

Besides essays on various subjects published in the best magazines of Mrs. Kadd's lifetime. She wrote articles on art, education and excellent poems. Her writings, especially her poems are characterized by strong religious feeling and love of nature. Some of her writings appeared in the Winoosboro press.

Mrs. Kadd, an unusually versatile and highly intelligent woman, presented operettas and plays in the Thespian Hall building on East Washington Street, Winoosboro. She used the excellent talent of the citizens, especially a goodly number of musician youth. The backdrops on the stage of the theatre were painted by her. As late as 1920 the last rural scene used by her was in good physical shape and still usable. This was the second oldest theatre in the state, Dock Street Theatre in Charleston being the predecessor of Thespian Hall in age.

1829. Deed from Richard Cathcart Lot #53 on Congress Street, Winnsboro, SC. to John M. Master. Consideration \$200.

MARCH 22, 1852. Deed from John M. Master Lot #53 and house on Congress Street, Winnsboro, S.C. to George W. Fadd. Consideration \$3,500.

December 2, 1862 Deed from George W. Fadd Lot #53, plus other lots and house on Congress Street, Winnsboro, SC. to Philip Porcher (Trustee for Mattie Egleston, wife of George Egleston of Charleston, S.C.) Consideration \$6,000.

November 27, 1784. Deed from Maria Porter of lots on Congress Street with residence to Priscilla Ketchin. Consideration, \$3,000.

November 29, 1938. Deed to John W. Cathcart by Bank of Fairfield to lots and house on Congress Street, Winnsboro, S.C. Deed signed by Priscilla Ketchin and her heirs.

(Mr. Ladd died July 14, 1864, and is interred in a church cemetery in the town of Winnsboro, S.C.)
