Ligon was the recipient of the Air Force Commendation Medal, the Air Medal with eleven Oak Leaf Clusters, Two Bronze Stars for valor in combat, the Distinguished Flying Cross exceptional heroism and bravery, the Armed Forces Medal, and two National Defense Service Medals. As a young pilot, his program "An American Way of Life― set the pattern for all Air Force Foreign Training and was formally recognized by the U.S. State Department. A tactical fighter pilot, Col. Ligon served in Europe, North Africa and Vietnam. Col. Ligon received his wings and commission at Foster Field, Victoria, TX, in March, 1953, followed by combat crew training. He was chief of Officer Training for 5 years at Craig AFB, a pilot training base near Selma, AL. Carroll trained pilots from 23 countries, including Iran, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Libya. As chief of Wing Current Operations in Vietnam (Phan Rang), Col. Ligon controlled the combat schedules and missions for 3 fighter squadrons, Chuck Yeager's B-57 squadrons, and the Royal Australian No. 2 Squadron. In addition to his analytic and managerial duties, Col. Ligon personally flew 201 fighter jet missions over Vietnam. [2]

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CLL was in charge of a Military Airlift Command communications facility at Scott AFB. His commanders were frustrating him with their obtuseness, they couldn't understand the difference between a keyword search and a password. CLL complained about the physical

plant. It burned down as he was preparing to leave for the Air War College in Alabama. CLL refused to lie about what happened and his commanders were reprimanded. CLL completed his training at the War College and was sent to MacDill AFB in Tampa, Florida. He held a SAC shift commander position for three years. He controlled the US relief efforts in Bangladesh after their flooding disaster in 1973. (See: George Harrison, Concert for Bangladesh.) A shift commander slot was a Brigadier General position. Lt. Col. CLLigon was passed over for promotion 3 times. His immediate commander informed him that he had been blacklisted and would never be promoted. CLL resigned his commission the following week, two years before he was due to retire. Pelham, please feel free to add this to your documentation.
