MARRIED FOR THE SECOND TIME, MISS C. L. LADD, DAUGHTER OF G. W. LADD

DEATH OF J. D. CURRETON
FROM CENSUS RECORDS
CATHERINE LYDIA IS THE DAUGHTER OF GEORGE MILLIAMSON LIVERMORE
110, CLOCK. HIS SUDDEN AND UNSPECIFIED DEATH WAS A GREAT SHOCK
TO HIS FRIENDS. THE IMMEDIATE CAUSE OF HIS DEATH WAS A STROKE
AUGUST 6, 1827. HIS FATHER, ABNER H. CURRETON WAS FROM WALES,
DR. CURRETON WAS BORN NEAR SANDY SPRINGS NEAR GREENVILLE COUNTY,
WHERE HE REARED A FAMILY OF FOURTEEN CHILDREN. AT THE AGE OF
EIGHTEEN DR. CURRETON LEFT THE FARM OF HIS FATHER AND ENTERED
THE OFFICE OF DR. EDWARDS IN GREENVILLE FOR THE PURPOSE OF
STUDYING DENTISTRY, REMAINING WITH HIM FOR SOME TIME. HE THEN
WENT TO BALTIMORE AND TOOK A COMPLETE COURSE IN DENTISTRY,
GRADUATING AT THE AGE OF 21.

DR. J. D. CURRETON DIED AT HIS HOME HERE FRIDAY MORNING ABOUT
110, CLOCK. HIS SUDDEN AND UNSPECIFIED DEATH WAS A GREAT SHOCK
TO HIS FRIENDS. THE IMMEDIATE CAUSE OF HIS DEATH WAS A STROKE
OF PARALYSIS, WHICH CAME ON THURSDAY NIGHT.
DR. CURRETON WAS BORN SANDBY SPRINGS IN VIRGINIA AND THEN REMOVED TO SANDY SPRINGS,
AND SETTLED FIRST IN VIRGINIA AND THEN REMOVED TO SANDY SPRINGS,
WHERE HE REARED A FAMILY OF FOURTEEN CHILDREN. AT THE AGE OF
EIGHTEEN DR. CURRETON LEFT THE FARM OF HIS FATHER AND ENTERED
THE OFFICE OF DR. EDWARDS IN GREENVILLE FOR THE PURPOSE OF
STUDYING DENTISTRY, REMAINING WITH HIM FOR SOME TIME. HE THEN
WENT TO BALTIMORE AND TOOK A COMPLETE COURSE IN DENTISTRY,
GRADUATING AT THE AGE OF 21.

DR. CURRETON HAS BEEN TWICE MARRIED, HIS FIRST WIFE HAVING BEEN
MISS POWERS OF NEWBERRY, DAUGHTER OF SAMUEL POWERS, A PROMINENT
PLANTER, AND ONE OF THE JUSTICES OF THE DISTRICT COURT. SHORTLY
AFTER MARRYING, DR. CURRETON MOVED TO WINNSBORO WHERE HE PRACTICED
HIS PROFESSION UNTIL THE CIVIL WAR. HE WAS AMONG THE FIRST
TO VOLUNTEER AND WAS 1ST LIEUT. OF CO. C OF 6TH S. C., AND WAS IN
SERVICE AT CHARLESTON DURING THE BOMBARDMENT OF FT. SUMTER. HE
HERE IN TIME TO WITNESS THE CLOSE OF THE FIRST BATTLE OF BULL RUN.
AFTERWARDS WAS ORDERED TO VIRGINIA WITH THE REGIMENT AND ARRIVED
HE WAS PROMOTED CAPTAIN AT THE BATTLE OF SEVEN PINES. HE REMAINED
IN SERVICE WITH THE ARMY OF NORTHERN VIRGINIA UNTIL DEC. 63,
WHEN ON ACCOUNT OF ILL HEALTH, HE WAS ASSIGNED TO DUTY IN THE
MILITARY COURT WHERE HE REMAINED UNTIL THE SURRENDER.

HE WAS MARRIED TO MISS C. L. LADD, DAUGHTER OF G. W. LADD, AN ARTIST
PRACTICING HIS PROFESSION. IN 1865 HIS WIFE DIED. IN 1866
AFTER THE WAR DR. CURRETON RETURNED TO WINNSBORO AND RESUMED THE
