The Judds were married Sept 28, 1828
First had school at Drattancade, Yorks Camp
Fairfield, whose daughter attended the school
in Yorks County - to who 1840 and attended the
college in later years at the (at Yorks County)

~~school~~ Mrs. Judd Academy for young ladies
A number of Charleston girls came there to be
educated. Of brilliant mind, social charm
and artistic, ~~and~~ ^{an artist} part, Mrs Judd had
great influence on the education of the
