## First Generation

John McClintock, I      1728 - 1796

Married Margaret Simpson 1733 - 1796 (1817)

He was born in Ulster County, Ireland and she was born in County Antrim, Ireland. They were married in Ireland and came to America and Laurens County October, 1772.

Both are buried in Old Fields Cemetary in Scuffletown (now called Ora).  
(or both are buried in Laurens Cemetary?)

They are both of Scotch - Irish decent.

They had nine (9) children.

Throughout his life, John McClintock, I , was faithful to, and active in, the lay work of the church. He served with devotion as an elder in the Old Fields and Laurens Presbyterian congregation in which city he was a successful merchant.

Note: He was an elder 40 years (from inscription upon tombstone).

John McClintock, II, was killed by a horse in Warrior's Creek. He was a stock raiser and was near Yarboroughs Mill. The horse was a fine stallion. While at the mill, he was washing the horse which became frightened and pawed him, had the men at the mill not been afraid of the horse, they could have saved John's life. Thomas McCarley witnessed this tragedy and was paralyzed with terror - John was 32 years old when he died April 7, 1803.

James McClintock, eldest child of Margaret Simpson and John McClintock, I, was drowned in 1810 near his residence - he was trying to ford the swollen waters of Warrior Creek with a wagon and a team of mules when one of the mules missed his footing and fell into the swift current. In the effort to rescue the team, James became entangled in the harness and was drown before help could be summoned.

Samuel McClintock was taken up by a scouting party near the close of the Revolutionary and by threats of hanging, compelled to tell where his brother James had gone, then Samuel was released.

## Second Generation

John McClintock, II 1776 - 1803

Son of John I, and Margaret Simpson McClintock of Ireland and the United States.

Married Jane Law (1769 - 1839) born in Antrim County, Ireland - the daughter of Samuel Law and Elizabeth Adger Law. Her parents later migrated to America and lived at Gilder's Creek, Newberry County, S.C.

John McClintock, II was born in County Intrim, Ireland - he is buried in Old Field Cemetary, Ora, S.C.

The Law family is buried in Fairfield County - Pressley's Creek Church Community.

Daughter of Margaret Simpson and John McClintock, I, she married Robert "Big Bob", Fleming (1771 - January 26, 1826) the son of Samuel Fleming, I.

"Big Bob" Robert Fleming and Elizabeth McClintock Fleming are buried in Old Field's Cemetary, Ora, S.C. (once called Scuffletown). They belonged to Bethel Church. She was noted for her great piety. Being left a widow with a large family (10 children), by her great industry and good judgement, she managed to give her children a good common school education. She was a woman of great magnetism and was loved and respected by all of her neighbors. She was ever ready to help those in need or sickness and always delighted to entertain the ministers of her church. She was well informed on the Bible and taught the Westminster Catachism to all of her children and those of her grandchildren who stayed with her much of the time. Her last words before she died were repeating the 23rd Psalm.

They were both natives of Ireland, but were married in this country. He was barely old enough to remember crossing the ocean when his father came to America.

### Third Generation

John McClintock, III May 1, 1801 - April 20, 1872

Son of John II, and Jane Law McClintock. Born May 1802 and died 1871. Married Mary Martin. She was born in Charleston on June 9th, 1803. She was the daughter of David and Margaret Aiken Martin of Fairfield, S.C. She died on April 24th, 1891.

John McClintock, III, was a farmer, deeply and judiciously devoted to the interest of the church, being himself a member of the Associate Reformed Synod of the South. Ebenezer Pressley McClintock, later became a minister in the ARP Church. He and Elizabeth Jane Young McClintock had two daughters:

1. Euphemia Elizabeth McClintock, famous college President of College for Women, Columbia, S.C. Dean of Women at Columbia University, New York. She also conducted Miss McClintock's School on Beacon Street in Boston, Mass.
2. Mary Law McClintock received distinction in educational work.

John McClintock, III, is buried in Old Field's Cemetery, Ora, S.C.

David Aiken McClintock was killed by pulling a pot of scalding coffee from the stove.

In early 1831, John McClintock, III, bequeathed a lot of land designated for the



1843. This was a non-denominational school until 1858, when it went under the control of the Presbyterian Synod and it became the Laurensville Female College. It closed in 1892.

Bella Bryson finished the Junior Class of Due West Female College and graduated from the Laurensville Female College in 1781.

