Frequently I am asked, "How did you get interested in your family history?" Probably the first interest was stimulated by a former apartment mate, Barbara Westerfield Hilyerd, who was "hunting her ancestors." I began to realize I knew nothing about my ancestors. I think it is a natural curiosity to wonder "From whence came I?" By 1967 I had started researching the Kennedy family. I knew the name of my great grandfather and that was as far back as my father knew. In the spring of 1967 while visiting in Washington, D.C. with Alva Hardin, I visited the National Archives. We scanned several Richland County, S.C. census microfilms. The 1880 census gave us the listing of Samuel Kennedy and his family. This turned out to be my great grandfather. I obtained more information about the children of Samuel Kennedy from my father. Then that summer I spent three weeks in Columbia at which time Margorie Cannon and I visited all the cemeteries in the Horrell Hill section. I spent my first afternoon in the State Archives in Columbia and was intrigued by all the available information. This was the beginning of many, many trips to the Archives.

I am indebted to many people who answered my letters and talked with me regarding our relatives: Mrs. Madge Reese Turner, Mrs. Catherine Jones Kennedy, Glenn O. Kennedy, Mrs. Evelyn "Tootsie" Kennedy Jones, Mrs. Minnie Reese Laurey, Rivers Kelly, Thomas Sessions, and my father, William Ray "Peck" Kennedy.

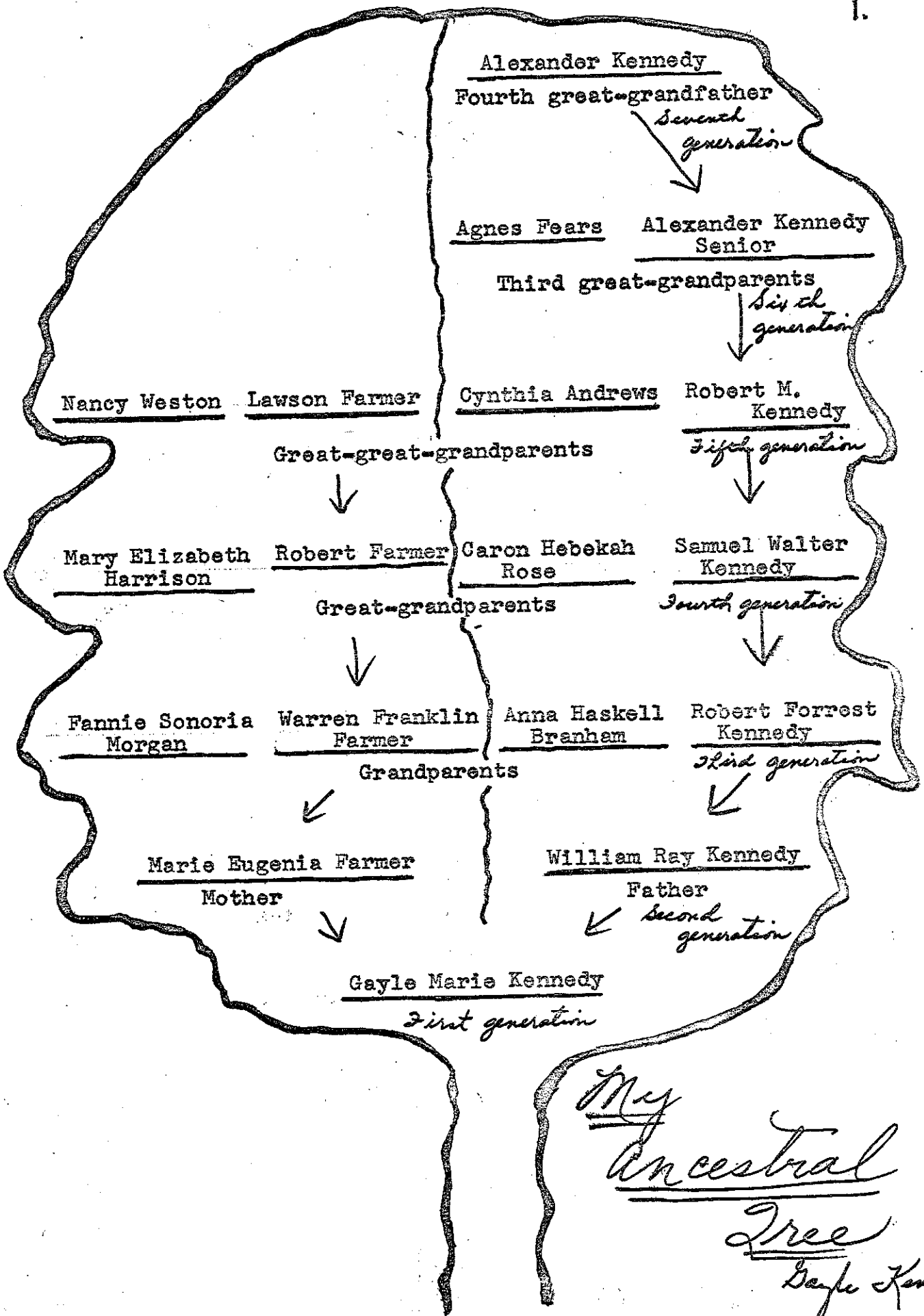
Mrs. Silas Calhoun McMeekin graciously let me make a copy of her D.A.R. application papers, and the research made for her by Leonardo Andrea, a professional genealogist. This really gave my research a boost. I also spent a fruitful and enjoyable day with William "Bill" Kennedy of Ridgeway, S.C., when he directed me to the Craig Cemetery. All the nineteen graves were of Kennedys, among them the ancestor from Ireland. I was elated. I have pictures of many of the very legible tombstones.

