

V. JOHN MOBERLEY, son of Edward Moberley, Sr. and Susannah DeRuel md. Mary Beam. Her ancestry is unplaced but she was probably related to one of the Beam families who were early-settlers in N/W Fairfield Co.

John Moberley received a land grant of 50 acres on Broad River, Jan. 17, 1770, Book 18, page 475. There was another grant of 118 acres to John Mobley, Craven Co., Apr. 14, 1773, Bk. No. 18, pg. 474. There was a John Moberley shown on the Lunenburg Tithe list but this may have been his Uncle or a cousin. The children of John Mobley and Mary Beam:

- (1) William Mobley - md. Drucilla Meador
- (2) Isaac Mobley md. _____ Brown
- (3) Susan Mobley - no further record.

The Rev. War records show two veterans named John Moberley. One served in the Mounted Militia.. "John Moberley (from Stubs to Indents, Vol. Y, Indent 388) 30 days services in Capt. Thomas Shannon's Reg. Mtd. Mil. Nov. 21, 1781. This is to certify that the above 30 days duty was done by John Moberley in my Co. of Mtd. Mil. in the time specified above.

"South Carolina, Camden Dist. Personally appeared before me, Burr Harrison, Esq. Justice of the Peace for Camden District, and made oath-dated 1785. 30 days duty as private horseman in Capt. Thos. Shannon's Co. from 21st Nov. to 22nd. Dec. 1781."

The other record of a John Moberley published in Book Q, page 175, '25 days Militia duty 1782 at Four Holes Bridge, Capt. Gray's Co.

John Moberley was not listed on the 1790 Census of Camden-Fairfield Co., S. C. There is nothing in the Probate records to indicate his decease. There were several land grants to a John Mobley after the 1790's in S. C.:

15 Jan., 1823 - William Mobley and Drusilla his wife to John Feaster, Sr. and Jacob Feaster "the plantation where I now live originally granted to William Hill and Edward Mobley and from them conveyed to the said William Mobley."

Land lies on both sides of Beaver Creek.

* VI. SAMUEL MOBERLEY, SR., son of Edward Moberley, Sr. and he married Mary Wagner (Waggoner) a dau of Hans or John Waggoner, May 1, 1761. She was born ca 1743 and died ca 1812. He came to Fairfield (then Craven) with others of his family in the late 1750's. He received several land grants in Fairfield County:
