

## HILL &amp; HILL-MOBERLY CONNECTIONS OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY, S. C.

COCKRELL - The Cockrell family was shown in the 1790 census for Fairfield District, S. C. as follows:

Thomas B. Cockrell - signed as Justice of the Peace, Feb. 26th, 1836 in a deed "Richard Hill to Matthew Hill." Fairfield County.

McMaster's "History of Fairfield." 'Quoting from a sketch by Col. Richard H. McMaster...."On July 3, 1781, from the same source...it is learned that General Green was at Cockrell, (White Oak)." (The White Oak section is in N. W. Fairfield Co.)

HOWELL - Gabe Howell lived in the Walker-Chattooga Co., Ga., vicinity. His daughter, Mary, married John Crawford Hill. "During the War Between the States, Gabe Howell visited his Son-in-law at Richmond, Virginia, where he was in the Confederate Army. While there, he became ill and died and is buried in Richmond." (quoted from family tradition). No further record.

LILES - LYLES - continued. From McMaster's History -  
Ephraim Liles and Ann, his wife, were early settlers of western Fairfield County where they received land grants. He and others of his family were killed by unknown assailants before 1769. Col. Arromanus Liles, son of Ephraim and Ann, served in the American Revolution with a distinguished record.

Company B, 7th S. C. Battalion, Confederate States Army, was organized as "Lyles Rifles".

*Thom Papa - Samuel Thomas Clowry*

→ (I) WILLIAM MOBERLEY, Senior, son of Edward Moberley, Sr. and Susannah DeRuel, was born circa 1725-30. He married Ann Osborne before 1750. Their son, Eliaser, received a land grant in 1771, being 21 years of age at that time.

*Thom*  
→ William Moberley, Sr., left the Lunenburg-Bedford County, Va. area and moved to South Carolina where he received a land grant in 1758. According to the records of the Historical Commission of S. C., both William Moberley, Sr., and Junior served in the South Carolina Militia. However, there were a number of William Mobley's in S. C. at that time and the Henry Chapman Bible record hints that he may have been deceased before the outbreak of the American Revolution. He received three land grants of 100, 200 and 150 acres in northwest Fairfield County in 1758-9. (Sec. of State Office - Columbia, S. C.) He sold 200 acres to Edward Moberly (his brother) and 150 acres to Benjamin Mobley, on the 9th and 10th days of May, 1762.

Children of William and Ann Osborne Mobley. *Ann Thom Papa -*

(1) Eleazer or Eliaser (Elias) Moberly was born circa 1750. There is no record of the date of his marriage to the Widow Ann Lyles. He received a land grant in Craven County, S. C., of 200 acres on July 9, 1771. The S. C. Militia records, shown by his indent, verifies that he accompanied Colonel John Winn on an expedition against Stono in 1779.

*Mabry's Brother*  
→ A deed in the Fairfield records - Book C, page 96, dated Nov. 7, 1775?, "Eleazer Mobley, of Camden District, State of S. C., ... to Ephraim Mabry..land on north side of Broad River, partly against the upper end of the Great Island...said land granted by His Excellency, the Rt. Hon. Lord Charles Granville Montague...to the said Eleazer Mobley the 8th day of February, 1773."

Another deed dated or recorded in 1787, Book B, pages 72-73.. "Eleazer Mobley of the state of S. C., and Camden District, and Ann, his wife, to George Godspeed and Hannah Godspeed...Land on a branch of Bever Creek. Witnesses: Thos. Cockrell, John Stone, et al.

Feb. 3, 1779 - Fairfield Records. "Eleazer Mobley of Craven County to Samuel Mobley, a negro slave." Book O, p. 442.

Dec. 5, 1789 - Fairfield deeds. "Eleazer Mobley of Richmond Co., Georgia, to Thomas Burns of Fairfield Co., S. C., conveyed by Martin Haile to William Mobley 12 February 1764 and whereas the said Wm. Mobley died intestate and whereas the said Eleazer Mobley as his eldest son and heir hath sold the sd. 100 acres therefore he makes deed to Burns for same. Wit: Francis Coleman, Job Meador and Armenus Liles. Deed Bk. N, pp 25, 27, 28". *Brother of Eleazer Mobley*

From the above record, it seems that Eleazer Mobley moved to Richmond Co., Georgia and that is our last record of him.