I believe I have visited just about every cemetery in the Ridgeway section of Fairfield County, S.C. In 1968 my parents and I really just happened up on the family plot containing the legible tombstones of my great-great grandparents. I have pictures of these markers.

I certainly hope that more information can be added later. I would appreciate receiving any additional information others may have.

THE KENNEDYS

The Kennedys, though some historians have stated that they came originally from Ireland, were probably indigenous to south-west Scotland. Leonardo Andrea, a genealogist who prepared D.A.R. application papers for a Kennedy descendant, stated that Alexander Kennedy, my ancestor, was an Irishman whose family originated in Killokennedy, Ireland near Killaloe in and around Glenomra. The clan later crossed the Shannon River and settled in Upper and Lower Ormond where the head of the clan became the Lord of Ormond.

Sometime soon after 1600 one branch of the O'Kennedy clan emigrated to County Antrim and from County Antrim the Fairfield County, South Carolina set of Kennedys came.

For the other version, according to the Kennedy Family Records by J. Montgomery Seaver, the Kennedy family is descendant from the ancient Earls of Carrick, who lived in Ayrshire, Scotland. Duncan de Carrick ("the chief of the clan") lived A.D. 1153. He had a son Nichol de Carrick, and a grandson Roland de Carrick. Roland "took the name Kennedy" in the 14th Century.

In both Scotland and Ireland the name Kennedy means "the head of a sept or clan". The Celtic form of Kennedy is Cenna-Thighe. Another authority claims that both Kennedy and McKenzie came from the name Kenneth. Another says that the name comes from the Irish O'Ceannphada or O'Cinnidh; Irish Caoinnach (peacable man). Still another authority

claims that the name was originally Cennedi (a man by that name in Ireland was the ancestor of Brian Boru, King of Munster and Monarch of Ireland).

Roland de Carrick Kennedy was killed in the Holy War against Saracens. His daughter married Robert de Bruce. His right to lead the clan was confirmed upon him by King Robert II. It is believed that practically all the Kennedys of the world are descendant from Roland Kennedy and from Kennedy of Dunure, who was chief of the clan, Earl of Cassillis and Marquis of Ailsa.

Some of the Kennedys who settled in the North of Ireland called themselves O'Kennedy. One of these was Darby O'Kennedy of Ballekierogue Castle, whose son John of Dublin died in 1758.

It is believed that all the foregoing Kennedy families are related either by virtue of being descendants of common ancestors, or by intermarriage.

From Scotland to Northern Ireland (Ulster)

In 1604 King James VI of Scotland became James I of England. In order to promote British influence in Ireland, King James I of England and Scotland sent many Scots to Northern Ireland (Ulster) to form colonies between 1609 and 1611, dispossessing the Irish tribesmen from their land and driving them into the west. The newcomers became known as the Scotch-Irish.

Northern Ireland was a wild, desolate country, mostly peat bogs, and a hard place to live. The natives left in Ireland lived in mud huts, with crude surroundings, and were hostile to the newcomers. This was the beginning of Scotch ascendancy in Ulster, Ireland, which became largely Presbyterian, yet the families involved in the transplantation rarely became Irish.

Northern Ireland was drained by the Scots and it soon improved. County Antrim, from whence our ancestor Alexander Kennedy came, is now well known for its scenic beauty, with its black sandy shores, beautiful glens and waterfalls, and lovely woods.

The Irish Rebellion:

There was civil war in Ireland in 1640. The Catholic Irish were resentful of the Scotch Presbyterians who had been settled upon them and resorted to bloody revenge. Thousands of Protestant settlers were killed in 1641.

Many Scotch-Irish Presbyterians, seeking religious

liberty and freedom from the tyranny and despotic rule in North Ireland, began coming to America as early as 1713. A continuous stream of these settlers, strong in religious faith and worship with undaunted courage, and true to their convictions concerning the teachings of God's Word, helped to populate a large part of the original colonies of these our United States.

The Kennedys have been in America since the early 17th Century and it is estimated that there are now more than 200,000 Kennedys in the United States. Many of the American Kennedys are descendants of Robert and William Kennedy (brothers), who came from Ireland to Bucks County, Pennsylvania, 1730. Others are descendants of David Kennedy, of Butler County, Pennsylvania.

ALEXANDER KENNEDYS IMMIGRATION TO SOUTH CAROLINA:

Probably Alexander was prompted to leave County Antrim in Northern Ireland by the prospect of religious freedom and economic opportunity. Many of the people left due to the potatoe famines of the late 1700's.

