Meeting of the GRANVILLE COUNTY COURT on the first Monday in Movember, 1787. Some members of the Grand Jury were: SANUEL CLEMENT WILLIAM KHIGHT GEORGE MELTON THOMAS HICKS

Meeting held again on November 8, 1787.

The case of HOWELL LEWIS v. RAMSON SOTTEM-LAND came on to be tried and among the jurors selected to serve were HENRY MELTON, SAMUEL PAR-KER, RAIPH WILLIAMS and STEPHEN CLEMENT.

ARGHIRALD HENDERSON was Clerk of the Gourt of GRANVILLE COUNTY in 1788, and most of the material shown in these abstracts was copied in his fine handwriting.

Meeting of the GRANVILLE COUNTY COURT on the first Monday in February, 1789.

John Howard Samuel Clements William Graves.

GROVES HOWARD was permitted to resign his office of Constable for the TAR RIVER DISTRICT.

Present as members of the court at this meeting were HOWELL LEWIS, JOHN PRODUCE and MEMUCAN HURT.

HOWKIL LEWIS acknowledged a deed of sale to CHARLES LEWIS for 720 acres of land.

Agreeable to an order of the last Court the following commissioners W. LLAM BLASS, JAMES LEWIS, JOHN TAYLOR, LECHARD SIMS and ROBERT BUB-TON, ESQ. in re-estate of JESSE HARPER, deceased:

ARCHIBALD HENDERSON is allowed \$15 for drawing the list of taxable property for the year 1788, alphabetically, which is ordered paid.

FIRST COURT OF GRANVILLE COUNTY. This writer is convinced that the first court ever held in GRANVILLE COUNTY was at the home of EDWARD JONES in the lower edge of what is now WARREN COUNTY at the "BOILING SPRINGS", later called SHOCCO and JONES' SPRING, and not at the home of COL. WILLIAM EATON as some writer has stated. Both Golonel Maten and Edward Jones, who appear to have been the moving spirits at this birth of COLONIAL GRANVILLE COUNTY were present. On page 43 of this work, the writer thinks he is in error in stating that JONES lived in the Morthern part of FRANKLIN, but now believes that his home was over the line in WARREN. These statements are based on the record discovered in the old minute book of the court detailing briefly the account of the first two meetings held, and upon data found among the notes of Gol. Ashe relating to the JONES and MACON FAMILIES which disclose that the JONES and MACONS (descendants of GIDEON) lived in that viwinity. Some of the facts relative to this meeting and relative also to COL. MATON will be found on page 43 hereof, to which reference is made.

GIDEON MACON who met with the first court of GRANVILLE COURT at the home of EDWARD JUNES on September 3, 1746, was a son in law of EDWARD JUNES, having married his daughter PRISCILLA, by whom he had ANN HART MACON ( m. CAPT. JOHN ALSTON ), SARAH MACON ( m. GAPT. JOHN HAWKINS ), MARTHA MACON ( m. JOSEPH SEAWELL), JOHN MACON ( m. JOANNA TARE ), HARRISON MACON ( m. HANNAH GIRMW), MATHALIEL MACON ( m. HANNAH PIJMMER ), and GIDEON HENT MACON, who m. (1) MACON GREEN, (2) MACON MATHALIEL GIDEON MACON was deceased before 1763, and his widow PRISCILLA (JOHES) MACON married JAMES RANSON on February 9th of that year. MARTHA, the sister of GIDEON MACON married CRIANCO JUNES, son of the MENV. ROWLAND JUNES, of Bruten Parish, in YORK COUNTY, VIRGINIA, and her daughter GRANCES JUNES, who married COL. DANDRINGE was the mother of MARTHA WASHINGTON. For the names of the children of EDWARD JUNES see page 43 ( this book ).

JAMES PAYME another one of the persons present at the first meeting of the first Court of GRANVILLE COUNTY on September 3, 1746, was a brother in law of EDWARD JUMES, he having married ALICIA JUMES, a sister of EDWARD, long before coming to North Carolina, as shown by the will of EDWARD JUMES, SR. in Farnhem Parish, in Virginia, recorded in 1715.

