

Family Reunion Held at Ed'e

The desdendants of William Lauderdale and his wife, Jane Milling Lauderdale, and their connections met at Ed's Pond last Tuesday, August 24 and enjoyed a most interesting reunion. A pienic lunch was served.

William Lauderdale, born in Ulster, Ireland in 1762 and his wife emigrated to South Carolina in 1817 upon invitation of Mrs. Lauderdale's uncle, Capt. Hugh Milling, a brave officer in the Revolutionary War. They first settled on Captain Milling's place in Fairfield and moved later to the place owned by their grandson, and the Winnsboro-Newberry highway, six miles west of Winnsboro. They brought with them from Ireland their children: Mary Ann, who married James Lemmon; and Thomas, David and William Lauderdale...

James Lemmon Sr., who married Mary Ann Lauderdale, was born in Ulster, Irland in 1797, and from this couple are descended many of Fairfield's best citizens. Among these was Robert Y. Lemmon, member of the S.C. Legislature from Fairfield, and his son, R. Howe Lemmon, Fairfield's present Farm Agent. Montgomery Lemmon, nephew of James Leinmon Sr., was the father of Mrs. Julia Orr Bong and Mrs. James W. Bolick. The late Lorena Milling Macfie, wife of James Macfie and many others are descendants of Capt. Hugh Milling.

After the permanent organization was perfected by the election of officers, and a resolution adopted that the familyorganization would meet annually in August at the call of the president, a recess was taken for dinner which was in the nature of a basket picnic on long tables arranged in the pavillion, A hundred and twenty six adults and as many more children did full justice to the fried chicken, ham, sandwiches of many kinds, pickles, sweet and sour, pies, custards, tarts and every variety of pastries and cakes. In fact there was everything imaginable on the tables to eat, from deviled harn to angel cake. It took a good deal of selfcontrol to leave those tables...