The Bounty Act passed by the General Assembly of the South Carolina Colony, on July 25, 1761, encouraged many protestants to come to South Carolina. The Royal Land Grants from King George III of England, allowed the head of the family to receive 100 acres of land, with an additional 50 acres for the wife and each child under 15. In return, the settler promised to support the Protestant House of Orange in religious controversy.

For the immigrants who were expected as a result of the bounty encouragement, three square shaped townships were, in 1762, laid off west of Ninety Six: Boonesborough (present Abbeville County), 20,500 acres on the head waters of Long Canes Creek two miles east of the present Due West; Hillsborough, 28,000 acres centering near where Long Canes enters Little River and containing the town of New Bordeaux; and Belfast, (later often called Londonborough), present Edgefield County, comprising 22,000 acres and lying on both sides of Hardlabour Creek above its junction with Cuffeetown Creek.

The trip by boat from Ireland to Charleston, S.C. took about four months. The voyage was difficult and needless to say, many did not survive the trip.

The applicants for bounty land had to have certificates from some official in Northern Ireland stating that they were protestants and entitled to receive benefits.

Alexander Kennedy of County Antrim, Ireland was in Charleston, S.C. by January 24, 1764. The South Carolina Council Journal, Volume 30 on page 20-31 lists the persons who petitioned for land at the meeting on January 24, 1764. The Irish protestant petitioners had recently arrived in Charleston on the Ship Prince Henry commanded by Captain James Egger. The list included petitions for :
 Alexander Kennedy, 400 acres... This would indicate the man was petitioning for 100 acres for himself and 50 acres for his wife and five children under age of 16. "It was ordered that the clerk grant him a certificate to the public Treasurer

to pay the said Bounty and that the Secretary do prepare Warrant of Survey to the Surveyor General to cause the land prayed for to be run out to the petitioner in Booneborough or Belfast township."

Also read: Alexander Kennedy...100 acres...This would indicate he was single and over 15. He was ordered to receive 100 acres in Booneborough or Belfast township.

these five persons were not given for the 100 acres asked until later which indicated these were not then 15 or over.

In summary we can assume that Alexander Kennedy arrived in Charleston, S.C. shortly before January 24, 1764 on the Ship Prince Henry, with a wife and six children. The children were: Alexander, Elizabeth, Robert, Agnes, William, and John.

The father, Alexander Kennedy, was granted 400 acres in Granville County on a branch of Great Rocky Creek on March 2, 1768. The tract of land was surveyed by John Pickens on July 30, 1767. See Royal Land Grants, Vol.15, Pg. 564, and Land Surveys or Plats, Vol. 17, Pg. 416. This 400 acres of land would be located in the present Abbeville County. The Abbeville County land records were burned in 1873 and I have not been able to trace the land. There are no Abbeville County Probate or Equity records for Alexander Kennedy or his children, that I have been able to determine.

ALEXANDER KENNEDY OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA:

Alexander Kennedy's son, Alexander Kennedy, was granted 100 acres in Craven District on 2 July, 1769. The land is in the present Fairfield County, S.C. See Royal Land Grants, Vol. 20, Pg. 235, " George the Third....Do Give and Grant... Alexander Kennedy,... one hundred acres in Craven County on a Branch of Cedar Creek bounding on all sides on vacant land...Second Day of July, A.D. 1769 in the Ninth Year of Our Reign."

The land survey or plat is recorded in Royal Land Surveys or Plats, Vol.17, Pg. 417.

" Pursuant to a warrant from the Honorable Egerton Leigh Esq. dated 4 October, 1768, I have admeasured out unto Alexander Kennedy a tract of land containing one hundred acres situated, lying or being in Craven County on a Branch of Cedar Creek, butting or bounding on all sides by vacant land. Certified 26 January, 1769 by Robert Ellison, surveyor"

I do not understand why the grant was made in Craven County rather than in the Boonesborough or Belfast township as the 1764 warrant specified.

Nevertheless in 1768 or 1769 we find young bachelor Alexander Kennedy situated in Fairfield County, on land near a branch of Cedar Creek. The land was probably near the present town of Ridgeway, S.C. He was now about 25 or 26 years of age having been born in County Antrim, Ireland on 6 December, 1743. Whether or not other members of the family moved to Fairfield County is hard to prove. However, according to tradition a William J. Kennedy of Fairfield County was his brother. He was born in Ireland in 1751.

Around the age of 31 Alexander Kennedy married Agnes Fears, age 20, in Fairfield County, South Carolina. The date is not known but their first child was born 25 August, 1775. Since birth control measures were not practiced at this time, I would assume that they married in 1774.

We can only surmise how he met Agnes Fears. No records of Fears are found in Fairfield County. However, Alexander Rosborough and his wife, Nancy Jane Fears, were married around 1770 in County Antrim, Ireland. They came to Fairfield County around 1772-1774. According to Rosborough History, this Nancy Jane Fears was a sister of Agnes Fears who married Alexander Kennedy. Possibly Agnes Fears came to Fairfield County, S.C. with her sister Nancy Jane Fears Rosborough.