WEST HARRIS, another member of this little band of GRANVILLE COUNTY pioneers was also related to EDWARD JOHES. WEST was the son of EDWARD HARRIS who died leaving a will in ISLE OF WIGHT COUNTY, Virginia in 1734, whose clister SIEW HARRIS married a JOHES. The wife of WEST HARRIS is said to have been MARY TURNER. This West Harris, of GRANVILLE was the ancestor of HOM. ISMAN HABBLE, the beloved Governor of Termessee. While the HARRIS genealogists have failed to furnish us with a list of his children, it is more than likely that WHOT HARRIS was the father of HOMERT HARRIS who, in the days of GOVERNOR DORES appears to have been a kind of "political Boss" of GRANVILLE COUNTY. As a member of the Assembly HOBERT HARRIS must have said some uncomplimentary things about Dobbs, for which he was hailed before the Governor and penalized by having his name left off the lists of Justices for Granville County, whereupon his more fortunate fellow-citizens who had been reappointed, refused to serve.

ROBERT POTTER, the orphan who is mentioned with his brother THOMAS and sisters POLLY and SALLY, and for whom JAMES DOWNEY at a meeting of the GRANVILLE COURTY COURT on Movember 2, 1787, was a son of ABRAHAM POTTER, and his subsequent history, while not very creditable, as same is related by the Historian Wheeler, yet his meteoric rise in GRANVILLE COURTY and MORTH CAROLINA pelitics to a seat in Congress, his fall back into the position as a member of the State Legislature, his trial for indignities against the peace and dignity of the State of North Carolina, and his final departure from the Old Morth State, headed for Texas, provides a historical "thriller " for people who like such negratives. Last will of WILLIAM BULICK, of GRAWVILLE COURTY, N. C. dated 1794 and proved in 1796; in it he names his wife ELIZABETH, and children ELIZABETH MARTIN, WILLIAM BULICK, and FRANCIS BOYD. Grandson JAMES BULICK and son in law JAMES LEWIS.

Last will and testement of RIGHARD BULLOCK of GRAWVILLE COUNTY, N. C. proved and recorded in 1766, in which he mentions the following children: SARAH SIMS, ACHES WILLIAMS, WILLIAM, ZACHARIAH, HATHANIEL, JUNG and LEGHARD HERLEY BULLOCK.

RICHARD BENNETT died leaving a will in CRANVILLE COUNTY, H. C., which was dated in the year 1783 and probated in 1786. In this will he mentions his wife ARME, and sons THOMAS, NI-CAJAE, WILLIAM, PETER, RARTLETT and LEWIS REM-HETT; daughters SARAH ASTES (ESTESS), ARMA DUKE. The witnesses were CRESIEV DANIEL and HARCY BLACKWELL.

Last will and testament of BENJAMIN HARRI-SON, dated January 17, 1773 and proved in MAY, 1774. Mentions his wife ELLEN; mentions his dementers SUSANNAM WHEELER, ALLSEY HARRISON, & SONS HAMUEL, BENJAMIN and VINSON HARRISON. The witnesses were CHESLEY DANIEL, JAMES DANIEL & JOSEPH ROBERTS.

EDWARD JONES. The first Court ever held in GRANVILLE COURTY was at his home in the lower part of what is now WARREN COUNTY, as has been mentioned before in some of these notes ( see pp 43 and 209 ). His will was proved in 1750 and that of his son EUGAR JUHES in 1761. e time these wills were filed neither the extinct county of BUFE, nor what is now WARREN At the time these while were like helder the extinct county of BUTA, nor west is now washing COUNTY had been established, so they were necessarily recorded in GRAVILLE COUNTY. Had they died after 1764 the records would appear among the records of BUTE later filed in Warren COUNTY. The wife of EDWARD JONES was ABIGAIL SUGHE, a member of a EUGUENOT family, from MANIKINTOWN, from which CAPT. SUGAR JONES obtained his Christian name. EDWARD JONES was the son of another EDWARD JONES whose will was proved in RICHMOND COUNTY, VIRGINIA, September 2, 1715, in which he named four sons and one daughter, SANFORD, JOHN, EDWARD, CHARLES and ALIGIA JONES the wife of a PAYNE (either the JAMES PATHE who was present at the first court of Granville County in 1746, or a son of that PAYNE who mearried ALIGIA JONES, sister of EDWARD ). SANFORD PAYNE, the cider brother of EDWARD of GRANVILLE, died in RICHMOND COUNTY, VIrginia, in 1717, and in his will names his "cousin" ANNE PAYNE. JOHN WILLIAMS mentions only three of his ren ( p. 196 ) though he had at least SIX ( See p. 237, in which the name of his daughter SITA SIMPSON was omitted by error). HETSI, or ELIZABETH, married AZARIAH GRAVES. This LE GRAVES. AZARIAH GRAVES was a grandson of HERRY WHITE GRAVES and his wife MARY WILLIAMS LHY WILLIAMS was the sount of COL. JOHN WILLIAMS of CASWELL COUNTY, N. C. and the sister of ather NATHANIEL WILLIAMS.

