Mr. Lemmon was born and raised in the house he died in, the house was built by his father and is in a fine state of preservation now. Mr. Lemmon was an elder in the Presbyterian church for fifty years and was held in highest esteem. He owned much land and was a suc-

cessful planter and lived at home.