In 1772 a Samuel Fear came to South Carolina on the Ship Lord Dunluce. (See Council Journal, Vol.37, Pg. 15-25) On 23 June, 1774 he was granted 250 acres for himself, wife and two children in Newberry County near the community of Prosperity. (See: Royal Land Grants, Vol.30, Pg.593) On his tombstone at the Cannon's Creek A.R.P. Cemetery located five miles southeast of Newberry Court House are these words:

" Sacred to the memory of Samuel Fair (note change of spelling) who was born in County Antrim, Ireland and removed to America in 1772, losing at sea a son and an aged father. He died in September, 1775 leaving two sons and one daughter, William and Samuel and Margaret."

William Fair had a son, Simeon Fair, who was born 17 November, 1801 on his father's farm in Newberry County near Prosperity. He became a lawyer. On 23 December, 1840 he married Mary Butler Pearson of Newberry who died 31 December, 1867. Col. Fair died

at Glenn Springs, S.C. on 15 July, 1873. Both are buried at Rosemont Cemetery, Newberry, S.C.

This Samuel Fear (Fair) could have been a brother of Agnes and Nancy Jane Fears and they all decided to come to South Carolina about the same time. Apparently Samuel's mother was already dead before the voyage since he only mentions his aged father dying on ship.

After their marriage in 1774 (?) Alexander and Agnes Fears Kennedy set about to establish a Christian home. Their friends and neighbors were the Alexander Rosboroughs, and later the James Craigs of County Antrim, Ireland.

The children came regularly about every two years.

Agnes Fears Kennedy, who lived to be 70, must have been a strong, healthy woman to survive the births of ten children. She was 21 when her first child was born and 44 when the last arrived.

During the American Revolution Alexander Kennedy, age 38, served for 86 days in the South Carolina Militia during 1781 and 1782. He was a Private stationed at the Congarees. He also made saddles for the horseman in the S.C. Militia.

He served as a Private under Col. Thomas Taylor, Capt. James Craig, Capt. John Miles, and Capt. William Robertson. They all certified his services. Alexander received payment for his militia service on 21 January, 1790 totaling 1200 pounds, 15 shillings and 5 pence. Apparently Alexander was not wounded in the war because he did not apply for a pension.

Alexander Kennedy received the following State Land Grants in Fairfield County, South Carolina:

of Cedar Creek, called Daniels Light, waters of

4. 545 acres situated in Camden district, in Richland County,
on a branch of Crane Creek, called the dry forks,
the waters of Broad River.

With the Royal Land Grant of 100 acres in 1769, he now
possessed 2142 acres of land.

Alexander Kennedy and Zachariah Kirkland received the following land grants together. I don't understand why this was done.

1. 2,432 acres surveyed for them on the 20 September, 1793.

Situated in the district of Camden in Fairfield County, on dividing ground between Cedar Creek, waters of Broad River, bounded North West and North East by Quinton Craigs land; West and North by James Kelly's; South West and North West by Anna? Winn and William Kirkland, Esq., South East and South West by Charles Leffan, and Alexander Kennedy, North East and South East by Andrew Doming and James Summins

7 October, 1793

2. 1,503 acres surveyed for them on the 5 September, 1793.

Situated in the District of Camden in Fairfield County on Drains of Cedar Creek Waters of Broad River, Bounded S.W. and S.E. by William Kirkland Esq. lands. N.W., by Frederick Hansminger, N.W. and N. by George Smith. S.E. part unknown and part by James Rosebrough's

7 October, 1793

If this land was divided between them, each would have owned 1967.5 acres. With the 2142 acres that Alexander had been granted alone, the additional land granted to the two men, if divided would total 4,109.5 acres of land granted to Alexander Kennedy. Most of his sons bought land from him when they married. Each inherited land from their father when he died.

CHURCH AFFILIATION:

The Scotch-Irish Alexander Kennedy was a Presbyterian. Around 1780 the Jackson Creek Presbyterian Church at Lebanon was organized. They may have worshipped at this church, however their land was around fifteen or so miles from Jackson Creek. The family may have conducted its own Bible training in the home.

In 1790 John Rosborough, the oldest son of Alexander and Nancy Jane Fears Rosborough, and his wife Annie Cubit, moved to Ridgeway from Lebanon section and it was from this point we know the origin of Aimwell Presbyterian Church, the first house of religious worship in or around Ridgeway. The Rosboroughs brought with them a fervent desire to organize a church. The first services were held in the Rosboroughs' home on the site of the present Century House in the town of Ridgeway. The first church building appears to have been erected about 1799 on land on Cedar Creek, given the previous year by Francis Robinson.

Early members of Aimwell were the Rosboroughs, Robinsons, Craigs, Kennedys, Hoods, Walkers, Gozas, Hunters, Campbells, Clevelands, Boulwares, and Colemans.

1790 Census:

In the first Federal Census in 1790 there were 6,138 white inhabitants of Fairfield County. Negroes numbered 1,485.

There were only two Kennedy families listed in 1790 Census. (Pg. 21 of printed Census) Fairfield County, S.C.

These two Kennedy men were apparently brothers. There are many land deeds to and from Alexander Kennedy in Fairfield County from 1785 to 1826 which show that he was a resident of Fairfield County, South Carolina.