The lineage and family history of the GRAVES FAMILY of GRANVILLE, CARWELL and CHATHAM ies, HORTH CAROLINA is very interesting and dates back to one THOMAS GRAVES who came to NIA and settled in ACCOMAC and NORTHAMPTON COUNTIES, before the latter County was erected f the former. He is said to have arrived in VIRGINIA before 1630, and appears to have had ast THREE CHILDREN:

The descendants of RICHARD GRAVES were perhaps as numerous as those of his brother GRAVES, but this compiler has not attempted to identify and follow them. Their names on secord are accounted for as his descendants, when they do not apparently belong with those is brother RAIPH. Doubtless there were many of them in MORTH CAROLINA, smong them, doubtbeing THOMAS GRAVES of SPOTTSTIWANIA COUNTY, Virginia, who is known to have come there &

WILLIAM COTTER, of ACCOMAC COUNTY, WEEGINIA, whose sister mar-CAPT. WILLIAM STORE, who became GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND. VERLINDA COTTER, the daughter of REV. IAM COTTER married THOMAS BURDETT and eventually settled in CHARLES COUNTY, MARYLAND, where THOMAS STORE sought refuge in his old age after a hectic career in Maryland Politics and Trow escape from the wrath of the second or third LORD BALTIMONE and his crowd. The EURDETTS HARRISONS of MARTIAND intermarried and the name VERLINDA is perpetuated in both families.

DANIEL. I want to make a correction in the note on page 213 about the DANIEL FAMILIES OF VILLE COUNTY. All that is said in that note is correct except that the JAMES DANIEL who mar-LELIZABETH WOODSON was BOY SEMILEY OF GOODSTAND. The SHERIFF of GOOCHLAND was still anor JAMES DANIEL ( my wife's ancestor ) who married JEAN KELSO. All of his sons except one ed to GREENE COURTY, GEORGIA, and all THREE of his sons married CUMNINGHAMS and one of his there married SAMUEL CUMNINGHAM. There were in fact FIVE or SIZ JAMES DANIELS in GOOCHLAND, LIA and PRINCE EDWARD and I will attempt to identify all of them when I take up the story of DANIEL FAMILY in its pumper place in this book.

ENGLISH parentage born in the COLONY OF VIRGINIA, was a brother in law of the first RALFH GRAVES ( son of THOMAS and brother of ANN who married HEV. WILLIAM COTTEN ). They both married daugh ters of the emigrant JOSEPH CROSHAW, who patented considerable land in NORK COUNTY and along QUEER'S CHARK. In one account of JOSEPH GROSHAW ( Vol 2 W.& M. p. 270, first series) it is said that he married at least three times (1) the widow FINCH, (2) AMME HODGES and (3) MARGARET, the widow of DANIEL TOWER. His children were by his first wife. They were: (1) HENJANIE CHOSHAW, (2) JOHNTH CHOSELY, (3) RASHEL CROSELY who married RAIPH GRAVES, (4) MARY CROSELY who married MR. HENRY WHITE and (5) UNITY GROSELY who married Licut. Col. JOHN WEST.

RALPH GRAVES ( the first ) died MAY 9, 1667. He and his wife RAGHEL GROSHAW, according to the account mentioned, had four children;

(6) AND GRAVES

(7) RAIPH GRAVES

(8) WILLIAM GRAVES

(9) MARY GRAVES.

RACHEL (CROSHAW) GRAVES, after the death of her husband, married second one RICHARD BARNES, by whom she probably had children who married into the COTTEN FAMILY, some of whom came to NORTH CAROLINA.

