To The Honorable the Senate and house of  
Representatives in General Assembly at  
Columbia met

The Petition of Edward M. Daniel of Chester District  
humbly sheweth That your Petitioner Received a Wound  
in the Shoulder from the British at Rocky Mount in the  
Summer of 1782 when fighting in defence of the State under  
the Command of General Suiter, by which Wound he was  
disabled from Supporting his Country, Family or defending his  
Country to any great Effect but with great difficulty and pain  
Served many Hours of duty in Camp in defence of the Country  
untill Peace was concluded in 1783 except whilst lying under the  
care of Physicians for the Cure of his Wound, That between four  
and five Years after Receiving said Wound it broke out and  
discharged a great deal of Matter attended with the most excru-  
ciating pain imaginable so that your Petitioner was for some  
time deprived of the Exercise of Reason previous to its breaking out

And as there was no Physician convenient was under  
the Necessity of Employing a Man to assist him to go to Camden  
where he was several Weeks under the care of Doctor Alexander  
and was obliged to borrow Money to defray the expences as  
well for Boarding &c as also the Doctors Account, At that  
time there were several Pieces of Bones extracted from under  
the Shoulder Blade as also from near the Elbow Joint

Said Wound has Swelled, Enflamed, broken out and  
discharged offensive matter several times since that period  
Sometimes did not apply to any Physician as well for the Reason  
that there was not any convenient and your Petitioner's Government  
not admitting him to go from home or to pay the expences abroad  
your Petitioner's Wife being much confined with a Family of  
Small Children he was obliged to hire a person to attend him  
at home

But Indigent as the Circumstances of your Petitioner  
was in order to save life once applied to Doctor ~~King~~ Maulin in North  
Carolina, take his Boarding &c at a Neighbouring house and attend  
every second day at the Doctors to have the Wound dressed for a consid-  
-erable time

Was obliged once to apply to Doctor King once to Doctor Cooper  
and once to Doctor Searles on account of said Wound, when the  
parts Swelled and Enflamed and was likely to break out.

That several times the Wound was probed to the depth of five  
Inches in one direction and four in another, There was several times

Your Petitioner further sheweth that he cannot make any

Bill of Expences occasion'd by said Wound untill it was too late

sion or annuity allow'd me on account of the Wound) untill comp-  
el'd by necessity as the Shoulder (as old age is creeping on) growing  
more troublesome and the Arm more infirm, especially since ~~but~~  
the last time the Wound broke out, that since sometime last  
Spring is oblig'd to have assistance to put on and off his clothes  
and as for the pains he suffers, or the distresses of his Family  
by Reason of said Wound, no calculation can be made, neither  
can be conceived except by the Sufferer or those who were Eye  
Witnesses to the same

true, and that from the destruction of his house  
by the burning of his dwelling house, as  
therein mentioned, & other circumstances, it is  
improbable for him to make out any accus-  
rate statement of the Monies he expended  
But thinks he is certain, that in the five  
several times he was obliged to apply to  
the different Doctors, viz. Alexander of Cam-  
den, McClain of North Carolina, Knox,  
Cooper & Harper of Chester, it did not  
cost him less, (but considerably more) than  
thirty dollars on an average each time (as  
he conceives. some times more, & sometimes  
less) besides the great length of time he  
lost, to the great inconvenience of himself  
and poor family, & the most excruciating  
pains which he suffered.



Edward M. Daniel. Since shortly after the Revolut-  
ionary War, and that it has been with extreme difficulty,  
and in the exercise of the greatest Industry of which he  
was capable, with the help of his anxiety, that he acquired  
a support for a small family, under the disasters of life,  
by reason of a wound received in his shoulder in  
the service of our Country, to which he has ever been  
firmly attached, and that the wound by frequent breaking  
and running for a length of time, has subjected him to  
considerable expense, to the injury of himself and family,  
and now in the decline of life he experiences still more  
of the painful effects of the wound received in his  
country's cause, so as to claim the humane patronage  
of our State Legislature. Whilst we as citizens enjoy  
the benefits flowing from the blood of our heroes, under a  
Benign Providence, an honorable Legislative Body <sup>were</sup> could