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WILL OF ALEXANDER KENNEDY

In the Name of God. Amen.

I Alexander Kennedy Senior, of the State of South Carolina, and District of Fairfield, being weak in body; but of perfect mind and memory, (thanks be to Almighty God for this) do make and constitute this my last Will and Testament, in the manner following Viz.

First. I commit my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it, and my body to the silent grave, to be buried after the manner of a decent Christian burial, desiring that my Executors do furnish decent Head and Foot stones for mine, my beloved wife's, and son Arthur's Graves, out of my Estate.

2. I give and bequeath unto my son James Kennedy a negro girl named Hester, with all her future increase. Also two tracts of land, one containing fifty--six acres, lying in said District, on Persimmon Forke, waters of Cedar Creek, binding on lands of William Kirkland dece., waters, and Thomas Howel. The other on waters of Crane Creek, containing fifty acres more or less, binding on Solomom Knipper's land.
3. I give and bequeath unto my son Henry Kennedy, a negro woman named Affa, and her boy child Jack.
4. I give and bequeath unto my son John Kennedy, a negro girl named Fanny.
5. I give and bequeath unto Alexander Kennedy my son, a negro girl named Maria. Also, one hundred and thirty seven acres of land, Situate on the waters of Cedar Creek, binding on lands belonging to the Estate of John Rofs senr. deced.
6. I give and bequeath unto my son William Kennedy, a negro boy named Charles, and a girl named Susy.
7. I give and bequeath unto my son Robert Kennedy, a negro woman named Phebey and her son Joe.
8. I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel W. Kennedy, a negro girl named Choley, and a boy named Lewis.
9. I give and bequeath unto my sons John, William, Robert, and Samuel W. Kennedy, twelve hundred and forty-seven acres of land, Situate on waters of Rice Creek, Crane Creek and Cedar Creek which lands, or the net proceeds of the sales thereof, to be equally divided between them.

- 10. I desire that whichsoever of my children, my old negro woman, Betty, chooses to live with, shall be her right owner.
- 11. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Jane Craig, a negro girl named Becca, to be held by the said Jane and the lawful heirs of her body forever.

12. It is my will and desire, that my negro man Tom, and woman Amy, together with all my stock, Plantation tools, House and Kitchen furniture, and in short every other article of which I am or may be possessed, not otherwise bequeathed, be sold after my decease, and that the following Legacies be paid by my Executors, out of the moneys arising from such sale, to the following persons, being my Grand Children Viz: To Alexander Craig, son of Robert W. Craig and Mary his wife, five hundred dollars.

After Mary Kennedy and Robert Washington Craig were married they lived on Mill Creek in Fairfield County where he farmed until the death of her mother, Agnes Fears Kennedy, in 1824. Then they went to live with her father, Alexander Kennedy, Sr., on Cedar Creek, part of which land was in possession of James H. Craig in 1932. Alexander Kennedy, Sr. died two years later in 1826. At the death of Alexander Kennedy, Robert W. and Mary Kennedy Craig came into possession of the Kennedy homestead and several of his slaves.

They continued to live there and farmed until the death of Robert W. Craig on 1 August, 1836. On the division of the land the homestead fell to his widow, Mary Kennedy Craig, and their son, Arthur Kennedy Craig. He afterwards bought his mother's interest and came into full possession of the homestead.

Mary K. Craig continued to live with her son, Arthur and his family, until the death of her son in law, Alexander George Kennedy in December, 1852. She then went to live with her widowed daughter Mary Ellen Craig Kennedy, and died there on 4 April, 1853.

