Sgt. Arrowsmith Killed In France

Former Carolina Football Star, Husband of Fairfield Girl, Makes Supreme Sacrifice In European Theater. 1944

1st Sgt. Stanley DeWitt Arrowsmith, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. V. Arrowsmith of Erie, Pa., was killed in action in France September 30, according to a message from the War Department, received by his wife, the former Miss Margaret Ligon, who makes her home with her mother, Mrs. W. W. Ligon, in the Bethel section of Fairfield county.

Sgt Arrowsmith was a senior at the University of South Carolina, when he was inducted at Fort Jackson in January, 1941. He was sent to Camp Wheeler, Macon, Ga., in February for training, and in August '43, he was transferred to Camp Blanding, Fla., as an instructor. In May, '44 he went to Fort George Meade, Md., and after 3 weeks he left for Italy, and later was sent to France, where he was in active combat only three months before he paid the supreme sacrifice.

His widow, Mrs. Margaret Ligon Arrowsmith, is a member of the faculty of the Greenbrier School.

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