In December, 1830, the Laurensville Female Academy was incorporated by the General Assembly.

In February 1831, John McClintock conveyed to the Trustees of the Laurensville Female Academy, a lot of land 184 foot by 240 foot in the village of Laurens for the purpose of erecting a female academy thereon. The deed granted the right to the use of water from a spring on the adjoining property of Mr. McClintock. The lot ran 184 feet on the western side of present church street, known as Lady's Street about 1840 and as mentioned in the deed, the approximate center of the lot faced the present intersection of Church and Laurens Streets.

Subscriptions were taken all over the county for the purpose of erecting a building to house the female academy, or seminary, as it was both referred to at that time.

The school was first taught by Miss Dorothy Teague Young, and her sister, Miss Florella Young, daughters of Abner Young, who had been educated in a Moravian School for young women at Salem, N.C.. The campus was later extended and the Female Academy eventually was succeeded by the Laurensville Female College whose college building was constructed about 1856. (information taken from History of Laurens County by Marion R. Wilkes - Laurens County Library)

About 1900, the property of this college was converted into a public school and the college was therefore discontinued. Rev. Zelotes Lee Holmes was a professor there.

The Laurensville Presbyterian Church, now the First Presbyterian Church of Laurens, S.C., was organized in the courthouse on Sunday, April 1, 1832. The first pastor was Reverend Samuel B. Lewers, who for some time before the organization had been preaching at this place. John McClintock, III, and his wife, Mary Martin McClintock, were two of the fourteen early charter members of the church.

Colonel Henry Young Simpson stated in his address at the church's centennial service in 1932 that in the early days negroes were received into the membership of this church, infants were baptized, and the funeral services of colored members were conducted by the pastor - this was the common practice of many southern churches at the time. They were taken into the church by the session, in the same manner as white members and occupied comfortable seats in the gallery. The church buildings though, which used to have galleries, have about disappeared - (from the History of Laurens County by Marion R. Wilkes).

Mr. & Mrs. David Martin McClintock, Augusta McClintock, LeRoy Sellers, Grace McClintock, and Harold McClintock attended the centennial in 1932.

Fourth Generation

William Aiken McClintock June 9, 1840 - August 5, 1919

Son of John, III, and Mary Martin McClintock

Married Frances Elizabeth Nesbitt in 1865. She was born January 2, 1846 the daughter of James Nesbitt and Caroline Brewton Nesbitt. She died August 26, 1909. Both are buried in Old Fields Cemetary, Ora, S.C.

William Aiken McClintock was called "Billy". All of this family are buried in Old Fields Cemetary, Ora, S.C. (except James Ebenezer McClintock who was buried in North Carolina)

William Aiken enlisted in the army at the age of 20 years. Served 4 years - was detailed among men to bring Jeff Davis through the Carolinas. Was with Hampton in Greensboro when Lee surrendered.

William Aiken McClintock was a director of the Peoples Loan and Exchange Bank of Laurens, founded in July 1886.

He served in the House of Representatives from Laurens County 1886 - 1888.

Fifth Generation  
(The same McCarley - Sixth Generation)

David Martin McClintock was born January 9, 1883. He was the son of William Aiken and Frances Elizabeth Nesbitt McClintock. He died April 27, 1949. He married Alice Agnew McCarley. She was born April 7, 1884. The daughter of Thomas Augustus and Jennie Agnew McCarley. She died June 4, 1976. They married July 25, 1906 and had 5 children.

David Martin McClintock attended Erskine College in Due West. He was a prominent farmer in Ora. He was a deacon of the Ora ARP Church and a director of the Palmetto Bank of Laurens.

Alice McCarley graduated in 1902 from Chicora College in Greenville, S.C. with a BS Degree and diploma in music. She was on the Editorial Staff as Associate Editor of the Chicora Clarion (yearbook). She was in the Cothran Literary Society and a member of the Dramatic Club. After she graduated, she taught school and music in Gray Court, where she and her father lived. She wanted to go to New York and study music, but her father got sick - she knew that she would have to care for him, so she decided to give up going to study music further and got married instead.

Alice and David got married in Gray Court July 25, 1906 and came to Ora in a buggy. She said that she never regretted her decision. Her father lived with them and died four years later. She also taught music in Ora. Alice and David and her father are buried in Old Fields Cemetary, Ora, S.C..

