The Blumes were not among the earliest settlers along Horse treek, and, in fact, lived more on Big Cedar Creek, but they intermarried ith the earliest settlers and can best be considered here.

JOHN BLUME, a native of Germany, was born on May 18,1826, and died time 15,1908. His wife Harriet Susannah was born on June 25,1838, and died bebruary 28,1926. They are buried in the graveyard of St. Andrews Lutheran Church near Blythewood. They were the parents of Frank and Noah Blume. Frank Blume married Mary Gradick, daughter of David Gradick and Mary Ann Leitner. Noah Blume married her sister Marion Gradick. Noah Blume born September 17,1870, and died March 17, 1953. His wife Marion tradick was born June 16,1875 and died July 1, 1953. They are buried in 16 the churchyard, Oak Grove Methodist Church.

THE McKINSTRYS

According to Mill's map (1820-improved 1826), T(Thomas) Mc Kinstry's nome was just north of Horse Creek where that stream crossed the Old improved Road and close to present day Beulah Church.

JOHN McKINSTRY, Richland County, Camden District, had 274 acres of and surveyed for him on Toms Creek by Phillip Pearson D.S., on August 21, 789. This land bordered on the land of Griffin Harris, the Salomon land, and on vacant land. The plat was certified by F.Bremer, S.G., on 17 arch 1, 1790.

John Mc Kinstry made his will on August 14,1795, and it was proven a October 5, 1795. He therefore died in the late summer or early fall of 795. To his eldest son, Samuel McKinstra (sic), he left one half of the lantation bordering on Griffin Harris; to his son John, he left a bay are, a cow and a yearling. His third son, James, to have a horse colt, two cows with yearlings. His fourth son, Thomas, to have a horse colt, two cows and a yearling. To his wife Jane, he left the other half of his lantation bordering on Griffin Harris, all of his home plantation, the smainder of the livestock, the furniture, and the farm tools for her use uring her lifetime. At her death, the property to be divided among his have youngest sons: John, James and Thomas. "If John remains in his present tate of mind" James and Thomas to have his share and to take care of him aring his lifetime. Joel Adams and William Weston were named as his secutors. George Jennings, James Carrell and Samuel Bell appraised his 18 attel goods for 167 pounds, 14 shillings and 10 pence.

Samuel McKinstry, oldest son of John and Jane McKinstry, was elected 19 utice of the Peace for Richland County in 1802.

On December 17,1799, James Duke borrowed \$200 from Samuel McKinstry, 20 lacksmith, to buy a Negro boy from Jacob Curry.

Thomas McKinstry, youngest son of John and Jane McKinstry, bought tract of land from James Craig on Cedar Creek for \$100 on May 24, 105. This land had been originally granted to Mary McGullough for

ound north on the estate of George Smith; west on Christopher Thompson; buth on Thompson and vacant land. Jane Craig signed her release on May 24, 805. On the following day, May 25, 1805, James Alston sold Thomas exinstry 150 acres of land on Big Branch of Big Cedar Creek for \$300: bund north on George Smith; east on land granted to Margaret McCullough; buth and east on the lands of Peter Entzminger; west on Herman Dash. This and was part of 197 acres of land granted George Smith on April 2, 1792, and by him released to Francis Lee on December 28,1797, and by Thomas Lee leased to James Alston. Frances Alston, wife of James Alston , signed her 21 lease.

Thomas McKinstry and his wife Jane (Jean) sold 279 acres of land Nicholas Wirick for \$558 on January 9,1812. This land lay on Indian much, Little Cedar Creek, Fairield District, and was originally granted to make Alston as 160 acres on January 1, 1787. John Brown and James Walker 22 thessed the deed.

Thomas Mc Kinstry was born in 1779 and died in 1833. He was buried the Alston family cemetery near old Mossydale School. Jane McKinstry, low of the recently deceased Thomas McKinstry, on June 28,1833, made tain agreements with her children: Eliza C.Bonner, wife of Samuel ther; Harriet Kennedy, wife of Alexander Kennedy Sr. (who had died testate), Maria Hamiter, wife of John J.Hamiter, Clementine Salena E.

daughters were to retain the slaves that had been given them, and that her son Thomas W.McKinstry would have one-half of the home place on home creek at the age of twenty-one years . She was to retain the other half of the home place and at her death the slaves to go to her daughters and her half of the home place to go to her son Thomas W.McKinstry.

