Do not know if he is known outside the Winnsboro area, but he was a prominent local figure. He:

- 1. Built the first house in Winnsboro, which is still there
- 2. Was the first Intendant (mayor) of Winnsboro
- 3. Was the first elder of the Sion church and served for 50 years
- 4. Founded a cotton gin and mill construction company and one of his gins process the first ginned bale of cotton in South Carolina
- 5. Held several patents for cotton gins that he licensed as far away as Texas and Mississippi
- 6. He owned a construction company
- 7. He built the Fairfield county court house, except for the outside steps, which were added later. The architect, Robert Mills also designed part of Monticello.
- 8. Imported the parts of a clock from England and installed it in the town tower
- 9. Was a founding father of Sion College
- 10.Lead a South Carolina regiment with the rank of colonel
- 11.Used a deed of trust to circumvent an 1820 South Carolina law forbidding freeing slaves. This allowed a young girl to live with her father freed before the law came into effect.
- 12.Previously trained the girl's father in building gins and mills and he formed his own highly successful business
