that number of democrats, who failed to go to the polls. This was doubtless largely due to the fact that the democrats were not as thoroughly organized as they would have been, had they had more time. An organization, to be effective, must be such as to reach every voter, and when the election comes, there should be an absolute certainty that not a single vote will be lost. It is upon this dubious, the making of the liberty, that a most strenuous efforts must be made. Once got such men into a well-formed political association, and they soon begin to realize their duties and to feel their importance as voters. The organization of the democratic party for the coming elections should embrace every available man in South Carolina, and each man should be made to feel his responsibility as much to the party as a member of it, as to the state as a citizen.

In the next place, the organization should be compact. There should be such a union in the party that there will be no chance for "splits" or "bolts" of any sort. The members should be made to feel themselves so closely bound together that to prove false in any manner whatever would be alike dishonorable to the individual and injurious to the party. Compactness of organization will go far towards preventing discord and useless differences over unimportant questions. The want of this compactness is a difficulty incident to most organizations, whatever may be their object. Where there are useless subdivisions or useless delegations of authority, there is likely to arise much conflict of opinion, and perhaps of authority—either of which is very unfortunate. The organization of the democrats of our state should be so compact as to make them appear as a single body of voters ready in any emergency to act, not as individuals, but in their organized capacity.

Again, the democratic party should be well disciplined. By this we must by no means be understood to mean that a union with the democrats is a practical slavery to the rule of a few leaders. The connection of any man with the party is purely a matter of his own option. There is no power that can force him into the party, except, indeed, the power of an instinct, without which man were lower than any of the brute creation—the instinct of self-preservation. But once a person goes into the party, and pledges himself to stand by it as long as it adheres to the principles to which the party itself is pledged, he must resolve to

expect to sink every day deeper and deeper into an abyss of embarrassment, disaster and despair, from which no power on earth will be able to rescue them.

Forty Years Ago.
Just forty years prior to this date (February 12), in response to a call for volunteers from the President of the U. S. to fight the Seminole Indians in Florida, South Carolina furnished 10 companies of 75 men each. Old Fairfield, at a public meeting, 1st February, tendered 126 men. From this number it was resolved, in order to comply with the requisite number, that all the married men should be excluded. At a subsequent meeting it was found that there were 86 single men (unmarried) and every man was determined to go; and they did go! They were received by a U. S. officer, and Fairfield was the only county in the State to whom 75 rations were given for 86 men, during the campaign; their supplies were furnished in strict accordance with U. S. Regulations; the commissary (Jas. R. Aiken) exercised his skill and discretion, so that no soldier could or did ever complain. Of this number of volunteers (the original roll, we understand, is yet preserved) there remain alive at the present day, only 13 members, whose names we annex: W. A. McCright, 1st Lt.; Jas. R. Aiken, O. S.; Dr. Edward Gibson, Dr. T. T. Robertson, B. H. Robertson, David Cnack, Jonathan Stanton, James Wyrick, R. T. Lumpkin, Wm. Elkin, Thomas Sloan, James Gibson, Benjamin Macon. If there are any more we would be gratified to publish their names.

The captain, Derrill Smith, who was elected by the influence of the "Sedar Creek Rifle Corps," was at the time engaged, and did marry on the night before the company left Fairfield; and he was brought home a corpse in May, 1836. Of those who have married since, we have nothing to say, but verily believe their descendants are ready once more, like their fathers, to volunteer at all times in the cause of what they believe to be true, just and right. In this company but one soldier was killed, but many died of disease contracted in the Florida campaign. The district owes them a debt of gratitude, if nothing more, Fairfield forever!!! Who will be the last soldier of the Florida war? Let the record be preserved.

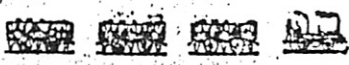
