thomas Pinkney Grubbs, John F. Grubbs, Ashford G. Grubbs and James Pleasant Grubbs all moved to Texas in the 1800s. We have no record on Parthenia. Ashford G. Grubbs married Sarah Francis Sigman, Mary Sigman's daughter, of Dumas. Ashford died in 1933, at Sanger, Texas. James Pleasant has two daughters living in California. Cora 90 and Callie 82. James Pleasant died in 1924.

I am always glad to hear from you. I have gathered more information on the Grubbs genealogy, but haven't had time to sort it out. You asked about the information that I had on Mary Grubbs and James Jennings. Aunt Mary was my Grandfather's own Aunt. His Father. Thomas H. was her youngest Brother. Grandfather William Cooper Grubbs passed away in I9I7 , but his wife, Sarah Jane Jones Grubbs lived until July 1932. I was seventeen years old then. She told me shout the families, and one of my Father's sisters, Dallas Pannell, born in 1877 lived until later, and Aunt Carrie, another sister died in the 1960s. These have given me a pretty good knowledge of the family. James Jennings was indeed Mary's husband, There was a John Jennings also in Fairfield Co.SC.but I want to think that he was a Brother to James. There has been a John and James Jennings, both Baptist preachers whose Grandparents came from S.C. I want to think that they are mescendants. They lived cloe to me. They have chilren living here now.

Enoch Grubbs, Sr. is believed to have been born in South Carolina and was first married in 1775. His first wife was Floried K. Burton about whom little else is known. Their first child, William, was born Oct. 6, 1776, just 3 months after the 13 Colonies had declared their Independence from Great Britian.

They had six children and apparently accumulated a considerable amount of land, monies and slaves during the years they were married. They lived in Fairfield County on 200 acres known as the Richardson Tract they had purchased from David Richardson with, possibly, an unknown number of acres from him and others.

During the American Revolutionary War (1775-1781), Enoch Grubbs served with Colonel William Washington's cavalry as foot soldier (Private) in Camden District near Orangeburg, Cowpens and Four Holes, South Carolina. Some of his pay records are on the following pages. He received indents from the government - number 1211 Lib Y - copies are on following pages.

The first United States of America census of South Carolina (1790) shows Enoch Grubs living in Fairfield County with his wife, three sons under age 16 and three daughters. There was, also, another man (besides Enoch) over the age of 16 in the household. It is not known who this man was, but it could have been a brother or father of Enoch or Floried. With a little over 7600 population, Fairfield was the largest of the 7 counties in the Camden District.

Prom the Will on the following pages, it seems that Enoch's first wife died in about 1812, and he shared some of their estate with the children he had by her.

Then, he married Mary Henson who evidently was 25-30 years younger than he was as they had six small children at the time Enoch had his Will drawn up and signed on July 13, 1831. Thomas (the second named child) was 13 at this time having been born in 1818 when Enoch was 63 years old. Mary must have been considerably younger to have borne him 6 children. Although Thomas was named 2nd in the Will, the 1820 Census shows Enoch, Mary and one son in the household. So he must have been the oldest. The other five were born between 1820 and 1825.

Enoch and Mary did not live on the Richardson Tract as the Will refers to that land as "..where I formerly lived". They did live in Fairfield County, however.

In February of 1832, Enoch sold a 4 acre plantation to a group who built the Beaver Creek Baptist Church. The western length of this property faced onto the road leading to Columbia, S.C., to the south. This church is now 148 years old and still holds worship services. On the following pages are copies of the Bill of Sale for the property and pictures of the interior and exterior of the church. It is believed that the Grubbs were members of this church.

Enoch Grubbs' Will was proved (filed for Probate) on Sept. 24, 1832, which leads me to believe he died in the first part of September or a little earlier. In the Will, he divided the Richardson Tract on which he and Ploried and their children had lived between Rhoda  $(\frac{1}{2})$ , Enoch, Jr.  $(\frac{1}{4})$  and John  $(\frac{1}{4})$  and left 17 of his slaves to various one. Presumably, he left some slaves to care for Mary and the six small children he had by her.

Enoch Grubbs, Sr. was 77 when he died in 1832.

The origin of the Grubba name seems to have been given to a group who migrated from the Scandinavian countries to the Hartz Mountains of Brunswich in the northern part of Germany. There was a variety of spellings of the name - Grubba, Gruba, Grubbe, Grubbe, Grubenhagen, etc. They built and lived in castles for many generations from about 1044 A.D. to about the middle 1500's when they began to migrate to Ireland, England and eventually to America. The name Grubbs meant "one who grubbs in the land" like miners or owners of mines. The Christian - or first- names of the Grubbs frequently point to the Bible loving protestant background of the family. Some of the Von Grubbes became Protestants through the preaching of John Huss and as a result of the consequent persecutions of the Hussites (as they were called), they migrated to England about 1440...onward. In the fifteenth century Johanan Von Grubbe owned vast territories and villages over the mountains and surrounding valleys, known as "The Principality of Grubenhagen". The castles are all in ruins now. Only a tower remains almost hidden from view.