(8) WILLIAM GRAVES, son of RALFH and RACHEL may have been an ancestor of some of the GRAVES FAMILY in SPOTTSTLYANIA COUNTY. This fact has greatly complicated the laneage of some of the members of this family and has almost run some of the genealogists crazy in trying to straighten them out. This compiler has kept his eye on the RAIPH GRAVES set, because he has been sue from the beginning that they were the GRANVILLE set.

(7) RAIPH GRAVES ( son of RAIPH GRAVES and RACHEL CROSHAW, and nephew of LIEUT. COL. JOHN WEST and also of HENRY WHITE, of QUEEN'S CHEEK in YORK COUNTY ) married his first cousin, UNITY WHITE, daughter of HENRY WHITE and his wife MARY CROSHAW. Thanks to the unwavering courtesy and benevolent generosity of my friend HDN. HEVERLY FLEET, tireless genealogical antiquarian, of RICHMOND, VIRGINIA, I do not have to depend on "family genealogists" for verification of this alliance between the GRAVES, CROSHAW and WHITE families. The following order of the YORK COUNTY, (Virginia) Court appears in the proceedings of said court on MARCH 26, 1688, on page 105 of Vol. VIII of the YORK COUNTY RECORDS and contains much information relating to the relationships in questions

> "WHEHEAS, JOSEPH WHITE and WILLIAM WHITE, sons of HENRY WHITE, late deceased, and WILLIAM DAVIS, as marrying MARY, one of the said daughters, and RAIPH GRAVES, as marrying UNITY, one other of the said daughters of the said HENRY WHITE, setting forth by their petition to this Court that the said HENRY WHITE, by his last will and testament did make COL. JOHN WEST and BRYAN SAYTH the executors, and did give and bequeath into his daughter REBECCA WHITE thirty pounds of tobacco and a certaine part of his estate as may appear by a division of the said estate amounting to forty-eight pounds, forty-one shillings and eight pence Sterling and One Thousand Right Hundred and THIRTY POUNDS of tobacco, and in cattell 4 cowes under ten yeares old, 2 steers three years old, two steer yearlings, 1 heifer cowe calfe. And in case the said REBECCA dye under age and before marriage then her part to bee equally divided amongst the surviving children. And now, it appearing to this Court that the said REBECCA WHITE dyed under age and before marriage, it is therefore ordered that COL. JOHN WEST, the surviving executor of the said HENRY WHITE do forthwith pay unto the said JOSEPH and WILLIAM WHITE, WILLIAM DAVIS and RAIPH GRAVES as aforesaid, the sum of Thirty Pounds Sterling, \* \* given by said will and also all other the estate \* \* both money, tobacco and cattell according to the age above mentioned and sett down in the said division and according to the true intent of the said HENRY WHITE'S written will, etc."

Further proceedings of interest in this connection is shown on pages 27 and 28 of the same record above quoted in 1687, where a deed is recorded from JOSEPH WHITE to ED-MUNID JENNINGS to property on ST. ANDREWS CREEK in York County, including a tract of land on which there was a mill. This deed is interesting on account of the names of the wit messes who were REV. ROWLAND JONES ( minister of ERUTEN PARISH and kinsman of GIDEON MACON and the GOOCH FAMILY of GRANVILLE COUNTY ). JOHN GAILOR and WILLIAM SHERWOOD ( Distinguished early lawyer of YOHK and JAMES CITY COUNTY ). The wife of JOSEPH WHITE, who signed the deed with him was MAGDATENE.

NOTE - DANIEL WILLIAMS. I have found another copy of an abstract of the will of DANIEL WILLIAMS, of GRANVILLE COUNTY ( other than the one previously mentioned ) in which, in addition to the sons HENRY, JOHN, JAMES, JOSEPH and DANIEL ( who married ANN HENDERSON ) there there appears the names of two daughters: MARY WILLIAMS who married a MITCHELL, and MARIA WILLIAMS who married a man named GOODMAN. On page 227 there is a note which says that MARY HEN-DERSON, daughter of SAMUEL HENDERSON married a JOAE MITCHELL, His brother probably married MARY.