On June 11, 1835, Jane McKinstry gave her son Thomas W.McKinstry her power-of-attorney. This power-of-attorney was used later in the year hen Thomas W.McKinstry, on October 13, 1835, representing his mother Jane eKinstry, signed for her as one of the several distributees of the estate if Samuel Alston, Esquire. Her share of Samuel Alston's estate was 154 1/4 heres of land on Little Cedar Creek: bound north on Mary Alston's land; list by William Robertson's land; and on the sounth by Jacob Wirick's land. Ohm Mc Kinstry signed for himself and as the representive of Margaret Kinstry. Their share of the estate of Samuel Alston was 358½ acres of 24 and on Creeked Run Creek and Little Cedar Creek.

Jane, wife of Samuel McKinstry (the elder) and Margaret, wife of m McKinstry were sisters, and were daughters of John Alston and sisters

Samuel Alston. It can be assumed that the John McKinstry, here mentioned, the second son of John and Jane Mc Kinstry. He must have improved "in mind."

James McKinstry, the third son of John and Jane McKinstry, lived

James Mc Kinstry, Little River, Chester County, made his will on anuary 8,1829, and it was proven on March 8,1830. To his daughter Jenny, he had married Thomas Jamison, he left one dollar since she already had it share of the estate. To his grandson, James Jamison, he left \$50. The left of his estate he left for the support of his wife and four other hildren: John Washington Mc Kinstry, William Percy Mc Kinstry, James dung McKinstry and Mary Ann Mc Kinstry. His wife and her brother Andrew Queston, along with James Strong were named the executors of his estate.

The following members of the family of Thomas W.Mckinstry, son of muel and Jane McKinstry, grandson of John McKinstry, and his wife Mary C. Kinstry, are buried in Bethel Methodist Churchyard, lower Fairfield muty:

As previously mentioned, John, son of the elder John McKinstry, beably recovered "in his mind" to marry and raise a family. I can find other John McKinstry that would fit into this pattern. John Mc Kinstry that 78 acres of land on Grooked Run Greek from William Mott for \$350 October 4, 1835: bordering on the lands of J.M.McKinstry, A.M.McDowell, the estates of Moses Camak and John Alston. Harriet Mott signed her 27 lease.

THE BALLENTINES

There were Ballentines of German, Scottch-Irish and English testry in South Carolina from the earliest days. On November 11,1736,

In the Forks of Crooked Run Creek and Little Cedar Creek

Pursuant to a warrant issued on November 5, 1771, 150 acres of land was surveyed for Nicholas Wyrey (Wirick) on Crooked Run Creek: bound southwest on John Hansearington, and on all other sides by vacant land.

The land was surveyed on November 10,1771, and the Royal Grant dated May 21,1772.

George Monglett and Peter Reamick, Lancaster County, South Carolina sold Nicholas (probably the young Nicholas) Wirick, of Fairfield County, 150 acres of land on Cedar Creek for 25 pounds, sterling, on January 1, 1798: bound southeast on land of George Freshley and vacant land; southween Nicholas Wirey(Wirick); and on the other aides by vacant land.

James Mann, on August 17,1802, sold Nicholas Wirick 134% acres of 1: on Little Cedar Creek. This land was part of 150 acres that had been granted James Mann on March 6, 1786, and at the time of the original surves bound on the northwest by land of Nicholas Wrick, southwest on Robert McCants, southeast on Elijah Wallens and vacant land, and on the northeast by vacant land. Mary and Samuel Alston witnessed the deed; Agnes, wife of James Mann signed her release.

Thomas McKinstry and wife Jane (Jean) sold Nicholas Wirick a tract of land for \$558, on January 9,1812. This land lay on Indian Branch, Little Cedar Creek, and had been surveyed for John Alston for 160 acres on January 1,1787. On resurvey, it was found to contain 279 acres. James Walker and John Brown witnessed the deed. Jean McKinstry signed her relea
