n March 1764, Ann Liles memorialized title to Ephraim's land at the Auditor eneral's Office in Charleston. Land owners were required to memorialize title or the Crown to collect taxes or rent on the land as it was sometimes called. Outh Carolina was in the 1760's a Royal colony. Memorializing title simply eant that the owner certified the chain of title from the original colonial rantee to the present owner. Memorializing title was beneficial to both the rown and the present owner as it served to strengthen the present owner' claim o the property. Since at the time their were no local county governments in he colony all recordings were made at the state-level in Charleston, making it ceesssary for citizens of the backcountry to make the long difficult trip to charleston.

Bhortly after Ephraim' death his widow, Ann, married Eleazer Mobley. On Hovember 3, 1766, his brother, Col. John Liles, was named administrator of his Estate.

radition holds that Ephraim Liles came from North Carolina to South arolina. He was among the earliest settlers of Fairfield. and records indicate that Ephraim had purchased land in the Craven County (now . airfield County) in the 1750's on the eastern side of the Broad River between eaver Creek and Henderson's Island. Ephraim and his family were probably iving on the land for several years prior to the recording of the land r sfer. Tradition holds that his oldest son, Arromanus Liles, was born in n ne county in 1748. Making the trip to Charleston to record transfers often eant long periods of time went by before these transactions were recorded. His rothers, Colonel John and Williamson Liles, settled on the opposite side of he Broad River at approximately the same time. The ford on the Broad iver between Ephraim Liles and Colonel John Liles land holdings soon became nown as Lyles Ford. It appears on two separate land plats at the South arolina Archives as Liles Ford in 1774. INDIVIDUAL DATA

nn Liles' maiden name has not been identified. It is not known when she arried Ephraim Liles, however they were most likely married in the 1740s. heir marriage may have taken place before they moved to South Carolina.

nn and Ephraim Liles had six sons. All six are identified in this enealogy, they undoubtedly also had daughters but none have been ositively identified yet.

In Liles memorialized title to land belonging to the estate of Ephraim Liles In March 1764, she later married Eleazer Mobley, son of Rev. William Obley. They were married by 1766. South Carolina Court of Ordinary, estate Pecords recorded in Charleston reveal Ann and her second husband signed as Itnesses when Ephraim Liles' brother Colonel John Liles was subsequently named B administrator of his estate on October 29, 1766.

he Robert Coleman family genealogy (available at the Fairfield County (brary) lists Eleazer Mobley as marrying the Widow Liles. It appears that on and her second husband did not have children.

on lived at least until the mid-1790s when she appeared in a recorded ocument entered in Fairfield County, Deed Book A.