Page 738 Valentine Papers (Friends Meeting Records): RICHARD JORDAN, son of THOMAS JOHDAN of Churkatuck descased, marriage to RESECCA RATCLIFFE, descator of RICHARD RATCLIFFE of TRAVESCOE MECK, married in the house of her father, the sixth month (JUNE) in the year 1706. The witnesses were JOHNAN, brother BORDAN, brother JAMES JOHNAN, MARCARET JORDAY, mother, MART JORDAN, NARGARET JORDAN, RICHARD RATCLIFFE, KLIZARETH RATCLIFFE, mother, RICHARD RATCHIFFE, brother, JOHN RATCHIFFE, brother, WILLIAM SCOTT and others,

On page 258 of BOIDIE'S 177H CENTURY ISLE OF WIGHT we are told that JOHN HARRISON was married to a sister of WILLIAN BRESSIE, a QUARKE, who was an oversoer of the will of MICHOLAS HILL, and that SARAH LUCK was a sister of JUHH JEWNIEGS who married one of the descriptors of MAJ. HIGHULAS HILL, and owned lands adjoining JOHN HARRISON in ISLE OF WIGHT COUNTY November 6, 1719.

The foregoing items (on this and the page preceding ) are set out somewhat in detail by the compiler to show certain things in connection with the MARRISONS who descended from HARMON HARRISON.

The will of WILLIAM BRESSET discloses that there was an older JOHN HAB-RISON, then perhaps long deceased (1700), numbers wife was MERCHOUGH or MYLDOROUGH. As his son WILLIAM HARRISON was a "brother" of the old QUAKER and contemporaneous with him, he was married and had, perhaps grown sons by 1658, when ERESSET bought lands from SAMUEL HASVELL in that year.

The notes show that both WILLIAM MARRISON and JOHN HARRISON must have married sisters of WILLIAM BRESSIE, and further show that WILLIAM MARRISON was alive in 1715 when he sold 100 acres of his inherited lands (from BRESSIE) to MATTHEW JURDAN.

The JOHN HAMMISCH who married MILECHOUGH HILL could not have been JOH, the som of RICHARD. (1648-1690) the married MART HAIL, of course and had one lone daughter MAHY, who married JUHN HUBBAHD and a son RICHARD who died in 1722 urmarried.

The WILLIAM HARRISON who married a BRESSEY and was "called brother" in BRESSET'S will was cortainly not the WILLIAM (1650-1719) she married MART HUBRARD or MART HAM, and became the ancestor of all of the "Scimino Marrisons".

If what is pointed out so far was ALL the evidence we would not have a pog to stand on. The paterial evidence is the part that discloses the relationship between these WILLIAM REESSET HARRISONS and those of QUEEN'S CREEK in YORK COUNTY, which may not be brushed asids or ignored.

NOW JOHNAN, som of THOMAS JOHNAN, lately deceased, is a legatee under the will. He was a brother of MATTHEW JOHNAH, who in 1702 married the widow SUNAMMAH BHESSEY, the sister of MEV. ROWLAND JOHES. Also a brother of MOMENT JOHNAN, grandfather of MARGARET JOHNAN who married the fourth WILLIAM HARRISON of QUEEN'S CHEEK.

In other words JOHN HARRISON ( son of HARRISON ) had two sons, JOHN and WILLIAM HARRISON who married sisters of WILLIAM BHESSEY, the QUAKER of LEVY REGI. In one sense they were brother's in law of REV. HOWLAND JUNES, minister of ERUTON PARISH. That brought them mighty close to QUEEN'S CREEK.

They were co-legatees with the JOHDANS of Hansemond and CHECKATUCK. They were certainly step-sons of MATTHEW JURNAN, great uncle of MARGARET

JOHNAM, who married the fourth WILLIAM HARRISON of QUEEN'S CREEK. They were in the same family circle with the RATCLIFFES who married into

the JOHNANS and the HARRISONS of LEVY MRCZ as well as the HARRISONS of QUEEN'S CREEK, all of whom were QUAKERS.

They had a brother (evidently) named MARTH MARRISON, or else MARTIN was a son of either JUHN or WILLIAM ( the sone of JUHN and MYLEOHOUGH HARRISON. Thus we are able to present from the EECORDS the names of at least two and maybe THREE sons of JOHN HARRISON. son of HARMON HARRISON, alive in ISLE OF VICEN COURTY in 1700, 92 years after the succestor first come to VIRGINIA.