## Sixth Generation

Alice Augusta McClintock - November 14, 1909 - March 8, 1955

The daughter of Alice Agnew McCarley McClintock and David Martin McClintock married July 25, 1932, Smith LeRoy Sellars (January 24, 1907 - November 17, 1989).

Smith LeRoy Sellars was the son of Effie Hatchett Sellers and Landrum Sellars.

They had three children:

Augusta was in all of the special programs - Thanksgiving, Christmas, etc. when she was in high school. She was also in all of the plays, gave recitations, etc. She went to Agnes Scott College for one year and didn't get home until Christmas. Her mother went to Atlanta on the train and spent Thanksgiving with her. So she changed to Chicora College in Columbia and liked it better and got home more often. After graduation, she went to Pauline to teach school, met LeRoy Sellars, got married and lived there the rest of her life. She taught school for 24 years in Pauline, West Springs and Roebuck High School.

LeRoy was a lawyer in Spartanburg - He graduated from Furman University and from Furman University School of Law. He was an officer with First Federal Savings and Loan for many years. He was a member of the House of Representatives. He served in the US Army Air Corp during World War II and they lived in Goldsboro, N.C..

Augusta and LeRoy are buried in Philadelphia Baptist Church Cemetary, Pauline, S.C..

David Bruce McClintock - May 10, 1912 - October 7, 1988

He was the son of Alice Agnew McCarley McClintock and David Martin McClintock.

He graduated from Laurens High School. He never married. His father had several farms; Bruce helped him with these and also with their large garden.

He was a member of the Ora ARP Church.

He lived his entire life in the home place living with his mother after his father's death. He is buried in Old Fields Cemetery, Ora, S.C.

Grace McClintock Fleming attended Columbia College. She and Sam were married by Rev. Calvin Smith at the home of Miss Mamie Byrd, where Rev. Smith was boarding in Ora, S.C.. Her hobbies were making crafts, reading and growing flowers. She had over 1,000 different varieties of daylilies in her yard. She enjoyed being a member of the Region 15 North and South Carolina Hemerocallis Society and also the American Hemerocallis Society (she attended many of their yearly meetings). She was named for her mothers friend Grace Frontis.

Samuel Bryson Fleming attended Erskine College two years and graduated from Wofford College. His Uncle, Dr. Hunter Bryson, had their white ranch style home built for them after they were married in 1935. They had the sun porch built later and added two bedrooms, a bath, and had it brick vaneered in 1949.

Sam owned and operated the Laurens Bonded Warehouse and also farmed (he enjoyed raising beef cattle). He had a keen interest in History. His hobbies were watching sports events, football games, basketball games and baseball games; he also enjoyed quail hunting. He was an elder of the Ora ARP Church.

Harold William McClintock (January 24, 1918 - February 2, 1990)

Son of Alice Agnew McCarley and David Martin McClintock.

Married Margaret Virginia Kellett (September 2, 1917 -), daughter of Charles Dee Kellett and Gertrude Willis Kellett.

They had two children:

She did volunteer work in the Laurens County Hospital as a Pink Lady and she also was very active in the Cancer Society and also the Laurens Unit. She was the daughter of Gertrude Willis Kellett and Charles Dee Kellett.

Before they married, they built a white frame house between his mother's house and the school house in Ora. Later they built a beautiful brick home. He is buried in Old Fields Cemetery in Ora, S.C.

David Martin served in the company of Capt. Edward Martin in the regiment of Col. Richard Winn and Sumpter's Brigade of S.C. during 1780 and 1781 and 1782. He was about 6 1/2 months on foot and on horseback in the militia.

Two Martin brothers married two Aiken sisters - Capt. Edward Martin was a brother of David Martin and his wife Mary was a sister of David Martin's wife Margaret. Edward and Mary were married two years after David and Margaret were married. Mary Aiken and Elizabeth Martin were bridesmaids to Margaret.

Martins applied for US Government pensions in the Revolutionary War.

\*\*\*\* Note from Mary Martin of Ora, S.C. in 1953:

Cousin Margaret and Agnes Aiken of Charleston visited the Capt. McClintock home in Ora around 1890. Cousin William and Margaret Martin of Charleston also visited the home often in the late 1800's - even by train in later years.

David Martin may have been the son of Henry Martin who died about 1780. His wife was Mary. He received land in Virginia in 1729. It is believed he died in Virginia in 1789.