This is an interesting note on the earliest known people using the Grubbs name, but it would take a great deal of digging to establish a positive link between them and Enoch Grubbs, Sr. who was born in 1755.

The six small children born to Enoch and Mary Grubbs are not in our direct line. Ashford, Thomas, Minerva, Sirena, Lucinda and Mithena Grubbs are Great, Great, Great, Great Half Uncles and Aunts to Judy Dumas Morris.

# CHILDREN OF ENOCH AND PLORIED K. BURTON GRUBBS

William A. Grubbs, b.Oct. 6, 1776./Chesterfield, S.C. This city is not on any map that I can find. It may have another name now. The Great, Great, Great Grandson of this man, C. W. (Bill) Thompson of Mesa, Ariz., is the one who furnished me with Enoch, Sr.'s will. Perry Grubbs of Lake Wales, Plorida, is another Great, Great, Great Grandson in this line who furnished the picture of the interior of the Beaver Creat Brandson. of the interior of the Beaver Creek Baptist Church.

Mary Grubbs Jennings predeceased Enoch and left six children: Elizabeth, William, Enoch, John, Thomas and James Jennings. A Great, Great, Great, Granddaughter in this line is Suzanne Jennings McCurry through Mary's son John Jennings. Mary Grubbs Jennings was born ca 1777...died 1831.

Rhoda Grubbs Hedgepath who inherited 1 of the Richardson Tract of land. One

item I received said her tombstone showed she died in 1841 at the age of 70. However, that would have made Enoch age 16 when she was born the 3rd child. I believe she was born about 1779.

Sarah Grubbs Lott predeceased Enoch and left the three children mentioned in

his will: Moses, George and Enoch Lott.
Enoch Grubbs, Jr. b. about 1781 married Sarah Rhoda Parnell. It is through this child of Enoch Grubbs, Sr. that we descend. John Grubbs, b. about 1783. Nothing known about him.




# THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA

Know all men by these present, I, Enoch Grubbs, of Fairfield District and State aforesaid in consideration of the sum of twenty dollars to me paid by Beaver Creek Baptist Church which is composed of members of Chester and Fairfield District in State aforesaid have granted, sold, and released unto the aforesaid Baptist Church all that plantation or tract of land granted to David Richardson the sixth day of September Seventeen Hundred and Seventy-four (1774). Beginning at the spring and running west six chains forty-five links to a Hickory corner thence south 10 chains to a white oak corner thence west three chains to a stake corner near Columbia road, then north 11 chains 50 links to a stake corner on said road, then east 3 chains to a stake, then southeast 140 6 chains 50 links to Little River having such former marks as the above lines doth represent, together with all and singular the rights, members, hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging or in any wise incident or appertaining to have and to hold all and singular the premises before mentioned unto them the aforesaid members of the aforesaid church and their successors forever. And, I do hereby bind myself, my heirs, executors, and assigns to warrant and forever defend all and singular the premises before mentioned unto them the aforesaid church members and their successors against myself, my heirs, executors, and assigns. In witness whereof I do hereunto set my hand and seal this day of Pebruary in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty-two and in the fifty-sixth year of the Independence of the United States of America.



Note: An Engineer's "chain" measures 100 feet. A Surveyor's "chain" measures 66 feet. I do not know which measurement was used in the marking off of the above property to be sold, but another document mentioned that the Church group had bought 4 acres - so, that may give you some idea of the size of this property. Also, note that it does not give the day it was signed in February, 1832. It shows, too, jointly the 56th year of the Independence of the United States of America. I found this same double notation of dates on several documents from the 1800's.




Left: Interior of the Beaver Creek



### BURTON: FAIRFIELD(CRAVEN) DISTRICT, SOUTH CAROLINA

DR. PHILIP BURTON, of Ft. Myers, FL., who is probably the best known Burton researcher we have, feels that the father of our Florid K. Burton(1st wife of Enoch Grubbs of Fairfield Co. S.C.) may have been THOMAS BURTON, who left his will in old extinct Craven County, S.C. The will is dated about 1755-60. He thinks THOMAS BURTON, or his father came from Bermuda to the South Carolina coast. He considers it possible that Florid may not have been born in S.C., and that she was married during or just after the Revolution. Enoch Grubbs was born 1755, and Florid K. Burton died in 1811, and Mary Grubbs-Jennings was their 2nd child, born in 1777, and died 1816. Using these figures(on an average), Enoch and Florid could have been married ca. 1773. This would give 2 years between the 1st child, William A. Grubbs, and our Mary Grubbs-Jennings. They could have been married as late as 1774-75. Dr. Burton is probably correct that they were married during or just after the Revolution. Enoch would have been about 19-20 years old when they married. Florid may have been younger. It seems likely if 1777 is the correct date for the birth of Mary Grubbs-Jennings, that they were married just before the Revolution broke out in full fighting.

This writer joined the Burton Families, published by A. Maxim Coppage of Concord, CA, but so far nothing has been learned of my branch of the Burton family-other than what has been given here in this section. We have 3 strikes against us at the beginning; Florid K. Burton is a woman, the dates are far back in history, and finally research that concerns South Carolina is often very difficult to do. Perhaps more will be found in the future.