From the SEARCH WAP it will be noticed that HERRY GRAVES, JR. lived in the COSHER DIS -TRIOT not far from (12) HESIAT DANIEL. LEGNARD DANIEL. a neglect of CHESLAY, married MARY ANN CHAVES, his eleter. SERRY CRAVES, St., his father, lived in the upper part of the Eastern area of the present CRAVILLE COURTY in the ISLAND CREEK DISTRICT. RAIFE CRAVES, his uncle, also lived in that part of the county. HALPH GRAVES, of YORK COUNTY, VIRGINIA, who married UNITY WHITE was the Great Great greadfather of HERRY CHAVES, JR. of CRANVILLE COUNTS.

(6) THOMAS SATTERWHITE was a native of YOHK COUNTY, VIRGINIA, where so many of the eld families of GRANVILLE COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, originated. He married a step-daughter of JUDGE JOHN WILLIAMS, the daughter of his wife AGHIS by her first imstand MR. KEELING. In the will of AGNES VILLIAMS, the relict of JUDGE JOHN VILLIAMS in 1802 in GRANVILLE COUNTY, she men tions MORAGE and EDWIM and FEGGY and MARCY SATTEMENTED as her granichildren. These were the names of four of the children of THOMAS SATTEMENTS, who had married her daughter, who was also a half-sister of AGATHA VILLIAMS who married COL. HORREST BURNOS. ( See page 213 ).

The SATTERVHITE FAMILY seems unquestionably to have had its VIRGINIA origin in TORK and GLOUCESTER COUNTIES. In 1646 and 1647 the name of MARSHALL SATTERWHITE appears as confessing judgments in the YORK COUNTY court, and in JULY, 1657, MICHAEL SATTEMENTS of Mop Jack Bay ( in GLOUCESTER, confessed an indebtedness in YORK COURTY. In 1742 TROMAS SATTERERITE gave a quit claim

for cortain negroes to PETER RICE in TORK COURTY. ( Page 2313 Valentine Papers).

ME. W. S. MORTON, of PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VIRGINIA, gives an account of this CHESLEY DANIEL family that makes him the son of emother JAMES DANIEL, who was the Sheriff of GOOCHLAND COUNTY, Some ten years earlier, and whom he says married KLIZARFTH WOODSON. He is mixed up in the matter. First, the Sheriff of GOODBLAND was not the JAMES who become after wards the SHERIFF OF ALBEMARIE, and the JAMES DAVIEL who married ELIZABETH WOODSON was HOT the Sheriff of GCOCHLAND. The Sheriff of GOOCHLAND was JAMES DANIEL who married JAME KELSO and wi died in PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY, VA. In his account Mr. MORTON gives to JAMES DANIEL ( Of Goodbland ) the same children named in the will of the ALBEMANIE JAMES DAWLEL in 1861. ( See p. 212

