gish surname has been adopted in many families of Irish origin as a variant deriving from Ó Leunáin, Ó Lonáin, Ó Luínín, otherwise rendered as Lennon, etc., and also, according to Dr. MacLysaght for Mac Alinon (Mac Ghiolla Alin).

LESLIE

This Irish surname was brought to Ulster by immigrants from Scotland early in the 17th century. It is found in many Leslie families in Co. Monaghan and in the names of Leslie Hill, Ballymoney, Co. Londonderry. They claim descent from the Leslies, Earls of Rothes and Barons of Balquhair in Scotland. A cadet of that family who came to Ireland in 1614. They bear as their coat of arms: A fess azure, three buckles or. The name is found in the names of the Tarbert, Co. Kerry, and the Leslies of Ballymore, Co. Down, are of the same stock in

L'ESTRANGE

This name, written Le Strange, L'Estrange, etc., came to Ireland in the latter part of the 16th century with English settlers from Norfolk who acquired lands in Co. Wick, Co. Louth and Co. Westmeath. The name is found mostly in Co. Offaly but it may not be descended from the settler family because MacLysaght has reported that members of a family named Mac Conchoigcríche in Co. Westmeath adopted the surname Lestrange.

LEWIS

This is one of the twenty-five commonest surnames in Ireland and Wales and particularly common in the west. The surname Lewis was brought to Ireland by settlers whose descendants are found in equal numbers in Leinster, Ulster and

LIDDY

This name derives from the name of the sept Ó Lideadha and it is still found in many parts of the country.

LIN(N)ANE

This name can be either Ó Linnéain or Lion-

establied themselves mostly in the east of the province. The landowning family in Co. Tyrone, who spell their name Lindesay, claim descent from a prominent family in Scotland in Haddingtonshire. Dr. MacLysaght has noted also that members of the Irish family named Ó Loingsigh tended, in Ulster, to anglicize their name as Lindsay.

LITTLE

THIS common English and Scottish surname was brought to Ireland, and particularly to Ulster, where many families of the name are found in Co. Fermanagh.

LIVINGSTON(E)

THIS surname was brought to Ireland, principally to Ulster and to Dublin, by settlers who came from Scotland since the 17th century. It is also not infrequently written Levingston.

LLOYD

THIS common Welsh surname was brought to Ireland by settlers whose descendants are found in all four provinces. Among the incomers in the 17th century were the ancestors of landed families named Lloyd in Co. Roscommon, Co. Limerick, Co. Tipperary, Co. Offaly and Co. Wexford.

LOCKHART

THIS Scottish surname came to Ulster, and particularly to Co. Antrim and Co. Armagh, with settlers from Scotland in the 17th century.

LOFTUS

THE Loftus families in Ireland, of settler descent, trace their lineage to the Loftus family of Swineshead, Yorkshire, members of which came to Ireland in the 17th century, one of whom, Adam Loftus, became the Protestant Primate of Ireland. The surname Loftus is, however, now found mainly in Connacht where it was adopted by descendants of the Ó Lachtnáin sept whose name was more usually rendered as Loughnane (q.v.) in English.

LOGAN

By far the heaviest distribution of this surname
