- 1. John McKinstry of Richland Co., S.C., in his will, proved 05 Oct. 1795, names wife Jane and sons Samuel, John, James, and Thomas.
- 2. Samuel, b.1769, d.26 May 1836, m. Margaret Alston (daughter of John Alston and Mary Boyd of Fairfield Co.) b.21 Dec.1770, d.12 Sept.1832. EDERINGTON'S HISTORY OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY, S.C., compiled by Mrs.B.H. Rossen, Mrs.A.H.Maybin, and Mrs.G.D.Foxworthy in 1957, identifies the children of Samuel McKinstry as John McKinstry, who moved to Alachua Co., Florida; Thomas McKinstry, who remained in Fairfield Co., and Nancy McKinstry m. Capt. Billy Broom.
- 3. Nothing is known about the John McKinstry mentioned in the 1795 will. The will alludes to some sort of physical or mental impairment which might require that his brothers take care of him.
- 4. James McKinstry b. ___ m. Jane Alston (sister of Margaret above) b. 15 Aug. 1779.d. 1844.
- 5. Thomas McKinstry b.1779, d.21 Aug. 1833 is buried in the Alston Family Cemetary. I am unable to find any records as to his marriage and descendants.
- 6. There is a family dispute over who were the parents of John McKinstry mentioned as the son of Samuel and Margaret (2.above). A tradition alledges that James and Jane McKinstry (4.above) were his parents. The family Bibles do not provide a list of the descendants of either Samuel or James, and I have not located wills or other clarifying documents. NSDAR records contain this gap.

I would appreciate any information on the descendants of this family. The John McKinstry who moved to Florida was b.01 Apr.1800, d.07 Oct. 1860 and m. Margaret Emmaline Smith, b.01 Jan.1821, d.13 Aug.1899. They were the parents of two surviving children, William Fletcher Smith McKinstry, M.D. and Margaret Emma m. William Robertson

The Blumes were not among the earliest settlers along Horse teek, and, in fact, lived more on Big Cedar Creek, but they intermarried with the earliest settlers and can best be considered here.

JOHN BLUME, a native of Germany, was born on May 18,1826, and died time 15,1908. His wife Harriet Susannah was born on June 25,1838, and died ebruary 28,1926. They are buried in the graveyard of St. Andrews Lutheran Church near Blythewood. They were the parents of Frank and Noah Blume. Frank Blume married Mary Gradick, daughter of David Gradick and Mary Ann Leitner. Noah Blume married her sister Marion Gradick. Noah Blume has born September 17,1870, and died March 17, 1953. His wife Marion tradick was born June 16,1875 and died July 1, 1953. They are buried in 16 de churchyard, Oak Grove Methodist Church.

THE McKINSTRYS

According to Mill's map (1820-improved 1826), T(Thomas) Mc Kinstry's none was just north of Horse Creek where that stream crossed the Old nosboro Road and close to present day Beulah Church.

JOHN McKINSTRY, Richland County, Camden District, had 274 acres of and surveyed for him on Toms Creek by Phillip Pearson D.S., on August 21, 789. This land bordered on the land of Griffin Harris, the Salomon land, and on vacant land. The plat was certified by F.Bremer, S.G., on 17 arch 1, 1790.

On the following day, May 25, 1805, James Alston sold Thomas Ekinstry 150 acres of land on Big Branch of Big Cedar Creek for \$300: ound north on George Smith; east on land granted to Margaret McCullough; outh and east on the lands of Peter Entzminger; west on Herman Dash. This and was part of 197 acres of land granted George Smith on April 2, 1792, and by him released to Francis Lee on December 28,1797, and by Thomas Lee leased to James Alston. Frances Alston, wife of James Alston, signed her 21 lease.

Thomas McKinstry and his wife Jane (Jean) sold 279 acres of land Nicholas Wirick for \$558 on January 9,1812. This land lay on Indian each, Little Cedar Creek, Fairield District, and was originally granted to the Alston as 160 acres on January 1, 1787. John Brown and James Walker 22 thessed the deed.

Thomas Mc Kinstry was born in 1779 and died in 1833. He was buried the Alston family cemetery near old Mossydale School. Jane McKinstry, low of the recently deceased Thomas McKinstry, on June 28,1833, made tain agreements with her children: Eliza C.Bonner, wife of Samuel mer; Harriet Kennedy, wife of Alexander Kennedy Sr. (who had died estate), Maria Hamiter, wife of John J.Hamiter, Clementine Salena E.

Taliferro, wife of John A. Taliferro; and her son Thomas W.McKinstry. Her daughters were to retain the slaves that had been given them, and that her son Thomas W, McKinstry would have one-half of the home place on lorse creek at the age of twenty-one years . She was to retain the other half of the home place and at her death the slaves to go to her daughters 23 and her half of the home place to go to her son Thomas W.McKinstry.

On June 11, 1835, Jane McKinstry gave her son Thomas W.McKinstry are power-of-attorney. This power-of-attorney was used later in the year then Thomas W.McKinstry, on October 13, 1835, representing his mother Jane ckinstry, signed for her as one of the several distributees of the estate samuel Alston, Esquire. Her share of Samuel Alston's estate was 154 1/4 dres of land on Little Cedar Creek: bound north on Mary Alston's land; list by William Robertson's land; and on the sounth by Jacob Wirick's land. Ohm Mc Kinstry signed for himself and as the representive of Margaret Kinstry. Their share of the estate of Samuel Alston was 358½ acres of 24 and on Creeked Run Creek and Little Cedar Creek.

Jane, wife of Samuel McKinstry (the elder) and Margaret, wife of McKinstry were sisters, and were daughters of John Alston and sisters

Samuel Alston. It can be assumed that the John McKinstry, here mentioned, the second son of John and Jane Mc Kinstry. He must have improved "in mind."

James McKinstry, the third son of John and Jane McKinstry, lived

in Chester County. He bought from James Brice and Alexander Douglas, deministrators of the estate of David Dennen for his children, 100 acres of land on the South Fork of Wateree Creek for \$100. Fourteen years later, December 31, 1829, and for the sum of \$100, he sold this land back to 25 the Dennan children.

James Mc Kinstry, Little River, Chester County, made his will on anuary 8,1829, and it was proven on March 8,1830. To his daughter Jenny, he had married Thomas Jamison, he left one dollar since she already had at share of the estate. To his grandson, James Jamison, he left \$50. The left of his estate he left for the support of his wife and four other alldren: John Washington Mc Kinstry, William Percy Mc Kinstry, James oung McKinstry and Mary Ann Mc Kinstry. His wife and her brother Andrew Queston, along with James Strong were named the executors of his estate.

As previously mentioned, John, son of the elder John McKinstry, robably recovered "in his mind" to marry and raise a family. I can find to other John McKinstry that would fit into this pattern. John McKinstry ought 78 acres of land on Grooked Run Creek from William Mott for \$350 Cctober 4, 1835: bordering on the lands of J.M.McKinstry, A.M.McDowell, and the estates of Moses Camak and John Alston. Harriet Mott signed her 27 lease.