- (93) SAMUEL HENDERSON (Searcy Map). An account of his family, together with a list of his children, will be found on page 221. About two miles South of MIDDLEBURG in what is now wance county there is dirt road turns to the right off the highway, which leads to ASHLAND, the old HENDERSON HOME. It is a two story house, three bays wide, has a doorway on the right hand bay and a story and a half addition on the right with end chimneys matching the twin chimneys on the left side of the main house. The headed wastherhouseding is reinted white, and both saves and bay and a story and a half addition on the right with end chimneys matching the twin chimneys on the left side of the main house. The beaded weatherboarding is painted white, and both caves and window headings have well-designed cornices. The KITTRELL family came to North Carolina from NANSEMOND and ISLE OF WIGHT County, Virginia, and first settled on BERNETT'S CHEKK in BERTIE PRECINCT, perhaps, and moved to the GRANVILLE COUNTY territory probably in about 1745. - (123) GREEN HILL ( SEARCY MAP). This GREEN HILL was the son of a GREEN HILL who man ried GRACE BENNETT, a daughter of WILLIAM BENNETT of Northampton County, North Carolina. The old the state of the st GREEN HILL home is on the South side of the HAW RIVER in the outskirts of LOUISEURG, in what is GHERN HILL home is on the South side of the HAW RIVER in the outskirts of LOUISEURG, in what is now Franklin County. Here it was that Bishop Coke held the first North Carolina Metchodist Conference in 1785. The home is now a well-preserved white frame house with do mer windows, three big brick end chimneys and high porches. This particular RREEN HILL was prominent in State, as well as religious affairs, representing HUTE COUNTY (a part of the original GRANVILLE in the provisional Congress. He was also a Major of the HUTE MILITIA in the revolution. He became a minister and moved to the general vicinity of Nashville, Tenn.
- (125) PHILLIP PIERCE was a resident of what is now FRANKLIN COUNTY (a part of the original GRANVILLE) and is distinguished in History mainly because of the fact that he was the father of one great Southern Preacher, and the grandfather of another who was a beloved BISHOP of the Methodist Church, REV. GEORGE F. PIERCE, of HANCUK COUNTY, Georgia, known and loved by members of his denomination throughout the entire South. See items from the records of Franklin County on page 207 relating to transactions of PHILLIP PIERCE, and his family.
- (133) EDWARD JUNES (Searcy Map). See the records of GRANVILLE COUNTY and its earliest organization, beginning on page 209 for information in regard to EDWARD JUNES. There is also an account of EDWARD JUNES on page 43 (Of the INDEX SECTION ) in connection with an account of COL. WILLIAM EARON and his genealogy. He was the father of PRISCILLA JUNES who became of the wife of GIDEON MACON. Any purported account of the early history of GRANVILLE COUNTY could not be written without mention of EDWARD JUNES and his descendants who exercised a wide influence on the destinies of the Province of North Carolina, and particularly GRANVILLE COUNTY.
- (140) WILLIAM EATON. A genealogical account of his family, briefly outlined is to be found on page 43 ( Index Section of the "Lost Tribes" ). He was from TOHK COUNTY, Virginia to North Carolina. The roster of his GRANVILLE COUNTY regiment will be given later.
- (145) ISHAM HARRISON ( Searcy Map ) was a son of JOHN HARRISON and his wife SARAH DAN-IEL, daughter of JOHN DANIEL who died in Granville County in 1765 ( See page 212). The ISHAM HAR-RISON who was on the tax list of GRANVILLE COUNTY in 1789 may have been a son, as he was only as-sessed with one poll, and at that time may not have been married. (145) ISHAM HARRISON moved to South Carolina, along the Pacolet, with some of the HENDERSONS and others, as did JOHN HARRISON, who may have been another son of ISHAM. ## THE HARRIS FAMILY OF GRANVILLE COUNTY, N. C.

(126) WEST HARRIS ( Of the SEARCY MAP ), one of those who met at the home of EDWARD JONES, on December 2, 1746, to complete the organization of the original GRANVILLE COUNTY, was a member of an old VIRGINIA FAMILI (p. 209). This WEST HARRIS was related to EDWARD JONES, to GIDEON MACON, to the LANIERS, JENNINGS, HILLS and BENNETTS, but whether in an attempted review of the notes pertaining to this femily of HARRIS, the writer can make this plain to the reader is questionable and I am sure will be questioned by others for the reason that the theories I will advance run counter to some of the writers who have attempted to set down the annals of

CAPT. THOMAS HARRIS, who on February 25, 1638, received a patent to 820 acres of land then known as LONGFIELD, but later known as "CUMILES" on the JAMES RIVER, was the first AMERICAN shoester of the GRANVILLE COUNTY HARRIS FAMILY. This land was afterwards claimed by NATHANIEL BACOM "the Rebel" through WILLIAM HARRIS, a son, (pp. 1387 and 1959 of the Valentine Papers, quering from the Records of HENRICO COUNTY), who sold the land to HOGER GREEN who promoted the first pilgrimage of Virginia settlers to the ALEEMARLE SOUND section of North Carolina. (Did & Dodd's Old South, p. 210). The name of the wife of CAPT. THOMAS HARRIS was DIANA. His widow, after his death, married (2nd) WILLIAM FOSTER, and finally, THOMAS WHITE. With her son JUEN she settled in North Carolina (p. 58 this work), perhaps at the instance of ROGER GREEN. She married WILLIAM FOSTER in 1675. The children of CAPT.