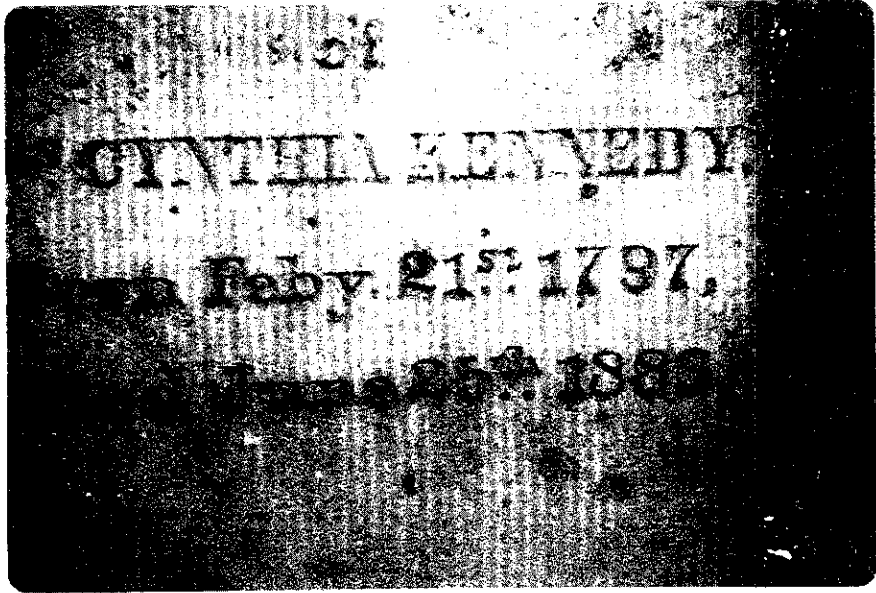

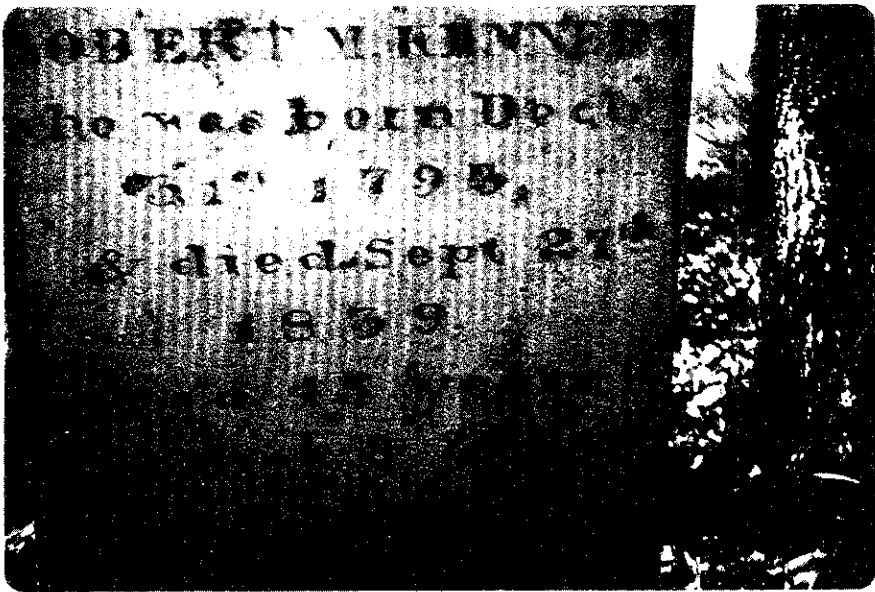

Early on the morning of June 11th we engaged near Trevillians Station. We dismounted and entered a piece of woods on the left of the road; in a few minutes we charged through the woods. Sarg. John Clowny was the first man in our company to be killed.

While in this wood a courier came dashing up to General Hampton to say that the Yankees had captured General Butler's wagon train. Gen. Hampton turned to Capt. Goodwyn and told him to mount his squadron and follow him. We crossed the railroad and jumped a fence with Gen. Hampton leading. Upon reaching the top of the hill we came in sight of the enemy trying to get back. We ran into them and had a regular mix-up, killing some, wounding some and capturing a great many; some of whom were foreigners and could not speak English. My company was ordered to charge a battery, during which several men and horses were wounded and one man killed. Nothing was accomplished. Our men fell back for the night and bivouacked at Green Spring Valley.

Sunday morning, June 12th we moved back to the railroad and our line was formed as follows: 4th S.C. on the left, 6th in the center, and the 5th on the right. I was holding the horses about a half mile back. About 12 o'clock a sargent came back with two men who said they were sick. I was sent to take the place of one of them and was put out in front as a vidette. About 2 o'clock the enemy made an attack on us. The line of our Regiment made a rather sharp angle at the railroad in order to get the benefit of the embankment and my company was in this angle, known as the bloody angle. Just as the fight began a Captain from the 5th Regt. came along the line in search of ten men who had Enfield rifles to be used as sharpshooters. I was chosen among the ten and we were sent across the railroad into a yard with trees and small houses; for an hour or two the Yankees shelled this yard. A few of us went into a Negro house and were shooting through the cracks when someone called to us that the enemy were coming in full line of battle about 200 yards distant. We made a dash to get back to our line and were shot at as we crossed the yard. We ran into the railroad and cut up an embankment. John Milling from Fairfield, who was just behind me, was shot in the back and fell at my left. The battle was raging and I fell in with Capt. Humphries Cadet Co. until the battle was over. The Cobb Legion came to our support and the Adjutant of the Legion was wounded by a shell and died. The enemy charged us seven times during the evening. We held them until dark when Sheridan withdrew leaving his dead and wounded on the battlefield. My company lost in the two days about 20 men. Lieut. Kennedy sent me to the rear with his lame horse. I was delayed 5 or 6 days; with this exception I was with my company every day not missing a roll call.

On June 26th we crossed the James River and went to Stony Creek to intercept Wilson, whose object was to destroy the railroad and Staunton River bridge. Wilson was foiled in this but undertook to break through our lines, renewing the attacks at intervals during the night. About daylight we charged them and they were completely demoralized and routed.

On August 11th Gen. Butler started with his Division to Culpepper and on the 14th received orders to return to Richmond. On the morning of the 16th we reached White Tavern eight miles from Richmond, just in time to assist Gen. W.H.F. Lee, who was being hard pressed by a superior force. In moving down Butler's division to occupy the picket line in front of Reams Station we encountered the enemy at Gravelly Run on August 23rd; after a stiff fight we drove them back. Another fight was on September 16th when Hampton took a part of his command by a circuitous route to the vicinity of City Point and captured over 2000 head of cattle and many horses.

On September 29, my eighteenth birthday, I was on picket when the Yankees charged us. Two other men and I were cut off and it was reported that we were captured, but we dismounted and let our horses through a thick swamp and reached an opening. We made a dash across an open field under fire but made our escape.

In October we engaged in several skirmishes, the hardest being at Burgess Mill. Other encounters of minor importance were made during November and December.

Early in January, 1865 our brigade, with Young's, was sent to South Carolina to meet Sherman. We first met him at Congaree River near Columbia.

I was one of the three detailed to ascertain the location of the enemy. Both bridges coming into Columbia were burned. On February 18 we had a sharp encounter with the 17th Corps, several killed and wounded near Killians Mill Pond.

The next day our Regt. marched towards Charlotte, N.C. and from there to Wadesboro where we met some raiding parties. After swimming our horses over Pee Dee River we charged Kilpatricks Camp, under a heavy rain. It was near this place at night fall that the 5th Kentucky rode up thinking they were joining friends. They were all taken prisoners without firing a shot. The next morning we charged the enemy just at daybreak and captured over 800 prisoners. My Lieutenant Kennedy was killed and several wounded. We had a skirmish

with a company of Yankees in the streets of Fayetteville, N.C. The next real battle was at Averyboro.

Along the whole march we were continually skirmishing. The last engagement was at Bentonville. Sherman passed round our left flank and went to Goldsboro. Our march was continued to Raleigh and from there we went to Hillsboro. It was here that Johnson surrendered to Sherman.

The night before the surrender, part of our regiment left for home taking horses, guns, and other accoutrements. I reached home May 5, 1865."

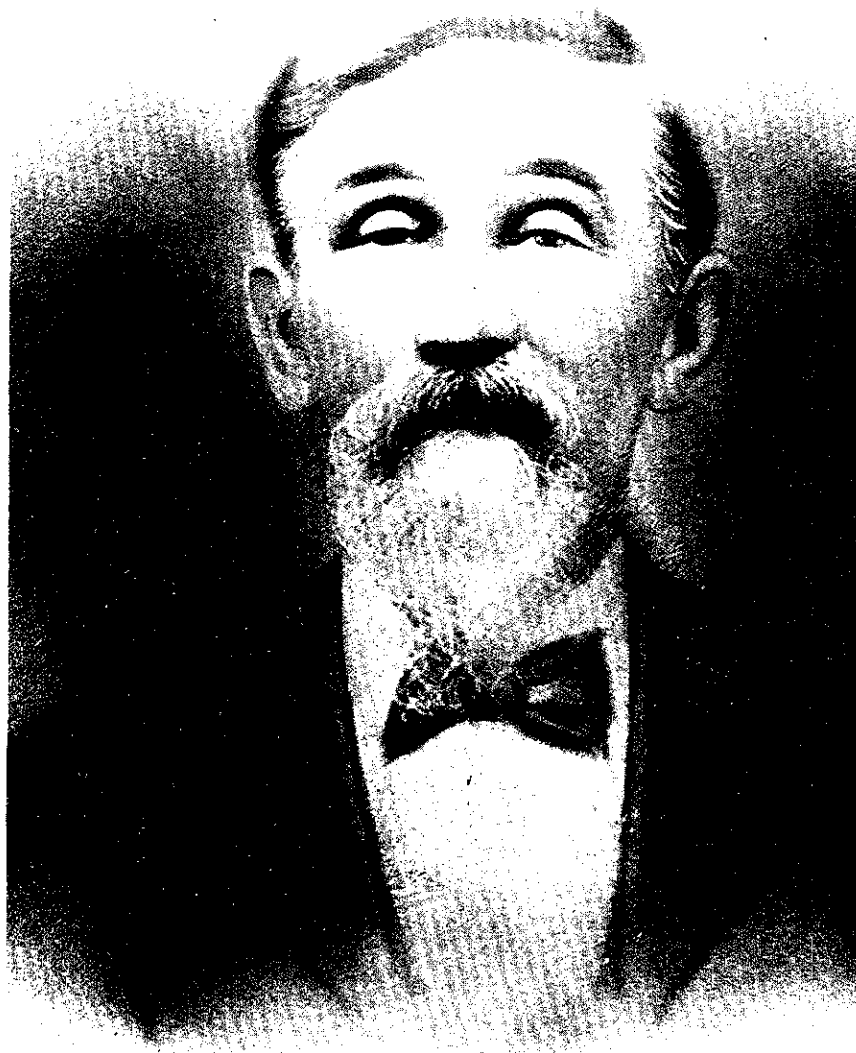

In conversation with grandchildren of Samuel Walter Kennedy some information was obtained which I feel is of interest.

Rivers Kelly reported that Samuel Walter Kennedy had attended college but he did not know where. Before he married he taught school in Griffin, Georgia.

Since his first child was born in 1860, it can be assumed he married Caron Hebekah Rose, the daughter of Jack Rose, sometimes in 1859. Caron Rose was from Ridgeway, South Carolina.

Samuel Kennedy was described by Rivers Kelly as being a good Southern gentleman. He was of medium build with black hair before he turned gray. He smoked cigars but never drank alcoholic beverages. He attended Baulah Baptist Church. When not working out doors he was usually reading a book.

His wife Caron Rose was a short woman with black hair and gray eyes. She was reported to have disliked "Yankees and Negroes". John Rose, her oldest brother, had a weakness for alcoholic drinks.

Samuel served in the Civil War as a Private in the 6th Regiment, Company C, Cavalry from June 15, 1862 until October, 1864. His brother Robert W. Kennedy served in the same Company. On the October, 1864 Muster Roll he was reported to be at Lynchburg, Va. with unservicable horses since July 1, 1864. He was listed on the Muster Roll of Co. C, Manigault's Battalion from November 18, 1861 to April 5, 1862.

Madge Reese Turner states she always heard that her grandfather contracted tuberculosis during the Civil War. The Muster Roll from January-- April, 1863 list him as sick in camp and then on sick furlough.

I have a photostatic copy of a letter on file in the South Caroliniana Library from a S.W. Kennedy to his niece Sallie. It is written 16 October, 1864 from Richardsonville, Edgefield, S.C. where he was teaching school. He reported that he returned home August 19, 1864. He stated that he had not lately heard from Bill or Boggs. He discussed that the trustees of the school are trying to get him to teach another term but he does not want to do this. He mentioned that he had already been exempted from active duty by the Medical Board. He stated that things must be dull on Long Cane. He asked that she "show this letter to grand ma". He expected to be home about the last of November. This letter might be from my great grandfather.

My father, William Ray "Peck" Kennedy, states he had always heard that his grandfather ran a livery stable in Ridgeway, S.C. In the 1870 Census of Fairfield County, S.C. Samuel W. Kennedy was listed as a clerk in a store.

"Peck" Kennedy states that his grandfather moved to Eastover, S.C. to manage a farm for a Northern man by the name of E.M. Brayton. They raised cotton and horses. The census taken June 15, 1880 lists S.W. Kennedy in Richland Co., S.C. as a farmer. There are five children plus his wife and mother, Cinthy Kennedy, a 84 year old widow.

Samuel Walter Kennedy later left Eastover due to malarial fever and moved to Horrell Hill, S.C. The home place was located on the main road to Beulah Baptist Church near Rivers Kelly's home. The home no longer stands, apparently destroyed by fire.

Samuel died at his home place in Horrell Hill of pneumonia on 6 August, 1903. After his death, his wife went to live with their daughter Lula Kennedy Reese. Rivers Kelly states she died at the age of 87 at the home of her daughter, Belle Kennedy Reese. Her death certificate, of which I have a copy, list the cause of death as "atheroma", duration 5 years, signed by Hubert Claytor, M.D. Both are buried at Beulah Baptist Church Cemetery, Horrell Hill, S.C.

Apparently the family Bible has been lost or destroyed by fire. Rivers Kelly reported that his daughter Sarah Kelly Reese has a picture of Samuel and Caron Kennedy. I have not seen this. Tootsie Kennedy Jones also has a picture of her grandparents. I have a copy of the picture.

James Craig Three of his children married children of Alexander Kennedy.

James Craig was born on 17 March, 1754 in the parish of Templepatrick, County Antrim, Ireland. He was a Scotch-Irish Presbyterian.

He arrived by the Ship Britania in Charleston, S.C. on 21 January, 1773, when scarcely nineteen years of age. According to data in his own handwriting found on pages of his New Testament, a half brother, Quinton Craig, also came to America. Pension file mentions Quinton, John, and Robert Craig as brothers. They were the children of Robert Craig, Senior, who died in Camden, S.C.

It is not known how long he remained in Charleston, but we next find him in Fairfield County, where he married Jinny (Jane) Bell on 22 May, 1777 in St. Mark Parish, Camden District, South Carolina. Jinny, born 1 January, 1756, in Ahoghill, County Antrim, Ireland, was the daughter of John and Martha Watts Bell. They were in South Carolina by 1 January, 1768. The Bells lived on Mill Creek in Fairfield County, S.C. Children besides Jinny were: Thomas, William, John, Alexander and Margaret Bell. Thomas died unmarried around 1798, John was born ca. 1762 and Alexander ca. 1765.

James and Jinny Bell Craig settled on Mill Creek in Fairfield County, S.C. From 1786 until 1804 he was granted nearly 7000 acres of land in Fairfield County.

He served as a Captain during the Revolutionary War. He also served as a member of the Legislature from Upper or Spartan District in 1788. He also served as a County Judge.

* Jinny Bell Craig died 12 February, 1813. James Craig married Margaret McInnis in January, 1817. James Craig died 20 December, 1820. Both James and Jinny Craig are buried near the old homestead in Fairfield County near the present town of Ridgeway, S.C. His widow married James McKee between 23 January, 1821 and before 1 January, 1824. By 1 January, 1833 she had married Samuel Miles who died 4 March, 1845. Margaret Miles died February, 1871 aged 70 or 78 years. She had one child, Mary Carolina Miles who married Thomas Glease.
